#### Freezer Safety

Spring usually brings showers, birds, and flowers. It can also bring severe storms which can result in a loss of electrical power.

When that hapens, families are often left without refrigerators and freezers for a long period of time, says Barbara De-Messe, county home economist at the University of Delaware. For those with a freezer full of food and maybe even a separate storage freezer, there is danger the food will spoil.

What can you do if your freezer stops running because of a mechanical problem or power failure? First, keep the freezer closed to keep the food as cold as possible for as long as possible. How long food in your

It's also a good idea to use extra care in preparation, packaging and freezing of food for storage to begin with. Food prepared and frozen under sanitary conditions is more apt to stand up well during a freezer failure, sanitary preparation since means fewer bacteria to cause spoilage.
