Governor Tribbitt made the announcement this afternoon following a meeting with Agriculture Secretary M. Martin Isaacs.

"I contacted Frank Elliott, Administrator of the Farmers Home Administration of USDA this afternoon and he informed me that official notification of the disaster designation is on the way to my office," Governor Tribbitt said last Thursday

"I am personally pleased to be able to inform the farmers of Kent and Sussex Counties of the availability of these lowinterest, emergency loans," Governor Tribbitt stated. "Our farmers have a definite and urgent need for these operating loans and I know they will be as pleased as I am that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has responded to my request for aid.

Governor Tribbitt had written to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz on October 8th, asking for federal aid to the drought-stricken farmers.

To qualify for these five percent loans a farmer must have experienced at least a ten percent monetary loss of his total production due to drought as compared with a normal year. Loans are for reimbursement of production expenses that went into the damaged crops and cannot exceed the amount of loss.

"The Nobel Prize Is Still A Nobel Achievement. C'est clair -- c'est francaise."

As 1974 draws rapidly to a close, we glance back at one of the most chaotic times in the history of this great country. With seemingly -- or at least one time political greats -- falling by the wayside, end the economy fast approaching the point where inflation was running rampid -- that is **JUST** might take a basketfull - of dollar bills to purchase a loaf of bread...as was the case of pre-wartime Germany.

Aside from this economical situation, there appears to be a greater controversy growing over the exposure of school children to certain books...which contain certain words.

The book which I make reference to is the great novel by Alexander Solzhenitsyn which two years ago earned him the coveted Nobel Prize for literature. A great book which can readily be recognized for its greatness. There are certain words contained therein which are too bold for the timid and too profound for the young and innocent. I hold that these words should not fall on the young to be sure - but the big drawback is that in order for the "young reader" to know and be exposed, he must read the book which would then expose the words to him. Otherwise I have nothing against the book.

Sometimes as is the case that in translating the words from something into English, the true meaning and intent of the original word is lost. Many times the procedures of translation is to translate from one to another and then to English. "That which is clear is French" is how the expression goes. I readily suspect that this is the case with Solzhenitsyn, and it is a tragic thing. On the other hand - it might aid in selling book copy - but he doesn't particularly need anymore money, and for this reason it is therefore tragic for the true meaning may have been lost
