| Lake Forest's track Spartans, coached by Jim Blades and Jim Fleming, made a strong showing at the Wilmington Relay Carnival, despite the absence of a pair of runners who hold the top Spartan clockings in the 440 and 880 yard runs. <br> The locals, who scored in six of nine events, totalled 23 points and tied Seaford for fifth place in Division TWO. <br> At full strength, fourth place would have been a certainty, with third place a probabiltiy of 17 teams. <br> Dan Parker, a fine performer heretofore at distances of one mile and up, through necessity, had to run the half mile in the distance medley. The strong sophomore surprised with a 59 second first quarter, en route to an excellent 2.04.3 half mile. <br> Sophomore Ron Loper, provided with a lead, held it with a 55 second quarter. Charley Scott ran 220 yards anchored with a 4.45 mile and Lake Forest had upset the pre-race dope with a 8.10 victory. <br> In the two mile relay, Lake Forest was fifth, 8.38.
