Two Locals Are Named Outstanding Young Men of America

Word was received this week that Charlie Brown and C. Lee Dean will be among the 9000 young men featured in the 1976 edition of Outstanding Young Men of America.

The Outstanding Young Men of America Program recognizes achievements and abilities of men between the ages of 21 and 36.

Criteria included in the selection are outstanding civic and professional contributions to their communities, states and nation.

Charlie Brown, 23, a Lake Forest graduate in 1970, earned a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing from the University of Delaware in 1974. He was employed by the Milford Chronicle for two years and served in advertising and reporting areas.

In January he became associated with Pacific Mutual Insurance Company with Delaware offices in Georgetown and Wilmington.

He is also a staff photographer for TRI-STATE Speed Press, a weekly racing publication.

Brown has been a member of the Harrington JAYCEES for four years, and is president elect of that organization. He also served for two years as the association's state chaplain.

He is vice-president of Delaware Bay Vans and a member of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company.

Brown is the son of Thomas E. and Ruth S. Brown of Harrington.

C. Lee Dean, 27, is a graduate of Harrington High School's class of 1966. He

attended the University of South Carolina for three and a half years and the University of Delaware for two and a half years on a part-time basis.

He has worked in Taylor's Hardware for three years as well as owning and operating a school bus. Prior to this, he was associated with Clyde Perry, a local painting contractor.

Dean has been in the JAYCEES for three years, serving as a past vice-president and is a vice-president elect for the coming year. He has also held the chairmanship of the annual Christmas parade here for the past two years.

He is a Sergeant E-5 in the Delaware National Guard, is a member of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company and a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia National Music Fraternity Alumni Association.

He has been actively participating with the Lake Forest Band since 1971, serving as flag corps director for the past three years, and helping out with the overall band activities prior to that.

Help In Fire Prevention

With the unseasonably hot, dry weather Delaware is experiencing, members of the local fire department have been busy with a rash of field and woods fire.

Abrey Brown, local fire prevention chairman, has provided the following tips in an attempt to help area citizens have a safe, fireless spring and summer.

Be extra careful during dry spells if burning trash. Since cities and towns prohibit the burning of trash, this applies to rural residents primarily. Trash containers should have deflectors to prevent flying sparks.

Take heed when there are burning bans in effect. Do not burn until the bans are lifted.

Avoid storing flammable liquids in homes, especially petroleum products.

Be aware of the possible dangers involved in the use of outside grills. Keep lighter fluids well away from children's reach and be sure

grills are completely out before going to bed at night.

For the handy man or do-it-yourselfer, use good safety procedures when using power tools or any other tools that might create sparks around the home.

Avoid overloading circuits when using power tools. Overload circuits should be avoided by homemakers as well.

Attics and cellars should be well-ventilated and free of disposable products such as old boxes and papers. These, according to Brown, merely add fuel to the fire that may start as a result of spontaneous combustion.

Items in attics should not be stored in such a way to touch the roof.

Keep cooking stoves and micro-wave ovens in good condition.

Keep all cleaning fluids, detergents, and petroleum distillates out of the reach of children. These items also need good ventilation.

Brown suggests that area homes be equipped with portable fire extinguishers, which he says cost around \$17 and up.

People still wishing to have a child identification sticker or an invalid identification sticker still obtain these. The red iridescent stickers are to be placed on windows in rooms of child-

ren or invalids so that, in the case of fire, these persons might be assisted. Write to Project Identification, 120 Grant Street, Harrington to Grant Street, Harrington for the stickers.

Shoot Out Injures Two

Three men were allegedly involved in a violent gun battle Friday night with two of the men getting hurt and the third being sought by State Police.

According to police, the incident took place on Sussex 561, four miles south of Bridgeville, at the home of William L. Collins, 28.

They said Collins, who was arguing with Lewis H. Kane, 29, of Greenwood, grabbed a .410 shotgun and allegedly shot Kane in the head and chest.

Kane grabbed a hand gun and allegedly shot Collins in the right arm, police said. A third man, Barry L. Collins, 25, of Seaford, then picked up Collins' shotgun and allegedly shot at Kane, hitting him in the neck, according to police.

Police said Collins and Kane were released from Nanticoke Memorial Hospital, Seaford after treatment.

Collins is being held at Sussex Correctional Institution in default of \$500, while Kane was released on \$500 bail by a Magistrate Court

No. 4 judge. Both men have been charged with first degree assault.

Barry Collins is still being sought by police on the same charge.

Annual AFS Walkathon Is May 1

Will Be One Feature of Old Dover Days

Some of the prettiest faces in Dover will be waiting to greet visitors at the home of Mrs. H. V. Holloway on May 8 and 9. Mrs. Holloway, 45 Maple Lane, Dover, will again have on display her family of antique dolls for the Old Dover Days Bicentennial Celebration. She has been exhibiting her

dolls for the past 20 years, and this year she expects to have more than 400 dolls arranged throughout the downstairs of her home. In addition to the dolls, some of which date back to the 1700's, visitors will also be able to see doll clothing and furniture.

Mrs. Holloway, whose late husband, H. V. Holloway was State Dept. of Public Instruction Superintendent,

began collecting dolls in 1927. Many of her dolls have been acquired during Mrs. Holloway's trips abroad, and she is particularly proud of those from Germany and Vietnam.

Unique this year to Mrs. Holloway's exhibit is a display of apple dolls which she has made herself. These dolls, all with faces made from apples, depict any Americans significant to the colonial era including Indian settlers, Betsy Ross, Francis Scott Key, and Delaware's own John Dickinson.

Mrs. Holloway shares her enthusiasm for dolls with hundreds of people throughout the year. Her dolls are always on display and her house is usually open by appointment to anyone who would like to see her "little people." Being quite an authority on the subject, Mrs. Holloway gives lectures and writes for trade publications on antique dolls.

The Holloway home is only one of the more than thirty-five homes and public buildings which will be open this year for Old Dover Days, May 7-9. Also incorporated in this traditional salute to the city's colonial heritage will be many festivities including crafts exhibits, colonial games and dancing, international food tasting booths, and a horse and carriage promenade.

Lake Forest Registration Date Set

Registration for children who will be attending kindergarten in September in the Lake Forest School District is set for the week of April 26-30. Parents should also register next year's first graders who will be entering an elementary school in the district for the first time in September.

Registration centers will be open from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the following locations: the nurse's office in the W. T. Chipman Junior High School in Harrington (Dorman Street), the nurse's office in the Lake Forest East Elementary School in Frederica and the nurse's office in the Lake Forest North Elementary School in Felton. If these times are not convenient call the nurse in your district.

Parents are asked to register their children in the building located in their elementary attendance area. Children now attending kindergarten in the district are considered to be registered for first grade; nothing in the way of registration is required of their parents.

Children in the age group for kindergarten attendance starting in September (those who will be five years old on or before January 1, 1977) must be registered. Also to be registered are prospective first graders who will be six years of age on or before January 1, 1977, but who have not been attending kindergarten or are newcomers to the district.

Parents must present the child's birth certificate at the time of registration. Immunization records must be presented at this time also.

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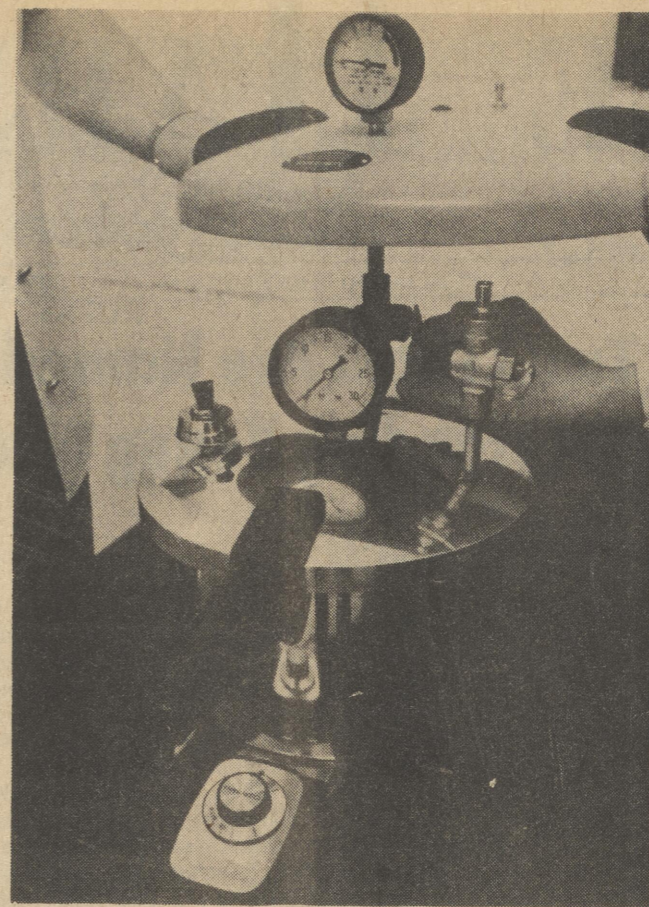

However, most of them (politicians) cannot pass up the opportunity for all of the glamour and exposure received from the various segments of the media.

In my mind the best candidate would be one who refrained from speech making. Think of all of the time saved here...especially at convention time. I would also go along with less hand shaking and the like for again it would eliminate a great deal of time and for that matter, sore hands. It would be acceptable for the candidate to have somewhat of a questionable past. This way we always know where we stand on matters.

Today's modern day candidates are the pillars of the church in one scene...and under investigation by a federal probe or even under federal indictment. If we have some idea of the worst side of things...we can always hope for the best...maybe.

There was such a man...I continued. Some of these men pass through this world just once. Many times history passes them by...and thereby creates a great vacuum. Adali Stevenson was such a man. He never reached politician maturity. I remember Charles F. What our government received in the way of information could not be counted or measured...in dollars and cents.

Chiefly among other things I don't believe, especially in his heyday, he would stand for any performance short of being good. The laws, I am quite sure would have been more strictly construed. Present day society has dipped to the point where just about anything is accepted "...as good work." The saddest part is when people tell you that they seek only the very best in their performance...and yet do not have a true eye for acceptable work.

We could go on forever about Hughes...finding I suppose just as many minuses as pluses. But...really who are these others trying to kid. In the final analysis about Hughes the biggest short coming...and it is probably the system...once we got him in there we might never get him out.

FROM THE FRYING PAN...

Weekly Report By Senator Joseph Biden

In January, as many Delawareans will recall, the Army agreed to declare as excess to its needs some 172 acres of prime beach land it controls at Cape Henlopen. This is the first step toward the eventual return of this land to Delaware for recreational purposes.

Because of the continuing interest in the return of this land, which I sought in a letter to the Army last October, I thought I might use this Weekly Report to run down some of the procedures that must be followed before this acreage is turned back to the State.

It will take some time. First, the land has to be cleared of all Army equipment and debris (the Army ended its military use of the land as a training site at the end of January). Once the land is cleared, then the Army can officially report to the Department of the Defense that 172 acres of the 192 acres it controls at Cape Henlopen at excess to its needs (the Army plans on keeping 20 acres for its own recreation purposes).

The next step is up to the Defense Department, which is required to officially determine that other military agencies do not have a need for the land. Once that takes place, then the Armed Services Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives are officially notified the land is excess to military needs. That notification, I hope, can take place by early this summer.

The Committees are expected to routinely give their approval, at which point the matter is referred to the General Services Administration, the housekeeping agency for the Federal government. GSA is required by Federal law to determine if any civilian agencies have a need for the land. I anticipate that at this point, the GSA will find the land is surplus to government needs, and it will then be made available to the State of Delaware, which could include the 172 acres within the Cape Henlopen State Park.

In all, there are about 580 acres of land at Cape Henlopen under military control, including the 192 owned by the Army and the rest under the control of the Navy. Ultimately, I would like to see all of this land returned to the State for use by Delawareans and our neighbors. That goal is likely to take a good deal of time; but in the interim, the first steps have been taken toward the return 172 acres of Army land, prime beach acreage that will be most welcome by our State and its people.

Thoughts.....

Our senior citizens should receive special consideration under our criminal laws because they are more vulnerable to crime than the rest of us.

Many of our older citizens are so fearful of street crimes that they are virtual prisoners in their homes.

I have just introduced legislation I hope will stimulate state legislatures to take special steps to combat crimes against the elderly.

My legislation would establish mandatory prison sentences for serious crimes against persons 60 years of age or older. It would authorize the Federal Law Assistance Administration to grant funds to states which develop special programs to protect our elderly persons.

The mandatory sentence provisions would apply only where Federal law has jurisdiction but they are intended to serve as a model for states. Under this legislation, mandatory minimum sentences would be set in Washington, D.C. and U.S. territories for such crimes as assault, burglary, kidnapping, manslaughter, rape, and robbery. The sentences would range from three months for simple assault to 15 years for second-degree murder. First-degree murder already carries a minimum sentence of life

imprisonment, regardless of the victim's age.

This legislation would prohibit suspended sentences and deny probation or parole in cases involving crimes against elderly persons.

I believe that punishment for the dangerous felon must be swift and certain. I believe prison sentences serve as deterrents to crime. When judges are required to impose jail sentences and offenders know they will be carried out, the would-be offender is much more likely to become a would-not-offender.

The first obligation of any society is to assure the safety of its law-abiding citizens.

Just as some students go away to a college, others go away to a state-supported residential vocational school (sometimes called a technical college). If you're interested in a good job after high school and don't plan to attend college, perhaps a live-in job school is the very thing you need.

The residential vocational school is not a second-best choice for second-best students. On the contrary, it is the very best choice for thousands of very fine students.

At a residential vocational school, you learn job skills. Programs are two years or less in length, and often operate 12 months a year.

The ideal residential vocational school is similar to state college - complete with dorms on campus, clubs, intramural sports, student-center, medical facilities, and other college-like attractions. Tuition is equivalent in these state-supported schools too. Most jobs school are open to students from any part of the county, although an out-of-state student will pay more than a state resident.

Programs vary widely among live-in job schools, but a wide range of skills can

be learned. At Oklahoma State Tech (OST), for instance, students train in one of 43 different programs, from automotive and heavy equipment, to food services and leathercraft. Anywhere over 17 1/2, with or without a high school diploma, can be admitted to OST.

Even in today's economy, OST grads are having no trouble finding jobs - in fact, many have from eight to ten offers. The reason OST grads do so well in the job market is the quality of the students' education.

Although there are many schools for vocational and technical training, like any other product, they represent all levels of quality. Some schools have a minimum of instructional equipment, much of it outdated; OST is blessed with a large inventory of up-to-date equipment in modern facilities. In some schools, one instructor may have to teach three different occupational programs; each OST instructor is a specialist. Time is another factor: some schools try to teach such programs as air conditioning or diesel work in six weeks

to nine months, whereas OST has a two-year program of study.

Unfortunately, there aren't many residential vocational schools around. Only about a dozen are in the same league as a state college. There are, of course, other ways to get job training, including area vocational schools, military programs, private vocational schools, community colleges, and colleges and universities which increasingly are offering vocational programs of less than four years in length. Still, for many students, the state-supported residential vocational school would be an excellent alma mater.

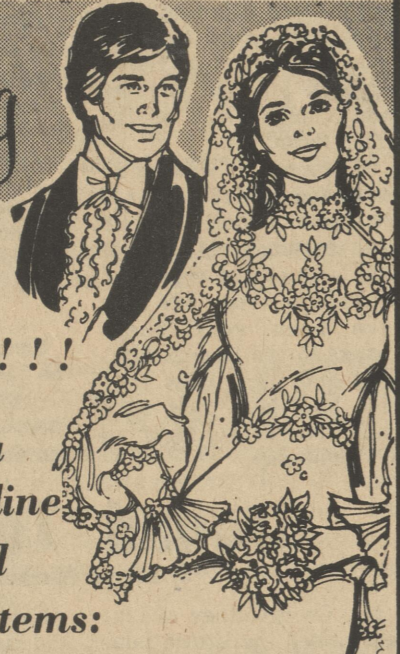

George Collins came hot with a very fine 618 series, added by K. P. Outten's 536 and Snookie Collin's 526.

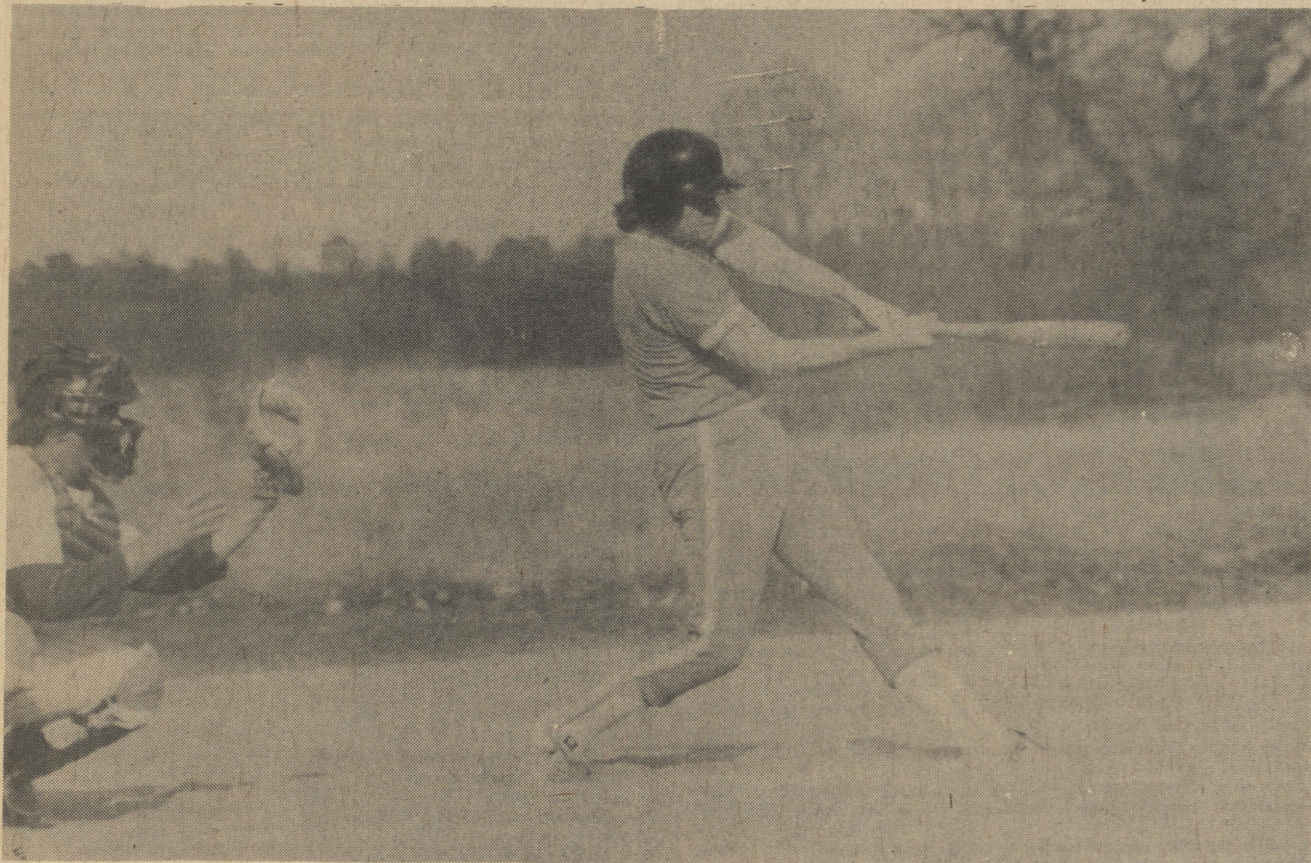
Although Burris was completely out of it, the captain Rich Dennis had a fine finish of a 574 series.

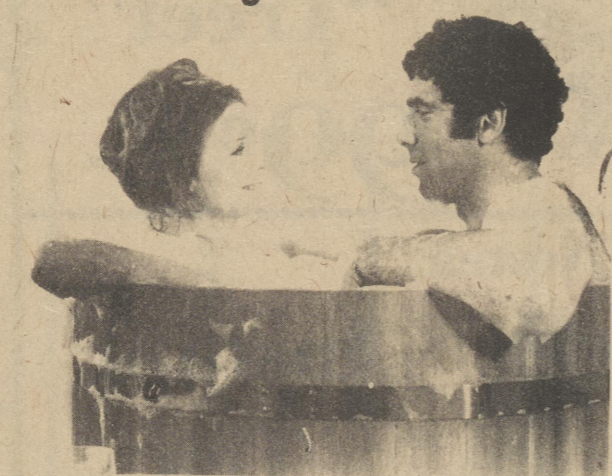
Buses will transport the Chorus to Rodney Square in Wilmington July 1st and to
