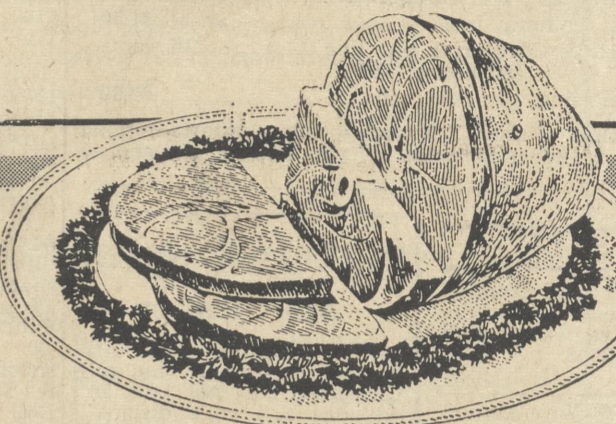
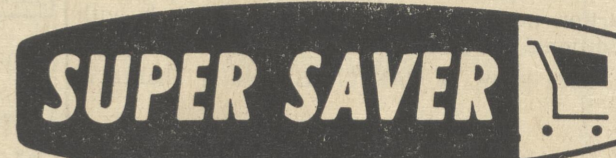

Veterans Administration News

Q -- Do I have to use a VA form to change the beneficiary on my GI Insurance policy?

A -- No. Any clear statement signed by the policyholder is acceptable to VA. However, it is preferred that VA Form 29-336 be used.

Q -- My aunt is a disabled veteran of World War II. She needs care in a home, but does not need nursing home care or hospitalization. Does VA have such homes for women veterans?

A -- Yes, VA has domiciliarys, and those at Bay Pines, Fla., Dayton, Ohio and Martinsburg, W. Va., and Vancouver, Wash., have facilities for women Veterans. Any VA office will help your aunt file an application for this benefit.

Q -- Can a veteran whose

VA benefits have been forfeited apply for their reinstatement?

A -- Yes, a veteran may apply for presidential pardon which, if granted, may again entitle him to VA benefits for which he was originally eligible.

Johnsongrass Research

Efforts to control Johnsongrass are beginning to pay off in Delaware.

A recent addition to the Delaware Code has made it unlawful "to knowingly contaminate uninfested land" or "to knowingly allow Johnsongrass to set seed."

The grass is a sturdy perennial which spreads rapidly and thrives in a variety of areas. It has traditionally been a burden to farmers because it reduces land values and increases food production costs.

Tests on methods of controlling the grass are being conducted at University of Delaware test plots in the Bowers Beach area and east of Georgetown. Although further testing is necessary, at this point some of the treatments are promising.

When Johnsongrass is allowed to grow naturally, it is about as tall as corn and has a seed head that resembles sudangrass and other sorghums. The seeds, which are larger than most grass seeds, can

survive in the soil for several years before germinating.

A number of control techniques are available. To be effective, they must control the underground roots as well as seedlings that develop from shattered seed. The roots are actually rhizomes or underground stems which are capable of putting forth new plants at intervals along their length. Most control techniques attempt to reduce the level of stored energy in the rhizome. This can be done by frequent disking, fall plowing, mowing and grazing.

One promising treatment involves the use of Treflan at about twice the amount usually used for soybean weed control. The chemical is absorbed by the rhizomes and seems to be effective in killing rhizomes as well as seed.

Another useful technique combines chemical treatment with plowing. About two weeks before plowing in late fall, a field of Johnsongrass can be sprayed with Dowpon. The chemical weakens the plant. Johnsongrass cannot tolerate cold temperatures, and the top growth is killed by

the first heavy frost. About two weeks after spraying, the field should be shallow plowed to bring the rhizomes to the surface where they can also be damaged or killed by low temperatures.

Another very promising treatment is spraying with Monsanto 2139. The chemical kills top growth in a very short time. Further tests are being conducted to determine the effect of the treatment on Johnsongrass rhizomes. The chemical seems to leave little or no residue, and a new crop can be planted in the field almost immediately.

Horse Farm Start With Many Services

The Elwin Ralyea family of Harrington, and the Julian Granger family of McLean, Va., have joined forces to bring a new enterprise to this area—the 3RG Horse Farm.

Situated on Road 279 two miles west of Harrington on the former Clarence Willey farm, the 3 RG Horse Farm offers boarding, pasturing and breeding services as well as riding instructions, both English and Western styles.

Open house is scheduled at the farm Sunday afternoon, Oct. 15.

A score or more of young people, chiefly from the Dover area, have signed up for riding classes to be conducted Saturdays and Sundays by Buddy Byrd of Dover, well-known in Delaware for his roping performances at horse shows.

Byrd, who formerly taught horseback riding in his native Pensacola, Fla., before coming to this area with the Air Force, hopes eventually to devote full time to riding instruction at the farm.

Granger, a U.S. Senate investigator, and his wife Alice, a Fairfax County, Va., school teacher, purchased the 70-acre Willey farm last February and associated themselves with the Ralyea family, of 203 Commerce St., in the horse farm operation. The three R's and G's consist of Elwin and Dolores Ralyea and their son, Joseph Ralyea, and the Grangers and their equestrienne, daughter Julie. The Ralyeas are well-known breeders of prize-winning Apaloosa horses.

Since February, the two families and a host of friends have been hard at work renovating the 11-stall horse barn and constructing a solid-oak fence around the two sections of pasture totaling about 20 acres. A stallion run also has been built, fenced also in oak. Helping in the renovations have been the tenants of the farm house, Sgt. Kenneth Sebring of the Air Force and his wife Jane, a Pennsylvania horsewoman.

"We are very grateful for all the wonderful encouragement we have received and for the way in which the whole community has demonstrated their confidence in us—from business leaders to small businessmen to just plain individuals," the Grangers and the Ralyeas said. "We want to make the 3 RG Horse Farm a place that Harrington and all of Delaware can be proud of."

Plans are in the making to create at the farm the Harrington area's first arena for horse shows and training and to make other additions, including a large multi-purpose pond. Facilities for boarding will be added as demand increases.

Truck-Tractor Licenses Should Be On The Front

Delaware registered truck tractors should have a new look about them these days if their owners are in compliance with a new state law concerning placement of license tags on such vehicles.

William J. Warren, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety's Division of Motor Vehicles, issued a reminder to all owners of truck tractors that the provisions of Senate Bill 615, as amended, are in effect now. The Bill, which was signed by Governor Peterson on July 21st, states that the license tag assigned to a truck tractor, whether coupled or uncoupled to a trailer or a semi-trailer, shall be displayed on the front of the vehicle in such a manner as to be easily identified.

Warren said previously tags were displayed on the rear of truck tractors, but it was impossible to keep them clean and easily identifiable when the trailer was coupled, so the law was changed to relocate the tags to the front of the truck tractors. He said a trailer license tag must be displayed on the rear of a trailer or semi-trailer as before. The front license tag law applies to truck tractors only, other motor vehicles must still display their Delaware tag on the rear.

While the new law actually

went into effect when it was signed by the governor in July, Warren said it has not been strictly enforced by the Motor Vehicle Division or police to date in order that all truckers have time to change their truck tractor tags. He stressed, however, that beginning Monday, Sept. 25, the

new law will be strictly enforced by police and motor vehicle inspectors.
