"Return Prayer to The Public Schools? You be the Judge."

It has been nearly twelve years since prayers were first banned by the U.S. Supreme Court from America's public schools. The controversy over whether the ban should be allowed to stand has never died down. During this season all of us seem to have a deeper feeling toward God and the celebration of the birth of the Christ Child. It seems to me therefore that at this time of the year the issue of returning prayer to the public schools becomes paramount in my thinking.

In the past, there have been numerous resolutions brought before Congress as well as amendments to the U.S. Constitution to enable prayer to return to the public classrooms, but they have all failed. In 1972 the Republican Party platform advocated restoration of the prayer to the public classrooms, but the proposal was not vigorously pushed. It therefore died along the way.

It was the government which listened to the arguments on banning and went along with it. Yet public officials have not banned prayer in the form of an oath of office, or in wording on the currency ("In God We Trust"), and in the very fact that there are chaplains installed for every session of Congress. Over the years since the Founding Fathers, Presidents as well as hords of public servants have identified with one church or another...as well as having invoked divine help in times of crisis. Should the younger generations to come be exposed to something to the contrary? Should not the will of the majority be protected?

The arguments to the contrary do not seem powerful enough to be swayed by them. Like...to permit prayers in public schools is a violation of Church and State, or prayers should be no concern of government not even if prayers are non-denominational and students permitted to skip them if they wish, and the fact that the Constitution forbids the use of tax dollars, which every public school receives, to promote religious beliefs. To me these seem to be weak arguments. Yet when they were argued before the Supreme Court, their arguments prevailed the day. I think that sometimes our system and our government on controversal issues tends to be blinded by compassion and reasons of the heart.

In the final analysis perhaps it has sharpened our wits and made us appreciate just what we do have. I know that it is a good feeling every Monday night at Rotary to open with a prayer and salute of the Flag. I witnessed this again on Saturday night as a guest of the Burrsville Ruritan Club where these people gave thanks in the form of a prayer and the singing of America.

Still the issue of whether prayer should be returned to the public schools rages on. Should it be returned? You be the judge.

"Fire Prevention On The Farm"

Every day fire destroys valuable property. One important item to remember at all times is "Fire Prevention". This isn't always the answer because many times an act of nature causes fires that are beyond our control.

The farms should be extra well protected because of the distance from the fire companies. One good idea would be for a farmer to have a good storage of water.

A farmer that is about to build should consider facts as to how their livestock can exit. He also needs to carefully select the material that he is building with. A fire hazard could be a roof that is not covered with proper material. A spark from a chimney or forest fire could easily set the building on fire. Another good precaution would be lightning rods.

Another rule to remember is to keep the area neat and clean, inside and outside. Rubbish lying around only invites trouble.

Spontaneous combustion is a deadly fear as many a farmer has lost barns full of straw or hay. Remember to keep raint or oily rags out of closed in areas.

The farmers must also be careful with gasoline or kerosene. If these liquids aren't kept in proper tanks they should be kept in a building where expensive equipment is not located. Precaution needs to take place when one is using gasoline or diesel fuel filling a

Gasoline should not be used to start fires and definitely keep matches safely away.

When using your workbench be sure you have proper connections and do not leave your electrical tools

Farmers should be careful if they smoke. A careless toss could burn his whole supply of hay or straw. Electrical wiring should be checked and circuits should not be overloaded.
