## **Police Investigate Murder, Chipman School Burglary**

suicide along with burglary kept both the Delaware State Police and the Harrington Police Department busy in two separate in-

cidents last week. On Friday the victim of an apparent homicide was Loretta Benson, 38, of 101 West Street, who was dead on arrival at the Nanticoke Memorial Hospital in Seaford after she had apparently been shot in the head with a .22 caliber rifle by her common law husband, Herbert Flamer.

Flamer, 55, of 127 Mispillion Street in Harrington is in serious condition in the Delaware Division of the Wilmington Medical Center after apparently attempting to committ suicide, after shooting Miss Benson by shooting himself in the forehead. Flamer had been scheduled to appear in magistrate court in Harrington on Friday morning but instead allegedly went to the home of Miss Benson about 10 a.m. and forced her at gunpoint to get into a car and drive to a deserted road 11/2 miles north of Harrington off of County Road 275. After arriving there

Flamer apparently shot Miss Benson and then shot himself. Her body and the wounded Flamer were found by a truck driver who was using the road as access to his place of business (Mutual Rendering) around 2:20 p.m. Friday afternoon. He then contacted the Delaware

Homicide and attempted Lewes but after the 72 approximately eighty-two hour observation period ended Flamer was released.

Earlier in the week the Harrington Police Department had received the report from the W.T. Chipman school that unknown subjects had entered the building through a window at the back of the building by apparently prying it open with a pair of pliers and a screwdriver. After the subjects gained entrance to the building they went to the junior high school office and then to the cafeteria




