# City Will Have to Pay For Testing Its Water

have to pay for testing its water, it was learned Monday night at the November meeting of the Council.

Quoting a letter from the State Board of Health, City Manager Kathryn Derrickson read drinking water standards would be changed and public water suppliers would have to pay for the testing. Formerly, the State Board of Health took care of the situation.

Since the testing would call for, among other things, chemical analysis, Council decided to ask Edward H. Richardson Associates Inc., which has a laboratory in Dover, costs of the tests.





Iridiscent fabrics, with threads of different colors in lengthwise and crosswise direction might be more becoming in one direction or the farm in good condition. other. Hold the fabric up to FRANK KOHOUT, JR. you and decide which color effect is more pleasing.

Currently, stripes are fashioned in a horizontial rather than a vertical direction, and pattern layout can be planned for the effect you want. 
