

# Harrington Council Handles Routine Business



WALT "Stevie" Breeding races to the front in the first lap of the 20 lap heat race at Georgetown Speedway Sunday for a commanding lead and then... "chases the sun"... to the winner's circle. The Smithville Farm's Special is owned by R. Norris "Speedy" Reed - "the leader of the Federalburg Gang".

The Harrington City Council sifted through mostly minor business before entering into executive session at the regular meeting on the council on Tuesday night. The council agreed to purchase a Sony telephone answering machine for use by the police department so that citizens of Harrington could leave a message for the department if no one was

in the office or in case of an emergency the machine would give the caller a number to contact. The cost of this machine is 249.00 and the funds for the purchase of it will come from the capital improvement part of the City budget. In another concerning the police department the council voted to have telephone stickers made up that would inform resi-

dents of the numbers to call for a police, ambulance or fire emergency. The stickers would make the telephone numbers more readily available for area residents. The council also approved a compensatory time policy for the police department while also voting to all Chief Edward Layton to attend a meeting of police chiefs in Rehoboth on May 9, 10, 11.

Also discussed by the council was the ordinance which is in the proposed charter that would have restricted the possession and use of guns and other weapons in Harrington. The council made it extremely clear that at no time did they have any intention of restricting the law abiding citizens use and possession of these guns and that this ordinance would be changed

accordingly before any passage of such. Council also continued their discussions about the removal of dangerous buildings by the city. They were quick to mention that residents who have been contacted or would like to have one demolished could possibly have it done for free by the county. The county is currently running a program that demolishes such

building at no cost to the owner or the city but this program is supposed to end May 6. Anyone who thinks they may be eligible for this may either contact the city or call the County Planning Office for further information. Mr. Henry from Edward H. Richardson Associated was on hand to discuss with the council some (Continued on page 4)

## Two File For Lake Forest School Board Election

Albert C. Price, of Harrington, and Wesley L. Bell, of Felton, have filed for seats on the Lake Forest School Board. One seat is vacant in the district.

Price, who is currently serving on the school board, has served on the board for 10 years. He is a life long resident of Harrington and he just completed his 31st year as a rural mail carrier with the Postal Service.

He is married to the former Elma Stauffer. They have one daughter, Jean Layton, who is a special education teacher with the Milford School District, and one son, a fifth grader at W.T. Chipman School.

Price has been President of the School Board for two terms, '71-72 and '75-76.

Price said his main reason for seeking another term on the school board "...is that I was President of the School Board when

the referendum went through for \$1,591,000 in November '75 which was used for a new auditorium with a 1,200 seating capacity, 8 classrooms, and an all purpose room. I campaigned hard for this. I would like to see it through completion."

Despite the fact that school board members are not reimbursed for the sacrifice of time and expense of travel, Price said "I am dedicated to improving our education system and seeing to it that our boys and girls get the best education possible."

Wesley L. Bell has lived in this area for a year. He is employed with the Public Information Office of the Air Force Reserve. Prior to moving to Delaware Bell worked in Louisiana and Tiawan. Bell and his wife, Mary, have 5 children, Jennifer, 14, is a freshman at Lake Forest High School, Alexis, 12, is in the 6th grade at North Elementary, Jason, 9, is in

the 3rd grade, Andy, 7, is in the 2nd grade, and Matthew is 4. He will begin kindergarten next year.

Bell said that he is running for school board election because "I think when elections come around people should take an interest." He said he would like to become more involved with the political system in the area and he said that he felt that the school board was a good place to start.

Another reason that Bell cited for running for the school board is that he thinks people should have a choice.

The elections will be held Tuesday, May 9.

## Frederica Council Raises Trash Collection Issue

FREDERICA. Since 1974 the Town of Frederica has received three increases in trash collection including the present request. Mayor Nashold explained that the Town had on the previous occasions in '74 and '77 about the expense of trash collection. The current number of pick ups is 313 at \$16 each per year, for a sum of \$5,008. It is costing the Town \$7,690 a year which means the Town is in the hole \$2,684 per year. The Council voted to raise the tax \$24.50 per household per year for the 313 trash pick ups in the community.

Former Police Chief Ray Wood brought new charges to the front last Wednesday night when he charged Mayor George Nashold with misappropriation and of federal funds from the so called CETA program, and also illegally and unlawfully authorizing the payment of \$150 to George Nashold without proper authority.

Earlier Mayor Nashold read aloud a letter from Wood's attorney which in effect said the former police chief did not have to return any items to the Town which could not be properly identified as the Town's.

## Sussex Council Holds Public Hearings For Grant Request

The Sussex County Council held public hearings for the Community Development Grant proposals which are being submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Tuesday, April 11.

Joseph T. Conaway, Sussex County administrator, explained that the application for the grant will be filed in 2 parts. One is a single purpose grant request for \$292,000. The second part is a comprehensive 3-year plan with the first year's request totalling \$300,000.

Conaway described the grant request as being "like a Christmas tree. There is something for everyone," he said. Under the single purpose request, Lewes is the target of \$212,000 for a community building and a senior center. Lewes and Bridgeville would get \$30,000 for neighborhood centers, and Dagsboro would receive \$20,000 for demolition of buildings and for property for a recreation area.

## Houston Gets New Mayor, Proposed Ordinance Brings Criticism

HOUSTON - Last Thursday night the Houston Town Council meeting was held for the purposes of a reorganization meeting following the recent election. Connie Morgan, a 22 year old resident of this community, and possibly the youngest Mayor in the State...certainly the youngest woman Mayor in the State was selected over Councilman Ted Yerkes for Mayor.

Miss Morgan whose father Frank served for years on the Council and also was the Mayor or President of the Council at his death in 1974, has been the Vice Mayor and acting Mayor in the absence of Tom Surdukowski who has been unable to attend meetings on a regular basis due to his work schedule. Miss Morgan is a 1973 graduate of Milford High School and is presently employed by the State of Delaware Motor Vehicle Revocation Section. Prior to that she worked in Nichols Department store in Dover as

manager of the shoe department. Her mother, Pauline Morgan, is the Town's Treasurer.

In previous correspondence with George Jarvis, Secretary of Transportation for the State of Delaware, the Town council had requested a meeting with him concerning the condition of the state maintained streets and roads which go through the Town. Jarvis referred the matter to Barrett Cullen who made a field inspection of the streets and roads. Cullen wrote back and said that "...compared with state maintained street and roads elsewhere in the State... Houston's are in excellent shape." The Council members seem to differ with this and have requested Cullen be present at their next Town council meeting in May. According to one council member "...the shoulders on Broad St., Church, Post Office and the east end of School St. are cracking apart with several potholes developing.

A survey meeting with Talley and a charter meeting are scheduled for the night of April 20 at 7 p.m. According to Mayor Morgan "...Mr. Talley finds discrepancy between the county map and how the actual properties plot out. In other matters, the telephone company was granted an easement to put underground cables in on Wharton St. Council-

man Ted Yerkes has requested the Town adopt a noise ordinance since he has many complaints about mini bikes in the Town. The matter is being referred to their attorney. The 4-H Club will come before Council next month to discuss the prospects of having a clean up project for the Town. The clean up is slated for two times of the year, fall and spring. The final note of business on last Thursday night's agenda was the proposal by Councilman Ted Yerkes to restrict the dissemination of news of the council's business and affairs. Yerkes went on to explain that he felt "we should not give the media any information if they are not in attendance at the meetings. The notes of the meeting can be read, but the council members should not make interpretations of what went on, and furthermore if any releases are sent to the media it should be done as a "...joint effort." Following the meeting and release to the media, it caused much commotion among the media as well as the Townspeople. The question which has been raised now is the good possibility that the motion which was made after the meeting was adjourned and without a second may have been illegal and have no effect. The nature of the motion might also render the motion illegal in nature.

## Kent County Levy Court Hears Revenue Sharing Requests

Approximately \$342,000 in federal revenue sharing money is up for grabs in Kent County, according to Barbara Remus, Kent County Levy Court secretary. Remus explained that this was the amount the county was given last year and she said they expect to receive somewhere around that much again this year.

Tuesday, April 4, the Levy Court heard new requests for federal revenue sharing money. The Capital Green Day Care Center asked the commissioners to consider a request for \$20,000 for

capital improvements for the center. A spokesperson indicated that the center has adequate operational funds but no funds for improvements to the center.

The Divine Life Mission requested \$17,000. The mission is a religious, charitable and educational center that functions to help people in times of need.

Whatcoat Social Services requested \$33,124 to help set up a temporary shelter. This would serve persons in Kent County who are undergoing a crisis situation. It would serve persons who are

over 18 years of age.

The Eight-o-One House, which provides temporary shelter for adolescents, requested \$12,000. The Harvest House Senior Center requested \$10,385. The Delmarva Advisory Council requested \$2,697. The Delaware Regional Ballet requested \$2,350. Delaware Youth for Human Services requested \$3,552. Delaware Guidance Services for Children and Youth requested \$35,200. The NYPUM Program requested \$5,700. And the Bay Arts Colony requested \$9,800.

According to Doug Barrett, a spokesperson at

Senator Roth's office, Federal Revenue sharing money has very few strings attached. "There are very few requirements for use of the money," Barrett said. He explained that there were certain high priority areas where the money could be spent but, basically he explained that it is up to the state, county, or municipality to decide where revenue sharing money will be spent.

Federal Revenue Sharing money has been around for about 6 years. It was intended to provide a method for distribution of money which

the federal government had collected from local areas. Rather than providing the money in the form of grants that would require a special purpose the money is given to local communities so that they can filter the money to the area that most needs it.

## Milford Says No Way To Planned DP And L Rate Increase

"We aren't going to agree to a rate increase in any way, shape or form," stated Milford City Administrator, Bill Russell.

Officials of Delmarva Power and Light Company met with representatives of its municipal wholesale electric customers on March 28 to discuss the Company's proposed wholesale rate increase request.

Milford is one such wholesale electric customer which faces the

possibility of increased wholesale electric rates. Fifteen municipalities including Clayton, Middletown, New Castle, Lincoln-Ellendale, Lewes, Seaford and Delaware Electric Cooperative will also face rate increases if the proposed increase is approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Milford has been buying electric wholesale from DPL and supplying it to people in Milford since 1947, according to Russell.

Prior to 1947 Milford, like many communities in this area, generated its own power. Russell explained that the City shifted from generating its own power in 1947 because they found that it was cheaper to buy the power wholesale from DPL. The Milford plant was dismantled at that time and power was supplied by DP and L. The City of Milford continued the responsibility of maintaining electric lines and providing repairs when electric lines were down as a result of bad weather.

According to DP and L spokesperson, Bill Mitten, the resale customers receive electric at a higher voltage. He claims that the towns have less of an investment when they buy wholesale and distribute the power to municipal customers. Mitten said that the reason for the increase is that there has been an increase in providing service. "It's just another case of inflation," he said. Higher cost in materials, however, was sighted as the major cause for a rate increase.

Russell explained that the City of Milford provides electric for its residents at a lower rate than what they would be paying if they were retail DP and L customers. He said that a person who used 750 kwh of electric in a month would be paying the City of Milford about \$37.94. A retail customer of DP and L, he said, would pay about \$42.04 for the same thing.

DP and L is asking the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to approve an increase in wholesale electric revenues of 20.46 percent or \$7,891, 583. Russell says that the increase will, if approved, cause the price savings in electric sales to be minimal.

Woodrow Crosby, City Manager of Seaford, said the city engineers in Seaford are reviewing the electric situation there. "We don't know what we are going to do," Crosby said. He added however that he believed that some, if not all, of the cost of the increase would have to be passed on to customers.

DP and L must justify its reasons for a rate increase before either the Public Service Commission, in cases of retail electric customers, or before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in the case of wholesale electric customers.

DP and L announced that it would delay filing

the proposed rate increase with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for up to two months. The delay, they explained, would allow time for the company and its wholesale customers to negotiate a settlement of the rate increase request before the request is filed with the Federal Commission.

According to Mitten, DP and L generate their own power at three plants in Delaware. He said that

these plants are located in Delaware City, Edgemoor, and near Millsboro. He indicated the DP and L is also the partial owner of several powerstations in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The Company noted that in the past four wholesale rate increase requests all have ended in a settlement agreement with the wholesale customers. DP and L has set April 21 as the date for the first informal settlement conference.



A somewhat complacent Lake Forest track team survived a strong upset bid by a fired-up Woodbridge squad and pulled out an 82-59 victory. The Monday afternoon contest at Woodbridge saw Lake Forest win 9 of 11 running events, while the Blue Raiders were first in 4 of 6 field events.

Woodbridge's amazing Greg Rowe, only a junior, is on the verge of becoming the top shot and discus thrower in Delaware scholastic history. He is defending state champ in the shot and is only a foot away from the all-time mark of 58 plus. In the discus he spun the platter 164 feet, 4 inches against Lake Forest. This is five feet better than his previous best and is only eight feet or so off the state standard. A rather pedestrian (for him) throw of 54 feet, 3½ inches completed his usual double.

Hardesty of Woodbridge was a distant second to Rowe in both events. Larry McCombs and Tim Kemp had thirds for the Spartans in the weights.

Howard Bailey of Woodbridge was first in the 120 yard high hurdles in 15. flat. Jerry Custis of Lake Forest was on his way to a Spartan record 15.2 or 15.3, when he hit the next-to-last hurdle and fell. Stanley of Woodbridge and Spartan Pete Hinson were second and third.

Custis led all the way in the intermediate hurdles and was awarded first place in a tight finish over Bailey, in 41.7 seconds, a new Spartan standard. Bill Moore held the old mark of 42.7. Custis best had been 43.7.

Dan Parker annexed the mile and 880 for Lake Forest in 4:49 and 2:06, respectively. Blue Raider George Williams held off Spartan Louis Thomas for second.

In the 880 Dave Richter

and Thomas were 2-3 behind Parker to give their team a 9-0 sweep.

Milton Justice, Lauren Burris, Baron Harmon and Ken Thorpe ran an "eased up" 880 relay clocking of 1:37.5. Jerry Custis replaced Thorpe and the Spartans relayed 440 yards in 47.2.

The Sussex Countians Gary Pettyjohn had a 10.3 100 yard dash victory while Spartan sophomore Ken Thorpe took the 220 in 25 seconds flat with a come-from-behind surge.

Dale Johnson of Lake Forest and teammate Joe Custis were 1-2 in the 440, although Custis took the long way home. Johnson did 56.4.

This pair, Craig Fry and David Richter, won the mile relay in 3:48.9 although the home team Raiders led most of the way.

Wilson Fry again won the two mile, this time in 10:47. Lake Forest's Bill Mitchell and Woodbridge's Chris James finished less than a second apart, ten seconds behind Fry.

Rodriquez of Woodbridge did 39-8 in the triple jump, 1½ inches ahead of Spartan Stacy Sams. Walt Waddler of Woodbridge was another foot back.

Sams captured the long jump with Neal of Woodbridge doing 20 feet even, 2½ inches behind Sams. Milton Justice had 19-10 in an extremely close event.

Waddler's 5-8 effort won the high jump over teammate Jerry Parker. Lake Forest's Joe Nored was next.

A late victory that gave the Spartans some breathing room was a tie for first in the pole vault. Gusty Voshell and Kelly Woodward cleared 10-6 and chose not to try a higher height. Wilson of Woodbridge was third. The Spartans (boys and girls) will be at Laurel, Thursday at 4 p.m. Come on down!



Another fine frosh sprint hope is James Evans, a fleet Frederician. Evans finished third behind Baron Harmon's second in the varsity 220.


Evans holds the record for the sprint from Chipman School to Quillen's store.





# Walker Marine Stages 5th Annual Boat Show
