HARRINGTON-With Cookie Monster in the vanguard of the 100 plus entries, the annual Christmas parade sponsored again this year by the Harrington JAYCEES will get under way this Saturday, Dec. 4. A rain date has been set for the following Saturday.

Co-chairman Lee Dean and Bob Outten told the Journal there are 74 entries for the parade so far, with eight bands and countless numbers of antique autos.

Once again this year there will be an antique car show in the parking lot of the First National Bank at 11 a.m.

The parade will get underway around 12:30 p.m., with the route beginning on Center Street, proceeding to Dorman, turning onto Com-

merce Street and onto Clark Street, where all units will be reviewed at the judging stand. The parade usually concludes in the vicinity of the Quillen Shopping Center.

Professional band judges will guarantee the band competition to be stiff as usual during the city's biggest parade of the year.

When the long awaited for guest of honor, Santa Claus, brings up the last part of the parade, he will continue to the Quillen Shopping Center to talk with the eager youngsters. Hours for Santa's visits in the shopping center will be announced as his schedule is worked out. Watch this paper for details.

spanking new green garlands. They look like brand new lights.

## Use Caution For Christmas Shopping

HARRINGTON-With the Christmas shopping season again upon consumers and merchants, the Better Business Bureau branch, located in Milford, offers a few words to the wise that should be kept in mind during the weeks ahead.

When shopping, be sure to read the exchange or return policies of the store (s) from which merchandise is purchased. This saves embarrassment, confusion and or misunderstanding when and if an item has to be returned. Especially important is for how long a store's exchange policy is good.

The BBB, Milford branch, also warns that all items purchased should be thoroughly inspected before gift giving. If any defects exist, it is easier to return the item before it is given as a gift. With this in mind, as well as for exchanging items, one should keep all sales receipts.

Do not expect cash refunds on return items, cautions the BBB. Items returned simply because they aren't what the person wanted cannot be expected to be exchanged for cash. This is an unhealthy business practice and the merchants would not stay in business if this were practiced said the BBB spokesman.

## Harrington Hears About Funds

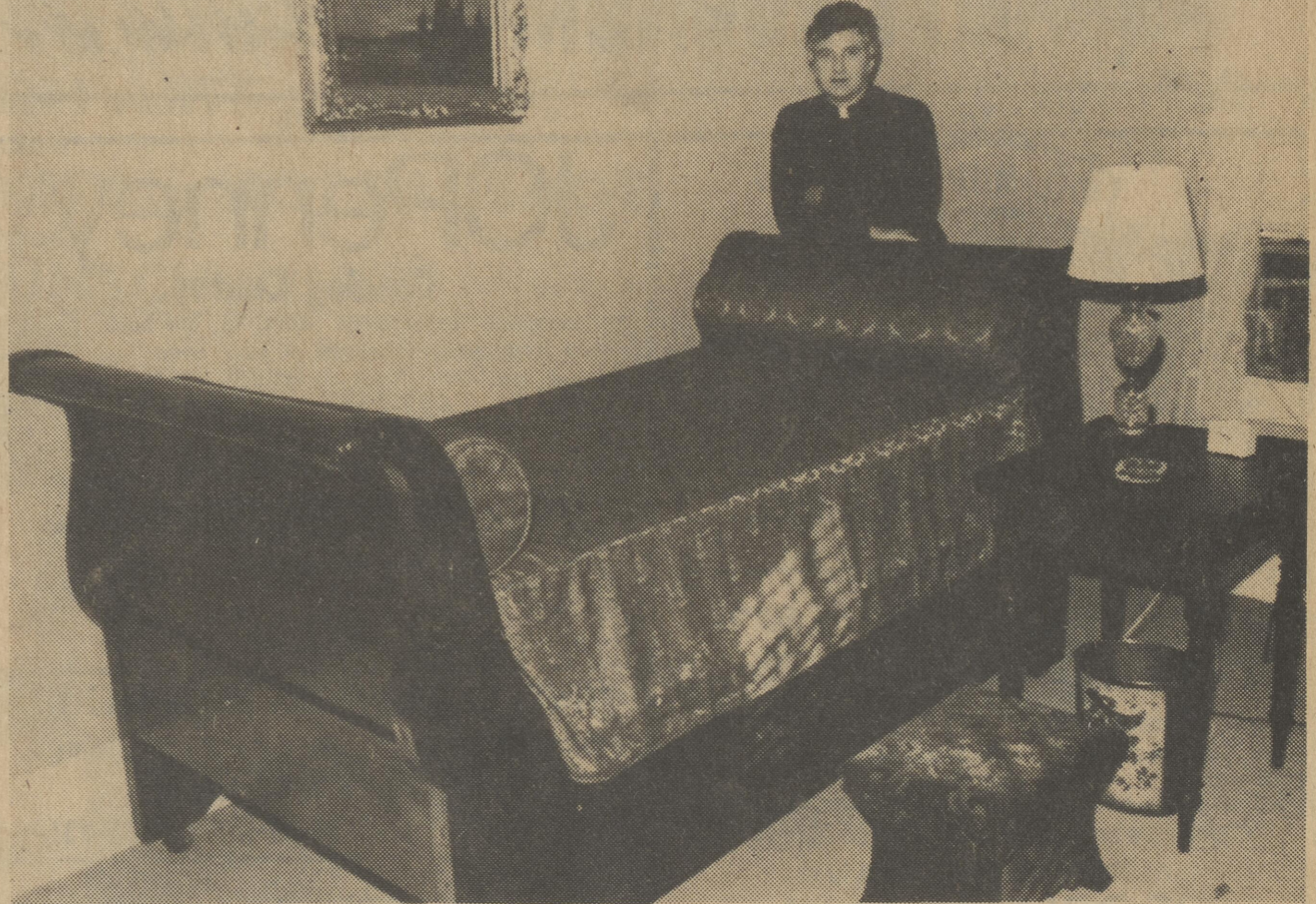
Last Wednesday a program sponsored by councilman Jack Wyatt brought Dennis Tobin from Senator Joe Biden's office and Betsy

Among the topics discussed were the possibility of buying the old People's Bank building with the idea of renovating it into city offices. Several other ideas were discussed including the current public works act, monies from HUD, and the possibility of building a total municipal building which would house both city offices and the Fire Co. No definite decisions were made. Also attending the meeting were councilman Earl McColley, Chief of Police Ed Layton, and city secretaries Joan Wilson and Norma Short. Chief Layton also discussed the possibility of obtaining money for a new police vehicle. No definite decisions were made on any of the matters but all plan to be explored.

BRIDGEVILLE-The Bridgeville Historical Society announced recently its plans to hold a "Christmas In Bridgeville". The day-long event will be held Saturday, December 18, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Plans for the day include a Christmas Craft Shop, a soup luncheon and a tour of several old or prominent dwellings in the Bridgeville area.

The day's activities will be centered at Fellowship Hall on Market Street, where tickets for the luncheon, the Christmas Craft Shop and house tours will be on sale.

The Christmas Craft Shop will have craft booths ranging in items from fruit baskets to an antique toy

display in "Ye Ole Christmas Tree" corner.

The "Country Store" will recall memories of earlier days when country stores were in abundance. Among the items for sale will be farm fresh country eggs, cured hams, homemade Christmas cakes and candies as well as many hand-crafted items. These will include Mr. and Mrs. Santas, handmade quilts and crocheted blankets.

The women of St. Mary's Episcopal Church will host a soup-luncheon from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Church, located a half block from Fellowship Hall.

Seven homes will be open for the tour. Among these are three 18th century homes. They include The Sudler House, owned by Mr. Thurman W. Adams; the Poplar Level Farms, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Charles S. Workman; and the Richards House, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph T. Conaway.

"The Storybook House", owned by Delaware artist, Jack Lewis, will also be included in the tour. Several of Mr. Lewis' art pieces will be on display as will ceramics by Mrs. Lewis.

St. Mary's Rectory, owned by

Mrs. Marguerite J. Peters and the Rev. Albert F. Peters, will be open for inspection. Viewers will see numerous mid-Victorian furnishings, of which the photograph with this article is an example. The home was built in 1904.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Rider will also be open for the tour. Lindenmere was built in 1924 and major renovations were made in 1974.

Persons interested in taking the house tour will take a bus that will begin the tour from the Union United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

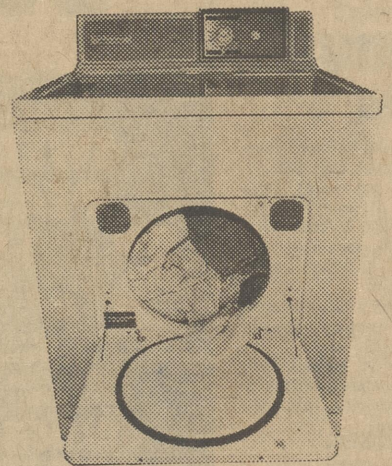

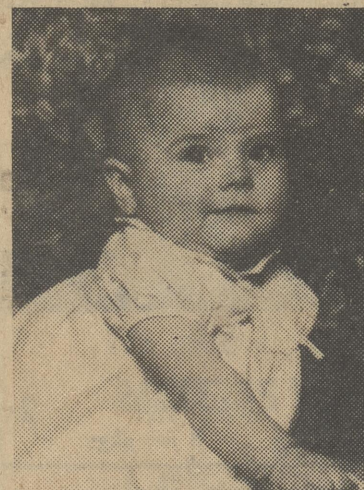

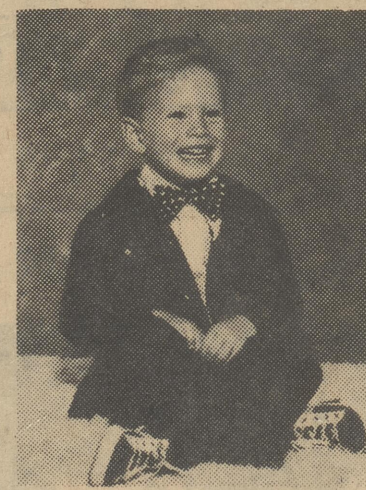

What a perfectly glorious Thanksgiving time we had. On Thanksgiving morning we arranged ourselves in the big, white van, comfortably surrounded by grandchildren, suitcases, color books and crayons and puzzles, and started our five-hour trip "over the river and through the woods, to Grandmother's house". As we rode along into Pennsylvania, Hilary and I feasted our eyes upon the lovely white birches. For miles, the road goes along by the picturesque Susquehanna. It was a Picture-Book Day. About halfway along, it started to snow softly, and the furrles were white against the sides of the high mountains. We stopped at a dairy store about eleven to fortify ourselves with a bit of a snack, because Grandmother had said that dinner would be about two.

We arrived in due time and were hustled over to Bill and Carol's house where the dinner would be served. Grandmother Bollerger carried along corn pudding, creamed cauliflower and pumpkin pies as her contribution. When we arrived at Bill's house, the long, long table had covers laid for fifteen, and it was all beautiful and heartwarming. Carol's mother had prepared a regular turkey, and Bill and Carol and roasted a wild turkey (like our Pilgrim forefathers). I had never eaten wild turkey before and was very much surprised. I had supposed it was dark meat like wild goose, but we decided it could not be told from the tame variety. I had some of both. There were huge bowls of whipped potatoes, candied sweet potatoes, gravy, stuffing, pickles, cranberries, cauliflower, souse, corn and pumpkin and pecan pie. We finally "groaned" ourselves away from the table, the men to watch football in the "rec" room and the women to

talk of clothes, recipes and children, as women do. Then came 7:30, and a supper was set out. Potato salad, all kinds of jello salads and fruit cups, pickled beef heart, cold cuts, rolls, more pie and a big Devil's food cake, also a Watergate cake. Well, when I went to bed that night, I thought I'd never eat again for six weeks, but in the morning I did full justice to my hostess's pancakes and sausage and cold fruit cup.

Gary's mother had told us about a museum recently opened in Lewisburg, so after lunch we visited there. The house was originally Andrew Shearer's Tavern and is the oldest log structure in Pennsylvania. Of course the logs are covered now with modern siding, but if you are a lover of antiques, it is well worth a trip to Lewisburg to see. In the early years, the Tavern served the rough, tough ferry and canal boat patrons, with their brutal ways, including, it is said, even murder. The place was acquired in the 1930's by a John Turney Fetherston and his wife, Edith. They renamed the property "Packwood House" after the Fetherston Estate in England. When Mrs. Fetherston died in 1972 she left the entire house with its fabulous collection of antiques and her paintings, including a considerable sum of money, to the Historical Society. They told us that she was very wealthy and money was no object except to obtain what she wanted. It was not unusual for her to pay as much as \$10,000 for a purchase. Her will specified that she had placed all the furniture and china, etc. exactly where she wanted it to be and it was not to be moved. In the hallway stood a huge, brass brazier, said to have belonged to Field Marshall Allenby of Jerusalem, and it was in the way of guiding visitors through, so they had to get a court order for permission to move it!

One of the guides was a former schoolteacher of Gary's and she remarked that we had all shown more interest and excitement than anyone she had taken through.

The lady who owned it was the most fascinating, eccentric personality that I have ever read or heard of. She disliked children, but in order to make her collection complete, she had acquired some early cradles, nursing bottles and tiny chairs. She had a dog, and, because she befriended a chicken who once came to her, she absolutely adored chickens, and there is an old plaster chicken in her garden.

She was a graduate of Bucknell University there in Lewisburg, and an artist of some note, I guess. I am not an art critic. Some of her paintings were almost primitive, like Grandma Moses, and some were misty and ethereal, with a French flavor and with intriguing titles. Many were of chickens. One was a painting of three white Leghorn roosters running, with the first rooster's head only partially showing. We were told that she explained this as his eagerness to get where he was going, so he could not wait for his head to be painted! In the foreground of this painting which she calls "Cocktail Party" there is a large red tomato. Two of the rooms are picture galleries hung with her paintings.

Her husband must have adored her. When we were shown into their bedroom, we immediately cried, "Why is the beautiful sleigh bed turned backwards with the footboard up against the wall?" It seems her husband wanted it that way so that when he awoke in the mornings, he could lie there and gaze up at her paintings hanging on that wall. That's devotion, eh? Our two guides knew her personally and they said she was not liked at all, and was a proud and haughty

woman, very unkind to her servants. She must have fancied herself, though. On one wall, she had a huge frame with pictures of herself from babyhood to adult womanhood. Hanging between two portraits of herself was a portrait of the Mona Lisa!

I could have lingered in the garden for a long time. It was an intimate, secluded retreat, shaded by giant Cryptomeria and ginkgo trees, and dotted with small sculptures, including a tiger.

Here's another odd thing. At one time, she

had a large elevator built in one end of the house (which has 27 rooms) presumably to get easily from one floor to another, but she then proceeded to equip this elevator with such things as food, clothing, a chair, a potty for the call of nature and all the items one might need if remaining there for some time. What kind of fears did this poor soul have?

On the third floor, one room is a completely equipped dental office and one of the Lewisburg dentists had to go to her home and do her dental work there.

# Last Call For Garden Cleanup

Early December marks the last call for garden cleanup and winterizing chores before severe weather sets in. If you haven't done it yet, now is the time to transplant deciduous trees, shrubs and roses and to place windbreaks and sunshields around plants. It's also your last chance to apply winter mulches and make them effective, says University of Delaware extension horticulturist Dr. Charles Dunham.

Most deciduous trees and shrubs are easy to transplant in late fall. Planted now while they are dormant, they will be off to an early start next spring. Be sure to reduce tops by pruning, though, to lessen the shock next year when growth resumes. The horticulturist recommends reducing tops of bare root plants by a half to a third. Balled plants only need to be shaped and thinned. Water trees and shrubs well after planting to help settle soil around their roots.

A few of the more difficult trees to transplant should wait until early spring, however. This includes scarlet, white and willow oaks; tulip poplars; nut trees; red maple; and magnolias. This is especially true if these plants are bare root. All of these are best moved in early spring.

Tender broadleaved evergreens in exposed areas

may need wind and sun protection over the winter. Place a piece of burlap or a roll of snow fence around them to lessen winter burn to foliage.

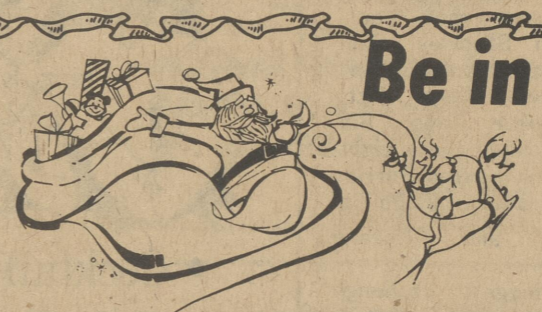
Winter mulches serve two purposes, according to Dunham. They prevent deep freezing of the soil and lessen heaving caused by alternate thawing and freezing. Broadleaved evergreens like box, holly and azalea benefit from a deep mulch (two to four inches) applied before the ground freezes. Use a light material that doesn't pack. Wood chips, licorice root or pine needles are all suitable. In applying the mulch, feather it out under plants so that the main stems are not covered.

Herbaceous perennials need a mulch to prevent heaving injury. Apply this mulch to them after the soil freezes. Cut back old, dead tops, leaving only a few inches of stem. Then cover the entire plant lightly with coarse straw, oak leaves, salt hay or pine needles. Perennials like foxglove, candytuft and coral bells that have evergreen leaves need a light, airy mulch. Evergreen branches are ideal for them, but you can also use deciduous branches lightly covered with straw or salt hay.

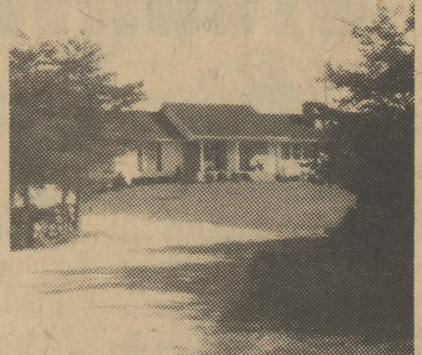
Remove the mulch from herbaceous or evergreen perennials in the spring after new growth starts.

But leave the mulch on broadleaf evergreens all year. A mulch to control summer weeds may be applied around herbaceous perennials in the spring after you have removed the winter mulch.

Spring flowering bulbs that were planted late in the season also need to be mulched. Do this before the ground freezes. Without mulching, bulbs planted in late November or early December may not be able to establish themselves for spring blooming.



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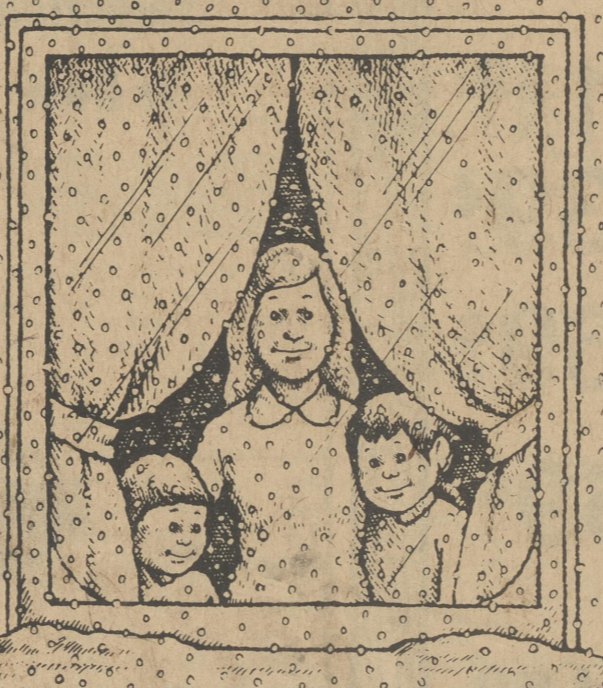

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## Farm Accident Survey Announced

The University of Delaware Cooperative Extension Service, together with the Delaware Farm Bureau and the Delaware State Grange, is participating in a National Farm Accident Survey. The survey will begin in December and continue for one year, according to extension farm safety specialist, Ronald C. Jester.

The survey has two goals: (1) to learn the frequency, severity, types and causes of accidental injuries among Delaware farmers and (2) to stimulate interest in developing a more intensive, result-oriented farm and health education program.

Approximately 45 women from the Delaware Farm Bureau and Grange Women Committees will contact 10 percent of Delaware's farmers. The initial contact will be simply to determine the type of size of farms. Later contacts will be to collect accident-related information.

The study is expected to benefit Delaware in several areas, but primarily in that of accident reduction, explains Jester.
