In contrast to the long periods of time spent learning the intricacies of football, basketball, baseball, soccer, wrestling, etc., a "walk-on" can sometimes show tremendous ability, in a few minutes, in cross-country. Pepper's first start was against a strong Rehoboth Junior High team. The 14-year-old freshman was near the leaders after the first half mile. Mike Price of Rehoboth, a talented freshman in his third season, led the pack. W.T. Chipman School's sensational duo of Dan Parker and Dave Richter were in the van, as the runners left the woods, with Price third, Pepper was still running well at two miles. At the finish it was Parker, Richter and Pepper, as Price faded to sixth. Parker and Richter have four victories apiece at this writing. Pepper's great 14.49 clocking, for a grueling 2.35 mile course, made him the tenth fastest Spartan. His first start moved him past many older runners who have been training for two months.

Banning Park Named To Historic Places

Banning Park, on the outskirts of Wilmington, has been named to the National Register of Historic Places by the Department of the Interior, according to an announcement from the Division of Historical & Cultural Affairs. The highlight of the 156-acre tract is Woodstock, a brick mansion that is now headquarters for the New Castle County park department. Woodstock was built in several stages, beginning around 1743 and culminating in a Greek-revival house built in 1833. The property was first settled during the seventeenth century by John Richardson, whose heirs, the Latimers and the Bannings, owned it until the present century.

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

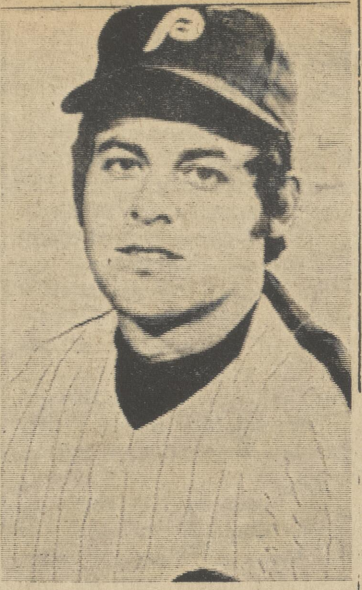
The locals lost to Dover 26-29 in the opener and will wind up a sixteenth straight winning season with a fine 8-2 log.

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TOWN AND COUNTRY TOPICS

New situations in agriculture - You, as farmers this year have experienced many changes in your enterprise. Some have been predicted and others have not. These desirable prices that we are experiencing for these field crops was, of course, predicted last year. These have been compiled with an excellent growing year along with an excellent harvest season. We don't generally get all three occurring at the same time but it has happened this year.

Following are the areas I believe should be of concern to you. It looks as if fertilizers, particularly nitrogen and phosphate, will be in short supply in 1974. This is happening because of several factors. Fertilizer is bringing higher prices for export than for domestic use, due to the price freeze. L. P. Gas is short in supply and this is a primary ingredient in the production of ammonia, nitrogen is in short supply.

In view of this prediction of short fertilizer supply, you should do everything that is available to you in conserving your needs. The best way to do this is through soil tests. This, of course, will not give you nitrogen analysis, but will tell you your need for phosphate, potash, and magnesium. Soil tests will help you make the use of the fertilizers you need. They also tell your lime needs. Lime is the most often overlooked in our fertility programs, yet it is very

important. Many times it is confused with fertilizers. People think one substitutes for the other. This is very inaccurate. Lime provides calcium and magnesium to the soil as well as raises the pH so that out fertilizers can be utilized by your crops.

You should order your fertilizers and lime early so you will have the best chance of getting the supply that is needed. If it is purchased before Dec. 31, it may improve your income tax returns.

Machinery is another essential farm need. As you may know tractors and machinery are hard to come by. Put your orders in for parts, as well as for new machinery, early so as to allow time for delivery. Here again, this year's purchase may be a tax advantage.

In further analysis of today's agriculture, I can't believe high prices will prevail. However, I do believe that reasonable prices will continue for some years over what we have experienced in the last ten years. There are a few of the agriculture enterprise that look promising for the future. Maybe now is a time to consider some of these other enterprises that will fit into your farming program. Some of these may be grain storage, livestock production, and retail marketing of vegetables and fruits.

Some people are of the opinion that agriculture is in a new

era and high prices to the farmer will prevail; but we live in a society that is cheap food minded, therefore, a compromise will be reached, I hope.

One reservation that I have at the present time is the additional 25 million acres of set-aside that will be going into crop production. Also, many foreign countries are gearing up to maximize agricultural output. To what degree these factors will influence our prices is not fully predicted but they certainly could cause some drastic alterations.

It Seems To Me

Home sewing has been discovered by the publishing business. Hardly a day goes by without another mailed advertisement for a reference book on home sewing or crafts. The ads sound great, and in the interest of keeping myself informed I have ordered many of these books. I now have a collection of duds.

Some of the books are useful, but most are a waste of money. You can get more information from inexpensive booklets at your fabric store-or free from your co-operative extension service office. Perhaps it is human nature to assume that if we pay ten dollars for something, it is better than something free. The book may have prettier pictures, a handsome cover and better paper, but the information may not be as complete or as accurate.

If you order any of these books by mail, be sure you have the option of returning them if you are not satisfied. If you don't like a book, return it. One beautiful, expensive book I saw recently contained no more information than beginning 4-H Club manuals. However, the

promotional literature led you to believe it was the greatest ever. I returned that one.

In evaluating the worth of a book, look for a description of the author's credentials. This may not mean a thing, but if there is no reference to the author, you have a right to wonder why.

One reason so many of these references are sold by mail is that you wouldn't buy them if you examined them first. The manufacturer gambles that you won't go to the bother of returning the book. If you need a reference, try your bookstore first and thoroughly examine the book to see if it is right for you.

You may be better off to invest in a good sewing class instead of a book. Once you learn the basic techniques you can get most of the additional help you'll need from the pattern instructions. Also use your common sense and creative instinct and you may come up with solutions for particular problems that are better than those in any reference book.

One wonders how many more sewing books the market can stand, but the interest seems insatiable and the books keep coming and coming. Many are introduced for the Christmas season. Even a major food com-

pany has entered the sewing and craft market, selling fabrics and craft supplies by mail.

But all this tells us one thing: that there are a lot of people wanting to make things with their hands, and that there is a desire for more and more knowledge. Creation of something beautiful seems to fulfill a basic human need. We all need beauty in our lives. Beauty is food for the soul.
