The exercise, which demonstrated U.S. capability to deploy overseas for rapid tactical operations, included a mock battle in defense of the air base and simulated supporting air strikes by U.S. Air Force R-4 Phantoms and Korean jet fighters. Military Airlift Command C-141 Star-lifter aircrews provided trans-oceanic airlift and assault airdrop for more than 800 members of the U.S. Army's 82nd Airborne Division at Ft. Bragg, N. C.

He is assigned to Osan as a member of the U.S. Pacific Air Forces.

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4-H'ers Put It All Together In County-Wide Safety Efforts

Over a half-million 4-H'ers are enrolled in the 4-H safety program this year.

But safety is of such universal concern that these young people decided to combine their efforts on a county-wide basis for the good of all their communities.

In St. James Parish, Louisiana, 4-H Clubs got together and organized a county-wide safety program in 1970 with tremendous success. The members contacted 5,000 people through poster and essay contests, conducted farm and home hazard hunts and set up outdoor and indoor exhibits. They presented films, held school assemblies and fire drills and arranged a total information program.

Working with civic organizations the various clubs were able to get the week of March 13 designated as 4-H Safety Week. Then all clubs concentrated their efforts on safety in the home, on the farm, in the school and community, and personal safety.

Each 4-H Club conducted a safety program under the direction of a committee and with supervision of local volunteer leaders.

A boy in one club produced a beauty pageant, "Miss Rosebud." It was such a hit at school that it was presented to the general public and over \$200 was raised for charity.

4-H'ers throughout the county involved government agencies, public and civic organizations and mayors of several cities in their safety efforts. They called on executives of public utilities, major industries and banks. They got the cooperation of school boards, colleges and associations.

This is an example of what can and is being done to promote the cause of safety in just one county. And it is being repeated in counties in every one of the 30 states (through the safety program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and supported by General Motors).

Another action program was conducted in Graham County, Arizona, where 2,640 members were enrolled in the 4-H safety program in 1970. This county-wide effort also enlisted the cooperation of service clubs and all public schools in the county.

Graham County activities were concentrated on the problems of bicycle safety. "The most common hazards noted were the laws that youths seem to neglect when riding bicycles on highways and on city streets. These we hoped were corrected through leader and teacher instruction," according to Robert L. Gilliland, county extension agent, who compiled the county-wide report.

"There were 2,640 youths in grades 1 through 8 on a county-wide basis that received instruction and certificates regarding bicycle safety. I think the results were excellent since this was the first time for a county-wide activity of this nature," Gilliland commented.

The 4-H safety program, sponsored by General Motors, offers recognition certificates to clubs and a \$25 cash award for one county in each state reporting the most outstanding 4-H safety program. The award is to be used for advancement of safety.

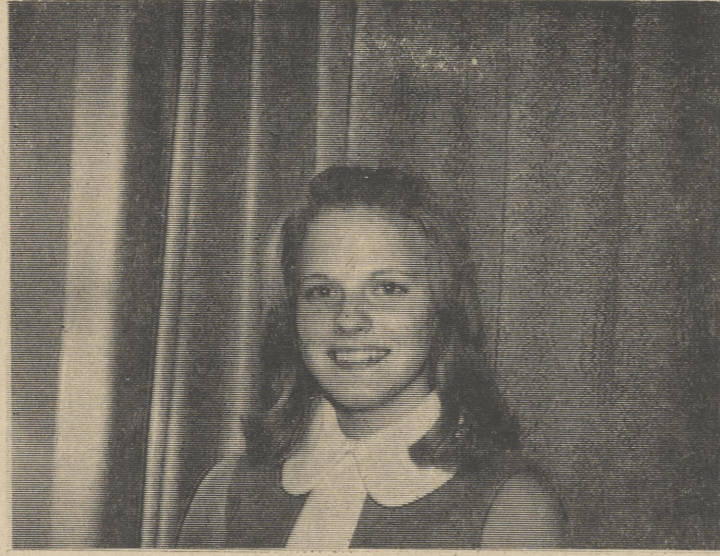
Toni McCready

Veteran's Administration News

Q-I am a Vietnam veteran discharged May 2, 1967, attending school under the GI Bill. Does this bar me from the home loan benefit?
A-No. The availability of the home loan benefit is not affected by the education benefit in any manner whatsoever.
Q-I am a recently discharged veteran. Is there some type of insurance available to me?
If you have a service-connected disability, you may qualify for Service Disabled Veterans Insurance. You must apply within one year of the date of notice that service-connection is granted, but you may apply before requesting or receiving a grant of service-connection. Upon receipt of your application for this insurance, VA will determine if you are eligible.
Also, a veteran may convert his Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to an individual, permanent policy within 120 days after separation from service.
Q-I want to enter college next summer. Should I advise the VA now, or enroll and advise the registrar of my veteran status at that time.
A-You should inform the VA as soon as possible of your plans to enroll.
