## Center Street Home To Be Upgraded Mrs. Messick Gets Tentative Approval

A benefit dance was scheduled Saturday night at the Harrington Armory to help raise money for improvements to a nursing home owned by Mrs. Mildred Messick. At this writing, it appeared the benefit would also be a celebration, as Messick received "tentative approval of a basic plan" by the state fire marshal's office for her home on Center Street. This information was released by Calvin Ball, a Milford city alderman and Mrs. Messick's spokesman.

The plans, which list basic structural improvements, including the installation of a sprinkler system, widening doors and partitioning of rooms, must be made in order for Mrs. Messick to obtain a license and thereby keep her elderly patients. Since several

thousand dollars were needed, supporters scheduled the benefit dance to help to meet the expenses involved when Messick had stated she didn't know how she would be able to pay for the work.

The problems began earlier this year when state officials checked her home on Reese Ave. and informed Messick she had more patients than her restricted license allowed. Several patients were transferred to the larger building on Center Street, which is where she planned to expand but had not applied for the license at that location. The move was made, according to Messick, because her patients would have been put out to uncertain futures, since her rates are much less than other Kent County nursing homes (\$350 a month as opposed to \$500 elsewhere).

The situation, which was discovered in July, resulted in a charge of operating without a license and a fine of \$50. Messick was told to meet the state fire and health standards in the home or close it.

A series of meetings with state officials as well as much public opinion in her favor continued to occur throughout the summer.

According to her spokesman, the next step will consist of a presentation of more detailed specifications of the proposed work to the fire marshal and the State Board of Health. Mrs. Messick is hopeful the work will be completed some time in January, followed by an inspection of the home for approval and issuance of the license.

## Last Chance To Register Bikes

Harrington Police have reminded the citizens that Saturday, Nov. 30, is the last day for bicycle registration. The registration is held at City Hall, Fleming Street from 9 to 1 p.m. and involves a 50 cent fee. The police department members permanently stamp a number on the bike frame, affix a license plate with the corresponding number to the seat or back of the bike and keep a permanent record of the registration number on file at the City Hall. This method is an attempt to discourage theft and if theft does occur, it is a more effective method of tracking missing bicycles, according to police.

Chief Ed Layton stated a number of bicycles have not been registered and warns the enforcement of the registration ordinance will go into effect as of Dec. 1. After that time any unregistered bicycle is subject to a \$5 impounding fee, which will have to be paid before the bicycle is returned to the owner. For any bicycle so impounded, the fee mentioned will also include the registration.

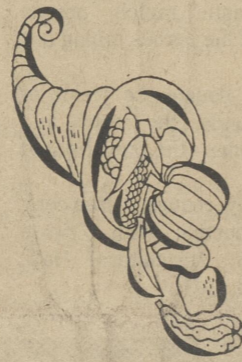
## Two Attend Southern States Meeting

## Driver Saved In Heroic Attempt

# Fiery Collision Near Here

Lewis Trivits (61) of R.D. 1 Seaford was listed in serious condition last Wednesday with 2nd and 3rd degree burns from the waist down when his gasoline filled Peninsula Oil Co. truck was hit from the rear by a lime truck driven by Naaman Luke Eberly of R.D. 2 Honey Brook, Pa.

The collision took place on the north bound lane of U.S. 13 about 100 yards north of Salmons Furniture Store. Trivits' truck was vaulted into the air and landed on its top off the shoulder of the highway. It exploded and burst into flames.

Trivits kicked the window out and crawled from the cab of the truck. He was on fire when he was seen by Charles H. Gruwell who operates a

green house across the highway from the scene of the accident. Gruwell managed to drag Trivits further from the fire to safety and ordered Trivits to roll on the ground to put out his burning clothes.

Gruwell then attempted to help the exhausted Trivits across the highway. He was aided by Ralph Dennis, who had by then arrived on the scene. Dennis, who lives near Harrington, had been rabbit hunting on the other side of the woods from the scene of the accident. When he heard the sounds of the collision, he rushed to the scene of the accident. Dennis reports that there was another unidentified hunter at the scene who also assisted in removing Trivits to safety.

Five fire cos. from

Harrington, Houston, Farmington, Greenwood, and Bridgeville responded to the fire and accident. Trivits requested to be first transported to the Nanticoke Memorial Hospital and was later transferred to the Delaware Division at Wilmington where he is listed in fair condition.

Trivits had just turned onto Rt. 13 from a side road and reportedly had accelerated to about 35 mph when the collision took place. Bystanders at the accident said that the Eberly truck was believed to be travelling at an excessive rate of speed. The impact, which badly damaged Eberly's cab, severed the rear axle from the Trivits truck. After the collision Eberly's truck reportedly continued on

several hundred feet with a fire on the hood of the truck cab, apparently from the gas truck. It came to rest in the grass plot between the two lanes of the highway.

Eberly, who received treatment for minor cuts to the left knee, was charged with Assault in the 1st Degree,

a criminal charge and a felony punishable by three to 30 years in jail and fines or other conditions as the court sees fit. He has been released under \$10,000 property bond. Trial

has been set for Dec. 18 at Magistrate Court No. 6, Harrington.

## November 29 State Holiday

Gov. Sherman W. Tribbitt has declared Friday, Nov. 29, a state holiday.

The governor said his decision was based on two considerations. First, the governor said that it involves a great deal of energy consumption to close state facilities for the Thursday, Nov. 28 Thanksgiving holiday, open them for just one day and close the facilities again for the weekend. With energy conservation in mind, the governor has ordered state agencies to treat Friday, Nov. 29, as a legal holiday and accord the employees the same time off, and other benefits, as provided on other legal holidays. The only exception will be state offices rendering essential services on a 24-hour basis, he said.

# 1035 Vote, Milford Referendum Passes

On this bright, sunny, and warm Saturday the voter turnout was expected to be a large one for this City's estimated 15,000 population, but only 1035 voters went to the polls. Despite the small turnout the referendum passed by some 50 votes.

Twice within the last nine years the residents of Milford have been called upon to vote in such a referendum. In 1965, the residents turned back a sewer referendum adopting the philosophy that even though the need is there, there is a different means of accomplishing this end. They felt then the cash flow to the City each year was enough to do the projects on piece meal basis and pay as you finished these improvements. The "Old Guard" of former Mayor

Logan Grier and former Councilman Albert Peterman worked long and hard for their cause in opposition. Their platform was recognizing the need for the sewer improvements, but do them piece meal and pay as you go.

The capital improvement will cost the taxpayers of Milford \$100,000 a year for 40 years. The plan is to borrow \$1.7 million at 5 per cent per annum from the Farmers Home Administration. This would mean an estimated \$4,000,000 will be paid back over the next 40 years.

Some of the City residents were interviewed and here is their reaction to the referendum:

Jack Nylund, Manager of Bata Shoe Store. "As a new comer to the Milford area, I

am in favor of the referendum being passed, for I feel that it will cause the community to grow and be ready for future growth."

Mack Patterson, Manager of Leggett's Store. "As a council member, I supported the referendum passage. I am very interested in Milford... community interest at heart. Naturally I feel that it will help Milford growth for the future."

Gordon McNeil, Manager of J.C. Penny Store. "I am a recent arrival to Milford having been transferred here from Pennsylvania. I have seen in other places where I have worked that without this planned expansion and a good supporting tax structure in the downtown business sector, the community can really be hurt.

For these reasons, I would be in support of the referendum passing. We have a very good political climate here between the Mayor and Council, and we find them very cooperative."

Mayor Herman (Hamm) McKnatt, Milford's Mayor. "We are behind this referendum because we see the immediate need for updating the sewer system and trying to get these facilities to the approximate 12 per cent of the residents who are without these facilities. The referendum will not take care of all of the problem but will take care of about 6 per cent of those now without this service. In addition to the sewer and water updating, the referendum calls for a storage tank of 500,000 gallons to be

constructed within the next two years. With the 280,000 gallon storage tank that we have now, this would give us ample water storage. We will also be getting another well to help the water supply."

Logan Grier, Former Milford Mayor. The former Mayor cited his record as the way to follow in the referendum. His record was one of pay as you go. For this reason, he opposed the referendum. "I have tried to make it clear to the voters that I am not against them having city sewer and water facilities. As a matter of fact, I am in favor of this type of improvement so long as we do not go into debt for it. Milford is not accustomed to the amount of the debt called for in the referendum. I am

against the referendum, because it would mean a long term indebtedness for the residents of the City. A baby born today would be 40 years old before the debt was paid off. A large portion of our people have more (debt) than they can stand now. When I left office (Mayor), we had completed many capital improvements...paid for them and left \$200,000 in the treasury."

Albert Peterman, Former Milford City Councilman. "I fought long and hard to defeat this referendum mainly for the youth of Milford so that they would not be in debt all of their life. It is just as simple as that. There is another way to do it and that is pay as you go."

Octavious Bach: "The last time we had a referendum was in 1965. It was defeated at that time. We are just now pulling out of debt. The sign of the times is not good. The economy is not good. It is the wrong time to be borrowing money. Projects in the past have been done and completed without borrowing money. I feel that the City limits are too large in scope. We are trying to service too large of an area. I am against a debt for 40 years when we have enough money coming in to accomplish the same thing in 3 or 4 years."

S. Allen (Skip) Pikus: Co-owner of Lou's Bootery, and City Councilman. Mr. Pikus was co-author of an open letter

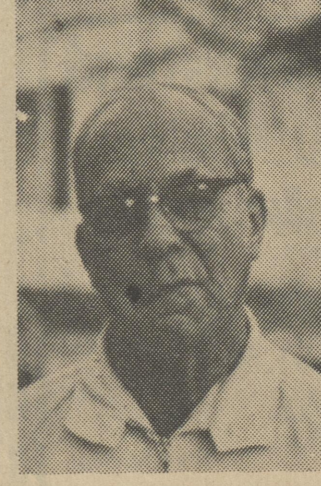

# Tax Dollars Up In Smoke



This State Highway Dept. grader has been burned beyond repair, and funds to replace such equipment are scarce. The \$35,000 replacement cost is part of the loss to the taxpayer-until the money becomes available to purchase another one, the 10 miles of shoulder and entrance grading this machine performed daily will have to be postponed.

Vandalism is hindering maintenance operations throughout the state with variable intensity and serious side effects, Department of Highways and Transportation officials report.

Fires have been set to heavy equipment in maintenance yards, and one recent fire set by vandals has permanently sidelined a grader, which cost \$35,000 to replace, they said.

Reports from one yard indicate the loss of nearly 200 gallons of gasoline per week, because of vandalism and batteries have been reported missing.

Vandalism also has resulted in broken windshields and radiator damage to trucks stemming from rifle fire.

In circumstances where equipment is sidelined indefinitely or permanently, the taxpayer stands to lose much more than the cost of repair or replacement. The services that the equipment performs is lost, too.

That loss is serious in cases where the money is not available to replace vandalized equipment, transportation officials emphasized.

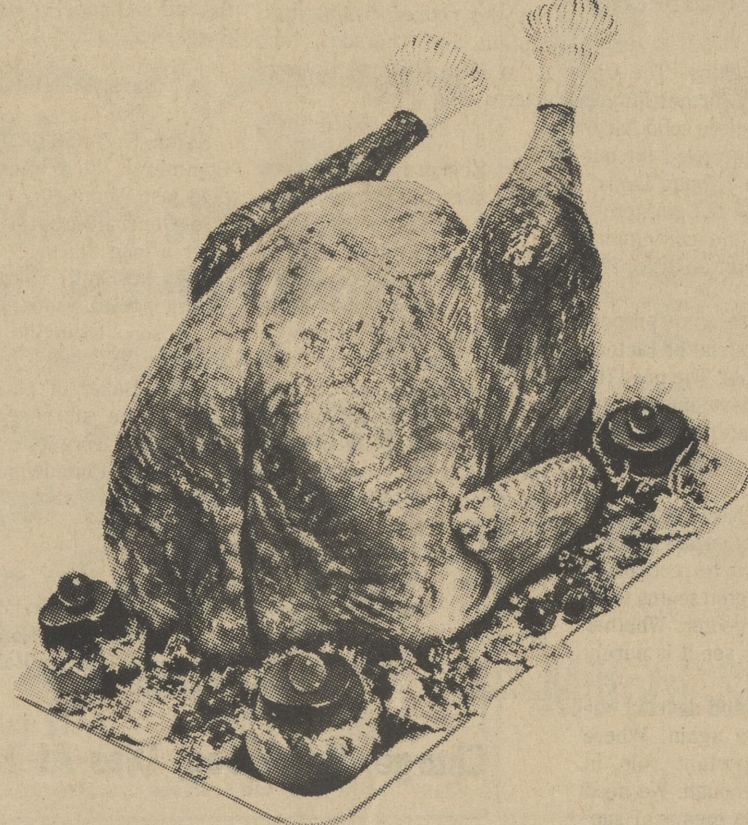

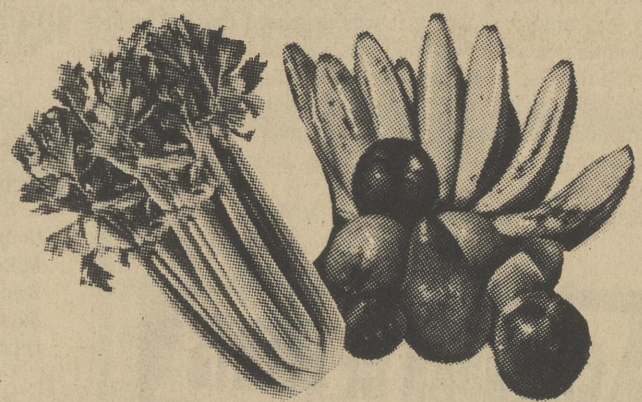

"...there are only so many ways you can raise the money"

Lines were drawn this past Saturday in Milford as the residents there were called to vote on a referendum where the City fathers were asking for \$1.7 million to update their present sewer system as well as extending water and sewer to more residents within the City proper. There are some 12 per cent of the residents of the City who are without these facilities. The cost of the referendum would correct only about half of the problem.

The question pitted the "Young Lions against The Old Guard" of the City. "The Old Guard" led by former Mayor Logan Grier would have the City travel on a more solid fiscal basis by doing all the things the referendum called for but doing them piece meal...pay as you go. The "Young Lions" composed of the City's businessmen, Chamber of Commerce, City Council and the younger portion of the community wanted the problem solved now... and pay later on time. The voters decided in favor of the referendum.

Milford in the past few years has grown to great proportions to where it has a good balance of industrial or factory jobs and many good retail stores and markets. The need for the referendum was for future growth and development and to take care of the emergency now. The water capabilities were somewhat lacking since major fires in the City usually drained the water supply.

Harrington on the other hand and in comparison has had an acceptable sewer and water system and the capabilities to grow for quite some time. Milford has grown to be recognized as a residential retail center whereas Harrington seems to be growing toward a more industrial oriented center. Whether this is true or not as some Milford residents see it is purely argumentative.

Hopefully we will grow on a steady basis and develop our business and retail community back once again. Where sewer and water facilities play an important role in development...standing alone they are not enough. We need to regain our downtown business sector as a means of supporting our tax base and structure. In accomplishing this we need more businesses...for this will invite competition which is good for the economy. With businesses to tax in the community, the need for levying additional taxes on the residential property owners would not be necessary.

The decision to borrow money or pay as you go for improvements is always a weighty decision to make. Milford has a wide range of raising revenues, and maybe for them this is the best course of action. Their electric department alone brings them great means of revenue. It has been stated that the amount of revenue which Milford takes in each year from the electric rates is in excess of what the smaller communities in the surrounding area pay to Delmarva Power in a year's time. They therefore can grow at a much faster rate than towns and communities in the surrounding area, for they have this additional revenue.

We should adopt means of growing with sound economic measures. We need to adopt a get tough policy on development by eliminating the abandoned properties that blight our City and also not be fooled by the zoning requests that existed with the Hammond Farm (east of the City on Rt. 14 across from the cemetery) where it was proposed that 800 apartment units and other housing units were to be constructed. I am sure the real intent behind this was to sell the land at a higher price by gaining the highest possible zoning without commencing any construction whatsoever.

We have the potential to grow here...so let's systemically go after it.

over 1972-73, and net savings totalled \$13.7 million, an increase of \$4.9 million before taxes. Both were new high marks. Feland told the session.

Feland told the session that after payment of dividends on outstanding stock and taxes, about \$10 million in cash will be refunded by the cooperative's total system (including local affiliates and branches) to patrons on their year's purchases. The cooperative will pay a 3.6 percent wholesale patronage refund while its local affiliates and branches, in some cases, will pay considerably more.

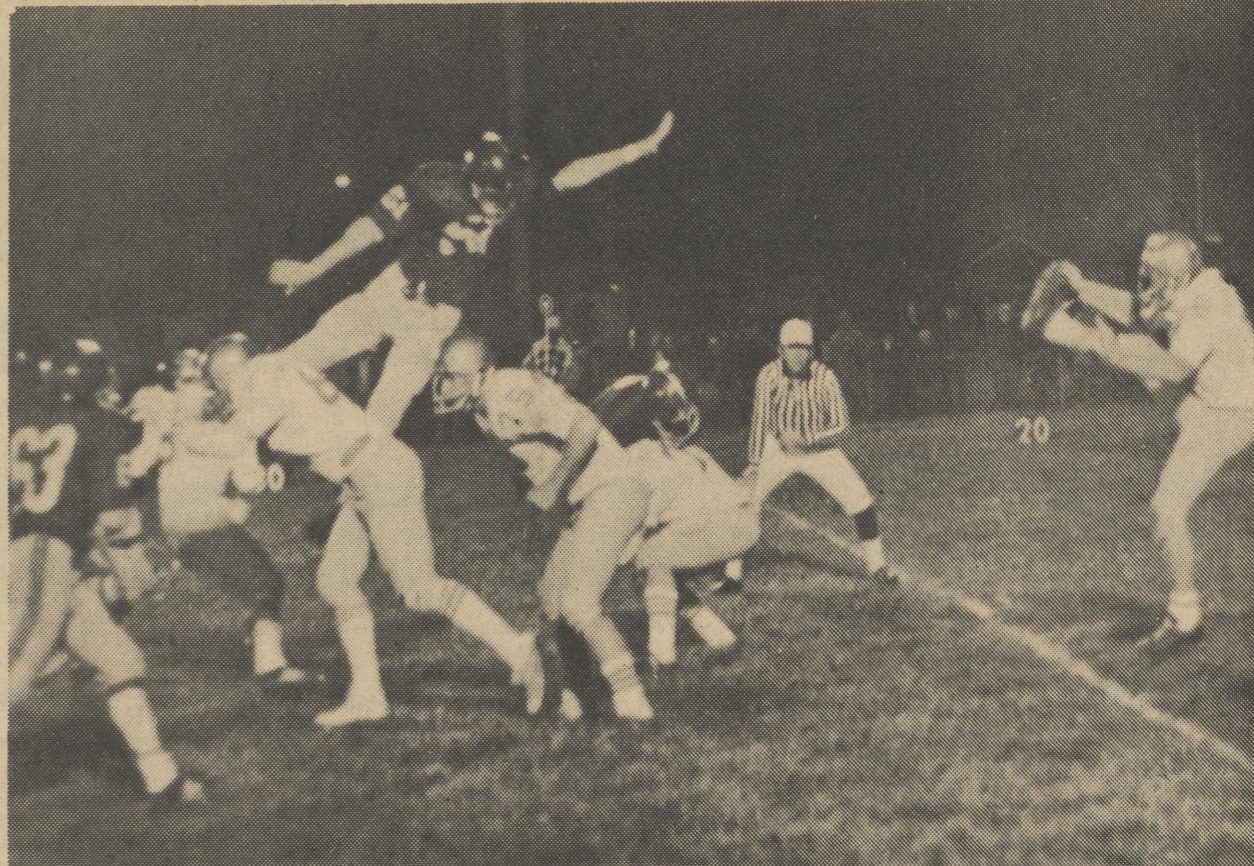

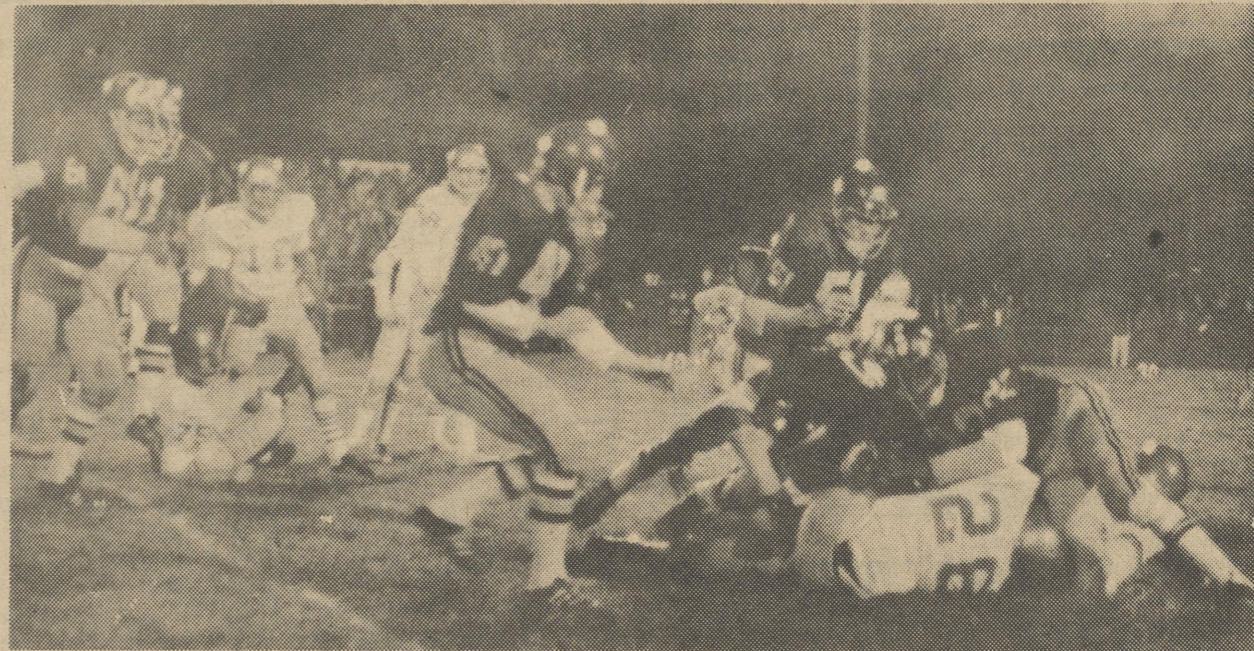

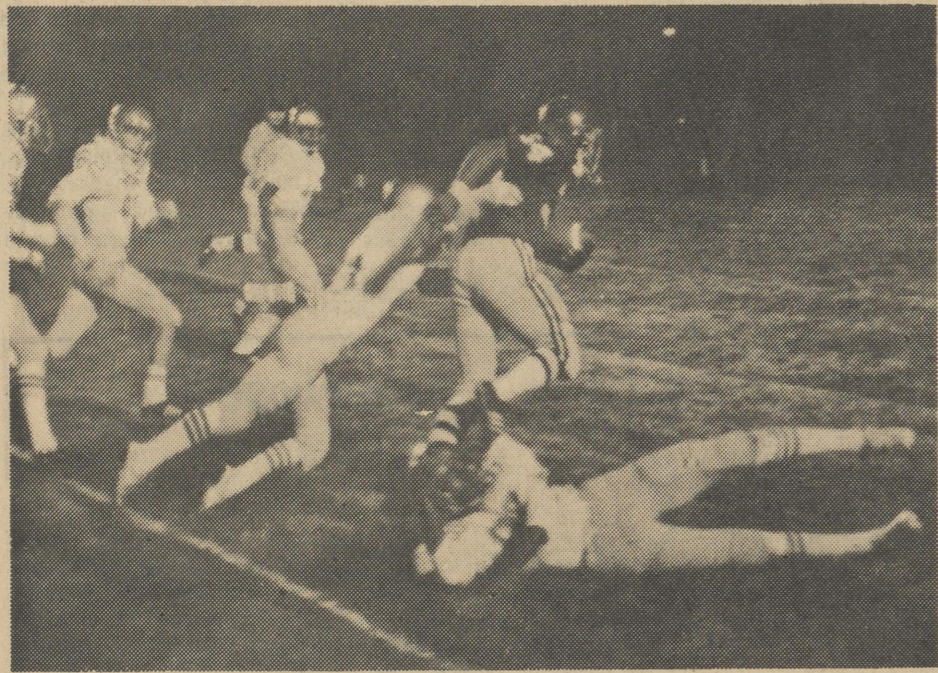

A 1971 graduate of Lake Forest High School, Felton, Del., he joined the Coast Guard in August, 1971.

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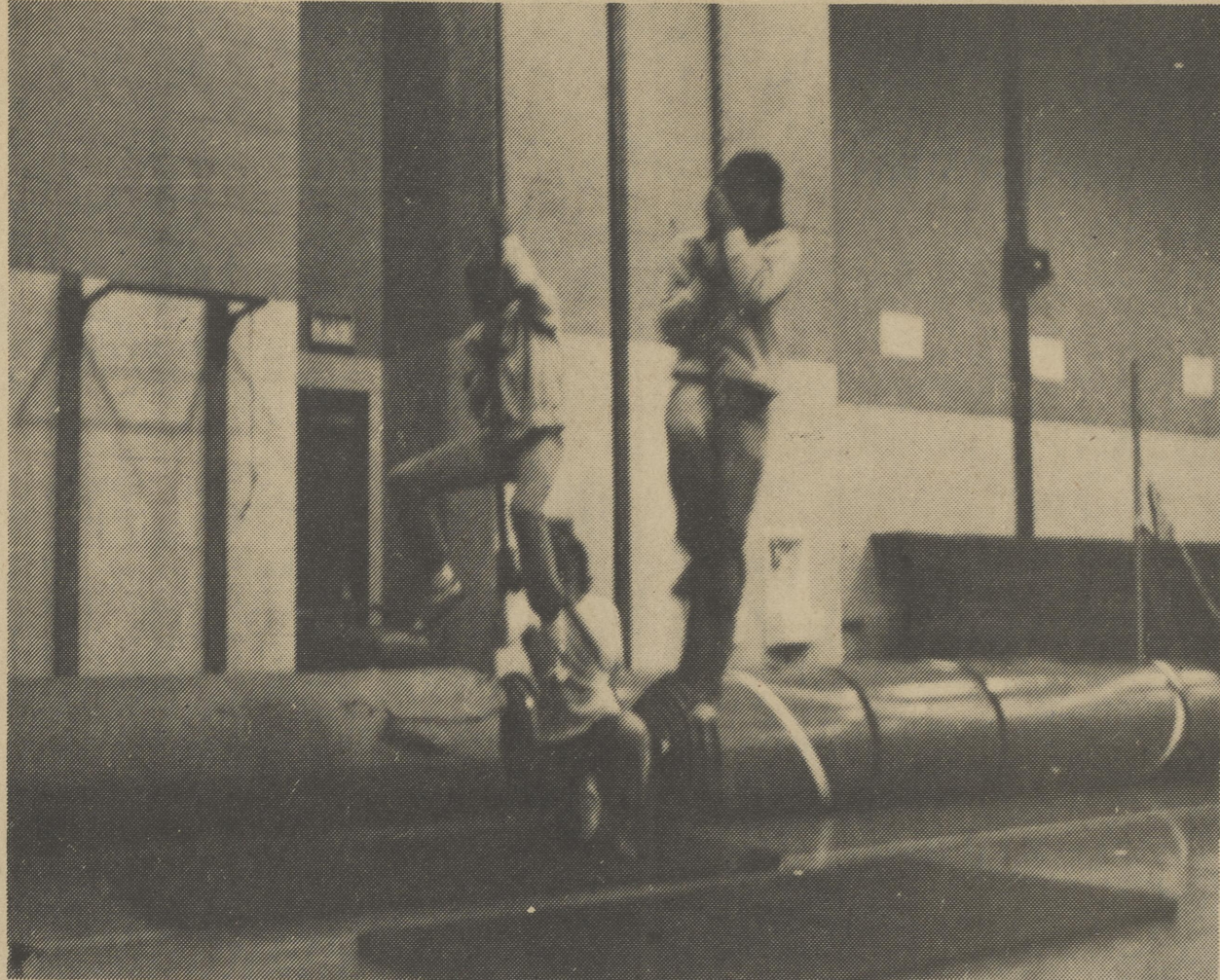
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Members of Lake Forest's wrestling team begin training.

**Can't Afford It? Substitute It**

Along the same line of substitutions, Pantry Pride Supermarkets in Philadelphia has made a substitution list for several food items. That store's equivalents are: for one cup sugar, use one half cup sugar plus one half cup corn syrup and take two tablespoons of liquid out of the recipe. For one tablespoon flour, substitute one half tablespoon cornstarch, potato starch, rice starch or arrowroot starch. For one cup cake flour sifted, use one cup all-purpose sifted flour minus two tablespoons. For one cup chocolate, use three tablespoons cocoa plus a tablespoon of fat. To convert one cup butter or margarine, use 7/8 to a cup hydrogenated shortening plus a half teaspoon salt. For one teaspoon baking powder, use 1/4 teaspoon baking soda plus 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar.
