## Hewitt Smith Dies

Dr. Hewitt W. Smith, 68, died of a heart attack December 4th in Blake Memorial Hospital, Bradenton, Fla. He had retired in 1966 after practicing medicine in Harrington for 36 years.

Born in Hollandville, Del., Dr. Smith was a graduate of The George Washington University Medical School. He interned at The Delaware Hospital in Wilmington.

Dr. Smith was mayor of Harrington from 1957 to 1958; a past President of The Kent

County and The Delaware State Medical Societies, and a member of the American Medical Association. He was attending physician for the Harrington School System for many years. He personally sponsored many scholarships, both educational and medical.

Dr. Smith leaves his wife Mrs. Martha P. Smith, St. Petersburg, Fla.; two daughters, Mrs. C. Donald Miller, Jr., Bradenton, Fla., and Mrs. Michael Pardee, St. Louis, Mo.; his mother Mrs. Effie W. Smith, St. Petersburg; and four grandchildren.

## Bryon W. Burgess, Railroad Employee Dies

Byron Wayne Burgess, 49, died Friday in Veterans Administration Hospital, Elsmere. He had been in ill health about two years.

A Harrington native, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Harvey Burgess, the former being owner of The Harrington Journal for which Byron Burgess worked as a printer before working for the Pennsylvania Railroad. At the time of his death, Mr. Burgess was a conductor and brakeman on the Penn Central.

He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the Coast Artillery in Guatemala and the Galapagos. He was a member of Callaway-Kemp-Roughley-Tea Post No. 7, American Legion, Harrington, and Milford Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He was divorced.

He is survived by three brothers, Winston C., Keith S. and Carrington H. Burgess, all of Harrington. The first and the last-named were former owners of The Harrington Journal.

Services were held Tuesday afternoon at McKnatt Funeral Home with burial in Hollywood Cemetery, Harrington. The Rev. Bruce Shortell, pastor of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, officiated.

## Harrington Center Will Stay Open State Cuts Senior Center Money

Last week it was announced by the state division of aging that six senior centers throughout the state would not receive state funds after Dec. 31. Among these was the Harrington Senior Center located on Fleming Street here. The center, which serves approximately 750 senior citizens from the surrounding areas has had a variety of programs ranging from educational to pure recreational, as well as giving companionship.

Perhaps the most known service is the number of meals served to senior citizens in their homes. These are provided to approximately 30 homebound elderly people, and will not be affected by the cut of state funds, since the monies used to finance them originate from MANNA, a federal program. MANNA also provides for the cook's salary at the center.

Tuesday night the Executive Committee of the center's Board of Directors met to discuss how the cut of funds will affect the center and the services provided. Walter Lang, the president of the Board told the Journal following the meeting that the center will definitely stay

open and will continue as usual. Lang stated the center gets monies from the United Way and takes part in revenue sharing which is administered by the Kent County Levy Court and will operate with the funds available.

The state monies which will be available to the "multi-purpose" centers in Kent County in 1975 amount to \$47,700. The sum will be shared by Dover and Milford centers. Milford will also receive funds from Sussex County, since it is considered a "border area."

The cut in funds from the

center here is part of a reorganization of senior centers throughout the state and involves the creation of "service districts" for the elderly, and is based on population, race and distribution of income.

In Sussex County the centers at Lewes and Rehoboth were told to merge and to begin a nutritional program in that area.

The 18 member Board of Directors meets tonight to make further plans in regard to the cut. Lang stressed, however, the center will continue to keep its doors open.

## Light Bills Will Be Higher

Delmarva Power & Light Company has announced that the electric fuel adjustment charge which will appear on customers' bills in Delaware during the month of December will be 1.538 cents per kilowatt hour. This represents a slight increase in the fuel adjustment charge in Delaware as compared to the November fuel adjustment charge of 1.451 cents per kilowatt hour.

The fuel adjustment charge for December is based on the cost of fuel the Company used

during the month of October. DP&L gave the reason for the December increase to be a result of one of the Company's coal-fired generators which was operating at a reduced level and two others were undergoing scheduled maintenance. Coal, which the Company burns at its Indian River Plant in Delaware, was a cheaper fuel to use during the month of October than was oil which the Company burns at its other major generating plants.

## Milford Seeks Ways To Tighten Budget

At Tuesday night's city council meeting in Milford with Mayor McKnatt on the sick list, several of the council members reflected on ways the city might take a look at ways of holding within the budget over the next 6 months. Milford anticipates revenues of \$3,647,325 over this period ahead.

Councilman Reese Phillips suggested a prime method to reduce expenditures would be to prohibit city employees from using city vehicles for

private transportation to and from work.

City Manager resisted this suggestion commenting that "...I want my superintendents on a moment's notice and for this reason I think they should be permitted to use these vehicles."

This week bids were opened for the construction of a new switching station. Satterfield and Ryan of Harrington was awarded the bid of \$7,940.

In other business Alderman

George Ball introduced an ordinance governing the issuance of bad checks. Council adopted this ordinance which will become effective in 10 days. Up until this ordinance was passed prosecutors, primarily merchants were forced to institute an action of this sort by travelling to Dover or to Magistrate Court in Harrington. This ordinance gives the people some effective protection for this sort of crime.

Leroy Dear and his wife were guests of the Harrington Rotary Club on Monday night. It was ladies night as well and all were treated to general exhibit of what the Kent County Dispatch Center in Dover is all about. Dear related the function of the Center as replacing the old way of sounding the alarm for fire or ambulance by this system which is tied into approximately 57 fire companies around the County.

In addition to well chosen remarks and explanations about this sophisticated Center, the discussion was carried further with the addition of slides. After this

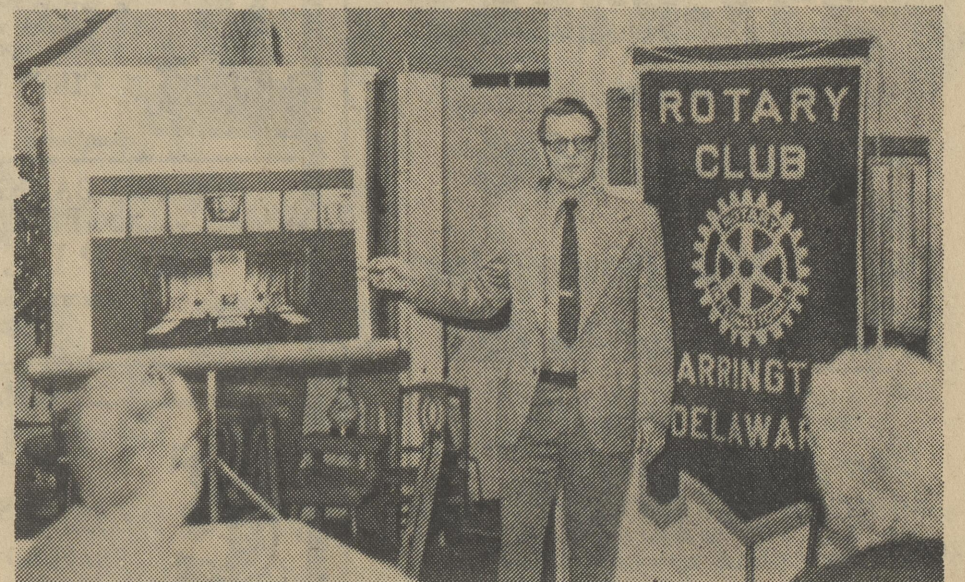
presentation, a question and answer session followed. At the termination of this, the fire alarm sounded at the local station. As Assistant Chief Melvin Wyatt, a Rotarian,

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### Milk Producers Coop Meet

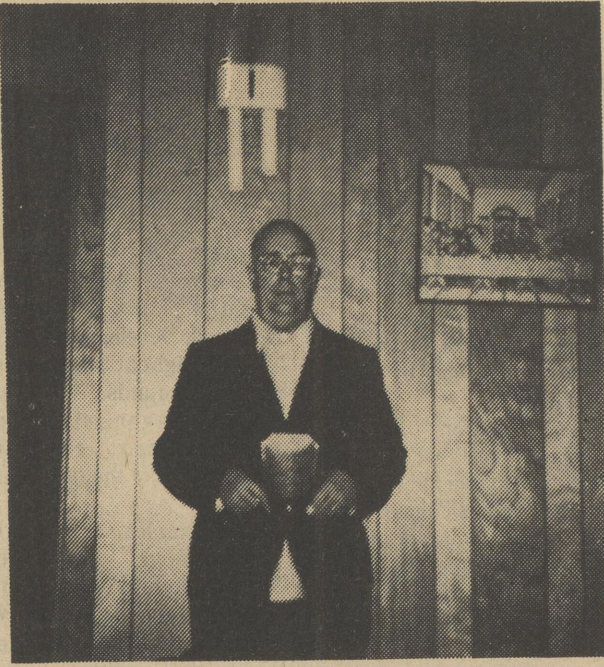

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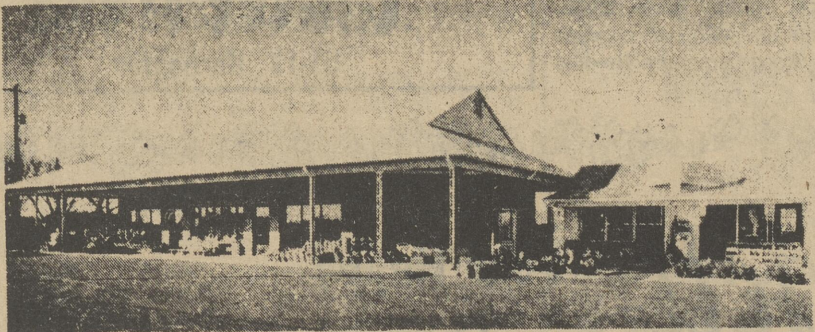

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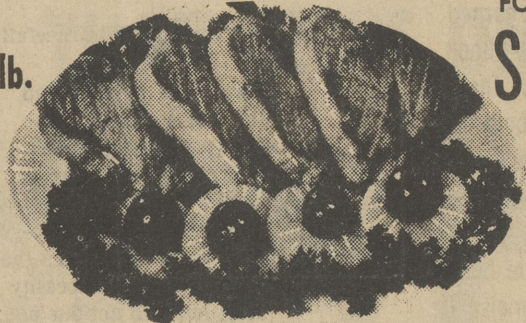

Biden Says No To Foreign Aid

On Dec. 4, I voted against final passage of the \$2.67 billion foreign aid bill. The measure, which passed by a vote of 46 to 45, now goes to the House of Representatives where it will be voted upon next week.

I would like to cite three basic reasons for opposing the bill.

"First, both military and economic assistance programs were lumped together in a single bill. I believe they should have been separated. I question, for example, the authorization of nearly \$2 billion for South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

"Secondly, I voted against the bill because I believe the scope of our entire foreign aid program must be reconsidered, particularly in light of the economic realities of 1974.

in multilateral assistance programs thereby sharing the burden of relief with other countries.

"Thirdly, I don't think we should fool ourselves about the altruistic nature of the foreign-aid bill. If it really was the hungry and the poor of this world who were the beneficiaries of this aid I would be less concerned.

"In essence, there is too much waste, corruption and abuse with our foreign aid program. But instead of correcting these abuses or putting a ceiling on the amount of assistance, we rejected an amendment introduced by Senator Frank Church that would have put a ceiling of \$5 billion on fiscal year 1974 expenditures for foreign assistance programs.

Roth Seeks Aid

U.S. Sen. Bill Roth said this week he is hopeful that the Army Corps of Engineers will be able to provide some assistance in repairing the damage caused to Delaware beaches and dunes by the Dec. 1 storm.

The senior Delaware senator said that the state may be eligible for assistance under the Federal Flood Control Act, which permits the Corps of Engineers to help states restore federally-authorized flood control projects.

Roth has been working closely with state and federal officials to determine what aid may be available to the state and to property owners affected by the storm.

He said the state could be entitled to significant assistance from the Corps of Engineers if its attorneys rule that the 25-mile-long barrier dune from Lewes to Fenwick is a flood control device and is federally authorized because it was constructed in part by the Corps following the 1962 storm.

Members of Roth's staff have discussed the possibility of assistance with Col. C. A. Selleck, Jr., district engineer for the Corps in Philadelphia, and with Corps of Engineers officials in Washington.

Officials of the Corps of Engineers accompanied Gary Patterson, a Dover aide to Senator Roth, and John Bryson, Secretary of the Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, on a helicopter flight last Wednesday over storm-damaged areas.

Patterson toured Sussex County beaches with state officials last Monday and conferred during the week with local and state officials and representatives of the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration.

Roth said his office was also exploring the possibility of obtaining a survey by the U.S. Small Business Administration to see whether property owners affected might be declared eligible to receive low-interest long-term repair loans.

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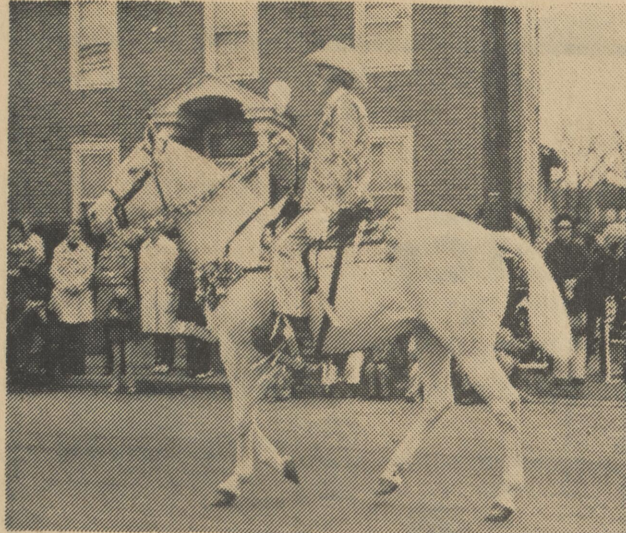

## Cross-Country Season Re-Cap

Lake Forest's state champion cross-country team had its busiest and most successful campaign in eighteen years.

Coach Jim Blades knew he had a strong combine and deliberately set up the toughest schedule ever attempted by a team from lower Delaware.

Prior to the start of the season the locals held a workout at Washington College, Chestertown, Md. Joe Vosshell, Terry Pettyjohn and Dan Parker covered the 5 and one-fifth miles of hills and dales in under 30 minutes. By the season's end in November, it was estimated the Spartans could get six men under 30 minutes, which is considered good, even for college athletes.

On Sept. 19 Lake Forest had the upper hand over P.S. duPont and Dover Air in a practice scrimmage at home, then outran Tower Hill in a practice test in Wilmington.

The season opened with a bang as Lake Forest easily captured its own invitational over fourteen rivals from Delaware, Maryland and Pennsylvania. September was closed out with dual meet triumphs over Cape Henlopen and always tough Dover Air.

On the 10th of October Salisbury State College hosted their annual invitational run with sixteen teams from Delaware, Maryland and Virginia. Surratsville, Md., a powerhouse team from the Washington, D.C. area, was extended by runnerup Lake Forest despite misfortune suffered by No. 1 Spartan Joe Vosshell who was tripped at the start. Vosshell courageously fought back to 14th place, but

could have been as high as fourth without the fall.

Also in early October Lake Forest competed in the Salesianum Invitational at Brandywine Creek State Park in Wilmington. Led by Joe Vosshell and Dan Parker the Spartans finished a highly creditable seventh in a field of 16 teams mostly from the Philadelphia area. Harry Benson was injured preventing the locals from finishing fourth and fifth. Still several Philly schools trailed the locals.

After dual meet victories over Laurel and Caesar Rodney, Lake Forest hit the road to New York City for the St. John's University Invitational. Fourteen year old freshman, Dan "J.J." Parker was the first Spartan in as Lake Forest finished 12th of 41 schools from six states.

Dual meet wins over Dover, Indian River, Seaford and Smyrna ended October competition.

In the Henlopen Conference championship meet only Dover Air finished within striking distance of the Spartans. The state championship meet was held for the second time in the last three years at Killen's Pond State Park. The fired-up Spartans led by Dan Parker's great third place finish successfully defended the state championship title they won in 1973. That's three state crowns in Lake Forest's six year existence to go with similar victories by Harold McDonald's Harrington High Lions in 1963 and 1966.

With high school competition finished, 28 of the younger Spartans principally from grades 7, 8, 9, 10 ran in the Road Runners Club Age-Group National Championship

Runs in New York City.

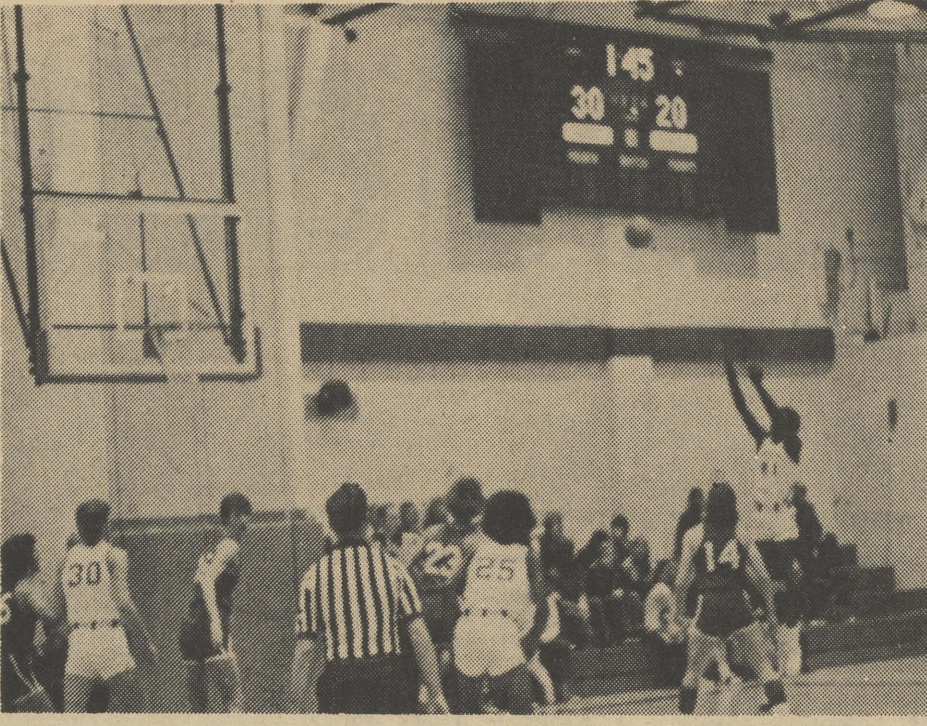

That same day in the 12 and under test, Mark Miller, Quintin Hendricks and Bill Mitchell made it 1-2-3 for W. T. Chipman. This same trio also ran well in the first Kent County Park and Recreation meet held here for 14 and under boys and girls.

Lake Forest area youngsters competed from Chestertown, Md., to Lewes, from Salisbury, Md. to New York City and represented this area extremely well, compiling an unbeaten dual meet season, a conference title, and invitational victory and a second place in another, plus a second state title.

Charles Briscoe, head coach of Virginia Tech, Blacksburg, Va. visited Spartan coach, Jim Blades over the weekend and jotted down the names of a few collegiate track and cross-country prospects. Athletic scholarships anyone?

For the first time since 1963 no fund appeal will be made to the general public in connection with rewarding this gallant Spartan team. Last year some twelve Spartans were given state championship jackets. Most of these lads are still on the team so it was only necessary to buy four more to insure that all the top runners got one. Funds are available for these and for state championship T-shirts for every runner and for each of the four senior girls who were team managers and statisticians.
