





What is veneer? Veneer is a thin sheet of natural wood cut from a selected log on either a giant lathe or on a slicer. The log is secured in position and automatically moved up against a razor sharp blade which cuts the log into slices or "peels" it off in long continuous sheets. The cutting method determines the appearance of the wood and depends on the wood species, the particular log, and the grain figure desired. The three most common methods used are: rotary cut, flat-sliced, quarter-sliced. Veneer thickness varies according to the end use of the paneling itself. The look of veneer is lovely for your walls, furniture, and floors.


