Recreation and appointments highlighted a meeting of more than three hours Monday night in the Library of Lake Forest High School of the Lake Forest School Board.

BIDEN SHOWS INTEREST IN FUEL SHORTAGE

The problem of fuel shortage in Delaware during the coming months continues to be in the forefront of Congressional activities this week, as well as participation in voting on health care legislation, aid to small businessmen, and discussion in

committee on the problems of auto emissions control and compliance with the clean air act of 1970.

As a followup to the meeting held in my office last week with Delaware fuel distributors, the Delaware Senator William Roth, and Rep. Pete DuPont joined me in sending a letter to the Chairman of the Oil Policy Committee of the Department of the Treasury urging his assistance in averting serious problems in Delaware during the proposed predicted shortage.

Two specific points mentioned in the letter were a request for special consideration and a priority allocation of fuel for Delaware because of the anticipated flow of visitors and tourists into the state during the summer; and a request that the guidelines for allotment be put into effect as soon as possible to avert any suspension of deliveries by Phillips Petroleum to Delaware's distributors.

I also sent a personal letter to the General Counsel for Phillips to encourage their compliance with the presidential guidelines to insure continued supply to Delaware.

The Senate passed several bills aimed at improving the quality of health care including legislation to set up a National Institute of Health Care Delivery, which would research and develop the most effective way to get good adequate health care to all citizens, and bill to develop better localized emergency service systems which has long been a concern of mine.

The Senate also passed a bill which came out of my Banking Committee which would provide for an increase in the amount of funds authorized for grants and loans to Small Business Administration.

And, in my Water and Air Pollution subcommittee, we began what will be a series of eight hearings to look into the ability of automobile manufacturers to comply with the clean Air Act of 1970 by cutting down auto emissions.

So far the committee has which has done a study on the heard testimony from the National Academy of Sciences, possibility of American manufacturers complying with the law by 1975-76 and from representatives of the Honda and Mazda, Japanese corporations, whose cars have met or come close to meeting the clean air standards.

KENT COUNTY CURRENTS

Today I'd like to discuss the local service function concept and Kent County financial policy. Shortly after I came to office, the City of Dover demanded that Kent County give tax relief to Dover residents on the grounds that there was duplication of services and that the city should not be paying for these services. This attack has been repeated regularly. Just last week we received a list from the city, of county responsibilities which the county does not acknowledge. The argument goes like this: Kent County has a board of assessment and the City of Dover has a Board of Assessment. Therefore, property owners within the City of Dover should not bear the cost of the counties Board of Assessment.

When this argument was first presented to me it had a ring of validity, and yet, it also appeared like the tip of an iceberg requiring a careful evaluation rather than an emotional response, so, Kent County, with the concurrence and approval of the City of Dover employed the University of Delaware to study the local service function budget for Kent County. Their completed study received national acclaim for its quality and thoroughness.

The study was emphatic in its recommendation against a local service function budget in Kent County. After we received it, I appointed a citizens committee to further evaluate the report. Mr. J.P. Harboure, a member of the Dover Chamber was chairman of the committee and representatives of the City of Dover as well as citizens from all walks of life participated in this evaluation. The committee was also emphatic in its recommendation against a local service function budget for Kent County and concurred with the report of the University of Delaware. Therefore, the concept insisted on by the City of Dover and in particular, Crawford Carroll, has been studied in depth by professionals and by local residents, and the local service function concept has received resounding opposition from everyone who studied and assessed the concept thoroughly. There are four substantial objections to the concept:

First, it provides no tax relief for residents of the county who also may not be receiving the benefit of all county services. In other words, to quote the report "The critical disadvantage of the local service function concept is that it (Continued on Page 5)

Have you ever seen a sheep dog trial? In nearby Pennsylvania and Maryland, several International Sheep Dog Trials have been set. You should plan to attend the 1973 International Sheep Dog Trials and see sheep dogs from five countries compete for \$10,000 in premiums. Here is the schedule:

May 28-29: U.S. Sheep Dog Championships, Erdenheim Farm, Stan Gates, manager, Lafayette Hill, Pa. A team of four dogs, winners of U.S. trials, against teams of dogs from Canada, England, Scotland, and South Africa for the International title.

May 31: International Championships, Buck and Doe Run Farm of King Ranch, Sam Wilson, manager, Unionville, Pa.

June 1-2: International Championships (continued), Fair Hill, Maryland.

The Delmarva Sheep Association would like to announce the 1973 Wool Pool, which will be held Sat., June 16, at the Delaware Fair Grounds, Harrington. The pool will open at 7 a.m. and close at 3 p.m.

Dr. Emory C. Leffel, University of Maryland, will grade the wool. Bids will be opened during early June, and prices will be sent to producers before June 16.

Hay cutting time is upon us. Many people ask when should I cut my hay. The following recommendations for alfalfa, red clover, orchardgrass, and timothy are for optimum quality, yield, and persistence of stand.

Alfalfa: The first cutting of alfalfa should be made at the late bud - first bloom stage to get the high protein and other high nutrients it contains. A hay conditioner is a necessity for first-cutting alfalfa as it will help speed field curing. In cutting the second crop and subsequent cuttings of alfalfa, it is important that the plants be allowed to reach full bloom once a year in order to replenish the root reserves. Usually a 10 per cent bloom for the other cuttings is a good practice and will

make the stand last longer.

Red Clover: Usually, two harvests of red clover should be cut each year. Its early growth does not decrease in feeding value as rapidly as alfalfa; therefore, the first cutting of red clover is generally made at 25 to 50 per cent bloom, and the following harvest taken when the plants reach 50 per cent bloom.

Orchardgrass: Good quality hay can be obtained from orchard grass, but you must watch it closely early in the spring. It is one of the first grasses to reach its desirable harvest stage, and once matured, quickly loses desirable forage characteristics. The first cutting should be made by early heading. Starting harvest at the boot stage is recommended. Re-growth can be harvested at 30 days after the first cutting.

Timothy: Quality and yield are obtained when harvested at early head out. Timothy will maintain its palatability much better than orchardgrass, even if it's cut at later stages. Timothy does not produce much re-

growth, but harvesting in the boot or early head stage provides greater probability for re-growth.

What causes "dieseling"? Many cars with anti-pollution systems don't want to "quit" when you turn the key off. They keep running on, or as the experts call it, "dieseling."

An expert anti-pollution tune-up should eliminate the problem. But there are still occasions when run-on will occur. In older cars a chronic run-on usually is an indication of some serious problem. One or all of the following conditions may be responsible:

(1) The idle speed may be set too fast. (2) Timing may be retarded. (3) The fuel may be of too low an octane.

The late model cars are built with tamper-proof idle settings. The older ones can still be adjusted to compensate for proper speed and mix. A tachometer is used to adjust to the best RPM setting. A timing light is recommended to be used with a tachometer to adjust or correct idle speed and timing.

It Seems To Me

It's time to put away those winter woollens. Time, too, to store those woolen fabrics you bought at end-of-season sales to make for next winter. Don't let moths or mildew take advantage of that fabric before you do.

New fabric is not as apt to be

damaged by moths, because moths really like to feed on particles of soil left in stained clothing. This is why moths seem to leave a hole right in the front of the garment, just where you spilled that bit of food and may not even have known it. It is also the reason why clothes should be put away absolutely clean. Dry cleaning kills moths.

With coin-operated cleaning, it's possible to clean a whole load of garments for a relatively small amount of money, especially if the garments are small or lightweight. Then they can be stored clean and brought out for pressing next fall. Many knit fabrics require very little pressing after dry cleaning. Heavier, bulkier garments such as winter coats can be stored by your dry cleaner if your storage space is limited.

If you're storing clothes at home, seal them tightly in garment bags or sealed boxes. If you wish to use moth crystals or other preparations, follow directions on the label. Be sure to use enough, for it is the vapor in high enough concentration that kills moths, not just the odor.

Store those unused fabrics in plastic bags and seal tightly. Moth crystals help prevent mildew damage which can cause as much trouble as moths in our Delaware climate.

While you are thinking of storage, it is a good time to give away those garments you are not likely to use again. Give them away before they are com-

pletely out of style and while someone can get wear from them. Then you won't have to be concerned about how and where to store them.

Farm Program Certification Deadline Is June 1

Time is short and in a couple of weeks it will be too late for Kent County farmers to certify their crop and farm program acres at the (ASCS) county office.

Final date for certifying is June 1.

This reminder comes from J. Heyman Roosa, chairman of the ASC County Committee, who also suggests that area farmers have their cropland measured and staked so they will know for sure they are not over- or under-planting their land.

"Certification is not completed," Roosa says. After a producer plants his crop, he goes to the ASCS county office and signs the certification papers. "When he signs," Roosa says, "he is stating in effect, 'I have planted so many acres of allotment and base crops.'"

In certifying, the producer also indicates the amount of set-aside land he has and that land is as productive as his planted acreage. "In other words," Roosa says, "if the average production of the land is 125 bushels of corn to the acre, the set-aside land must also be as productive."

If the farmer wants to hay or graze his set-aside land, he

should tell the county office when he certifies. If he decides he wants to hay or graze later (after the certification) he also should notify the ASCA county office. Set-aside payments are reduced when the land is used for haying or grazing, and failure to notify the county office could result in loss of this payment. The producer must also maintain his conserving base acreage and plant the crop in a workmanlike manner.

Following certification, certain farms are picked at random for a spot check. These farms are visited, and program acreage checked. Accuracy of the certification is determined by comparing actual acreages with those certified by the producer. Those found out of compliance by spot checks may not dispose of their crops to bring their farms back in compliance, and they could lose all or part of their program payment.
