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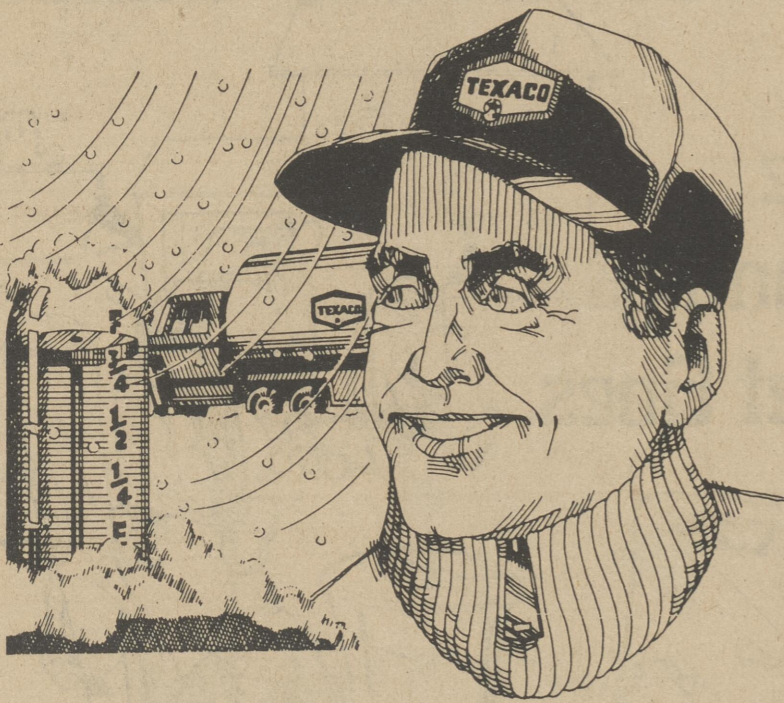
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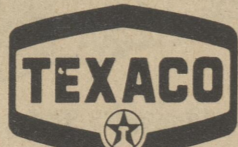
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Methodists Observe Heritage Sunday

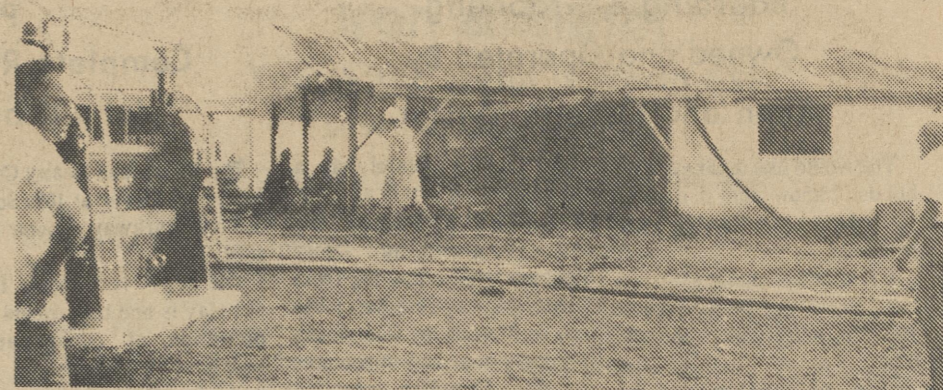

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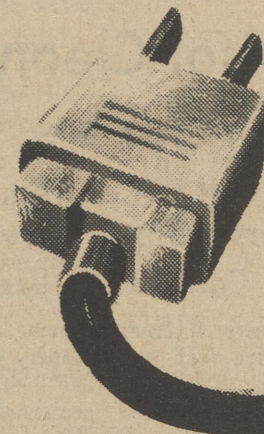
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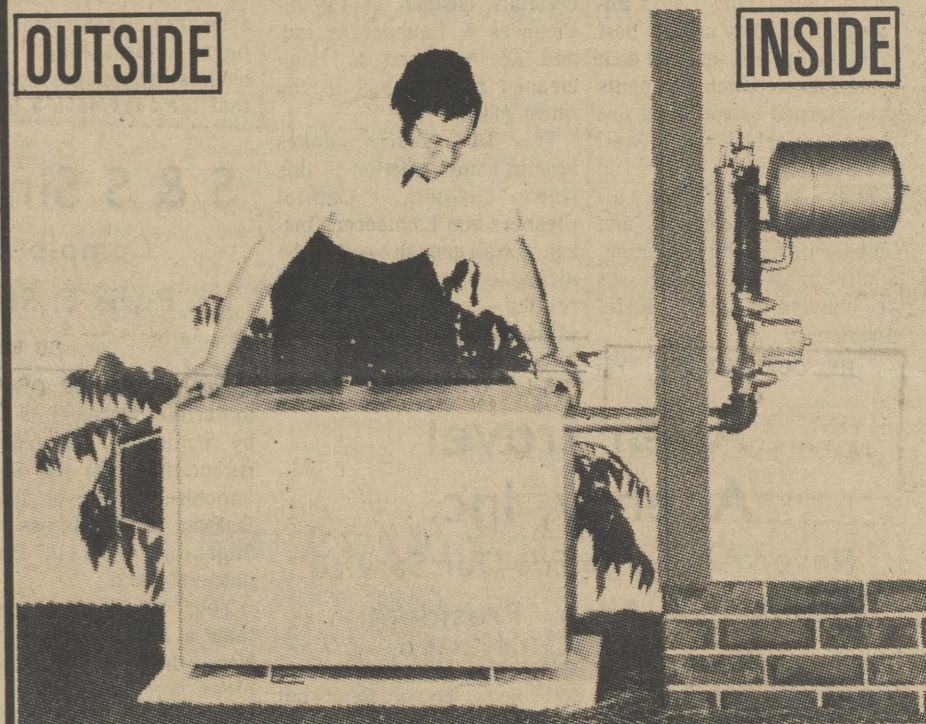

If you're in the market for old decoys of collectible status the Waterfowl Festival's Auction here Saturday, November 9, at 8:30 p.m. might be the source you're looking for.

The Auction will be controlled to include a list of fifty items.

A minimum price will be set and withdrawn if bids do not exceed the established minimum price. Festival officials said.

In addition the auction items will include Waterfowl and Hunting prints.

The Auction is included in the Festival program as part of the Artifacts Exhibition, to be staged in the Easton Fire Hall on Aurora Park Drive. Additionally, collectors may buy, sell or swap oil decoys all three days (Nov. 8-10) in a special section of the Artifacts Exhibit.

City's water system with a 10" line at the intersection of Coleman and Mispillion Streets; that the HUD project would have to connect into the sewer somewhere in the area of the North Street pumping station; and that a portion of the tap-in fee collected would be used to repair the leakage situation on Weiner Ave. The State will pay the City the sewer and water rents which will be figured on a "doubling basis", because it is an area outside the City limits. The plan is to build 50 units on the Masten tract where some will be rental units and others be sale units. No time table was discussed at the meeting concerning construction dates. The apparent feeling of the Council is that the City can go without such a project. It would mean extra revenue to some extent from the stand point of water and sewer rates; however the City might be required to answer health complaints from residents of the project as well as maintenance on the water and

sewer lines. The project will be in the county, and it will not be taxable. The only revenue realized for a municipality (Harrington) would be through the water and sewer rents. This is the route the City has elected to take...if Weiner's Company will go along with it.

Sam Powell was back again before Mayor and Council because citizens of Grant St. (Dr. Lobo's Ward) had again complained about his truck used to pump septic tanks, which he parks in his yard.

Mayor Minner pointed out that the matter had been before Council lately on a regular basis and felt it should be resolved as soon as possible. The main issue is a zoning problem (commercial operation in a residential area). There were other issues cited like a possible health problem, but these are argumentative according to the Council.
