The Lake Forest School District shut the doors on all its schools Tuesday and Wednesday.

To the east, the Milford District. Middle School and Milford High Schools closed. Woodbridge schools were open.

The strike resulted in Governor Sherman Tribbitt's veto of a package bill which would have granted an 8 percent pay raise, smaller classes and would have provided for an automatic cost of living clause for Delaware's teachers.

Reaction to the placardcarrying strikers were varied.



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



not by foreign private companies. They are investments by foreign governments, which makes them distinctly different from American investments abroad. Our investments are by private interests which are not controlled by our government.

I think investments in our industries by foreign governments must be strictly regulated to prevent takeovers that would be contrary to our national interest. I am drafting legislation that would do this.

My bill would prohibit any such investment in defense and telecommunications industries and would require any other proposed major investments in industry or real estate to be reviewed by the Secretary of Commerce. He could give his approval only after determining that the investment proposed would be in the national interest, and he could do so only with the consent of the Congress.


