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Vogl House Named ToNational Register

MASTEN'S CORNER-The Vogl House, a unique concrete-block house of Eastern European design, has been named to the National Register of Historic Places by the National Park Service.

The announcement was made this week by the State of Delaware's Division of Historical and Cultural

According to Edward Heite, the historic registrar, the process in naming the Vogl House took about six months. Properties are first nominated by the staff at the Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs, then reviewed by a state reviewing staff. Following this review, the nominations are sent to Washington to be decided upon by the National Park Service.

Living in the home are three of the children of a family of 10 children, eight of whom helped their parents in the construction of the home, which began in 1915.

The cornerstone of the concrete block house reads 1915, but according to Elsie Vogl Rouse, it took about three years for her parents, livable. Two children were born after the home was completed.

A newspaper advertisement lured the Vogl family to Kent County in 1908 after immigrating from Bohemia. The family farmed at first, but soon turned to raising chickens.

When the family decided to build the present home, they ordered a completing the term of Mr. Webb, block machine and moulds from Sears, Roebuck and Company and laid the foundation.

Mrs. Vogl, who had no training in architecture and design, drew the plans and supervised the complete production of the building, which included designing the intricate moulds for statues and columns.

Concrete was used primarily because it resembled cut stone, the material used in the Vogls' native Bohemia in buildings and, for practicality, because it could be handled fairly easily and was relatively inexpensive.

The house is H-shaped, measures ninety by fifty-one feet with two large wings joined by a central section. There are seven bedrooms, two living rooms, one kitchen, one balcony and one hallway.

Throughout the house the European effect is in evidence. Mrs. Vogl's talent is also seen within the home as her art work is seen nearly everywhere. Several examples are seen on page 4 of this issue.

Even outside the home are examples of the family's artistry. Castconcrete animal statues, designed and made by Mrs. Vogl, view the surrounding farmland through the stand of cedar trees that surrounds the home.

According to Susanne N. Fox, who was the research archivist involved in submitting the Vogl House to be considered initially, "Few details were overlooked in the creation of the Vogl House. Its beauty rests in its harmony of design and its charm in its overall picturesque quality."..."The Vogl House is also

Houston Council Makes Donation

HOUSTON-The Houston Town Council in their monthly meeting last week voted to donate \$1,000 to the Houston Vol. Fire Co.

When the matter was brought before the council by Mayor Leonard Rollison, Councilwoman Virginia Twilley moved to donate \$1,000 to the Fire Co. Mayor Rollison announced the he was remaining neutral on the matter, but George Jester spoke out in opposition to the size of the donation. Last year's gift was in the sum of \$500. In as much as there was a motion on the floor at the time, Jester's motion was out of order. Councilman William Sapp who admitted that this was only his second meeting felt that he needed more information on the subject.

When the vote was taken there was no opposition to the donation. Mayor expressed his belief after the vote that he approved the donation to be the same as last year's. Councilman Surdowski said "..the citizens of the Town would still get the fire

protection regardless of the donation". It was felt earlier that the monies could be obtained from the federal or state funds, but it was ruled by the accountant that the money would come from the general fund.

Norman J. Kelley and Henry Nutter, both of Milford, Delaware, rescued a woman and a man in the late afternoon of Tuesday,

May 18, 1976. A storm came up suddenly with gale force winds high waves. During the height of the storm, both radios and depth finders were destroyed by waves breaking over the bow of the boat, Nina Kay II, making it impossible to communicate with rescue agencies, marine police or any other boat.

I'm sorry is the classic expression, but toremembrance of tragedy of yesterday. It happens always someone else - then suddenly, with little forewarning, you personally come face to face with death! There is an old adage that wherever there is life, there is hope, but no words I can ever write will express the thoughts of someone who is alive, but short of a miracle, knows they are dying.

event to someone - to describe in detail what happened - the fears, the pain, the hope, the prayers. It's something like what an arthritic patient who looks well enough but who is wrenched with pain that cannot be seen, the heart attack victim who attempts to describe the excruciating pain in his chest, his striving for every breath of air knowing that is his very life line. It's easy for the listener to nod and attempt to understand, yet, it is impossible for him to understand since he was not the one who experienced

I use the foregoing only for the purpose of setting the stage for describing our accident, knowing, fully well, there are no words that can come close to describing the hazardous conditions and the heroism shown by Captain Henry Nutter and Norm Kelley and so as not to exclude anyone - several other men on the headboat who assisted in our rescue risking their lives, under nearly impossible navigational conditions, to rescue us. No honor, how great, would be too great for these fine men.

With this in mind, let me begin -It was on May 18, 1976,

Representative for the Corporation, Schering covering the State of Delaware and who, on that particular day, was working down State, had mentioned if the weather was nice after he finished work, taking the boat, a 20' Sea Craft, out for a couple of hours before he returned to Maple Shade, New Jersey, where he has an invalid mother in a nursing home and an elderly father he must keep close check on, and I, who am attending Temple University in Philadelphia, returned to my apartment in Merchantville, New Jersey. On his lunch break he had checked the Coast Guard report. They had reported 10-20 knots, no small craft warnings. So, at approximately 5 p.m., we launched the boat from Bowers Beach, a place we have come to love because of its unspoiled natural beauty. There were a few clouds in the sky. It even looked as though we might possibly get a few showers some time in the evening. but the bay was relatively calm. We had been out only twice prior to this and had had little more luck at fishing then catching several sand sharks numerous crackers. On the two previous occasions, we had had my two small boys, ages six and nine with us. The horrible haunts us still - had they been with us, even with the heroic seamanship displayed by Captain Nutter, we would have all perished since they would probably have panicked and Bernie and I had, by the time of our rescue, expended our last bit of strength to keep ourselves afloat. This particular day we decided to go out close to the Brandywine Shoal since that is where the headboats lie and the weakfish as they are called in New Jersey, according to all reports, had been biting well. I'm quite sure that was the best decision we could have made, since that put us in a position where Captain Nutter could have come across us in his attempt to reach home.

I remember very vividly how beautiful the day was that afternoon. Being a novice at boating, I had no fear of the few dark clouds that seemed to be gathering behind us and on occasion would blot out the sun, but as the clouds would pass, I can remember expressing how beautiful the sun is on the bay at that time of the after-

We continued past the anchorage and shortly beyond decided to stop. We dropped our lines - five in all. Within about twelve minutes we had caught four beautiful weakfish. There were several boats in the area, however, I don't recall seeing "The Nina Kay'

The wind had picked up a little and there seemed to be a few drops of rain now and then, so we put our rainsuits on.

The wind continued to pick up and Bernie decided to pull in our lines and start for home. I was opposed to this since I was estatic with joy over catching my first fish. Bernie, with quite a bit of experience behind him, apparently sensed we might have some difficulty in reaching home so he won out. We started for Bowers. The wind continued to pick up as we started back toward the anchorage. As we neared the anchorage, where a Japanese freighter lay anchored, the sea inferno of water much comparable to an uncontrollable fire. There was a thunderstorm with sharp lightning over us. As we neared the freighter, I begin to panic, begging Bernie to try to tie into the freighter. It seemed our only hope of surviving. My inexperience in boating was apparent at that time, since Bernie knew that our

chances of reaching shore were greater than being thrashed apart against the freighter should attempt to get close

enough to tie into their line. remember thinking - there must be some courtesy of the sea as there is on land that one human being helps his fellow man but. there was no sign of life on the Japanese freighter. Bernie kept reassuring me that we could make it. It is difficult to guage dis-

tance when in the sea, but I would guess we were approximately 500' beyond the freighter when Bernie mentioned there seemed to be an abnormal amount of water in the bilge. Being afraid to leave the wheel since I am not experienced in navigation, Bernie inserted a fuse in the bilge pump. Unable to leave the wheel, he could not tell if the bilge pump was working. Apparently it was not, because shortly thereafter, the motor quit. We had been taking a lot of water over the stern, but being self-bailing, it motor stopped and we lost named. our power, Bernie tied a bucket and threw it from the bow of the boat. That, I later learned, was in an attempt to keep the bow

seemed we were totally alone. It is difficult to describe what happened in the next few minutes everything happened so fast. We were being thrown almost mercilessly about the sea. Bernie threw anchor hoping to help stabilize the boat to some extent. I was in the bow on the floor as there was no standing up. I could see water in the stern.
