ware from the canal down is a sandy plain. The area north of the canal has rocks and other kinds of soil. This means that drainage, sewer problems, and water resource problems of the area below the canal are the same as in Kent County, and we are better tuned to these conditions. Likewise, the best use of the land in agriculture and forestry, housing and industry, depends on soil types, and the geological conditions determine solutions to these needs. Lower New Castle County and Kent will always have these conditions in common, and upper New Castle County will never have them. Likewise, the use of marshlands and the concern for the Delaware Bay and its industry are more real to lower Delawareans since it makes up almost 1/3 of the total area of these two counties, and the Delaware Bay and large marshland areas begins in lower New Castle County below the canal.
