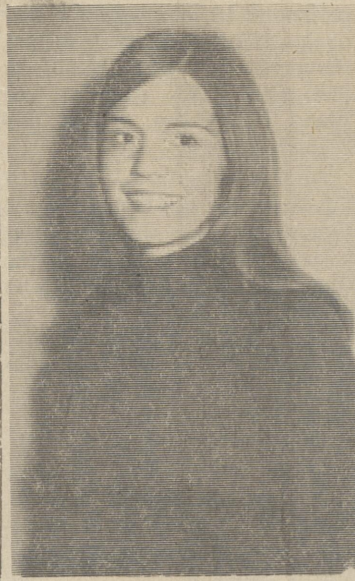

Police Chief and Patrolman Resign, Effective April 29

Harrington's nebulous police force is still playing musical chairs. City Council at a special meeting Monday night, accepted the resignation of Chief of Police Richard Bradley, effective as of April 29, after City Manager Jack Harrington read a letter from Bradley who had been

here 19 months. Reason for resigning was accepted as "a better job." While the site of this new position was not mentioned sources said he would be going to the Milford police department. Patrolman Ed Layton, on the force since Feb. 7, had also resigned, effective as of April 29,

to accept a post in Frederica. However, he did not appear before Council or send in a letter of resignation and the Council took no stand on it. Council Monday night acted rapidly to repair the shortages in the force by appointing Patrolman Paul Davis as chief at \$150 per week.

It also appointed Glenn A. Favre of Smyrna as a full-time patrolman. He had worked here as a part-time patrolman before going into the Marine Corps. Favre, 24, will begin duty tomorrow. The force also includes a part-time patrolman, Wayne Wheeler.

Derrickson Found Guilty In Murder Rap

Charles R. (Bobby) Derrickson, 34, of near Harrington, was found guilty Tuesday in Superior Court of first degree murder in the death of the "Farmington Man."

A date for sentencing has not yet been set, but first degree murder carries a mandatory term of life imprisonment, which in Delaware is considered 45 years.

The jury of seven women and five men returned the unanimous verdict 2 1/2 hours after hearing the final arguments and receiving their instructions from Judge John J. McNeilly. Derrickson sat impassively at the defense table, as he has throughout the 10-day trial, while the verdict was read.

Defence lawyers said they would appeal the verdict. Derrickson was found guilty of shooting Carl Wayne McNeal, 25, of Tyrone, Pa., and then setting fire to the body. The charred remains were found in the still-smoking ruins of a shack on Kent 311 near Farmington on Dec. 12, 1970.

Phone Co. Plans Major Cable Work In Felton

Diamond State Telephone Co. engineers are now planning an \$89,000 cable addition in the Felton exchange area which is scheduled to get started in July and be completed by Nov. 1, reports Jim Strickland, the firm's Kent County manager.

The project require placing 16,450 feet of underground cable and 250 feet of aerial cable. Buried cable will start 370 feet west of Walnut St. in Felton and go west on Road #57 to the intersection of Road #56 then north on Road #56 to the intersection of Road #248.

Strickland pointed out that this cable addition is required for additional wire facilities for customers in Sandtown-Petersburg and Whiteysburg communities.

During 1973-74 the Diamond State Telephone Co. plans to invest an additional \$225,000 for cable work in the Felton exchange area.

City Council Accepts Annexation

The City Council, at a special meeting Monday night, accepted the results of a referendum Thurs., April 5, when there was no opposition to annexing a large tract east of the city.

The area borders the north-bound lane of U.S. 13 and a branch of the Penn Central Railroad. It includes some lands belonging to the Progress Corp., of Milford; lands of Milton Hubbard, Cadillac Realty Company and Capital Shopping Center.

Some 60 acres of the Progress Corporation land has been sold to Consolidated Thermoplastics, a subsidiary of Dart Industries, which is expected to start construction of a plant in a few weeks. This land is the rear portion of the former Greenaway property.

City Council Monday night heard a request to rezone the land from agriculture to manufacturing. A hearing on the rezoning will be held at 7:30 p.m., Mon., May 7, at the regular May meeting of the Council.

The Planning & Zoning Commission will act on the rezoning the same night and give its decision to the Council which has the final say.

In their final business Monday night, Council learned from City Manager Jack Harrington that Robert S. Moyer, director of division of housing for the state, and a representative of Leon

Weiner Associates, Wilmington builder, wanted to hook up a housing project to the city's sewer and water.

The project is a 15-acre tract, mostly outside the city limits, on County Road 275. It calls for 50-low rental modular houses and a community center and is sponsored by the Housing and Urban Development department

He is survived by his wife, Clara M., and a sister, Mrs. Esther Pride of Harbeson.

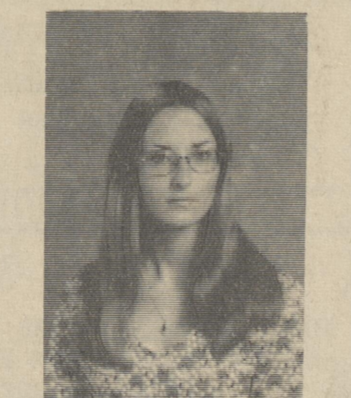

Trackman At 2-1 After Split

Ed Webster's track Spartans own a 2-1 log after beating Dover Air 93-44 and losing 102½-38½ to a powerhouse Dover Squad.

Lake Forest is a young team with perhaps four point-scoring seniors and some outstanding youngsters. Some of the freshman and sophomore distance runners are approaching times good enough for athletic scholarships.

Don Bryant and Don Parker were triple winners at Dover Air, the former in the jumps and the latter in the sprints. Charles Baynard won the high hurdles, was second in the low to teammate Lee Dunbar and was runnerup to Bryant in the long jump.

Sven Osmundson swept the shot and discus, with Matt Burgess third in each. Benny Cohee and Ricky Wright took second in the discus and shot respectively.

Neil Travis and John Pickett were on the winning 440 and 880 relay units. Ron Dunlap ran 880 and mile relay quartet.

Ron Mosely was second to Bob Baca, the Falcon's distance ace, in the mile, then upset Baca in the half mile, with a lifetime best of 2:08.1. Ron shadowed Bob for 660 yards, then easily won the sprint to the tape.

Another highly-touted Falcon, Jack Taylor, bit the dust in the two-mile run. Lake Forest sophomore, Eddie Thompson, stuck like glue to Taylor, then strong 440 yard drive.

Thompson's 10:41 effort was 10 seconds better than his previous best time, set in 1972. Sandtown's Joe Voshell, a splendid freshman prospect, who has no previous running experience, recorded a fine 11:20, in only the second race of his career.

Harry Benson, another fresh-

man, is only 14 but has experience beyond his years. Benson set personal marks with a 5:04.5 in the mile (third) and a 58.5 in the 440 (second). Benson then anchored the mile relay to victory after Kit Tilghman made up a huge deficit on the third leg. Shellfont Waples, a veteran track performer is having his best year. Waples, ran 59.2 for third in the 440.

Kevin Wooters was second in the high jump, a new event for the Spartan sophomore.

Don Bryant set a new Spartan long jump record in finishing a close second to Dover's state champion, Jim Solomon. Bryant unleashed a mighty leap of 21 feet, 9½ inches, to erase the Lake Forest standard of 21 feet, set by George Turner in 1972. Solomon stretched out to 22-2½ to eke out the win. Bryant then outleaped Solomon in the triple jump with a superb bound of 41 feet, 3¼ inches. George Turner's Spartan record in that event is about 4 inches further and could fall soon.

Bryant later anchored the unbeaten Spartan 440 relay team to a 45.6 triumph, as relay specialist Neil Travis brought the Spartans from behind on the third leg. Freshman John Prickett and senior Don Parker were the other relayers.

Despite the one-sided loss, the Spartans had some other bright moments. Junior Ron Mosely, followed his 2:08.1 effort at Dover Air with a swift 2:04 win in the 880, a personal best by 4 seconds. Chris Wetherhold's 2:01.5, Spartan standard may not last out the season.

He spun the platter 102 feet, 9 inches, getting an exclamation from one of the fireplugs, "Hey, that skinny kid can throw!" Matt held the lead until a 6 foot, 4 inch, 300 pound Senator pushed him back to second with 107 feet 6 inches.

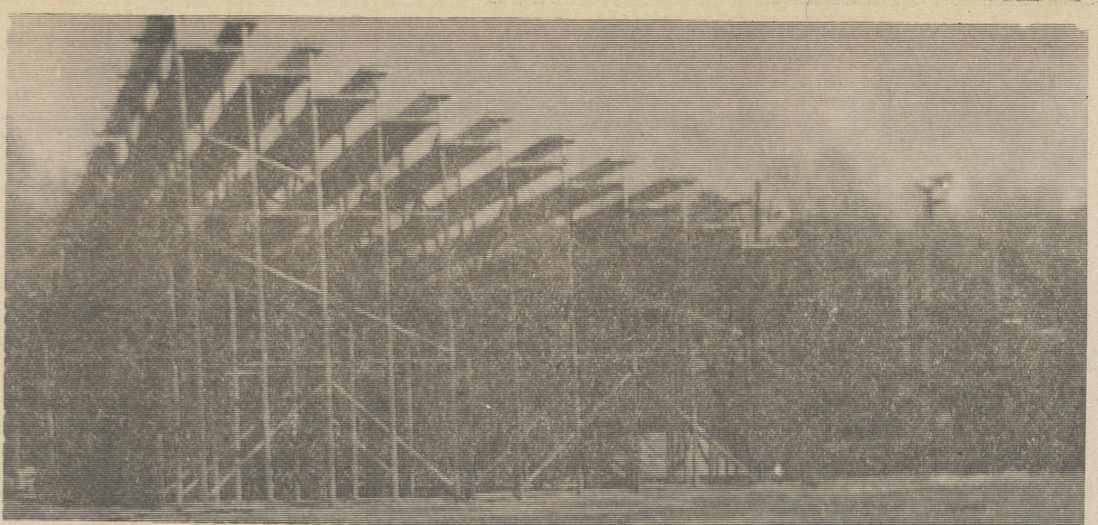

It Seams To Me

Pick a pocket and add it to the dress you are making. Pockets can be ornamental as well as useful. Even if your pattern doesn't show a pocket you can add one of your own. If you're trying to add a functional pocket and you don't want to change the design lines of the garment, place the pocket in the side skirt seam. You probably have a pattern for this type of pocket in another dress and it's a simple matter to copy it for the garment you are making.

An ornamental pocket can attract attention to that part of the figure, so be careful where you place it. If you are wider than average at the hipline, two conspicuous pockets will make the hipline even broader.

The size of the individual should be considered when adding patch pockets. A petite figure can look overpowered with big pockets, and one pocket might be better than two.

Patch pockets will become almost inconspicuous on a print fabric when you match the design exactly. This should be done on stripes and plaids, too, but if you want a decorative pocket, reverse the stripe direction or cut the plaid on the bias.

Pockets must be made with precision if you expect a professional appearance. If you aren't sure of your skill or don't want to take the time for the detail required, better leave the pockets off. Make a practice pocket first if you're trying intricate pockets such as a welt or bound buttonhole type.

Welt, flap and bound pockets are made on the same principle as bound buttonholes—with many variations. They require the same care as a bound buttonhole and are usually made in tailored type garments.

The patch pocket appears so simple that it's easy to do a careless job. A few suggestions may help give professional results.

Don't sew the pocket flat to it. An embroiderer or decorator for your hand to slide in easily. This is especially important in a woven type fabric which does

not stretch. If you don't leave room enough for your hand, the top of the pocket soon can rip from the garment. If you follow pattern markings exactly, you'll find the pattern usually allows for this ease.

Watch the lower curved edge of a patch pocket; this edge must be evenly rounded. An easy technique—run a line of machine stitching on the pocket piece on the seam line of the curve. The seam line will then turn under slightly on the stitching line, so you can press the seam allowance smoothly. Or make a double pocket, stitching on the curve with small stitches. Trim seam and turn with all raw edges to the inside.

Trim the seam allowance to about half of the original five-eighths inch and also cut out chunks of extra fabric in the curved seam allowance. If you expect to top stitch the pocket in from the edge, you'll probably eliminate the seam trimming.

Raw edges of fabric should not peep out at pocket curves. Enclose the edges of top pocket hem before attaching and miter the lower corners.

Most patch pockets are top stitched close to the pocket edge. The heavier the fabric, the farther from the edge you should sew. Some heavy fabrics are lined before attaching to achieve a smoother appearance and to make sewing easier.

There are ways to attach patch pockets by stitching from the inside only. This works better on some fabrics than others, and it's difficult to do well without a lot of practice.

Do your most careful work on a pocket because everyone sees it. An embroiderer or decorator pocket must be especially well sewn or poor workmanship will detract from the decoration.

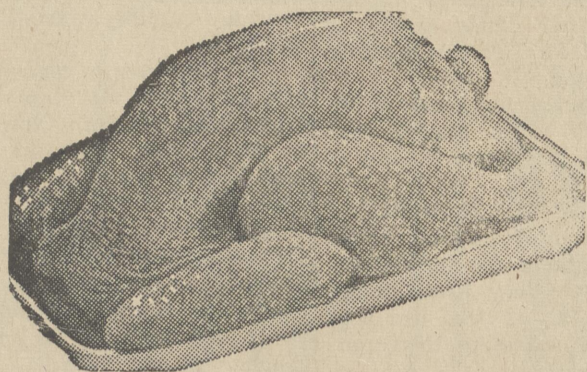

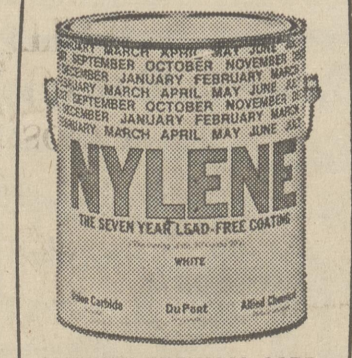
