All of the men of the class receive 18 transfer credits for college level, criminal justice courses, by virtue of more than 800 hours of classroom study. It is interesting to note that 10 men in the class have a 4-year college degree in subjects ranging from agriculture to sociology.

City Will Take Steps To Combat Energy Crisis

The City of Harrington will take steps to combat an energy crisis, it was revealed Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council. The gathering took the place of the one normally scheduled for the first Monday in the month.

To solve an impending shortage in power and fuel, the Council proposed to curtail the usual decorative Christmas lighting, to eliminate every other streetlight on Commerce and Clark Streets, but to have a light at intersections, to have

one Christmas tree instead of two. Council also suggested homes dispense with outside lights and Christmas lights. The Junior Chamber of Commerce usually erects the Yuletide lighting, with the City pay-

ing for the current.

The Council took its stand after hearing Richard Johnson, local manager of Delmarva Power & Light Company, tell of a fuel shortage.

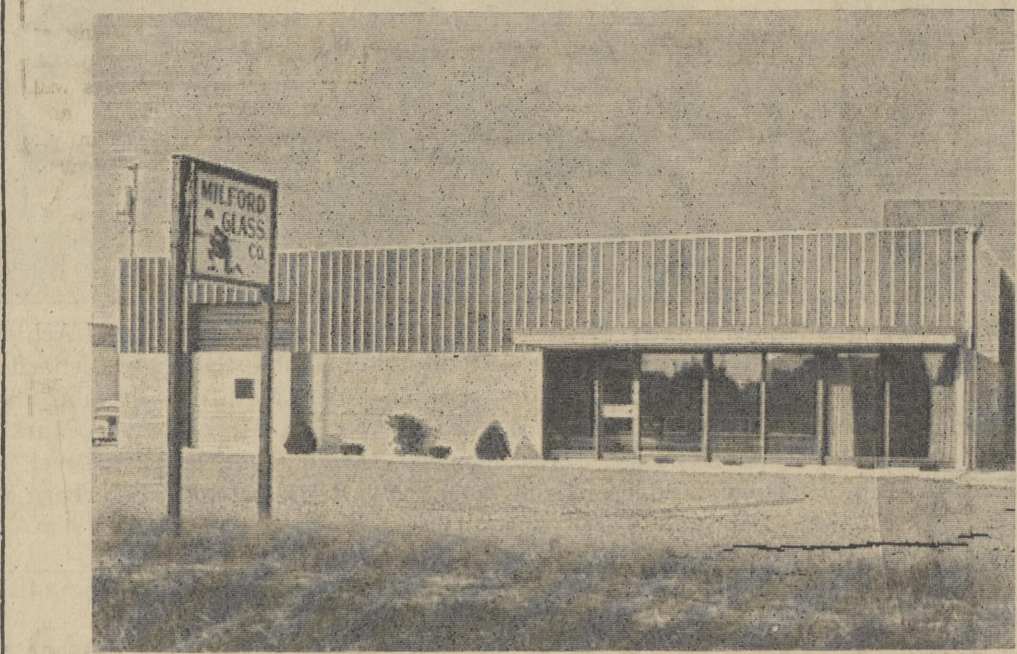
In other business, the Council heard William G. Longest, superintendent of transmission of Delmarva Power, say the Company proposed to erect a 138,000 volt power line on railroad property from Cheswold to Powell's Crossing. It would replace a 69,000-volt line. The new line, explained Longest, would be necessary because of the growth potential down the middle of the state. He hoped to get started in December or January.

The Council, with Vice Mayor James Carroll in the chair, tabled action until the next meeting.

In other business, Council voted to pay Jaycees \$700 due from last year's Christmas parade.

Approved request of Thomas Draper, of Milford, to improve a road on the former Greenaway property on U.S. 13 and dedicate it to the City. This would give Consolidated Thermoplastics Company, under construction, an outlet on U.S. 13.

Previous to Monday night's meeting, the Council visited the new plant of Burris Foods here.

Opera At Milford Dec. 8

Members of the Continuing Arts Committee of Milford Adult Education Association are arranging an early Christmas gift to residents of Milford and surrounding communities.

Sat., Dec. 8 at 8 p.m., a company of the Wilmington Opera Society will waltz into Milford High School Theater with their current production of the Johann Strauss opera, "Die Fledermaus".

Sung entirely in English, "Die Fledermaus" is one of Strauss' most popular creations evidenced by the fact that 1974 will mark the opera's centennial year.

Opera comique in three acts, "Die Fledermaus" is a sprightly musical jewel that lingers little on dialogue while literally sparkling with waltz and polka motifs and spirited melodies. A harvest of dances, romances, drinking songs, czardas, vivacious dance rhythms and choruses, "Die Fledermaus" is a dazzling mixture of Viennese gaiety and French comedy.

Because this single performance will be supported in part by a grant from the Delaware Arts Council, admission will be only \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

For a complete evening, the opera will be preceded by a buffet dinner served in the Milford High School Cafeteria at 6 p.m. Tickets for the combined dinner and reserved theater seat are available for \$7.

Phone Device Aids Apartment Security

Diamond State Telephone Company can help apartment owners reduce unauthorized building 'visitors' with a voice controlled Apartment-Door-Answering-Service, (ADAS).

Despite a variety of security measures in use, such as building guards and alarm systems, landlords say that the real threat to security is posed by the "laxity" of apartment tenants themselves.

Busy with household chores or momentarily distracted, a tenant will unthinkingly give an unknown visitor free access to a building's interior by pressing a buzzer which unlocks the lobby door.

Bob Marry, the telephone company's sales manager for Kent and Sussex, said this doesn't happen with his firm's new system.

"ADAS requires voice contact between tenant and visitor. Which, of course, makes the tenant responsible for admitting his own guest.
