





Remember, the "price special" is a promotion. It is like giving away dishes, stamps, towels and the like. Prices are juggled to attract attention, but give away as little as possible. The average shopper is attracted by these "specials" and will go and buy not only the special but the rest of her groceries. This usually makes up for the bargains gotten on special sale.

Remember, there is little room for food retailers to give anything away since they all operate on small profit margins. They know what will move at what prices and build the price structure to fit this movement and cover their


