It would require the co-operation of all levels of government who have benefited from revenue sharing to determine accurately which should meet a particular need, and to what extent.

The first step, however, is for the state of Delaware to inventory the amount lost for programs for the aged, the handicapped, and the disadvantaged. Then we can better determine how revenue sharing should be used.

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## Area Ditch Work Will Not Be Affected by Nixon's Cuts

President Nixon's recent cuts in federal spending have not affected local community drainage projects assisted by the Soil Conservation Service. Fred Mott, district conservationist, told The Journal Tuesday area projects included Bright-Haynes and Brown's Branch tax ditches.

"We're hoping to start Bright-Haynes in two more months," he commented. He added the Brown's Branch tax ditch comes under a Resource Conservation Development project, covering the state, which has to be approved at the Washington level.

Mott pointed out Brownsville, Prospect and Point Branch tax ditches were under construction.

In fact, he continued, Soil Conservation Service has established a project office in Harrington in the Quillen Building on Commerce Street because Harrington is in the center of ditchwork in lower Kent and upper Sussex counties.

John Bister is manager of the office. Mott emphasized the office was for projects only, that it was not an office open to the public, and persons desiring soil conservation information should get in touch with the U. S. SCS office on U.S. 13 at Camden.

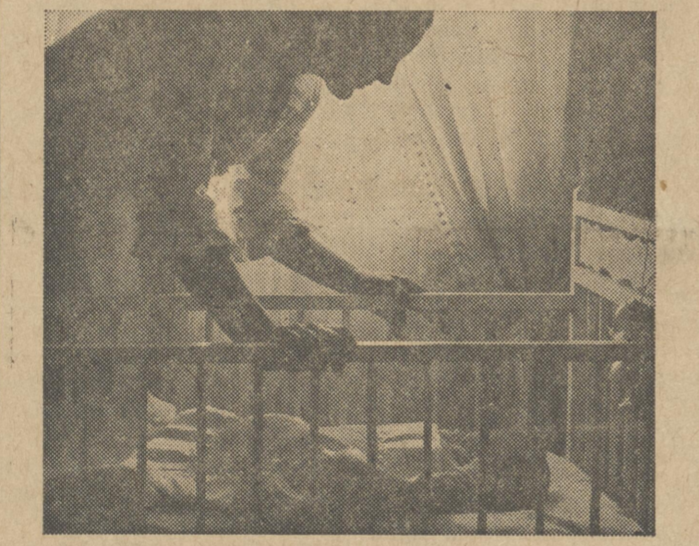

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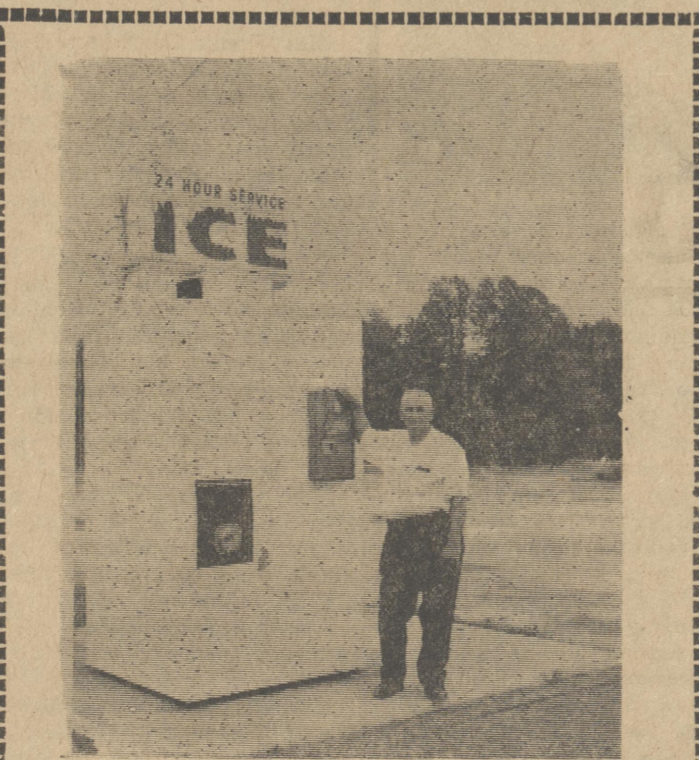

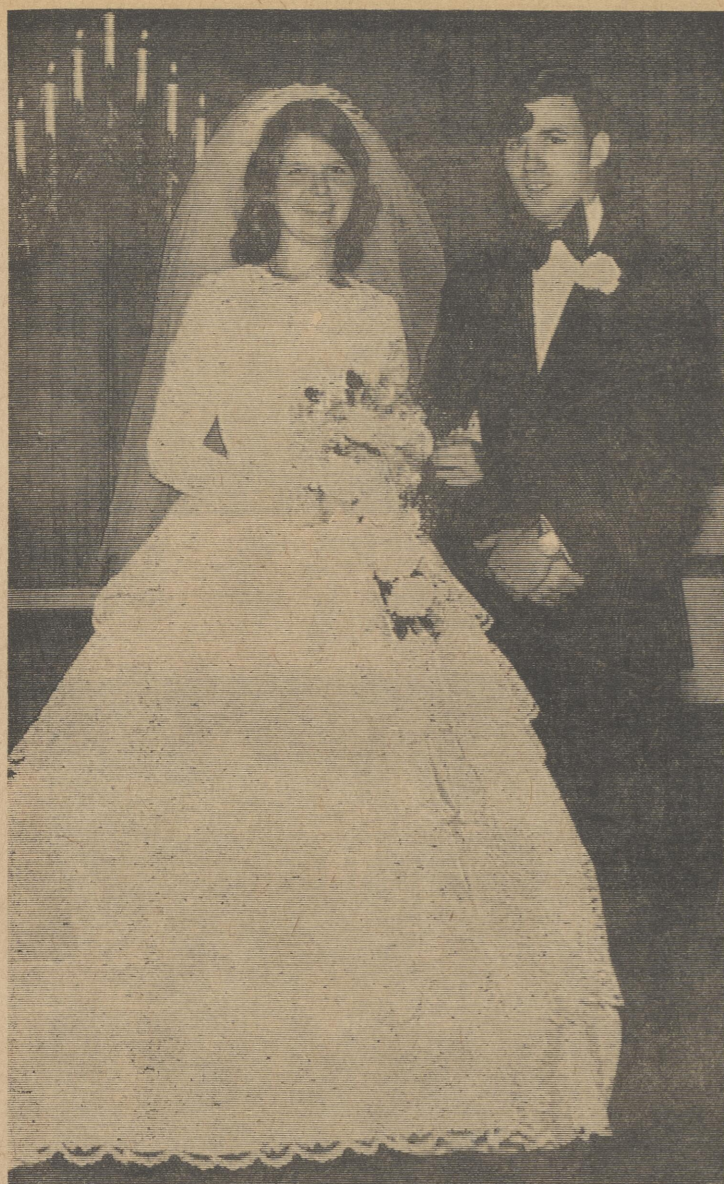

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# TOWN AND COUNTRY TOPICS

Livestock being shipped during severe cold weather should be protected against the extreme wind to prevent chills. Young animals, especially, are susceptible to stress and disease brought on by chilling.

Trucks hauling young pigs and calves during cold weather should have a solid front and side curtains to give protection. Mature animals that have reached market weight can stand more stress and therefore do not need as much protection.

Standing truck floors is necessary to keep the animals from slipping. If young stock is to be hauled, bedding should also be added to the floor of the truck.

If a custom trucker hauls your cattle, check on the cleanliness of the truck, bedding, wind protection, and location of exhaust pipe to avoid prolonged exposure to diesel fumes. Driver experience is necessary in hauling cattle, because sudden starts and stops can throw animals to the truck floor.

Livestock being hauled long distances should be unloaded and given water and hay or light feed every 24 hours. After a long trip, animals should be examined individually. It's always a good precaution to isolate new livestock and keep them under observation while they recover from the trip. If an individual appears to be sick, a veterinarian should be contacted immediately.

Young dairy calves are very susceptible to chilling and vulnerable to pneumonia and enteritis. If young dairy calves are to be hauled very far, they should have had colostrum and be over seven days old.

When shipping feeder pigs to market in cold weather, you will be money ahead to have the truck well bedded and enclosed. Crowding will also put young pigs under stress.

Consumers will be helped by a new law that requires the window in window packages of sliced bacon to be at least one and a half inches wide and show at least 70% of the length of a representative slice of bacon.

In the past, all the shopper could see of the bacon was the lean on the top edges of the strips. The new law, effective next month, makes it possible to judge the amount of fat also in the strips.

Another regulation requires that all cured meats or products containing cured meat, such as frozen dinners with bacon, to be labeled with the ingredients used in the curing process. In the past, when meats were cured with a simple solution, ingredient statements were less important than now when more complex curing solutions have come into common use.

With all the talk about fuel shortage, it is quite possible that we might be heating our homes with wood in the future. Someone once said that wood heats you twice, once when you cut it and once again when you burn it.

Here is a list of various woods, which are listed in order of heat producing capability: hickory, white oak, beech, sugar maple, red oak, birch, ash, red maple, elm, yellow pine, white pine, and aspen.

Seasoned wood is best for heating. Soft wood and green wood do not burn as well. You should give a woodpile of fleshy split green wood about four to six months to dry out under cover.

Apple and pear are the best woods available for a fireplace; they burn clean and hot, giving off a delightful fragrance, but they are in short supply. Pine, poplar, hemlock, and willow do not give off much heat and erupts, splits, pops, and sparks as they burn. Black cherry also burns hot, but pops out sparks.

One of the nicest things about wood fuel is that it is a renewable resource, and properly managed woodlots will supply fuel needs with no damage to the environment.

## Delaware Food Market Report

As it looks now, the Administration is not going to impose price controls of any sort on the raw agricultural products which make up the nation's food supply. The exceptionally large increases in farm product prices, and processed foods and feeds during the past two months were largely attributed to the unusual weather patterns we all have been having.

When will food prices come down? If and when the supplies of food get larger and it won't be until then regardless what the government says or does. Meat cannot be produced fast enough for prices to drop very soon. It takes the planting and harvesting of fruits and vegetables to increase the fresh or processed supplies. Therefore, no major food item is likely to decrease in price before summer.

What about now? Wholesale prices for beef, pork, lamb and veal will remain high during March. Perhaps some weakness in the market may occur in March due to larger imports and larger marketings of beef. Import controls on meat have been relaxed so that shipments will increase. However, imports are small in relation to domestic consumption. Don't worry about buying imported foods because all foods that are imported, no matter which one, must pass the same standards for safety

and purity that domestic foods must meet. The processing plants abroad are carefully inspected before approval is given, and sampling of the food is done at the port of entry.

Also, the widening margins, rising consumer incomes, and lower rates of unemployment will tend to keep prices strong. In addition, pork production will be less than last year and the expansion of broilers has temporarily halted. Broilers will be coming to market during March at about the same number as last year. This type of meat will continue to be one of the lower cost meat choices. Turkey supplies will be larger in March. Egg prices will hold about as they are until we go into the season of heavy production this spring.

Storage stocks of many fruits and vegetables will continue below a year ago. These include pears, onions, cabbage, and potatoes. Stocks of apples in controlled atmosphere storage about equal those of last year. Frozen orange concentrate for juice is in ample supply. Stocks of frozen cherries in the institutional sized pack are equal to or slightly larger than a year ago.

Fresh fruits typically in season in March are bananas,

pineapples, avocados, grapefruit and oranges. The leading fresh vegetables in season include cabbage, miscellaneous greens, broccoli, and mushrooms, as well as a variety of vegetables from winter producing areas.

The foods listed for March by the USDA as Plentiful Foods include turkeys, dry beans, and peanuts, and peanut products. Another short list but one that is full of good top quality protein. As you shop check your market for specials on these foods throughout the month.
