

City Notes Water Rates

Following are the Water Rates for the City of Harrington for 1974.

1. Each new service shall be charged an administrative "tap-on fee" which shall be as follows:

2. Each new service shall reimburse the City for actual connection expenses incurred.

3. Services of four inches or greater shall be subject to a "standby" charge which shall be billed quarterly based on the following schedule:

4. All services shall incur the minimum quarterly billings unless disconnected for the quarter or pro-rata portion thereof. Services are subject to disconnection for non-payment of water-sewer bills, and reconnection shall require payment of the disconnection and reconnection fees in addition to the outstanding water/sewer bill.

B. Residential Services
1. The minimum quarterly

rate for each single family dwelling unit shall be \$6.50 which shall include kitchen sink, full bath, laundry/utility tubs and one outside spigot. The minimum quarterly rate shall be increased by the following fixture charges:

2. Swimming pools over 18 inches deep shall be subject to a \$10.00 per year charge.

C. Commercial and Industrial Services
1. All commercial and industrial services shall be metered and billed quarterly based on the following schedules for meter size and water use.

F. Readiness-to-Serve

S. General

B. Quarterly Sewer Billings
All accounts shall be billed for sewer service at 200 per cent of the quarterly water billing. The sewer billing shall not, however, reflect any disconnection/reconnection fees, "stand-by" charges, or swimming pool charges. Where sewer service is provided without water service, an appropriate and equitable sewer rate shall be established by the City Council.

C. Readiness-to-Serve
Where sewer service is available to underdeveloped parcels of land (not being served by sewer), the owner shall be assessed an annual readiness-to-serve sewer charge which shall be \$0.10 per front foot along the improved public roadway containing the sewer line.

2 Plots of Land Sell Here For Total of \$196,000

The main street appears deserted, the city is in need of adrenalin, but the interest of outsiders gives the impression there's "gold in them thar hills." The past year saw building of 10 townhouses, with sewer laid for 30 more. Furthermore, a cluster of five houses was built in Harrington Manor. Recently, a Baltimore investor purchased two plots here for a total of \$196,000. Included were 40 acres and three lots, belonging to Dudley Willis, which brought \$131,500, with an adjoining 18 acres belonging to Ernest Killen bringing \$64,500. The Willis land was the former Trane Company land. The sale prices were secured from the Kent County Assessment Office. Purchaser was Sidney Monen, of Baltimore. Land was bought thru the Ruth Russell Realty Company, of Baltimore, and the Gilstad Realty of Harrington. William Russell, of the Baltimore firm, said the buyer of the land intended "to sit on it."

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Is your dog a potential victim for canine heartworm disease? This disease is a serious and potentially fatal disease to dogs in Kent County. The long white worms, technically known as *Dirofilaria immitis*, are the cause. The adult worms reach a length of 6 to 14 inches live in the heart and in adjacent blood vessels. A dog may have several of these in his system, although the number is usually less. Long accumulation of adult worms restrict circulation of the blood flow and result in damage to a dog's heart, lungs, liver and kidneys. The important thing for dog owners to remember is that a great deal of damage can occur before any outward signs of heartworm disease are noticed. However, a dog can lead a normal healthy life with a few heartworms in its system, in advanced stages the disease may cause the victim to have difficulty in breathing, constant coughing, tire easily, become listless, lose weight and have fainting spells. If the disease is not detected and controlled with proper treatment, it can lead to heart failure and death.

Heartworm infection is spread by mosquitoes. When a mosquito bites an infected dog it takes up blood which contains microscopic immature forms of heart worms called microfilariae. These incubate in the mosquito for about two weeks. When the mosquito bites another dog, the infected larvae are passed into the second dog infecting it. The infected larvae migrate through the tissues of the body for about three months, then enter the heart where they reach adult size in another three months. Heart worm infection is more common in areas where mosquitoes are numerous and outdoor dogs constantly are exposed to mosquitoes and as a result are the most frequent victims.

The only way to detect heart worm disease in its early stages is through a blood test. Veterinarians can detect the heart worm microfilariae in an infected dog's blood. Signs of heart worm disease that dog owners are most likely to notice include frequent coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring and labored breathing. When the disease enters the critical stages the

victim is usually weak, has difficulty breathing and may faint. By this time damage to vital organs is usually so severe that the dog cannot be saved.

Most dogs can be successfully treated for heart worms if the disease is detected early. The adult worms are killed with an organic arsenical drug given through a series of carefully administered injections. A few days after treatment the worms die and are carried by the bloodstream to the lungs where they lodge in the small blood vessels. There they decompose and are absorbed through the body over the period of several months. A means of preventing the infection of heart worm disease has been developed.

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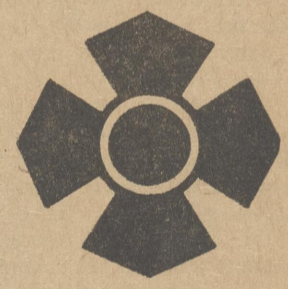
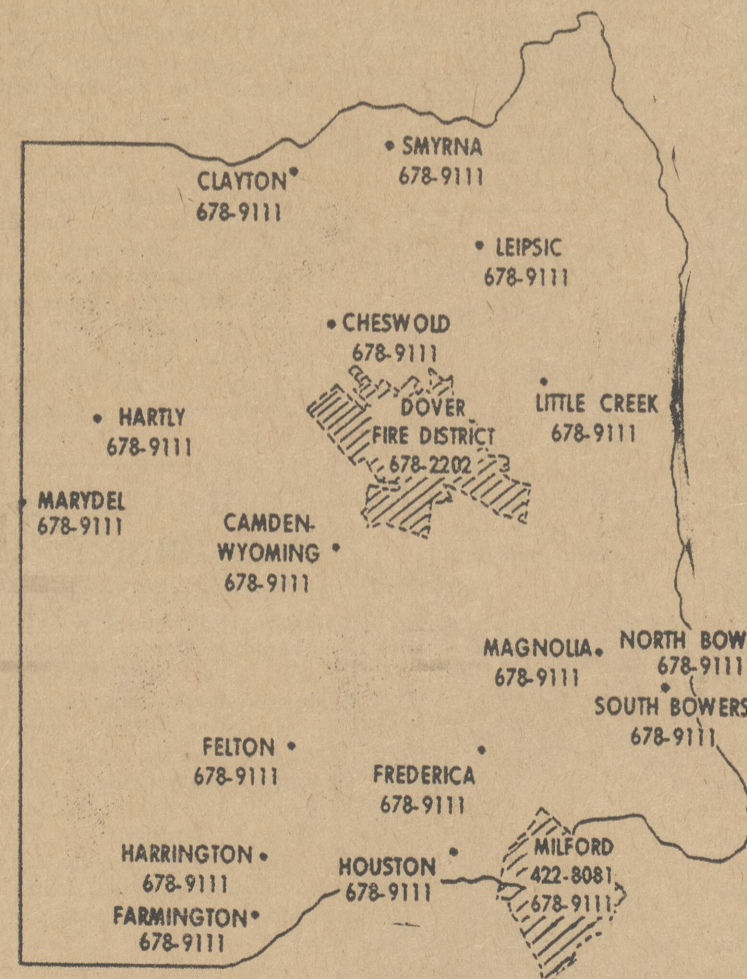
