At the request of Sen. Nancy W. Cook(D-Kenton), the General Assembly's Joint Finance Committee has increased the operation and maintenance budget for Killens Pond State Park by \$10,000.






























#13 of a Series: The onshore impact of offshore oil

Can we proceed without further delay?

Amoco understands the interest of Eastern Shore residents in offshore oil operations and their questions about its effect on them. Many proposals and alternatives have been studied to determine how this important venture will affect all of us.

Over the past several months, our twelve reports above have tried to present a balanced picture of the opportunities, economic benefits and manageable risks that may lead to oil or gas production from the Atlantic Outer Continental Shelf.

Let's review the facts, as we see them.

If there is oil and natural gas under the Atlantic Outer Continental Shelf, in sufficient quantities for commercial production, and if our most optimistic timetables can be met, the first drop of oil or the first cubic foot of gas may be produced by the early 1980's.

We recognize that important physical, ecological and economic issues must be solved. We believe we have the know-how and technology to do the job. Continued delay, will not produce the oil or gas needed to meet the future energy requirements of the Eastern Seaboard.

After federal lease sales are held, several years of exploratory drilling by mobile rigs are needed to determine whether oil or gas is present. If oil and gas reserves are discovered, seven to ten years more would be needed to determine reservoir potential, make development plans and bring the field into production.

If producible oil is found, costly platforms must be built to rigid engineering and safety standards, installed in the ocean far out at sea and connected by undersea pipelines to bring the oil or gas ashore.

The industrial complex already highly developed on the East Coast would provide much of the labor, and all of the plant and harbor facilities needed. At present, it appears that anticipated Atlantic offshore oil would be processed at existing refineries by substituting this new domestic oil for some of the foreign oil now being processed.

The economic impact on the East Coast would be planned and gradual as exploration gets underway and would grow during the development and production phases.

The fishing and shellfish industries would not be significantly affected if at all. Similarly, activities of the tourist industry such as pleasure boating, swimming at beach areas, hunting in marsh and wetland areas and sport fishing at sea should continue to be enjoyed by all.

Amoco and the industry have the trained and experienced personnel and the technology to safely carry on exploration, production and transportation in the Atlantic.

Last week in separate meetings...school board meetings at Lake Forest and Woodbridge...the respective superintendents of the schools Albert W.Adams and Foster Flint of Lake Forest and Woodbridge respectively asked the same question "...but where is all of the money coming from".

It was an honest request. Each school district is run by conscientious superintendents. Both are on top of school board matters both in and out of the meeting rooms. Today it cost the individual families quite a sizeable sum of money to send a student through high school let alone the cost to the school district.

Well...where is all of the money coming from. Can a well go dry. It would seem to me sooner or later the well could go dry. The only place the government can get the money is through taxation. That is either taxing the people (who are taxed to death now) or properties (which are reaching the same plateau).

It would appear to me we should cut down on government and government spending. Now I grant you the government must be of large proportions, because there are more to govern today than yesterday. BUT DO WE NEED SO MANY ON THE PAYROLL. With most companies where the overhead is very high, they start cutting. The idea behind it in the early years was to save money, because it would end up costing the school teachers just as much in the long run.

Today they refer to these work assignments as extra duty assignments and those who perform these tasks must be compensated for them.

So the problems continue on and continue to grow. "Where will all of the money come from".....it is fairly obvious. The taxpayers will continue to pay and continue to pay until they can't pay any longer. Some of the abuses in government spending can be curbed without incurring any more. It is important to start, and a savings here will be a savings there.
