

For every evil under the sun There is a remedy, or there is none If there be one, seek till you find it If there be none, never mind it.

When this country has come into troubled times in the past, its leaders...its citizens have reflected on the past and how their great leaders have reacted to a like situation Abraham Lincoln is the one we look to for strength and respect for his judgment.

It's strange sometimes how history and fate work together -- for as events develop around us on the federal, state and local levels -- indeed on the local level -- the compassion in his judgments and the interpretation of the events as reflected though the law bring us back through the teachings of Lincoln. We live under a government of laws and not by the will of man. Lincoln, as a knowledgeable man as well as a strict constructionist of the constitution, enforced the powers of his office to insure these rights at a most crucial time in the history of this country. Harry S. Truman gave us that same sense of direction and leadership.

This newspaper has said in the past that the elected officials on the federal, state, and local levels are employees of the taxpayers. The taxpayers, therefore, as Lincoln would interpret, have the right to know. You cannot keep from the taxpaying public for one instant what their tax dollars entitle them to know. Executive sessions as a general rule of law may be illegal. I view this rule to mean that executive sessions as a general rule of law are not illegal so long as discussions are conducted with no decision making or vote taking accomplished.

As we approach the 12th of February and Lincoln's birthday, and not the 3rd of February, his immortal words "...a government of the people, by the people, and for the people...shall not perish from the earth ... " remain with us. When we as men swap in the right to ask "why" for an easy way out or due to embarrassment we forfeit the question then we have given up a precious privilege which Lincoln made provisions for us to have in the future. Can we conduct business without an obligation to the laws? Where would justice for all be served? Forfeit these rights you will relinquish more than what the word "why" imputes. You forfeit your right to interest...or cause. Without interest you have a dying country -- or closer yet, a dying community.

I refer to the word "why" because many times, we naturally form opinions too quickly, often react prematurely and can even overreact to situations. It was a lesson to be learned from Lincoln who after "the war" in an atmosphere of hate and bitterness attempted through compassion in his judgment to lead a divided nation back to unity and strength. You cannot be blinded by fear or public ridicule, for cool
