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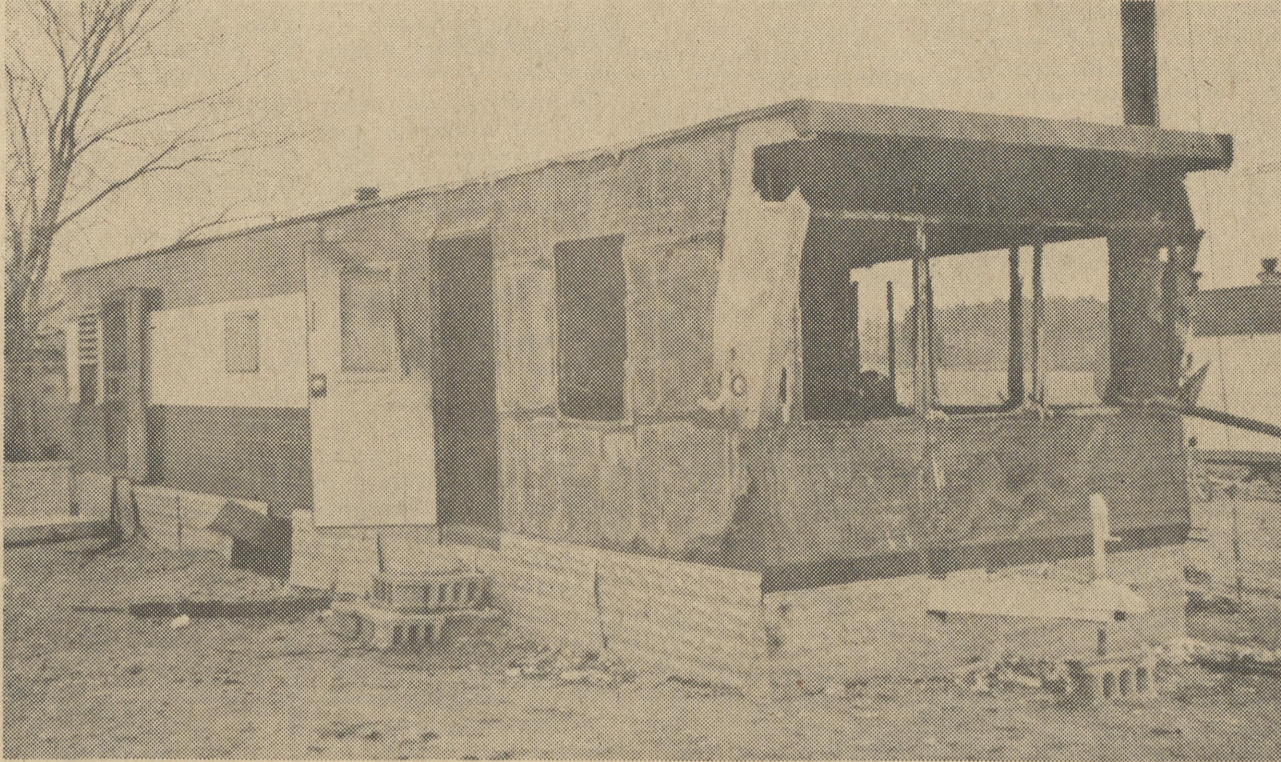
Fire Claims One

An elderly retired farmer was found dead in the remains of his trailer following a fire Friday night. Clarence L. Collins, 70, had been living in a mobile home south of Harrington off U.S. 13. Harrington and Farmington responded to reports of smoke seen pouring from the Collins trailer around 10 p.m. The apparent cause of the fire was a dropped cigarette, according to officials.

Mr. Collins left 52 close relatives. His wife died in 1968. Surviving are three sons, Layton and Ralph of Harrington and Paul of Georgetown; and five daughters, Marie Hammond and Emily Bland of Harrington, Hilda Tucker of Camden; Louise Ash of Dover, and Catherine Newton of Sharptown, Md.; 20 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

Also surviving are 4 brothers, John of Plant City, Fla.; Joseph and Granville of Gumboro; and Eben of Wilmington, and eight sisters, Ola Moore of Laurel; Stella Adkins of Millsboro; Florence Harbin and Alice Stockles of Stockley; Ruth Larmore and Edith Shockley of Salisbury, Md.; Ellen Bailey of Pittsville, Md., and Maggie Baker of Gumboro.

Services were Tuesday afternoon at 2 at the Fleischauer Funeral Home, Greenwood. Interment was in Bethel Cemetery, near Gumboro.

Quillen Is Harrington City Manager

Council Calls Special Session

On Monday night, Harrington City Council met in special session to decide upon a new City Manager for the Town. George Robert (Bobby) Quillen was the unanimous choice of the committee of Councilmen Griffin, McColley, and Shaw to interview the applicants for the position. The post was left vacant when Jack Harrington came under fire earlier in the month and resigned.

The Charter required that the City Manager be a resident of the Town. Quillen has been a life long resident of the

community. The new City Manager will assume his duties March 1st. The job calls for a salary of \$150 per week, and Quillen will work under a probationary period of 90 days.

Although the meeting was called specifically to hire a City Manager, the Mayor did conduct some general City business. He announced that the new police car had arrived, but there would be a short delay before delivery. It was discussed that the old police car would be retained by the City for the purpose of

allowing the City Manager to use it for City business. No action was taken on this, for it was agreed that the matter could be held over until the regular monthly meeting on Monday night the 3rd of March.

Something unusual appeared at the special session

in that a tape recorder was being used to tape the meeting. It is understood that the tape recorder will be used by the Town at future meetings.

The next regular monthly meeting of City Council will be Monday March 3rd at 7:30 p.m.

Killen Is New Chairman

The new chairman of the Delaware River and Bay Authority Ernest E. Killen began his two-year term this week with a report that the third new vessel of the Cape May-Lewes Ferry was launched successfully in Houston, Texas, on Saturday, Feb. 15.

Sea trials are scheduled for mid-April with delivery at Cape May, New Jersey, expected by May 1, according to Authority Director William J. Miller.

Killen of Harrington was elected chairman at the Jan. 21 meeting of the Authority as the Commission rotated the chairmanship and vice-chairmanship. The new vice-chairman from New Jersey is Clarence B. McCormick.

Commissioners were presented with the Delaware Memorial Twin Spans traffic and revenue report for January 1975 which shows

considerably improved statistics over the previous January. Revenue traffic increased by 91,899 vehicles or 8.4 percent while revenue for the same period increased by \$18,392 or 2.4 percent.

Miller pointed out that the private automobile traffic increase of 14.5 percent over last January with a corresponding revenue of 17.4 percent was the most encouraging feature of the report since this was the area most affected by the energy crisis.

While commercial traffic showed a decrease during 1974, the year-end comparison shows a drop in revenue of only four percent of the overall decrease in revenue.

Edible Soybean Developed

A new edible soybean named "Emerald" has just been released by the University of Delaware's Agricultural Experiment Station in Georgetown.

Emerald is a green vegetable soybean which is intended for use in the processing trade for either freezing or canning. According to Dr. H. William Crittenden, the plant pathologist who developed Emerald, the bean is equally adapted for the home garden.

Emerald has a large, bright green seed which is quite different in shape from the more familiar yellow-seeded field varieties of soybean. The bean is slightly flattened and has a black hilum. It possesses a good flavor and can be cooked in a variety of ways. It contains 40 percent protein - nearly twice that of peas, navy beans and limas.

The new vegetable soybean is resistant to the fungus diseases, downy mildew and pod-stem blight. It has a higher yield and a better shatter resistance than the Verde soybean, a variety released at the Experiment Station by Crittenden back in 1967.

Council Names City Manager

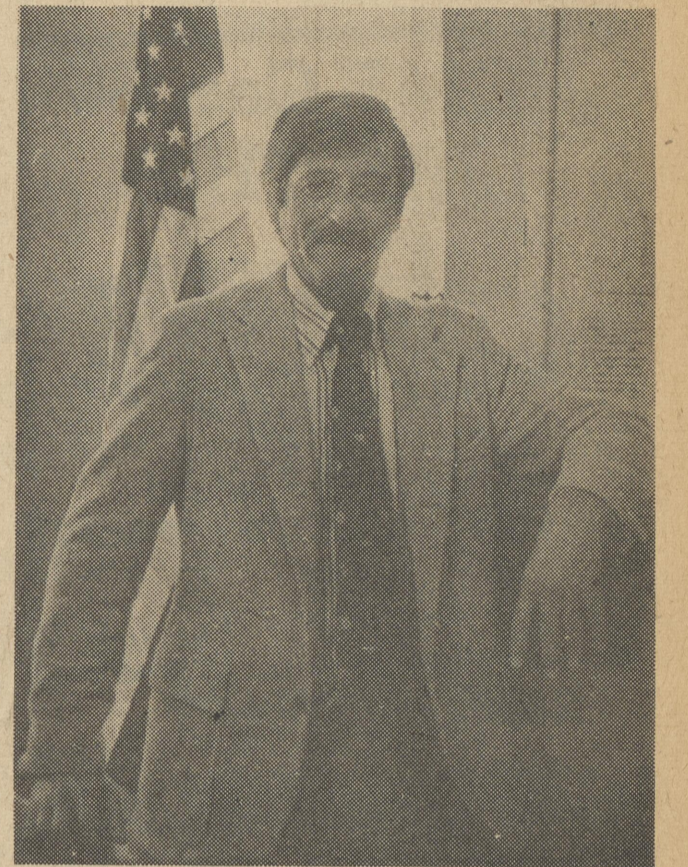
Bobby Quillen, life long resident of Harrington, was named the new City Manager to replace Jack Harrington who resigned earlier this month. Quillen will take over the duties of City Manager for Harrington the 1st of March. A committee of three councilmen, Griffin, McColley, and Shaw, recommended to the Council that Quillen be hired over the five other applicants. The Charter requires that the City Manager be a resident of the Town.

Quillen's wide background in government brings knowledge and understanding to the office of City Manager. The office of City Manager over the years due to federal revenue sharing and the like requires someone with this understanding. Quillen has this know-how and understanding. As a Republican, Quillen has served in the State Legislature first elected in 1966 and was elected three times to that office. He left office in 1972. While in the State Legislature, he served on the Highway and Transportation committee and the Welfare Committee. He served as Chairman of the Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee and was a member of the Committee to study new methods on taxation, which was a joint committee of the House and Senate.

From the Legislature, Quillen was appointed by then Governor Russell W. Peterson to fill the unexpired term of G. Dorsey Torbert, the Kent County Receiver of Taxes, who died in office. The period as Receiver of Taxes was from September 1973 to June of 1974. Following that period he was named a lobbyist for the Delaware Oilmen's Association.

Quillen graduated from the Harrington High School. He is a charter member of the

Harrington Jaycees, and a member of the American Legion. He is also a member of St. Stephens Episcopal Church of Harrington where he has served as a delegate to the State Convention. Currently he is a member of the Vestry of that Church and was recently promoted from Junior Warden to Senior Warden.

Welch Is Henlopen Champ

"I guess you could say the time I beat him was the time it counted," were the words Alan Welch on his semi-final victory over Chris Rincon. This, and two other victories landed Welch the Henlopen Conference 132 pound championship.

Not only did Welch capture first place in his weight class but also was named the outstanding wrestler of the entire Henlopen Conference Tournament. Along the way Welch, who was seeded third, captured two upsets, one over Rincon, and the other over Andy Scrafford, in the championship match.

Twice before Welch had been defeated by Rincon by identical 5-3 scores, once during last year's regular season and once this year during their dual match against Caesar Rodney. Rincon was seeded second, but one of the other surprises of the tournament had to be Scrafford who upset Sussex Central's Stanton Adkins in the semi-finals.

Welch had also wrestled Scrafford twice before, losing in the Milford Invitational 6-4 before gaining revenge by winning 1-0 in their dual match this season. Welch won the toss and took the top at the start of the second period of their championship match.

Some confusion on his part in the last few seconds of the period cost Welch two points as Scrafford reversed him.

With Scrafford on top in the third period and time running out, Welch used a lateral drop and reversed him with the risky move. This forced the match into overtime where Welch took only 34 seconds to pin Scrafford for the victory. Welch began wrestling back in the seventh grade and had a 4-3 record. In the eighth he raised it to 12-1. But in ninth and tenth grades he was relegated to the junior varsity team where he had 10-1-1 and 11-1 records.

As the eleventh grade began Welch was the varsity 126 pounder but when Martin Miller got well Alan lost to him in eliminations and wrestled junior varsity for three meets. He then moved up to 132 pounds where he finished 6-1, third in the conference and fourth in the state.

When this season rolled around Welch had a solid position on the team and was one of the co-captains. He finished with a record of 9-2 losing only to Rincon and Adkins.

This week Welch goes to the State Tournament at St. Marks.

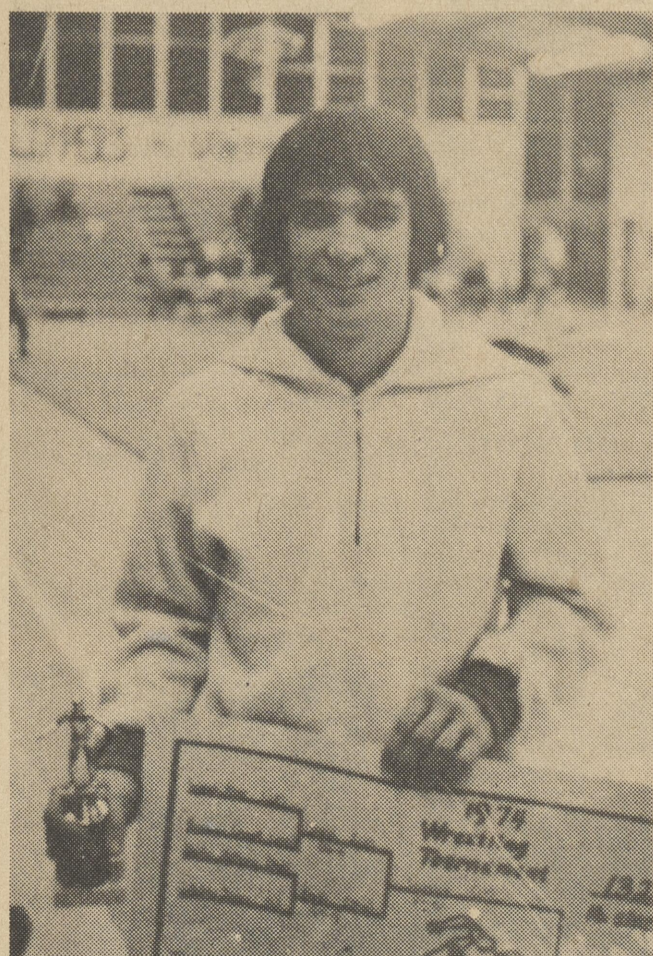
Biden Will Speak At Milford



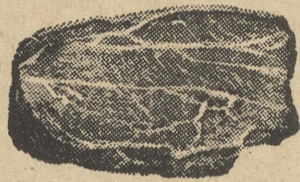

The Farrow family was wiped-out last week with the latest invasion of the flu bug. The first time in my entire life that I can remember when the entire family was affected. Recovery is slow and it is harder on the adults than the infants.

With nothing else to do during the convalescence but think, I tried to catch up on my research. I have often heard it said long before oil in the Mid-East was a national problem that the "...Arabs or the Jews were the aggressors". They each appeared to be caught up with the plan to occupy more and more land. These people aren't the real aggressors. To be sure they are caught up in a struggle in their homeland in a very sensitive situation. Their reaction is only natural each to each. I believe the real struggle is among the "oil barons" of this country whose families have for years manipulated the destinies of the residents of the Mid-East. The power...and power on a global situation...of the great oil companies is demonstrated each day particularly when one company head can tell the Governor of a State what he can and can't do. The stakes are high and staggering to say the least. We are helpless to defend against all that we thought to be ours whether it be what we have worked or whether it is part of the great natural resources of this once great country. It is likely to destroy the natural resources of our political system like private enterprise. The signs are on the wall. It takes three people working today to keep one government employe...and look at the size of the State and Federal government. For me or some other individual...as an individual to go around and voice this I would be labelled a "nut" or someone who doesn't know what he is talking about.

What can be done about it? Well...all that we can do now is sit and hope that some rational mind can organize enough people to save the situation. In the meantime, Congress CAN STOP spending when they don't have the money. There are too many welfare programs and too many give away programs. Put people back to work and bring the prices of materials down where people can afford them. Reduce taxes on middle and low American incomes. This is particularly essential. If we don't take notice of the situation soon then all that we hold as precious and essential to our customary way of life will be gone and the government will end up taking over everything worthwhile in sight.

As we go down this road though, bear in mind who the real aggressors are in this situation.

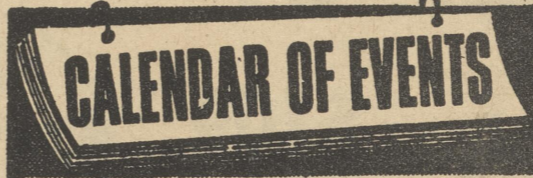

variety came from a cross of Aoda and a selection from Hahto and Kent made at the University's Georgetown Substation in 1960. The bean has been tested in Delaware for eight years. It reaches the plump stage, which is best for edible quality, in 95 days. It matures for harvest in the dry state in 126 days. Yield per acre for processing is approximately 2,500 pounds. Yield per acre for combining averages around 35 bushels.

In anticipation of a growing demand for such green-seeded vegetable soybeans in the future, an application for a Plant Variety Protection Certificate for Emerald has been filed.

Seed supply in 1975 will go only to seed growers. It should be commercially available the following year.

The Delaware Agricultural Experiment Station will maintain foundation seed.

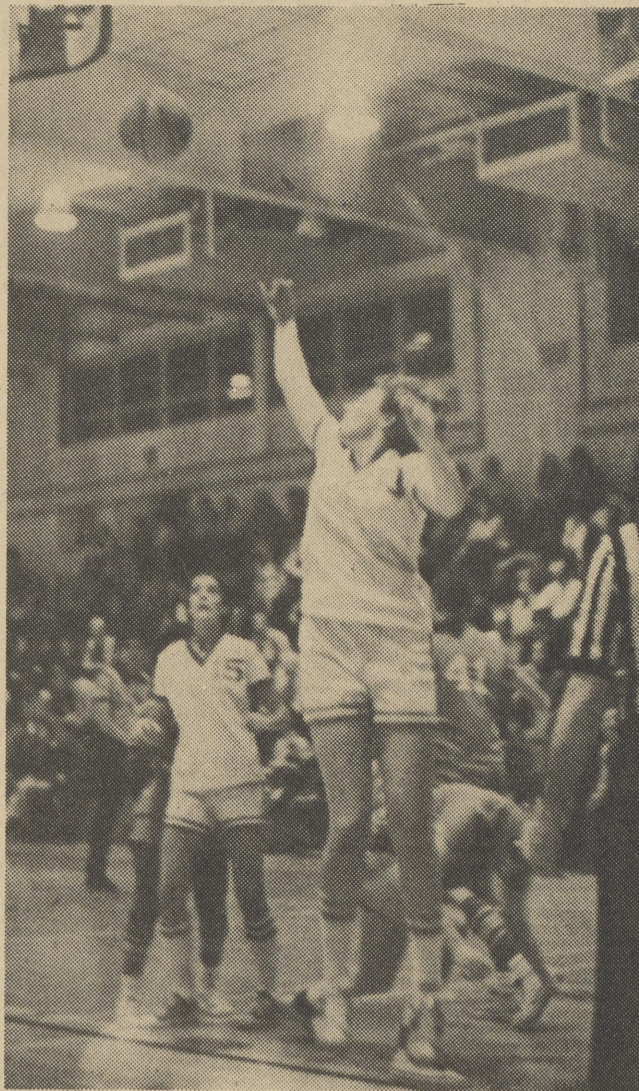
In winning the third game in three days, a necessity because of a tie with Smyrna for the Southern Division crown, the Spartans engaged in a see-saw battle throughout.
