| Delaware Food Market Report <br> by Anng Homberton <br> If the wor "budget" comjures up thoughts of pennypinching and dull routine, revise your way of thinking. A budget is simply planned spending. This means both mental and written plamning so you will use your food money more economically, yet serve pleasing and varied meals. <br> Sometimes getting started on a budget is the hardest part. You may find yourself asking "How do I start"? Simple. Stant with a realistic budyou can "live with." Then plan your menus and shop around this. <br> Only you can decide when the budget is realistic. For | example, family size influ- ences the budget; family ages also make a great difference. Of course, family preferences as well as health play a big part also. <br> What about meal plans? Well, the best way to approch this is to plan menus for at least 3 or 4 days at a time. Gather together newspaper food ads, cookbooks and recipes, and the Basic Four Food Guide. Consider nutrition, family likes and dislikes, current good buys, your preand available, storage space. <br> As a rule, you will take good care of your family's nutritional needs by serving basic four foods at each meal. To cut cost and maintain nutrition, use these tips: <br> 1. Serve only average portions of food. We meed only 4 to 6 ounces of meat daily, | but many of us eat that amount at one meal. Learn to know what an average serving is; don't over-eat. <br> 2. Use less tender cuts of meat as well as meat sub- stitutes such as dry beans stitutes such as dry <br> 3. If you serye desserts, make them a nutritious part of the meal. A custard or cream pudding provides part of the day's milk requirements. Fruits in season supply vitamiss, ruffage, and variety. <br> 4. If you have a freezer space, buy specials (particularly your family's favorite meats) in larger quantities. <br> When you go shopping, remember a well-organized shopping list is very impor- tant when you are trying to maintain a budget. Use these suggests for your list and as you shop: 1 . Make out your shopping list. from the menus | and recipes you are planning on using. 2. Group your foods. of the list. Put advertised prices and brand names beside items. 3. Record the amount of food you need to buy. Remember, buy meat by $\left\lvert\, \begin{aligned} & \text { the cost per serving, not cost } \\ & \text { per pound. A good rule of }\end{aligned}\right.$ thumb is: Boneless meat allows $1 / 4 \mathrm{lib}$. per serving, meat bone (bone in roast, steaks, ham) allow $1 / 3$ to $1 / 2 \mathrm{lb}$. per serving, and meat with a large amount of bone (spareribs, short ribs) allow $3 / 4$ to 1 lb . per serving. 4.
