

The report says, based on state estimates, 52,600 persons from Kent County traveled by air in 1973, using other airports. More than 50 percent of those persons would be projected to use an airport commuter service from Dover.

In terms of total air passengers with destinations or origins in Kent County, that figure is projected to climb from 52,600 to 94,000 in 1980 and 235,000 per year in 1995.

#### Shellfish growing waters opened

An additional 1,000 acres of shellfish growing waters were opened for harvest Wed., March 20 in the Indian River near Oak Orchard by the Delaware Shellfish Quality Control Board on the basis of results of an intensive water quality survey.

The area opened has been conditionally approved but is subject to sudden closure in the event of degradation of bacteriological quality or malfunction of sanitary treatment plants in

Monitorings of water quality, shellfish meat quality and treatment plants in Indian River will continue throughout the harvest

The conditional waters include an area bounded by Pot-Nets Point westward along the shoreline to Emily Gut, then 1,000 feet offshore westward from Emily Gut to Yellowbank Point, then southward to Rock Point, then southward from Rock Point to Channel Marker R-2, then southward from R-2 to an unidentified point eastward of the cove at Falling Point, and then eastward along the south shoreline to Ellis

Point. The opening of these additional areas has been made possible by the combined efforts of the Departments of Natural Resources and Environmental Control and Health and Social Serv-
