

Burris Foods Plant Begins Operations

One of the largest food distribution centers in the East began operations here last week. The \$2 million plant of Burris Foods, of Milford, began receiving frozen foods for processing and distribution last week. Shipping out is scheduled to take place this week. Some customers are Acme Markets and the A & P Comptny.

While the parent company is based in Milford, John Burris Sr., told the Harrington Chamber of Commerce some months ago his decision to build here was based on a number of advantages. One was most of the outgoing shipments would go to the west of Harrington. The plant is Reese Avenue at Penn Central tracks where a switch has been provided, an a

15-acre tract. While odds and ends remain to be done at the plant, it is functional. Burris told the Journal last week he planned an open house at a time still to be determined. Construction of Burris Foods here has given the community a boost in its economy. Subcontractors have been given a number of local construction workers assistance and these, and a number of Harrington businesses have benefited.

Tribbitt Looks For Increased Deficit

Governor Sherman W. Tribbitt estimates the State of Delaware will have a General Fund deficit of \$26 million on June 30, 1974, an increased deficit of \$3 million over the estimate released May 14. The Governor's estimate, which is given in accord with Section 28 of the Fiscal 1973 Budget Act (H.B. 676), was submitted to the General Assembly Thursday afternoon. The increase in the projected deficit is attributed to 1) a slight decline in anticipated personal income receipts for Fiscal '73 from the \$111 million, estimated in the projection of May 14, to \$110.2 million; and 2) a reduction in anticipated motor fuel revenues from \$24.7 million to \$24.5 million. The total anticipated revenue from Fiscal '73 decreased from \$301.5 million to \$300.5 million, Governor Tribbitt said. Therefore, the anticipated total deficit for this year is \$3.3 million. For Fiscal '74 - ending June 30, 1974 - the estimated income for the year has been reduced by \$1.5 million, from \$322.5 million to \$321 million, the Governor said. (Continued on Page 7)

Harrington Motor Company Excels With Suzukis

A dealership in motorcycles has saved the day for Harrington Motor Company. Gayle Smith, the owner, said that about two years ago he found himself with an idle building and decided on a Suzuki dealership. He decided on handling Suzukis and picked the brand for the following reasons: 1. In the past five years the growth of sales of the brand has been phenomenal. The sales chart showed where Suzukis had moved from 9th place to a solid third in registrations. 2. Smith selected Suzukis because there had never been a franchised Suzuki dealer on the

Eastern Shore. The Harrington Motor Company franchise encompasses all of Kent and Sussex Counties. To-date, there is no other Suzuki dealer on the Eastern Shore, explains Smith. 3. Suzuki is the only motorcycle sold in the United States that carries a 12-month or 12,000 mile warranty. Smith said last April he sold 32 motorcycles, a record for his business. He cited progress was due to promotion. In the past year, Harrington Motor Company has been influential in promotion of Delaware's first sanctioned American Motorcycle Association

motorcross track at Delmarva Cycle Park in Seaford. Smith, vice president of the Mason Dixon Dirt Riders Club, which owns and operates the franchise for the track, said last year's largest meet saw 49 entries. A recent meet this year had 239. Smith added Harrington Motor Company's involvement had been responsible for a sales growth of 40 per cent over last year. Because of the increased volume, it has necessitated moving to larger quarters on U.S. 13, construction of which is scheduled to begin in two weeks.

"Farmington Man" Sentenced For Life

Charles R. (Bobby) Derrickson, 34, Friday received the mandatory life sentence for the December 1970 murder of the "Farmington Man". Derrickson, of near Harrington, was convicted on April 24 of killing Carl Wayne McNeal, 25, of Tyrone, Pa., and then setting fire to the body in a cabin on Kent 311 near Farmington. The victim was unidentified for several months and was known only as the "Farmington Man." In pronouncing sentence Friday, Judge John J. McNeilly, who presided over Derrickson's 10-day Superior Court trial, said he had formed his own opinion "I have no doubt, be-

yond a reasonable doubt, that you are guilty of that crime, and I sentence you to be imprisoned for the period of your natural life," he told Derrickson. McNeilly called the murder "heinous" and said "in the event that you become eligible for parole, I hope the parole board sees fit to deny you that parole and you are in fact imprisoned for the period of your natural life." Life imprisonment in Delaware is presumed to be 45 years for purpose of parole. Derrickson will be eligible after having served about 15 years, possibly minus time for good behavior. Derrickson's attorney, Richard Allen Paul of the Public De-

fender's office, said something should be said when a man is being sentenced to prison for life. He said the court can dispose of Derrickson's body, but not his mind. Since Derrickson insists on his innocence, that insistence will be pursued on appeal, Paul said. **6 Minner Trout Total 51 1/2 Lbs.** Harold P. City Council Prohibits Thru Truck Traffic

The City Council Monday night voted to erect signs at the terminals of Hanley Street prohibiting thru truck traffic. The measure was consummated after a delegation of citizens complained of truck traffic using Hanley Street to reach the new Burris Foods plant on Reese Avenue at the Penn Central. Mayor William Minner, however, told the delegation he would have brought up the problem even if the delegation had not been present. Some Reese Avenue residents complained about the condition of Reese Avenue. This street has been on the schedule for improvement but it was withheld until the Burris plant was completed. The Council's reaction was a decision to get in touch with the city's consulting engineer, Dudley Willis, of

Edward H. Richardson Associates. The engineer will also be consulted about the feasibility of hooking up the Delaware State Fair grounds to the City's sewer and water systems. George C. Simpson, the fair's general manager, told the Council the fair association hoped to have the sewer system connect with the city's system back of the Dairy Queen on U.S. 13. In other business, the Council acted as follows: Appointed Alfred Holt as part-time patrolman. He has 13 years in police work and was formerly on the Frederica force. 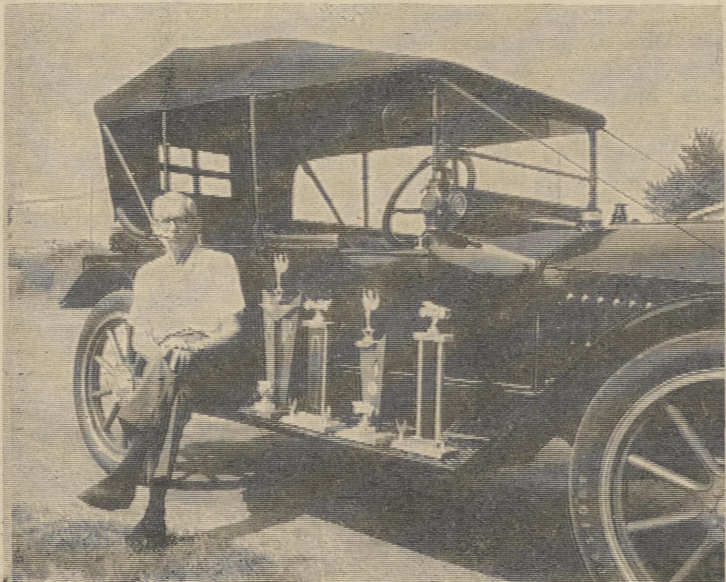

Mulches For The Garden

It's true that so far this year Delaware residents haven't needed to keep soil temperatures down or preserve soil moisture, because we've had so much cool, wet weather. But there probably will be plenty of warm, dry days this summer. So, now is a good time to give some thought to using a mulch in your garden, says Robert F. Stevens, extension horticulturist at the University of Delaware.

Mulches are used to control weeds, to retain soil moisture, and to maintain a more even soil temperature. There are a lot of mulches that will do the job, says Stevens. But before you buy a mulch, it may be helpful to think about some of the pros and cons of the different types. Some mulches are more available than others. Some cost less than others. Some are easier to apply, or more attractive or last longer. And mulches can cause some garden problems you need to be aware of.

Mulches like straw and sawdust need to be supplemented with nitrogen. Other mulches are a haven for vermin like pine and meadow mice, especially if they are applied in the early fall. Some retain excess moisture in the fall and can cause plant damage.

Mulches like straw and hay contain many weed seeds and

may cause more weed problems than they prevent. Others, like pine needles, peat moss and wood chips, are a potential fire hazard and need to be used with caution. Peanut hulls and cocoa hulls are easy to apply, but they do blow away rather easily, and may attract some rodents.

On the plus side, mulches like salt hay - one of the best but a little hard to get, says Stevens. It breaks down rather slowly and doesn't blow away. Pine needles are another mulch that's slow to break down. They are fine for azaleas and other acid-loving plants. Unfortunately they, too, are a little hard to get sometimes, and will cost more. Stevens says licorice root is a rather good mulch that lasts well, looks well and is very easy to apply.

Sawdust is popular on blueberries, but it takes a thick application and is less available than some mulches. Wood chips break down more slowly than sawdust and give good air and water penetration. Bark is excellent, especially pine bark. It is attractive and easy to apply. And then there is peat moss - easy to apply, but with a tendency to blow away. It also has poor water penetration.

Where looks don't count, some people prefer to use layers of newspapers or black plastic film. The film is especially good in a vegetable garden.

You will have to choose for yourself just which mulch offers you the most advantages. And in the interest of cost, you may find it necessary to make a compromise between what you really want and the mulch you can afford. But mulches do fulfill important needs in the garden, and you should consider using one in some form. Make your decision now, Stevens advises. Mulches should be applied by mid-June, to help keep down the weeds, control the soil temperatures and preserve soil moisture through the summer.

Avoid Food Poisoning With Extra Handling Care

More than two million Americans, or one person out of every hundred, suffer each year from salmonellosis, according to government statistics. Salmonellosis is one form of the malady popularly known as food poisoning. While it is rarely fatal, it can be uncomfortable and inconvenient.

Commercial restaurants in hospitals, restaurants, schools and hotels are required by law to maintain high standards of sanitation. Managers of such institutions are schooled in sanitary food handling methods. But, during the summer months many non-professionals get involved in preparing large quantities of food for church picnics, scout campouts, family reunions and other social occasions. These people aren't always aware of the safety measures they should take when handling food, says Barbara DeMesse, extension home economist at the University of Delaware.

Precautions against salmonella are the same whether you're making chili in a camp kitchen or potato salad for the neighbors in the backyard, says Mrs. DeMesse. Here are some of the steps you can take to prevent food poisoning when you handle food this summer.

First, wash your hands before preparing food. If you're inter-

rupted during food preparation, wash your hands again before getting back to work. And wash your hands again after handling food - especially after handling raw meat, fish, poultry or eggs. These all can contain salmonella bacteria.

It is also important to wash utensils and food containers well after using. Use soap or detergent and the hottest water available. Wash chopping blocks and counters before and after each use. Keep separate sponges or dish cloths for counter wiping and dish washing.

Cook foods thoroughly and serve them immediately after cooking. Refrigerate prepared food that is not served right away. Store your leftovers promptly in the refrigerator or discard them. Food that is thawed must be cooked, never refrozen, reminds Mrs. DeMesse.

Plan picnic menus with the least possible perishable foods. Don't serve foods that contain eggs, such as custards or sauces, or salads made with mayonnaise unless they can be refrigerated as soon as they are prepared.

Scrub picnic tables and benches, table cloths, place mats and serving utensils. Try not to handle dishes and utensils that people will eat from, and don't taste with the cooking spoon.

Finally, remember that just because it's a picnic or church supper or campout doesn't mean that anything goes with the food. On the contrary, more precautions must be taken because more people are involved and conditions for bacteria growth are prevalent. Why ruin a good time with a bad aftereffect. Make this summer a healthy one by exercising careful food handling on your picnics and outings.

Freezer Safety

Spring usually brings show-ers, birds, and flowers. It can also bring severe storms which can result in a loss of electrical power.

When that happens, families are often left without refrigerators and freezers for a long period of time, says Barbara De-Messe, county home economist at the University of Delaware.

For those with a freezer full of food and maybe even a separate storage freezer, there is danger the food will spoil.

What can you do if your freezer stops running because of a mechanical problem or power failure? First, keep the freezer closed to keep the food as cold as possible for as long as possible. How long food in your freezer will stay frozen depends on several factors. A full freezer will stay cold much longer than one that is only partly full. A freezer full of meat will not warm as quickly as one full of baked goods. The colder the food is to begin with, the longer it will stay frozen. And a well insulated freezer will keep food frozen longer than one with only a little insulation.

There are other ways you can keep food frozen in an emergency. You could move frozen food to a locker plant. However, arrangements must be made in advance so when the emergency arises you've already made preliminary contacts. If you can get dry ice, it will help keep food frozen till the power comes back on.

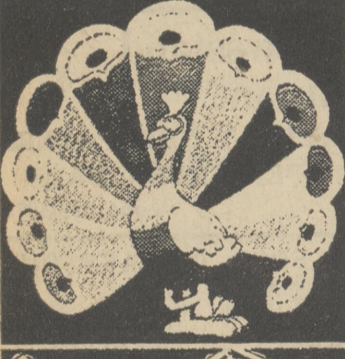
Whenever your freezer isn't working you have to be concerned with food safety. You may safely refreeze most foods that have thawed if they still contain ice crystals or if they are still cold, about 40 degrees Fahrenheit, and have been held at this temperature no longer than one or two days after thawing.

You should be especially careful in refreezing thawed vegetables, shellfish and cooked foods. You can't always tell if these foods have started to spoil. It's best not to refreeze any of these foods when they have thawed completely.

It's also a good idea to use extra care in preparation, packaging and freezing of food for storage to begin with. Food prepared and frozen under sanitary conditions is more apt to stand up well during a freezer failure, since sanitary preparation means fewer bacteria to cause spoilage.

Fresh hog skins from the Jimmy Dean Meat Company of Plainview, Texas, are being used by the Burn Treatment Skin Bank, Inc., of Phoenix, Ariz., as a skin dressing in the treatment of severe burn victims throughout the nation.

Because of the cellular structure closely related to that of human skin, pig skin (in the form of a porcine dressing) has become accepted as the most suitable dressing for the treatment of severe burn victims. Applied directly to the burn area, porcine dressing serves as a temporary skin which prevents body fluid loss and protects against infection and pain.

Skins for porcine dressings are selected daily by a representative of the Skin Bank at the Plainview plant and flown to Phoenix. Upon arrival there, the skins are treated with antibiotics, shaved, cut to a thickness of .015 in., and packaged in a variety of forms in surgically clean conditions and chill-stored to await shipment to hospitals and burn treatment centers throughout the nation.

In explaining the rapidity of this process, the director of the Skin Bank, Francis Hope, said that within 24 hours from the time the hide is removed from a hog in Plainview, the porcine skin made from the hide can be in a dressing on a burn victim almost anywhere in the United States. It has been estimated by the Skin Bank that these porcine skin dressings save at least one life per day in this country and it is known that the dressings alleviate much pain and shorten hospitalization for other severe burn victims.

Private U.S. investors including John B. Connally, former U.S. treasury secretary and governor of Texas, will join the Jamaican government in a major venture to create a beef cattle industry in this Caribbean nation, according to Prime Minister Michael Manley.

Other principals are John Rollins, former lieutenant governor of Delaware, and Pollard Simon, a real estate operator, who, like Connally, comes from Texas. Together they will build a \$5

million meat packing plant, start a feedlot operation and construct a quarantine station for importation of breeding cattle. The government of Jamaica is contributing 11,000 acres of land to the joint venture.

"This welcome project will help us meet our strategic objective which is to make Jamaica agriculturally self-sufficient," the prime minister said.

The agricultural project will require the establishment of a distribution system in conjunction with the meat packing operation. Also it is estimated that the packing plant will produce quality hides for the leather industry on the island.

Starter Solution Helps With Transplanting

If you are getting ready to set plants into the garden or transplant some which are already there, chances are they will do better if you give them a small amount of starter solution when you plant them, according to David V. Tatnall, extension garden specialist at the University of Delaware.

Starter solution is a soluble fertilizer in water. It supplies the plant with immediate available forms of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. The main difference between starter solutions and regular fertilizers is that they are more soluble in water and are easier for plants to use quickly.

They are available from most fertilizer and garden centers. They are very concentrated, and are usually in a ratio of 1-2-1. Since they are available in many different formulations, follow the manufacturer's directions closely in preparing them for use.

Generally, you should use about one tablespoon of starter solution per gallon of water, and apply about a half pint to each plant. It can be poured around the roots of plants without damaging them.

It Seems To Me

Janet Reed

"My dress is tight across the back." This is one of the most common fitting complaints that comes to my ears. I have heard that there are some 50 reasons why the dress seems to pull across the back. I have never been able to analyze that many, but does point up the complexity of getting an accurate and comfortable fit.

The primary reason the garment pulls across the back is because there isn't enough fabric for your figure. The problem is to find out why.

Many figures are broad across the back and actually need a size larger back bodice than front bodice. Therefore, they need to add extra fabric to the back bodice only. If the woman with a large bustline has a too snug fit, the fabric also will pull across the back, but she needs extra fabric in the front bodice.

The fit of the arm hole and sleeve further complicate the problem. If the dress is too long in the armhole, the narrow part of the back bodice hits your figure at the wrong spot and you have a feeling of tightness. This commonly occurs when one buys a pattern size to fit crosswise measurements rather than length proportions. Look for patterns in figure types proportioned to your figure. This has nothing to do with total height. A tall woman may be quite short waisted and find that the bodice of a misses pattern is uncomfortable.

Broad shouldered figures find that set-in sleeves are uncomfortable and cause the fabric to pull across the back. Again,

more fabric is needed for the broad or square shoulder. The seams of a set-in sleeve must follow the joint of your arm for easy movement. If it is too short or too long, the fabric will draw.

In a long fitted sleeve, the fit at the elbow is involved. Fullness must be released at the elbow to provide comfort as the arm bends. If fullness is released above or below the elbow, fabric will draw and affect the fit at the shoulder.

Large upped arms cause problems, too. If there isn't enough fabric ease there will be pull across upper arms and back. There must be at least two inches of fabric ease across the fullest part of the arm.

So you can see there is no simple answer to a simple fitting question. Every figure is different.

Try to find the pattern figure type which fits you best and stick to it. Also, knit fabrics have greatly simplified the problems of achieving comfortable fit because of their natural stretch.

And inspect the area for sticks, stones and other debris. Thousands of people are injured each year by debris shot from the mower's rotary blade. These blades obtain top speeds of greater than 100 miles per hour, so even a small stick can become a deadly misguided missile if picked up by the blade, warns Williams.

Never allow young or inexperienced children to operate lawn equipment. Keep your hands and feet clear of the discharge chute. Many amputations and injuries have been suffered when careless operators caught their hands or feet in the whirling blades of a mower. Wear heavy leather shoes for added protection. Steel-toed safety shoes are best. Never mow in bare feet or sandals.

Maintain your mower regularly to prevent accidents, advises Williams. When you make repairs or adjustments, stop the mower and disconnect the spark plug wires. Never refuel a hot or running engine. Always push your mower, never pull it. And mow steep slopes sideways so that the mower doesn't get away from you.

Riding mowers and garden tractors are especially hazardous. Never carry riders on these machines and be extra careful when backing up. When working on steep slopes, use extra caution to prevent the mower from tipping. Power equipment is a real time-saver and when

properly used can make short work of a tedious job. Improperly used it can be a source of tragedy, injury and death. So think safety.

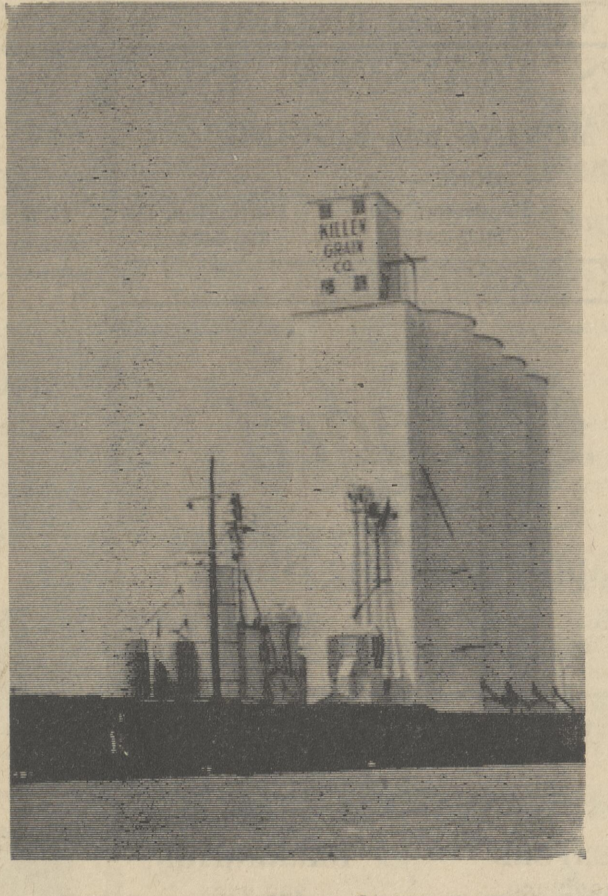

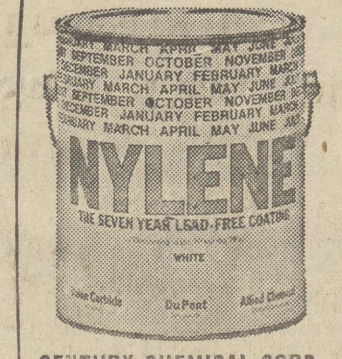

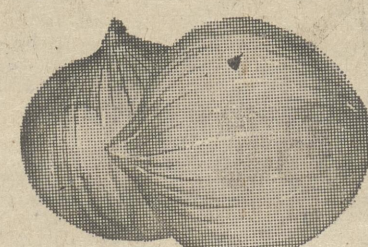
