In the absence of Mrs. Seik, cafeteria supervisor, Mr. Luff presented a proposal whereby cafeteria workers could receive time and a half for overtime. It was regularly moved, seconded and unanimously approved that the subject be tabled until the next meeting when Mrs. Seik could be present.

A dishwashing unit at Lake Forest North or replacement of parts, was discussed. It was moved by Mr. Warrington, seconded by Mr. Price and unanimously approved to purchase a new dishwashing unit at an approximate cost of \$1700. Motion carried.

Mr. Hawkins of the State Department discussed the Sterck School for Hearing Impaired. The board asked that a letter be written the State Department asking the feasibility of satellite class in lower Kent or upper Sussex County.

Mr. Adams explained that under present attorney-general's ruling, the local school district has no authority to remove names from the tax list. Legislation is being provided to give them this authority, but will not be done until the next session of the General Assembly.

The rolling back of adult lunches was discussed at length. Mr. William Griffin and Mr. Earl Griffin, school principals, asked that the Board consider rescinding its motion raising adult lunches to 75c. It was moved that adult lunches cost 15c above student lunches. The motion was seconded. Two members voted against the motion. Motion was defeated.

Upon motion of Mr. Price, seconded by Mr. Warrington, and unanimously approved, Mr. Adams will ask Mrs. Seik to make a study of adult lunches and bring her recommendations to the next meeting of the Board. Motion carried.

The Lake Forest District plan for exceptional children was approved with appreciation to Mr. Markowitz for a job well done.

A review of how money was spent for high school library needs at the high school last year will be made at the next meeting of the Board.

Tuition expenditures for fiscal 1973 were reviewed.

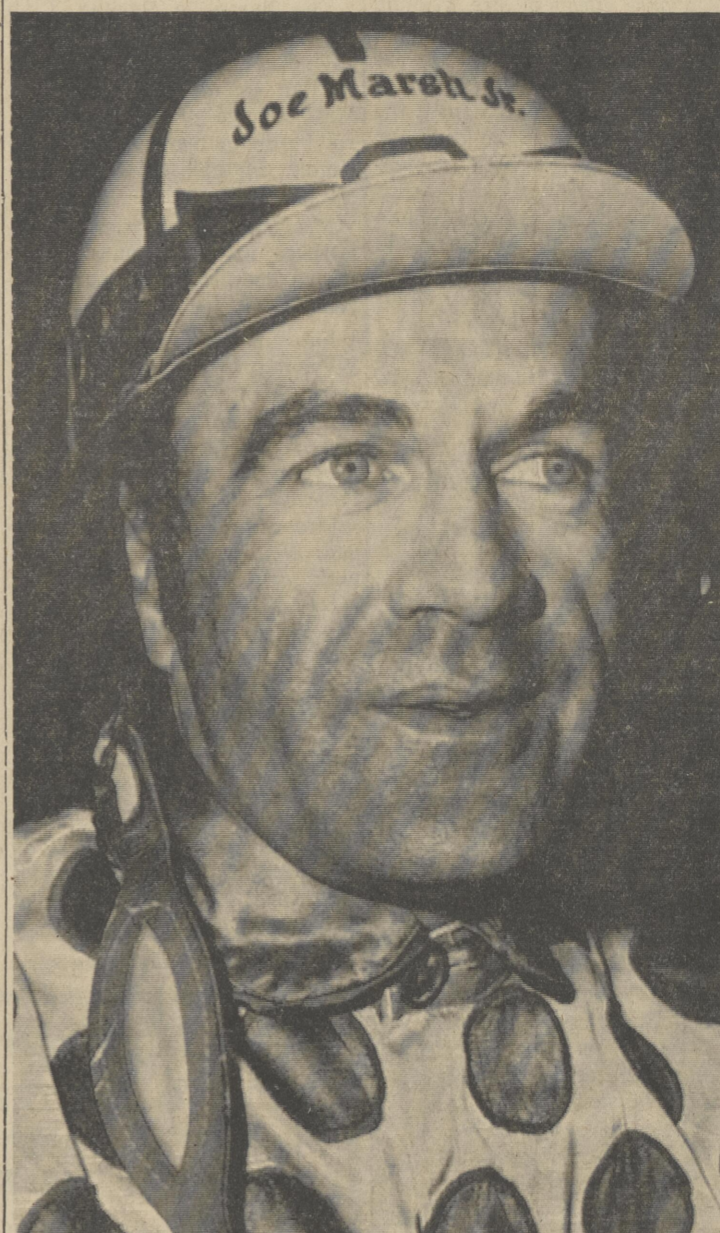

Ride With "The Wheelmen" To Support Safe Bicycling

Sat., Sept. 22, The Wheelmen - the national antique bicycle organization - will be riding their restored highwheels in a Century Bike-a-thon in Delaware, and they are looking for company.

A Bike-a-thon is a bike ride where the riders line up sponsors at so much a mile for as far as they can ride, all done for a special cause. A Century Bike-a-thon is one where the riders try for 100 miles (Yes, the Wheelmen will be aiming for that too!) Riders turning in the most money will be awarded prizes, the top one being a \$460 Raleigh Professional bicycle.

The "cause" that this Century Bike-a-thon is benefitting is the work of the Delaware Friends of Biweology, Inc., a grass-roots citizen's organization, dedicated to improvement of the environment through encouragement of safety for bicycling and bicycle facilities.

Records are made to be broken, but officials at Harrington Raceway were beginning to wonder as they watched their all time mutuel record stay on the books since back in October of 1963 when \$182,341 went through the machines. Finally, however, last Saturday night, almost ten years later, 3927 fans sent \$190,497 through the windows to erase the old mark by a substantial margin. Track President, Herman Brown was elated as he watched the mutuel record tumble stating, "It took us a long time to shatter the old mark, I hope the new record only lasts ten days." The way the Fall meeting at Harrington has been going Mr. Brown's wish may be realized as the figures show strong gains in handle over a year ago.

Coming up this Sun., Sept. 23 Harrington Raceway will play host to a "Battle of Champions" when All-Time World Driving Champion, Herve Filion and Chicago's 1972 Driver of the Year, Joe Marsh Jr. will compete on both afternoon and evening cards of the scheduled doubleheader program. Joe Marsh Jr. is a sprightly 39 years of age and has been one of Chicago's top drivers for many seasons. In 1972 he became only the sixth driver in harness racing history to win more than 300 races in a single year. That total placed him second in the nation finishing only behind Herve Filion, who was in the process of breaking every record in the books.

Joe's greatest horse ever was the recently retired Song Cycle, who ranks 10th among the all time money earning horses in the sport with career earnings of \$559,255 through 1972. The Ohio born reinsman also developed such great pacers as, Glad Rags, Miles Dares and Careless Time, who finished third to the incomparable Rum Customer in the 1968 Little Brown Jug. During his illustrious career Joe has driven twenty-eight 2:00 mes through 1972 and ranks 18th on the all-time list of race winners and 24th on the all-time list of money winners in the sport's long history.

Driving 38 2:00 miles through 1972 and ranking first among all-time money winners is the unbelievable 33 year old "Flying Frenchman", Herve Filion. In 1972 he astounded the Harness world by recording an incredible 605 victories, breaking his own record of 543 set in 1971. An even more impressive total when one considers that no other driver in history has ever won more than 500 races in a single season. Also in 1972 his horses earned a whopping \$2,473,265 in purse money once again topping his own prior record of \$1,915,945 set in 1971. In the same year Herve became the first harness driver to ever win the Hickok Professional

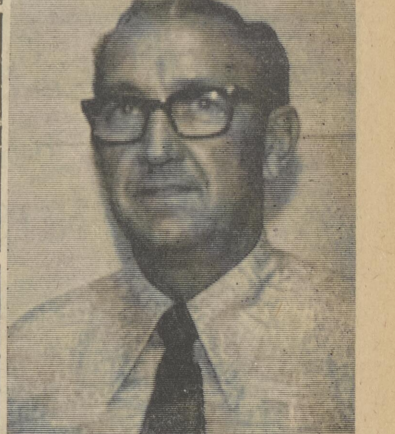

Delaware Food Market Report

By Anne W. Holberton

In less than a generation, the frozen food industry has grown like "topsy". Consumption of frozen fruits and juices has more than doubled and frozen vegetables have tripled in use since 1950.

Why are frozen foods so popular? They save time and energy. They are usually high in quality, if handled properly, since they are packed while the fresh produce is in peak supply and quality. Frozen foods are available the year-round. Last but not least they are often the most economical form of food. For instance, a serving of reconstituted frozen orange juice concentrate costs approximately half as much as a serving of fresh squeezed orange juice. A serving of frozen peas or lima beans also costs half as much as the fresh-half the cost of the fresh form is for the pod which represents about half the weight.

On the other half of the coin, there are a number of frozen foods that cost more than other forms. Why? Because the number of services performed in processing and distribution plus their cost make them more expensive than either the fresh or canned. Examples of this are frozen pies, cakes, biscuits and the like. So when you buy always compare prices so you will know what you are doing.

While you are buying always allow enough time to read the labels carefully. This is your responsibility. Why is this important? Because all frozen food labels must carry the following information: Name of the product, net weight, packers' or distributor's name and address

and a list of ingredients unless standards of identity have been established for the product by the Food and Drug Administration. The importance of reading the list of ingredients is that they are arranged in descending order of volume. When buying chicken pot pie if chicken is listed as the third ingredient then you know approximately how much chicken is in the pie (not much, just the very minimum).

There are special label requirements for frozen meat and poultry foods that move in interstate commerce and they are: the seal of wholesomeness of the USDA, the seal of inspection and the approval of the labels to indicate the minimum meat content. Frozen meat pies must contain not less than 25 per cent meat on a fresh cooked basis in relation to the total weight, including crust. Frozen dinners must contain not less than 25 per cent meat on a cooked weight basis.

Here are a few clues for selection of frozen foods. Avoid frozen foods in shipping cases in the aisles. Always check the condition of the freezer cabinet, it should be clean and the food should not be stacked above the fill line. Check the temperature in the case. Hardness of a package is not always reliable since some packages may be hard at 20 or 25 degrees F. Quality loss at 25 degrees for only one day is greater than for storage of the food at 0 degrees or colder for more than a year. Once the damage is done, it can never be undone. A frozen food package is like an elephant-it never forgets. Last, always select packages that are clear and firm, not torn, crushed, juice stained, or covered with ice or frost. These are indications that the package may have been thawed or refrozen.

Del. River And Bay Authority

The month of August set new records in two areas for the Delaware Memorial Bridge. Records broken were total traffic and total weekend traffic. Traffic for the weekend of Aug. 17, 18 and 19 was 237,485. The previous weekend high was 228,921. Traffic for the month of August was 2,087,893. The previous high month for traffic was 2,006,359 for the month of August, 1972.

Traffic on the Delaware Memorial Twin Bridges increased 81,534 vehicles or 4.1 percent in August over the same month last year. These statistics were made public by Theodore C. Bright, general manager, and are included in his monthly report to the Commissioners of the Delaware River and Bay Authority.

Bridge traffic for August 1973 was 2,087,893 vehicles compared to 2,006,359 for August 1972.

Bridge traffic for the 12-month period ended August 1973 was 19,017,063 vehicles compared to 18,144,240 vehicles for the 12-month period ended August 1972, an increase of 872,823 vehicles or 4.8 percent.

Since Aug. 16, 1951, a total of 269,553,167 vehicles have crossed the Delaware Memorial Bridge.

Test Soil And Order Fertilizer

Delaware farmers should test their soil this fall and order needed fertilizer early for spring delivery, says Dr. William H. Mitchell, University of Delaware extension agronomist.

He points out that last spring farmers faced a commercial fertilizer shortage, and with a fuel shortage facing the nation, fertilizer may be in short supply next spring. But fertilizer companies report no problems of shortages this fall.

In planning next year's fertilizer program, Mitchell also says Delaware growers should remember that (1) the soil on many farms is relatively high in phosphorus as a result of previous fertilization programs, and (2) on most soils in the state, phosphorus and potassium can safely be applied in the fall or winter.

The only way to be sure of how much phosphorus or potassium is in your soils is to have a soils test run. A soil sampling kit is available for \$1 from the county extension offices in Newark, Dover or Georgetown.

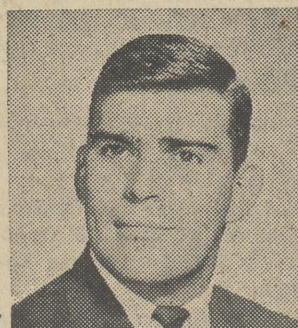

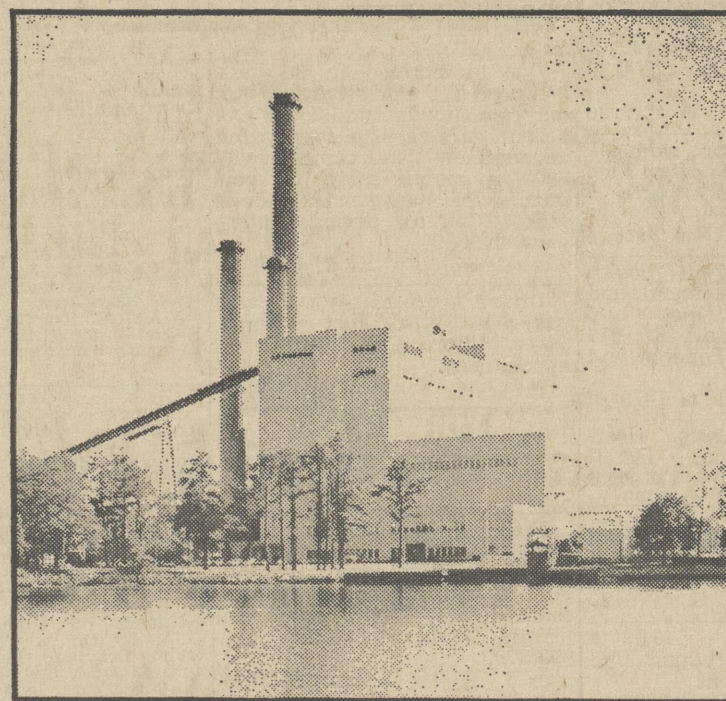

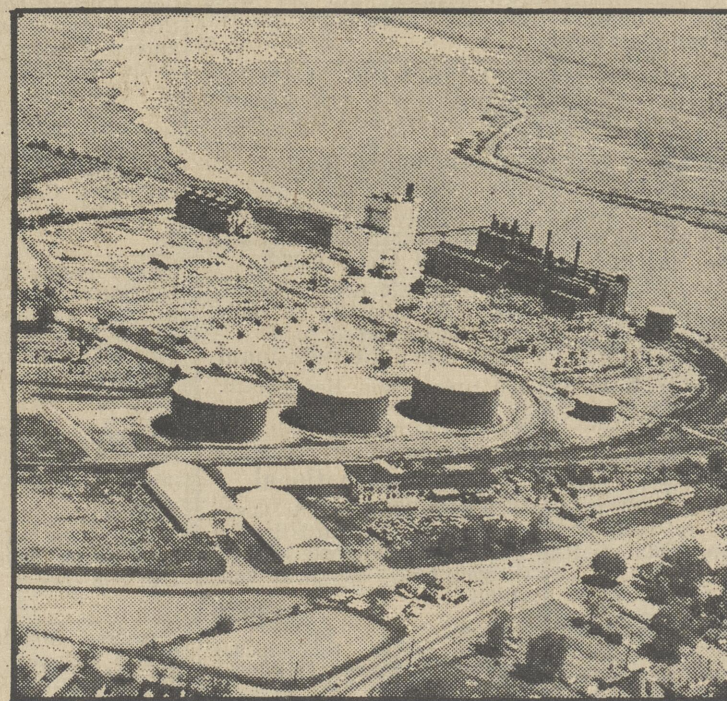

Our soybean crop looks outstanding except for a few insect problems here and there. Soybeans are still growing and especially late planted beans are still in blooming and early pod filling stages. It is during this stage that the soybean cannot stand too much damage to the foliage.

The one insect that is causing most of the foliage damage is the Mexican bean beetle. When infestations are heavy, the beetles feeding on the green leaves will give the soybean field a brown cast when looking across it. In most instances, if damage to this severity is being experienced, spraying is suggested. However, check your beans to see what stage they are in. If pods are filled and the beans are starting to mature, spraying would not be suggested.

The insects that can cause the most severe damage, being completely unnoticed when riding by your field, is the corn ear worm. This insect is not a leaf feeder, but rather feeds on the soybean pods and the beans which are incased in the pod. Detection of this insect is found only by going into your soybean field and visually checking the pods for damage. If, when shaking a plant vigorously to shake the worms off in the row, you are finding six to eight worms per foot of row, spraying would be recommended, especially if worms are one-fourth to one-half inch long.

This insect can be distinguished from the green clover worm, which should not be a problem now anyway, by its larger diameter and darker color. Also, the corn ear worm does not jump around when touched.

When checking these late maturing beans for insect infestations, let's keep some common sense and not go off the deep end like many did early in the

season with the green clover worm. During that episode, there were literally thousands of acres sprayed uselessly.

The Mexican bean beetle and the corn ear worm are two serious pests of soybeans. We are getting late in the season now; many of our early planted beans are quickly maturing and generally the only damage that can be expected is in the medium of late maturing soybeans. If you have any questions or need assistance in determining insect problems, give me a call at the Kent County Co-operative Extension Service, phone 736-1448.

During the fall months we have a lot of uninvited guests in our homes of the insect classification. One that's always an annoying problem for many homeowners throughout the state is the small bug that's black with red outlining on the wings and body. This is the box elder bug and they feed heavily on box elder trees during this time of year.

If you have a box elder tree on or near your premises, you can be assured of this problem almost every year. Box elder trees are common throughout the state. This tree is in the maple family, but few people recognize it as a box elder.

This insect will crawl to the side of your house and get through any cracks, crevices, in windows, and foundation areas during our cool fall evenings. Although a foliage feeder of the box elder tree, this insect does not cause any problems inside the home except being a nuisance.

These insects are easy to control if the tree is small enough to spray; however, if it is a very large tree, control measures will have to be taken at the home, especially if the tree is on someone else's property and you are unable to spray it. Control would consist of spraying around the foundation walls and windows of your house with malathion and liquid detergent in the spray water.

If the tree is on your property and it is too large for you to spray, spraying as much of the trunk area as possible will usually help to control this insect.

Plant Alfalfa Now To Cut High Protein Costs

Alfalfa, often referred to as the queen of forage crops, is staging a big comeback on many dairy farms. This is because of its protein content. Ten pounds of alfalfa will provide a cow with one pound of protein—about a fourth of her daily protein needs, according to Dr. Wilbur R. Hesselstine, extension dairy specialist at the University of Delaware.

Hesselstine urges dairy farmers to grow alfalfa to help ease the high cost of protein feed.

Dairymen who plan to grow alfalfa as a feed crop will have to hurry, though, if they expect to get a crop in this fall. It is important to get seed in soon, if seedlings are to have time to become well established by winter, says Dr. William H. Mitchell, extension agronomist at the university.

If a farmer wants to shoot for high alfalfa yields, the first step is to select a soil with adequate drainage. Root development, nutrient up-take, nitrogen fixation and winter survival depend on adequate soil drainage. In fact, many farmers lost alfalfa stands in the wet conditions last fall and winter.

A second essential for a successful alfalfa crop is proper soil nutrient levels. Mitchell advises farmers to apply two tons of ground limestone before seeding. High-yielding hay crops remove and require large amounts of fertilizer nutrients. For this reason it is advisable to have a soil test run to determine whether applications of phosphorus and potassium are also needed. Existing fields of alfalfa should be fertilized after the third or fourth cutting to help

winterize the plants. One advantage to growing alfalfa is that it needs no nitrogen fertilizer, which promises to be somewhat scarce and more expensive in the immediate future. In fact, alfalfa will supply nitrogen for a subsequent corn crop used in rotation.

Farmers who intend to plant alfalfa this fall may encounter one big problem, warns Mitchell. Seed is presently in short supply and it may be necessary to compromise on their choice of variety. A small amount of Williamsburg and Saranac (which is susceptible to southern anthracnose) is still available in Delaware. An there is still a supply of Team. Some of the private seed companies may also have some of their own varieties on hand. Growers should be prepared to settle for their second or third choice.

It Seems To Me

How do you store your supplies? There comes a time when you need to discard old supplies and reorganize your sewing area. It's easy to accumulate so many odds and ends that valuable time is wasted looking for supplies you have stored away.

First of all, discard all those items that you are not likely to use again. An assortment of colored threads is handy to have when you suddenly need a specific color. But cotton thread will deteriorate in time and may not have the original strength. Use up your oldest threads first. They can be used for inside seams, even if the color isn't exactly right.

Styles in notions change, too. We don't use much seam tape anymore, and I have a number of bolts or partial bolts taking up valuable storage space. I really haven't come up with a good use for old seam tape though. If you have let me know.

Trimings, too, tend to accumulate. These can be donated to groups that do service sewing or sew for Christmas bazaars. Mothers who sew for young children often make good use of trims suitable for children's clothes. Maybe you could fashion a wall hanging or collage for your sewing room made up with odds and ends from your sewing supplies.

Sewing gadgets you no longer use are not likely to be used again. Throw them away or give them away. Maybe there will be a white elephant sale at your favorite Christmas bazaar. Some sewing gadgets qualify beautifully for that.

Once you have cleared out the supplies you will probably not use again, plan storage so you can quickly and easily reach the supplies you do use. Everyone who sews seems to have a favorite type of sewing box that meets their own needs. The important thing is to have like items together and store them where convenient and label if necessary.

Pennsylvania 4-H's Take Honors In Regional Driving Contest

Two Pennsylvania youths drove off with the top honors at the Northeast Regional 4-H Automotive Driving Contest held recently at the University of Delaware.

David Colter, 16, of New Brighton and Marsue Hillaker, 18, of Clinton, were awarded first place in the boys and girls divisions.

Michael Hudson, of Milton, and Ronald Dukewitz, 16, Elkton, Md., took second and third place, respectively, in the boys competition. Elizabeth Schultze, 17, Ransomville, N.Y., and Patricia Williams, 16, Hockessin, placed second and third in the girls division.

Seven states—West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New York, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Delaware—participated in the regional 4-H event.
