200 Federal Farm Workers Hear Campbell

USDA Official Addresses Group

"The greatest contribution the United States and other developed countries can make toward alleviating world hunger is to teach the less fortunate societies how to produce enough agriculturally to feed themselves," Under Secretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell told some 200 federal farm program workers in Dover Dec. 10 and 11.

"By sharing our know-how in Agricultural production, we are sharing a commodity far more precious than food itself," Mr. Campbell said. We have been sharing our food and expertise with developing nations for years, he said, but must do as much as we can to help others achieve the success in productivity we have already achieved in this country.

The 2-day conference brought together workers of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) from Maryland, Delaware, and New Jersey.

C. William Haines, Jr., Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) director for the three states, said recreation and community services are as important to rural development

as housing and farm conservation practices. He also described FmHA loans that have been made for such unusual projects as an automobile crushing facility, a seed oyster operation and an indoor tennis center.

With the emphasis now on "All-out crop production," William H. Henderson, Delaware's Sussex County Extension Agent, said weather modification (cloud seeding) was one possible way to help increase farm production. Sussex county crops are damaged, he said, "almost every year because of dry weather during July and August." He said one Michigan county had three good crop years with the help of cloud seeding, and cited other states where work is underway.

William C. White, Vice President of the Fertilizer Institute, said "The world is about to enter a fourth consecutive year in which food consumption will equal or exceed production, and this has serious implications for agriculture and the fertilizer industry. He expects U.S. fertilizer supplies to increase in 1975 about four to six percent above 1974.

Band Uniforms, Salaries and Protest

Report Head Board Agenda

At the Lake Forest School Board meeting Monday night, the topic that drew the most concern and interest was the one presented by Mrs. E.B. Warrington, for the Band Boosters who reported it will cost approximately \$130 per uniform for the W.T. Chipman Junior High Band. The Band Boosters will continue to raise money for uniforms, but the money must "be there before they place the order" said Mrs. Warrington. She reported that she feels that they can raise half of the figure needed, but asked the Board to underwrite the remaining half or approximately \$7,000. There are 100 band members.

School Board member Marvin Brown moved to underwrite this amount by having the Board sign two notes in the amount of \$3,500 each with the 1st National Bank of Harrington and the Felton Bank. Mrs. Minner had requested this as a last ditch measure if funds could not be raised. She proposed to have the Band Boosters endeavor to raise the money by February, report to the Board at that time the financial status of the drive, and then borrow the money if necessary. Board President Don Garey praised Mrs. Minner for her group's efforts in the past to raise money for the Lake Forest School Bands.

The School Board meeting was delayed one half hour due to an executive session held to discuss the custodian request for salary increases and the extension of administrator's contracts. The custodians were granted a \$200 yearly increase in salary and the chiefs of the custodians were granted a \$100 yearly increase. All administrators were given contract renewals for three years except for Mrs. Gilbert, a Lake Forest North administrator hired for one year, who is to be hired for one more year and if she continues to achieve as of the present she will be given a two year contract next December.

Superintendent Albert Adams announced that the School Board should advertise for a new head football coach to replace Coach Al Wood, who has officially submitted his resignation. The Board made clear that a person could not serve simultaneously as Athletic Director and head football coach. It was further clarified that a person could not hold both positions at the same school because of the demands of the jobs.

William Griffin, Lake Forest High School Principal, reported the progress of the protest which the Lake Forest School District lodged against the officiating of the football game this fall between Lake Forest and Indian River at

Indian River. The controversial game drew much publicity at the time. A meeting was held recently between Principal Griffin, Athletic Director James Hogdsten, and Coach Al Wood and the Executive Committee of the Conference. The two officials in question were Clifford Lee, the head linesman, and Carlton Jones, the referee. A half dozen or more complaints were lodged against these officials by Lake Forest people as well as criticism of Indian River's

coach Steen. Steen, it was charged, had come onto the field several times, incited the crowd to a frenzy, and demonstrated before the home crowd as well as after the game issuing statements to the press of an inflammatory nature against L.F. The Lake Forest committee asked that the Executive Committee review Coach Steen's actions. Principal Griffin felt that much had been gained and accomplished by seeing this protest through. The Con-

Charles H. Gruwell, 61, who saved a Delaware man from burning to death in a gasoline tanker fire last month, was cited for heroism last week by the Kent County Volunteer Fireman's Association.

Gruwell received a plaque in recognition of saving the life of Lewis Trivits of Seaford. The tanker truck driven by Trivits was struck from behind by a dump truck and was forced off the road where it burst into flames near Gruwell's property. Gruwell, who saw Trivits attempting to free himself from the truck and fire rushed to his rescue, in spite of the constant danger of an explosion.

The recognition of Gruwell's heroism came at the association meeting at the Carlisle Fire Co. in Milford.

Local Man Gets Zoning Break

A Harrington man was told by Kent County Levy Court last week to continue with plans to place a mobile home on his land, in spite of a conflict with county zoning ordinance.

James E. Hobbs, on the Harrington-Farmington Road had already installed a septic system on his property and was about to place the mobile home on his property when he learned from the county the property was zoned for "light industrial use." A "break-down in communications" supposedly caused the permit for the septic tank to be issued before the zoning was checked.

Hobbs, who told the court he might lose his investment in

the mobile home, and since he has no place to keep it, was prepared with a number of signatures from area residents to have the land rezoned to "agricultural residential."

Under normal procedures, the earliest date when rezoning could be completed would be Jan. 28. On a motion made by commissioner William Paskey (D-Felton) the court voted 6-1 to change

the zoning immediately.

The vote, which was an illegal move, was followed by a second vote to pursue the zoning change through normal channels. Normal channels include public hearings before the planning commission and the Levy Court. A comprehensive planning and zoning study and map which began by the Dover Office P&Z in 1969 has caused many area residents to be unaware of the zoning changes throughout the County. It was this sort of thing which confronted Hobbs. He had decided to sell his home and about 4 acres, buy a mobile home and place it on his remaining 2 acres, which caused this problem to surface.

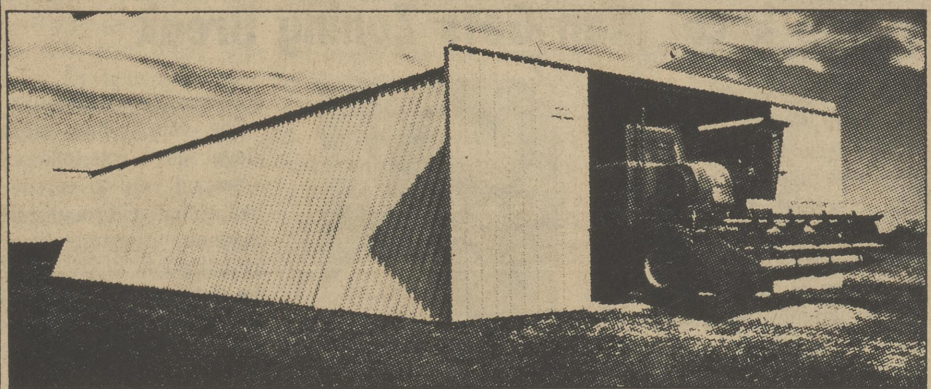

"Fire Prevention On The Farm"

Every day fire destroys valuable property. One important item to remember at all times is "Fire Prevention". This isn't always the answer because many times an act of nature causes fires that are beyond our control.

The farms should be extra well protected because of the distance from the fire companies. One good idea would be for a farmer to have a good storage of water.

A farmer that is about to build should consider facts as to how their livestock can exit. He also needs to carefully select the material that he is building with. A fire hazard could be a roof that is not covered with proper material. A spark from a chimney or forest fire could easily set the building on fire. Another good precaution would be lightning rods.

Another rule to remember is to keep the area neat and clean, inside and outside. Rubbish lying around only invites trouble.

Spontaneous combustion is a deadly fear as many a farmer has lost barns full of straw or hay. Remember to keep paint or oily rags out of closed in areas.

The farmers must also be careful with gasoline or kerosene. If these liquids aren't kept in proper tanks they should be kept in a building where expensive equipment is not located. Precaution needs to take place when one is using gasoline or diesel fuel filling a hot tractor.

Gasoline should not be used to start fires and definitely keep matches safely away.

When using your workbench be sure you have proper connections and do not leave your electrical tools untended.

Farmers should be careful if they smoke. A careless toss could burn his whole supply of hay or straw.

Electrical wiring should be checked and circuits should not be overloaded.

Holiday Fire Safety Tips

This Christmas don't let the "jingle bells" heard in your driveway be those of a fire engine!

Failure to pay attention to fire safety in regard to Christmas trees, lights and other decorations can inject tragedy into this traditionally joyful season, warns J. Benjamin Roy, Jr., State Fire Marshal and The Kent County Fire Chief's Association as the busy holiday season nears. They offer these suggestions for keeping Christmas a firesafe and happy time:

1. Natural trees should be fresh-looking and firm-needled when selected. Saw off the butt an inch above the original cut, stand the tree in water, and keep it in water until it is disposed of -- soon after Christmas Day. Don't rely on do-it-yourself flameproofing treatment, as none is truly effective. Set up the tree away from heat and where it won't block doorways or stairs ... Artificial trees should be clearly marked as made of slow-burning materials. Look for the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) label on trees with built-in electrical systems ... With metal trees, use only indirect lighting to avoid the possibility of electrical shock.

2. Check lighting strings for frayed and cracked wires, loose connections, broken sockets. Replace only with UL-labeled sets. Bulbs made in the U.S. generally are

safest; imported bulbs may have dangerous hot spots. Electrical cord sets with built-in fuses are strongly recommended ... Always turn

off tree and other indoor holiday lighting when leaving the house or retiring for the night ... or outdoor lighting, use only sets UL-listed for this purpose.

3. Noncombustible materials such as metal, glass and asbestos should be used for decorations as much as possible. Make sure cotton batting, flock and decorating paper are flameproofed. Natural evergreen decorations dry quickly, burn readily, so keep them well removed from candles, the fireplace and other heat. Don't use polystyrene foam for table or mantel decorations where there are lighted candles.

4. Dispose of gift wrappings promptly and safely -- NOT in the fireplace.

5. Be especially careful during the Christmas season to keep matches and cigarette lighters out of the reach of children, and try to keep the youngsters from playing beneath or near the Christmas tree.

Finally, State Fire Marshal J. Benjamin Roy, Jr., emphasized, it is especially important during this busy time of the year that children never be left alone or without proper supervision -- even for a short time -- and that every family have a well-rehearsed escape plan for use in case of a fire emergency.

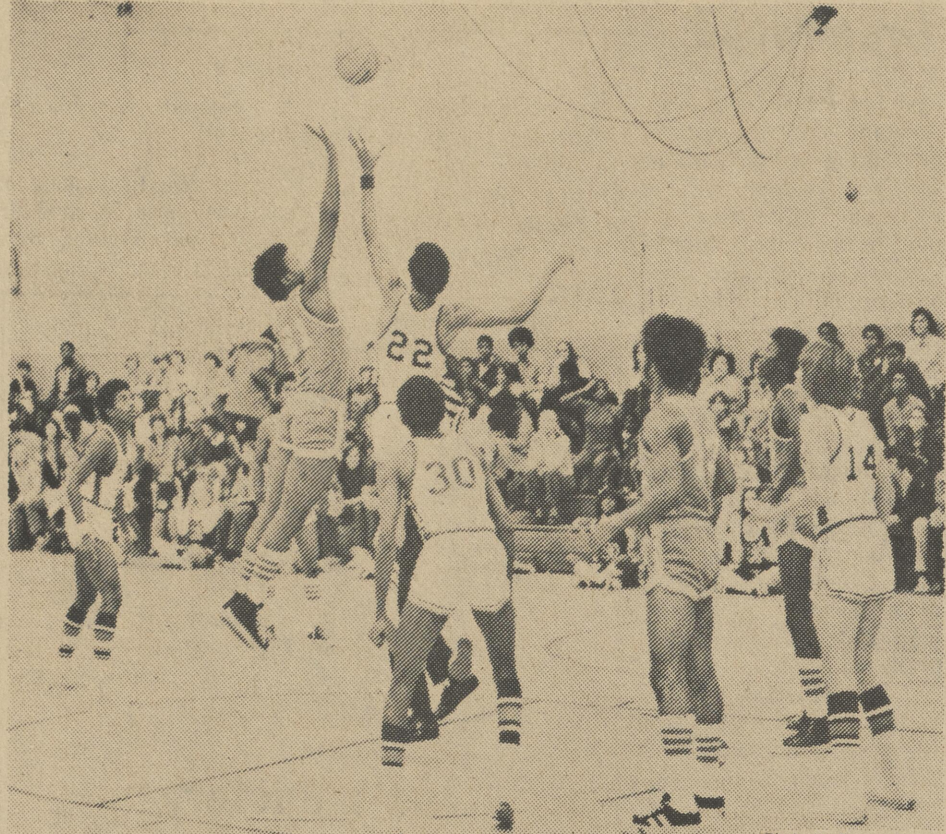

The energy situation and high fuel costs are causing many people to seek alternative sources of energy for heat. Their purpose may be twofold: to provide supplemental heat, and to provide for standby heat in an emergency, such as a power shortage. Coal and wood stoves can provide safe alternative sources of heat if properly selected, installed and used.

Many homes have fireplaces so the question of what to use as an alternate heat source is answered. Tests indicate, however, that an ordinary fireplace is only about one-third as efficient as a good stove.

In the absence of a fireplace the homeowner must turn to some other heating device for backup warmth. Unfortunately, choices may be few since the fuel situation has caused a high demand on the supply of solid fuel stoves. Unless a prospective buyer is willing to wait, his selection of equipment will be severely limited.

There are several factors affecting safety to consider when selecting an alternative heating source:

- (1) the condition of an existing fireplace and its chimney;
- (2) the condition of an available stove;
- (3) the available means for venting;
- (4) whether coal or wood is to be used as fuel.

Some fireplaces are merely installed as part of the decor. They may not have a chimney flue. Naturally, a fireplace which has no chimney flue must not be used because unvented toxic products of combustion are deadly. The same danger exists with unvented solid fuel grills, although many householders are not as aware of this.

If the fireplace has a

chimney flue and has never been used, it should be inspected. Further, the chimney must be thick enough, have proper clearances from combustible structural members of the building and be properly lined. If the fireplace has been previously used, it and the chimney should be inspected frequently. The chimney should be clean, the damper in working order (some chimneys may not have a damper, but a damper is preferred), and the chimney, fireplace and hearth should be in good repair.

Check that no alteration to the structure has been made in the immediate vicinity of the fireplace such as partition changes, in the addition of bookcases or cabinets, or similar changes that affect heat transfer from the fireplace to combustible materials. The fireplace must have a tight fitting screen to prevent sparks and hot coals from popping out.

If you are considering a used stove, it should be checked for cracks or other defects that may require repairs with stove cement. More obvious defects may be faulty legs, hinges, draft louvers, etc. Severe cracks should be welded by an expert; or preferably, find a stove in better repair. A coal burning stove must be in good condition.

A new stove should be made of sturdy, suitable materials such as cast iron. Purchase it from a reliable dealer that has stove experts on his staff. Various sized stoves are available including the Franklin stove, the box stove and the pot-belly stove.

Your stove must have venting. An existing chimney with a blocked off flue entrance may be used. Otherwise, a complete chimney in addition to a chimney con-

ductor will be needed.

Although fireplaces and stoves can usually be adjusted or altered to burn either coal or wood, the stove you select must either be suitable or altered for the fuel you will use. A stove and chimney connector equipped to burn coal may need a heavier flue lining if wood is to be used. A fireplace or stove must be equipped with grates if coal is to be burned. A wood burning fireplace usually has andirons.





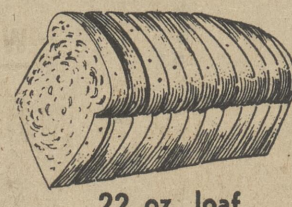
