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Lake Forest School Board Initiates Medical Program And Gets Construction Report

School Board on Monday night and told those assembled that the immunization program for the Lake Forest School District is not being enforced according to the State's mandate on the subject. Doris Moffett, R.N., spokeswoman for the group told the Board members that about 40% of the students required to be immunized against certain diseases are not so protected. "The State Board of Health has us to handle and we feel that this is not a school problem, but one for the Kent County Health Unit to take care of or the family doctor", according to Mrs. Moffett.

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The State's mandate calls for children up to 10 years of age to show proof that they have been immunized prior to entering school. Children under 6 must have taken diphtheria pertussis and tet-Children 6 to 10 anus. years of age must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, measles, rubella, and polio. The procedure the State requires to be followed is to give the incoming and enrolling 10 year old student a copy of the mandate. If the student is not in compliance, the student then has 20 calendar days to begin the necessary immunization. The parent then notifies the school when the treatment is completed. Mrs. Beverly Gemmell, R.N., East Elementary, said "...that it is important for K or 1st graders to have a birth certificate and other records like a shot record, check ups, but in many cases the only time a student or child sees a doctor is when that child is so sick that they cannot attend school". She cited one recent case of a child coming down with mumps which led to encephalitis. "If the child had been properly immunized, this would not have occured", she concluded. E.B. Warrington said the School Board should adopt a resolution in favor of the State's mandate on immunization, and that the responsibility should be placed back on the parent.

WHY JOB SECURITY HAS NOTHING TO DO ON WITH TENURE.

A lot of us have been fooled into believing that if we go to work regularly, put in our time, don't make waves and pile up a lot of time in grade, our jobs are automatically secure. We even fool ourselves into thinking that we've earned such job security, even though we produce no more-or even less-than we did in years past.

Every so often, this article of faith is tested as the economy jogs through a recessionary cycle-and is found wanting. If we should be so unfortunate as to have our jobs disappear during these times, we are thunderstruck. "What happened to our job security?" we cry.
