Lake Forest School Board Initiates Medical Program And Gets Construction Report

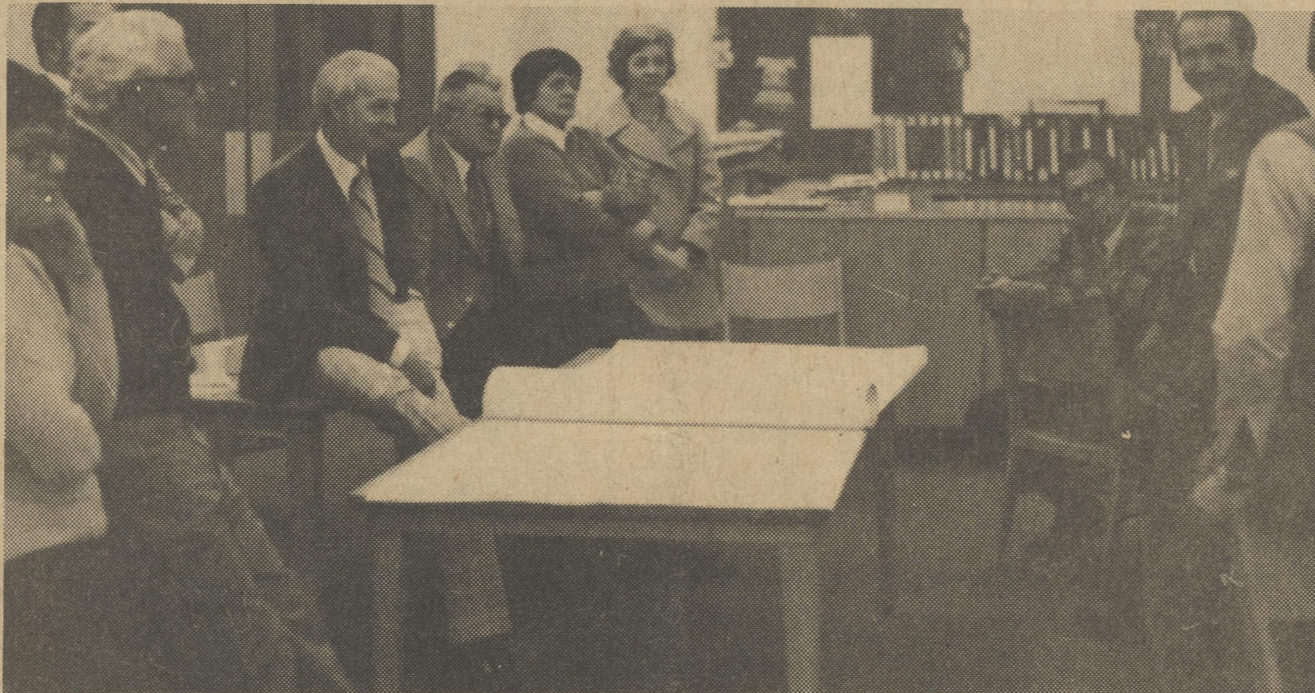
FELTON - Four of the District's Nurses appeared before the Lake Forest School Board on Monday night and told those assembled that the immunization program for the Lake Forest School District is not being enforced according to the State's mandate on the subject. Doris Moffett, R.N., spokeswoman for the group told the Board members that about 40% of the students required to be immunized against certain diseases are not so protected. "The State Board of Health has thrown the matter back on us to handle and we feel that this is not a school problem, but one for the Kent County Health Unit to take care of or the family doctor", according to Mrs. Moffett.

The State's mandate calls for children up to 10 years of age to show proof that they have been immunized prior to entering school. Children under 6 must have taken diphtheria pertussis and tetanus. Children 6 to 10 years of age must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, measles, rubella, and polio. The procedure the State requires to be followed is to give the incoming and enrolling 10 year old student a copy of the mandate. If the student is not in compliance, the student then has 20 calendar days to begin the necessary immunization. The parent then notifies the school when the treatment is completed. If proof of the immunization is not provided or not initiated at the end of 20 days, there will be a 7 day grace period for the parents to appeal to the building principal. Within another 7 day period, the building principal must file an answer with the District Superintendent. If no appeal at the end of 7 days (a minimum of 27 days have now passed

from the beginning) the child is excluded until such time as proof is provided that immunization has been met. A student may be exempted from this for medical and religious reasons.

The Board members were all in agreement that this sort of thing is not within the framework of the school district to enforce, but in the alternative is a matter for the State Health Unit to set up a clinic and provide the immunization service. E.B. Warrington urged the nurses to advise the students where the immunization shots can be obtained. Mrs. Beverly Gemmell, R.N., East Elementary, said "...that it is important for K or 1st graders to have a birth certificate and other records like a shot record, check ups, but in many cases the only time a student or child sees a doctor is when that child is so sick that they cannot attend school". She cited one recent case of a child coming down with mumps which led to encephalitis. "If the child had been properly immunized, this would not have occurred", she concluded. E.B. Warrington said the School Board should adopt a resolution in favor of the State's mandate on immunization, and that the responsibility should be placed back on the parent.

In other matters the School Board felt mainly through the urging of Board member Warrington that the Board should be relieved of the responsibility of underwriting the cost of the year books each year. The cost of the printing of the year books this year will be approximately \$6,500. To date the students have sold approximately \$1500 of ads. The cost of each year book would be \$8.75 per copy. The Board had been asked to make up the difference. The Board

on Monday night voted not to underwrite the cost of the book. Warrington said "...I do not feel the taxpayers of this district should be made to bear this kind of expense". The other Board members agreed with him.

In another matter regarding class dues and the cost of graduation, it was explained by Mr. Lynn Zimmerman, High School Principal, that each student pays dues for four years which goes toward graduation. This money is not refundable at any point after once paying anything into the fund.

The student will not be deprived of graduating and receiving a diploma, but will be deprived of participating in the exercises. The dues over the class trip, diploma, rent of the caps and gowns, and the general cost of graduation. Last year the graduation exercises were held at the Delaware State Fairgrounds and the cost of the loud speaker system was paid by the School District. It was agreed that this practice would continue as long as graduation exercises were held at some place other than the High School due to the construction in the area.

Phase III Construction

FELTON - Nelson McCloskey of Buchart Associates of Lancaster, Pa. architects for the new school addition, appeared before the School Board on Monday night to unfold the drawings for Phase III of the LPW project.

The original grant from the federal government was \$1,589,000.

Phase III includes a natatorium, which is an indoor swimming pool, locker rooms, storage facilities, parking facilities for approximately 168 spaces, and eight all-weather tennis courts. The latter will receive separate bids. The pool will be heated in the winter time and ventilated in the summer. There will not be any air conditioning in the natatorium. The pool will have a depth at the diving end of 12 feet and will taper down to three and

a half feet. The pool will be 25 meters (83 ft.) in length.

The bids are due to be advertised in January and let in February. It is expected that work will begin some time in late February, weather permitting. The entire project will take approximately a year and a half to complete.

Donald Garey proposed the possibility of using a solar heating system for the new addition. Robert Anawalt of the architectural firm said that the developments with solar energy are not developed enough at the present time to consider a solar heating system. Allowance will be made for installing such a system when, as Anawalt stated, the government and industry develop a controlled system in the next five years.

Woodbridge To Finish Construction Of High School AG Building

BRIDGEVILLE - The Woodbridge School Board gave approval to let the bid to Kent Construction Co. to finish the construction of the Ag Building at the High School. The balance of the federal grant of approximately \$32,000 will be used. The low bid of \$34,565 will cover approximately twelve or thirteen items to be completed. The School District had planned to complete 17 alternatives, but due to federal regulations and a new bidding system under a deductive system rather than an additive alternatives, has allowed for certain items to be knocked out of the budget, according to William Griffin, School Superintendent.

The actual construction will be primarily finishing of two bathrooms, finishing a classroom floor, drive-

way and fencing. If possible a stairs will be installed.

In other action the Board voted to accept 19-A rule in the Henlopen Conference rules and regulations on non-certified coaches.

The District has now instituted a monthly absenteeism on teachers. For the past monthly period, it was discovered that 26% are absent on Fridays. There was a 62% absent rate due to personal illness.

The Board approved a construction contract with Conventional Builders of Harrington to run a new water line at the Greenwood School.

The Board also adopted several policies covering Student Hearings in that a suspended student requires a parent to appear before the principal and an ex-

pelled student can have a public or private hearing before the Board. Another policy adopted toward Distribution of Non-School Materials needs approval of the Superintendent and must be of education value. The number of emergency drills has been

reduced to two a year, and the policy of student attendance is required at all times, but the student can be excused for certain well founded reasons. A legal excused absence is permissible but all work must be made up within five days.

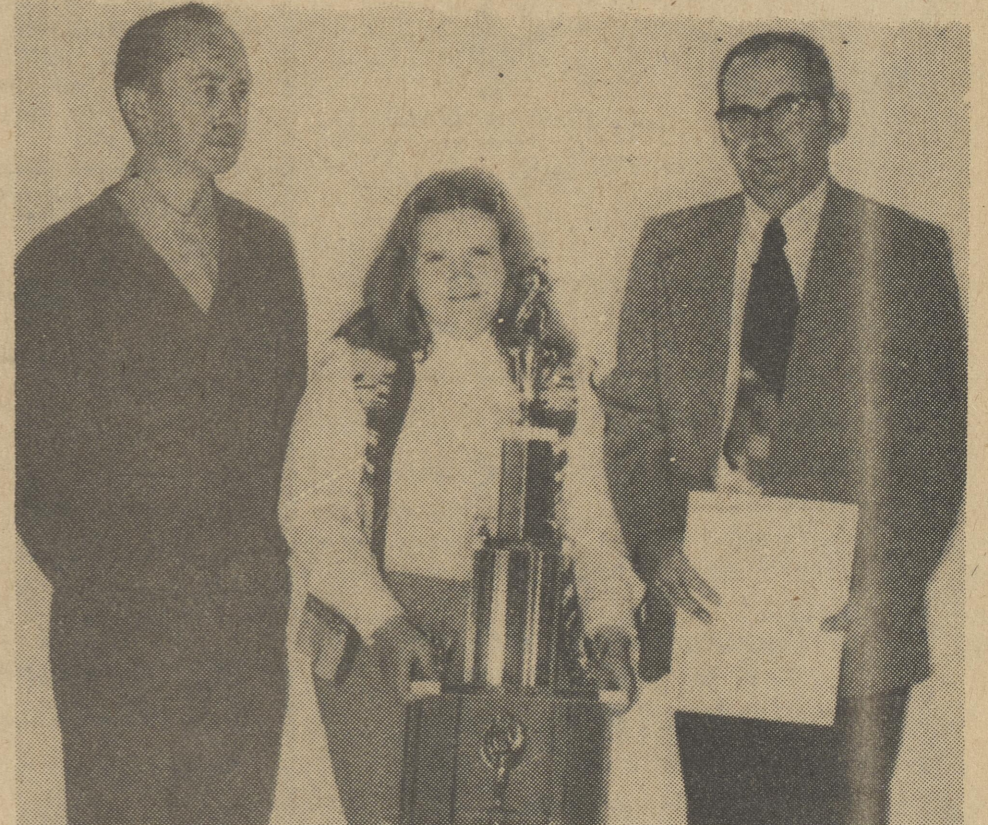

Two Council Seats Up For Election

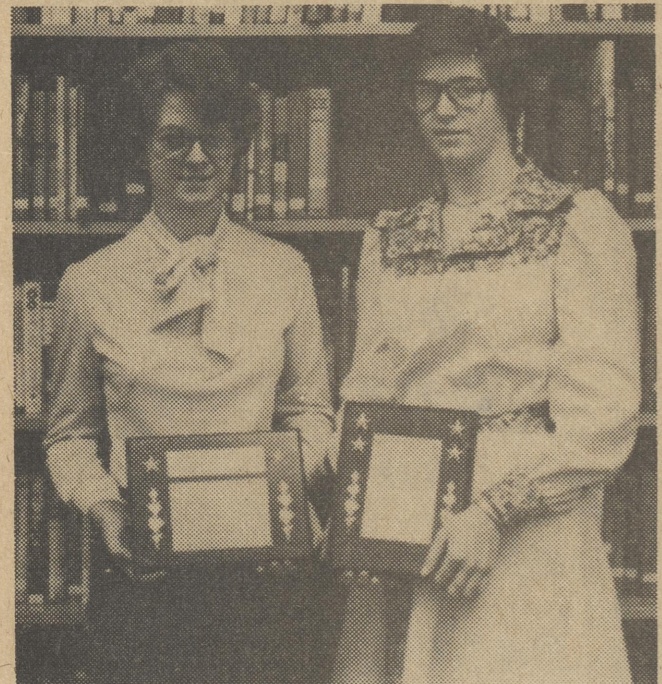
The annual election in the City of Harrington is fast approaching and to date no one has filed for the two council seats that will be up for election.

Get Out And Get Help

Editor's Note: Donna Lee Blessing was the winner of the State Fire Prevention essay contest. Below is the winning essay.

Most people have never had a fire, but those who have didn't escape with many belongings, and some barely escaped with their lives. Thousands of people are killed in fires each year, most of which could have been avoided had steps been taken to protect the occupants.

There is no way to fire-proof a house, but a home can be made safer for its occupants. Before you can

get help, you must first get out. Every family should devise a fire escape plan. The escape plan should include such things as how to get out of the house if normal exits are blocked and a place where family members are to meet. This escape plan should be practiced often.

If you ever wake up at night and smell smoke, don't open the door. Feel the door first. If it is cool open it and proceed. If it is warm resort to one of your other methods of escape. Smoke detectors can be installed in homes to help wake the occupants before the fire can spread. Once out you must get help. If you have a near-

by neighbor call from their home. If not arrangements should be made in advance for one of the family members to drive to the nearest neighbor and call the fire department from there. Never call from a burning building; fire spreads quickly. Upon reaching the fire department, tell them your name, address, including route or county road number, and any specific direction that could be used to help find the burning building more quickly.

You may never have a fire in your home, but if you do, following these tips may not only help you save valuable time, it may help you save a life.

The SSR program is more for motivation than anything else according to Mrs. Phelps. The program she feels will be successful only if there is follow up with special instruction.

Sussex County 4-H News

GEORGETOWN, De. - Christmas is just around the corner so why not try a few of our delicious "foreign recipes." Sussex County 4-H'ers chose these recipes and entered them in an International Foods Day in November.

The first is called "Schwarzwaelder Kirschtorte" which is a Swedish dessert commonly known as "Black Forest Cherry Torte". Katrina Workman of the Blue Hen Workers submitted this recipe.

Black Forest Cherry Torte
4 oz. butter
¼ cup sugar
4 eggs
1 liquid chocolate (unsweetened)
1 cup ground nuts
¾ cup flour
2 tsps. baking powder
Filling: 2 pints whipping

cream 1 can cherry pie filling.

Cream butter and sugar. Add whole eggs. Add liquid chocolate and blend well. Stir in the nuts, then the flour and baking powder. Fill a spring form-pan, lined with waxed paper. Do not grease the pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes; After baking, take a knife and separate cake from rim of pan. Cool on wire rack. Cut cake in three layers. Whip the cream and spread on first layer of cake. Add cherries and second layer of cake. Spread with cream and cherries and add third layer. Cover with cream and decorate with maraschino cherries.

Lasagne - is a great dish to make for the Holiday friends and relatives. Candee Clifton of the Dublin Hill 4-H Club shows how quick and easy it is to prepare:

Brown in large skillet 1½ lb. hamburger. Add two cans of spaghetti sauce with meat and one can tomato paste. Add salt and pepper to taste and simmer. Cook 1 package of lasagne noodles. Slice ½ lb. of mozzarella cheese and have ready, with 1 lb. cottage cheese. Layer as follows in pan: (9 x 14) Sauce, 3 noodles across. Additional small amount of sauce. Then, mozzarella cheese and small amount of cottage cheese. Repeat sauce, noodles and cheese layering until all noodles are used or pan is fairly full. Sprinkle top with parmesan cheese and bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. Serve fairly hot.

Safety At Christmas Time

Glass Christmas tree ornaments definitely are not recommended for the baby's diet this holiday season.

Absurd statement? Of Course. But not as absurd as you might think. Every Christmas season physicians are called upon to give emergency treatment to small children who have swallowed bits of ornaments and glass.

Christmas is a time of bright little lights on a tree in the parlor, of shiny glass ornaments and decorations, of filmy spun glass filaments, of toys that sometimes have sharp, rough edges, of lots of candy, nuts and other rich edibles.

These are part of Christmas, and no one is suggesting there's anything wrong about it. The American Medical Association at this holiday season, however, points out once again that there are safety hazards at the Christmas season that aren't encountered during the rest of the year...hazards that can turn a happy holiday into tragedy.

Check over your old strings of Christmas tree lights and discard those that are worn or brittle. If there are very small children around your house discard burnt-out bulbs with caution, so baby can't get at them.

Keep the glass ornaments and filmy glass

"Angel hair" out of baby's reach. The ornaments crumble readily into sharp slivers.

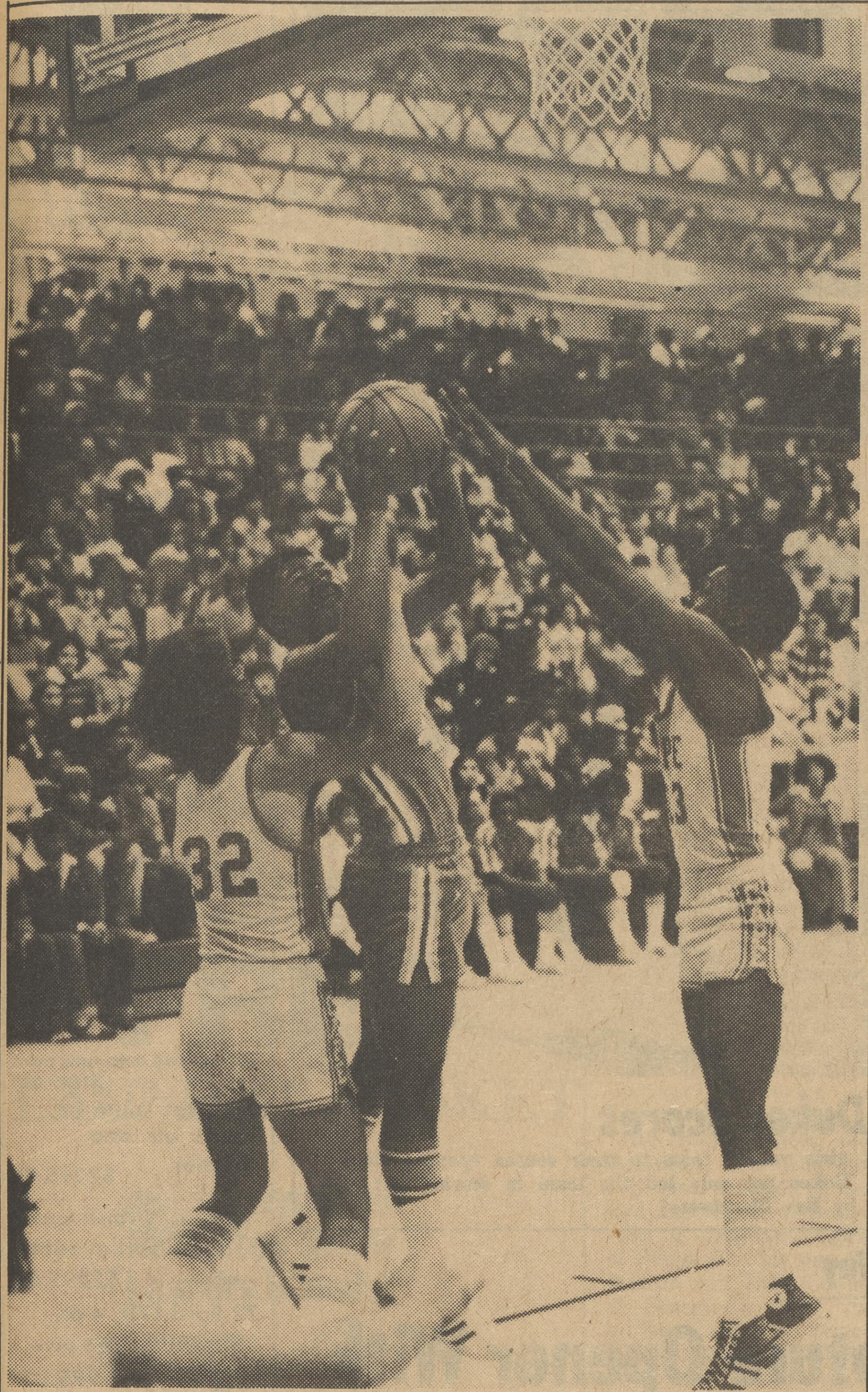
Make absolutely certain that no toys coated with lead-based paint are included in Santa's pack. Lead poisoning is a danger should the child chew on the toy. Almost all manufacturers now avoid dangerous paints.

Select toys with a minimum of sharp, rough edges, toys that won't burn quickly if flicked through a candle flame, toys that are large enough so that babies can't swallow them.

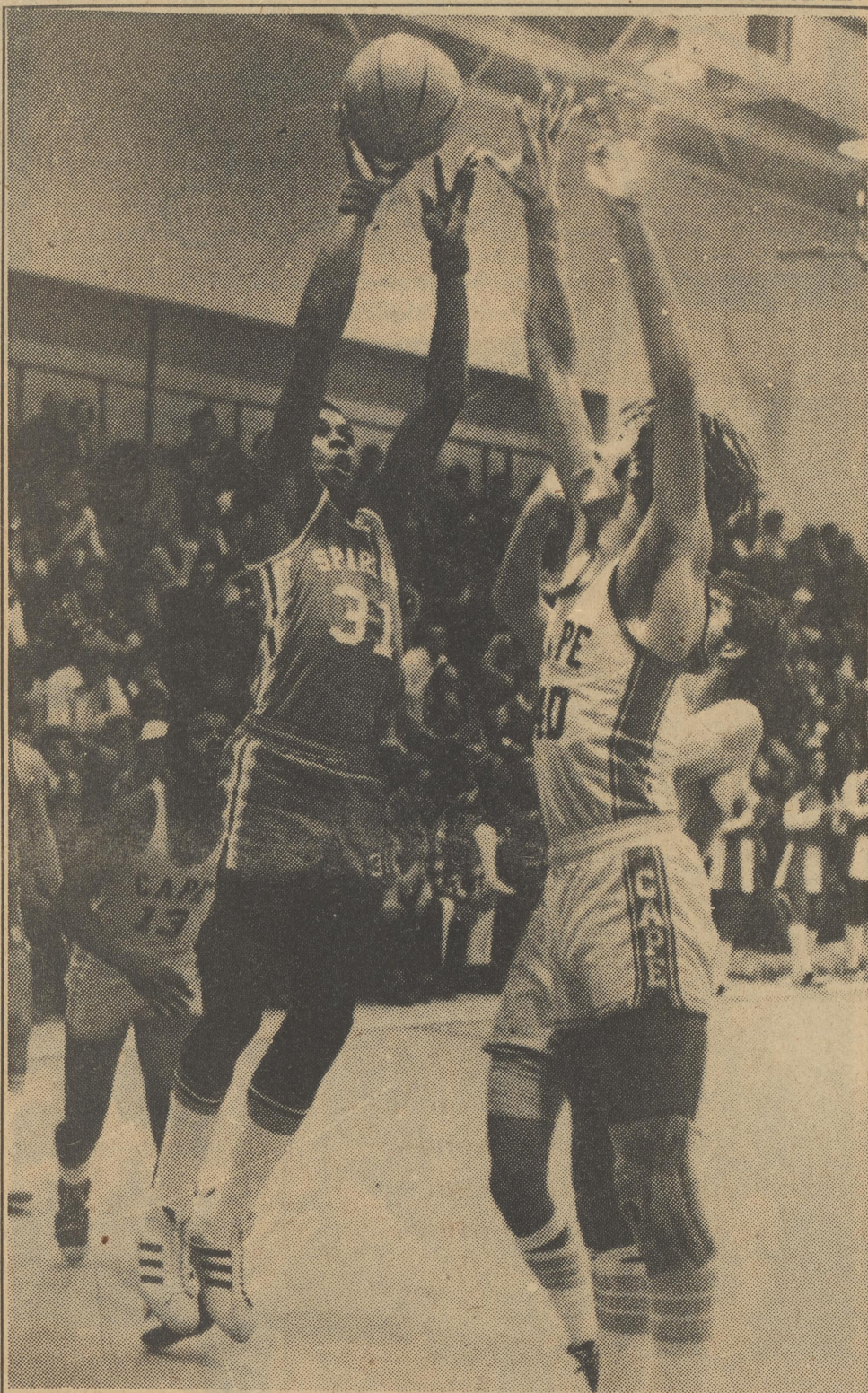
Electrical toys, such as trains, should be selected with safety in mind. Is the wiring intact and strong, or is it loose and flimsy?

Air rifles, sling shots, archery sets and other missile throwing toys are obviously dangerous if carelessly used. Set up a target range and make certain the youngster is taught to use the toy properly and safely.

This list could be continued, but you can make your own. The prime thing to remember is that in the bustle and excitement of Christmas, accidents can happen. Certainly no one wants to spoil the holiday with undue worry. Make your plans for a safe Christmas and then enjoy it to the hilt.

of increased expenditure over last year is the

raising of the unemployment compensation which this coming year will cost the City approximately \$4,000. The highest revenue for the City will be from Water and Sewer which will be about \$102,375 with federal and state aid amounting to about \$95,000. The real estate and trash fees will amount to \$112,000. The City is presently servicing a debt of \$25,000 with interest annually of \$12,513.

The Council voted to give fourteen employees a \$25 Christmas bonus. The bonus was awarded to employees who had been with the City over a year.

It was decided that delinquent trash bills be paid before December 22nd. If the bills are not paid, the City Alderman is authorized to proceed to legal suit to collect amount owed. Mrs. Kenneth Meredith, present

at the meeting, said "...the trash collection fee is illegal, and I refuse to pay for a service I do not desire."

A letter filed with the City by Mrs. William Walls of Second Avenue protesting wherein she alleges that the owners of the Peck lands on Second Avenue are in violation of the zoning ordinance as it pertains to the Peck farm on Second Avenue. The present

owners, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph T. Richardson, and Mrs. William Walls will be invited to the next council meeting on January 11th for further discussion of the matter.

A final bill was paid to Warren Brothers in the amount of \$5,694 for curbing and paving on Milby St., hot mix on Liberty St., Peck Avenue, and resurfacing of New, Franklin, and around the water tower.

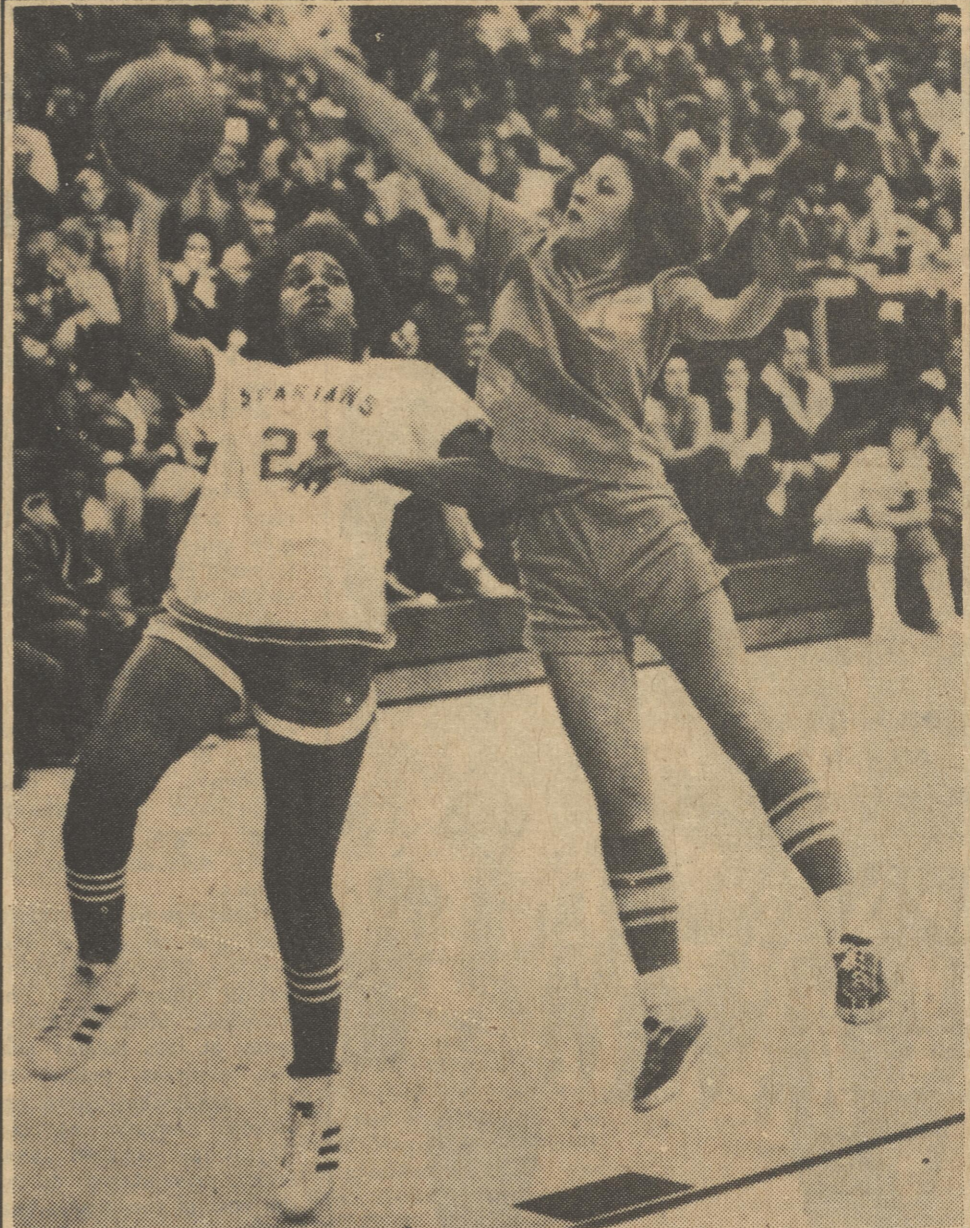

Pit Chatter



DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. - The 1977 NASCAR Late Model Sportsman and Modified season spanned the continent and when the competition ended, Jerry Cook claimed a record sixth national Modified title and Butch Lindley copped his first national crown in the Late Model Sportsman division.

Cook, the 34-year-old veteran from Rome, N.Y., overwhelmed the opposition again this year with 3712 points to second-place Geoff Bodine's 2611.

The 29-year-old Lindley of Greenville, S.C., posted a final total of 7566 points to Harry Gant's 6575.

Winning "still feels good" to Cook, who decided to run for the national title in 1969 and has finished either first or second every year since. Cook won the crown in 1971, '72, '74, '75, '76 and '77, finishing second in 1969, '70 and '73. He credits his success to the "best owner/sponsor a guy could ever have - Hollebrand Trucking of Ontario, N.Y." Cook's racing efforts on the NASCAR circuit have been sponsored by Pete Hollebrand since 1968.

Cook started 55 races and recorded three wins and 27 top-five finishes during the season.

Lindley teamed with Black Diamond Coal Company this season and their goal was to go to the race track and make every effort to win - and win he did. He put the Black Diamond team in victory lane 21 times in 77 starts and recorded 53 top-five finishes.

"It really hasn't hit me yet, that we've won the title," Lindley said. "But we're really looking forward to next season."

Both Cook and Lindley plan to defend their titles next year, a fact which probably does not gladden the hearts of their fellow drivers.

LOS ANGELES - The International Race of Champions (IROC), the unique auto racing event that matches 12 of the world's finest drivers in a format aimed at finding out who is best among the best, will be shown in January and February as a series of four special one-hour telecasts, ABC-TV has announced.

The 1977-78 IROC series will be shown nationwide on Saturday, Jan. 14, and on following Saturdays, Jan. 28; Feb. 11 and the championship finale Feb. 25. Local broadcast time was tentatively scheduled for 2:30 p.m. in each area.

The IROC format pits 12 drivers from the three major kinds of racing against one another with identical cars (Chevrolet Camaro Z-28s) over four races, two on oval tracks and two on a road racing course.

This year's drivers are Al Unser, Tom Sneva, Johnny Rutherford and Gordon Johncock, all representing Indianapolis-type competition. From the NASCAR stock car ranks are Cale Yarborough, Richard Petty, Benny Parsons and Darrell Waltrip and representing international road racing are Mario Andretti, Gunnar Nilsson, Al Holbert and Jacky Ickx.

IROC competition, besides bringing together drivers from different styles of racing on an equal footing, is particularly suited for television because of its tight action. Under IROC rules, only actual racing laps are counted. In contrast to other forms of auto racing, the slow caution periods, when cars coast along single file due to accidents, are thrown out.

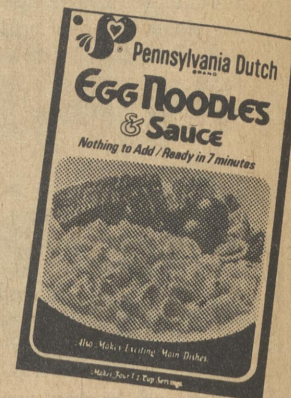
