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## County Ok's sewer plans

The Kent County Levy Court last week authorized an \$8,000,000 expansion plan for the much maligned sewage treatment plant in Frederica.

Retained by the Levy Court for the preliminary design research is the firm of O'Brien & Gere of Syracuse, NY. O'Brien & Gere, to the consternation of many residents, were the designers of the original sewage plant that has come under heavy fire recently for pollution problems in the Murderkill River. Kent County was directed by the state to stop the pollution in the Murderkill by November 9th and has been notified of a refusal to renew the discharge permit until such pollution was brought under control.

O'Brien & Gere freely admit the design mistakes that have led to the problems at the Frederica sewage plant. They claim that such errors are common and there is nothing unusual about it. Kent County engineer Walter Fritz also finds nothing unusual with the design mistakes, or the hiring of the same firm to handle the exploratory engineering in Frederica.

The expansion will double the capacity of the plant to 20 million gallons. According to Fritz, the entire iob will take three years.

Fritz also said that O'Brien & Gere may not be chosen to do the actual work on the proposed construction, that decision will be made separately and in the future.

The costs of the new plant will be handled in large part by the state and federal governments with the county

## High speed chase ends in Greenwood

Greenwood was the final stop in a long, high speed chase involving a van, a 12 year old driver and police from two states.

The chase began in Salisbury where, allegedly, a 12 year old Laurel girl stole a van belonging to Thomas Brown of Laurel. Dawn Johnson, the alleged driver, and a passenger, Pamela Steward also 12, were charged with first degree assault, reckless endangering and misdomeaner theft. Before it ended, the chase was joined by six police and the Maryland Police helicopter. Both girls were released in the custody of their parents after posting bond.

According to police reports, Brown notified Maryland Police on Sunday afternoon that his van was missing. At 3:37 p.m., Maryland State Police spotted the van heading north on Route 13 and the chase got underway. The Maryland helicopter joined the police cars and trailed the girls to

Delmar at the Delaware border. From there, Delaware State Police took up the hunt, but the helicopter stayed on duty overhead.

The Delaware State Police called the Seaford and Bridgeville force for assistance and between them, a roadblock was set up. The van simply crashed through the block and continued to head north at speeds of 100 mph and more. According to state police spokesman James Neal, "she was using both sides of the road and cars on either side were forced off the road surface to avoid her."

Finally, just south of Greenwood, Delaware Detective Raymond Callaway fired five shots at the van causing the right rear tire to blow which stopped the speeding vehicle.

The only injury to result in the high speed affair was a state policeman, Cpl. Jerry Scott when he attempted to cut the van off and ran off the road. His injuries were not serious.

Director Alex Becton and the W.T. Chipman Junior Band brought home trophies and cash in their first two parade outings on Saturday. The Junior Spartans traveled to Milford in the morning where their appearance and performance in the Halloween Parade there won them first place and \$150 in the Junior competition. In addition the band racked up a total of 77 points out of a possible 100 in judging by the professional opinion of officials of the Mid-Atlantic Judging Association. This was a higher total than any of the five bands [including the high school bands] who participated. According to Becton it was also an all time high for Chipman.

Immediately following their Milford appearance the junior band members hopped aboard buses for the trip to Dover where they were scheduled to participate in the Dover Halloween Parade at 1 p.m. The Dover parade was not competitive, but a trophy was awarded for their participation.

The Lake Forest High School Band also captured honors in the Milford Parade. Despite the handicap of reduced numbers [all the eleventh grade members were tied up with SAT tests that day] the Marching Spartans took first place in the Senior division and were awarded

The impact concerned citizens can have was evidenced last Thursday when new and larger stopsigns were erected at a Whitelysburg intersection which was the scene of a tragic and fatal accident this fall. Following the crash in which two young boys burned to death after begin trapped inside their grandfather's camper, Curtis Conley and 100 others lodged a protest with the Delaware Division of Highways. Conley was one of the rescuers who reached the accident scene in time to pull the grandparents from the wreckage, but had to stand by helplessly as the trapped boys burned.

The camper, driven by 73-year-old Henry Sacra apparently ran a stop sign at the intersection and was rammed by the truck. Sacra's two grandsons, John E. Sacra, Jr. and Norman C. Sacra, Jr., were the two fatalities. The Sacra's were returning to Maryland after a day at Dover Downs.

The Whitelysburg intersection is a triangular confusion at which two Delaware roads - Delaware 12 and Kent 59 - join in a V before becoming Maryland 314. A tiny stretch of road, Kent 452 forms one side of the triangle and helps make a tricky situation, especially for drivers who are not familiar with the intersection and not expecting to stop.

Agreeing with Conley and the other petitioners that the situation

After our snow and frost, I must say today is a perfect "Indian careful to keep the basement door and bedroom door closed for a couple of days. I don't mind it at all, it's just Summer" day. All the African Violet growers are probably out raking leaves or putting down storm winthat people come in your house and wonder why you are keeping "dead fish" around.

You have read in previous articles about putting leaves down in damp vermiculite to increase your supply of plants. Some people have more luck rooting their leaves in water, then when they have roots they put them in vermiculite or soil. Leaves rooted in water grow "water" roots then when they are planted in soil they have to grow soil roots and it really takes your violets twice as long to put

up plants. I'll describe the water method first: Take a small jar, fill it with water and cover it with two layers of waxed paper held on by a rubber band. Poke holes in this to insert the leaf stem. Use leaves that are about halfway on your plant--not the oldest or the newest leaves. Break the leaf cleanly off your plant leaving no stump. Then take a sharp knife and cut the stem diagonally leaving about two inches of stem on the leaf. Put this stem through the holes in the waxed paper. If the leaf comes from a named

variety plant, be sure to mark the leaf with it's name. Put your jar in a light place but not in the sun. You will see roots appear in three or four weeks. Plant them in damp vermiculite when the roots are about an inch long. If you leave them in water too long, the ends will curl toward the light and will be difficult to plant.

I prefer to set my leaves down this way: Take a small margarine cup with no drainage holes and fill it with dry Vermiculite, then water it until it is very wet but with no water standing on top. Take the same kind of leaf as described above but cut it on a slant leaving about 11/2 inch of stem. Poke holes in the vermiculite on a slant from the outside toward the middle. Insert your leaf with the point of the slanted cut stem on the bottom. Insert it as far as the bottom of the leaf. Press it down firmly around the stem but don't break the stem. You can put three or four leaves in one cup unless they are very large. Put the cup in a light place, keep it moist and in about six weeks you should see some little plantlets pushing their way up. Let the plants grow on the mother leaf until they are

two to two and one half inches tall and look sturdy enough to make it on their own. Then pull out the leaf, separate the plantlets and pot them in your soil mixture in a small pot. Baby them a little and in about nine months they should be ready to bloom.

If you are having trouble growing any kind of houseplants, that just might be the reason. Also do not try to use African Violets as a coffee table decoration. They must have proper light. You can use one as a decoration for a day or night, but put it back in the light soon.

I hope I am answering some of the questions you may have about growing African Violets. It is such a rewarding hobby. Don't think because it takes so long to read these articles that it takes a lot of time to get into the hobby. After getting the basics ready--pots and soil--it only takes a few minutes a day to tend to them and you will be rewarded, I

Now a little of the history of Ruritan. In the spring of 1928, the first Ruritan club met in a small hotel in the little village of Holland in eastern Virginia. A group of busi-

nessmen and farmers met for dinner. The purpose of the meeting was to help the village people and the farm people come to a better understanding of one another and of their individual and mutual problems. That was the beginning and within four vears other communities organized Ruritan clubs patterned after the one in Holland, and by 1952, joined together in an organization that they audaciously called "national".

In the early days of the depression of the '30's, the Ruritan clubs grew from simply a fellowship group to a group striving to meet the needs of the rural communities as they began to identify those needs. The members worked together on a variety of projects including such things as better sanitary facilities, rural electrification, highway improvements, aid to needy people, and promoting better farming and conservation practices.

In the 30's, Ruritan clubs began to develop a meeting procedure which provided for a time of fellowship during the evening meal, a time in

in 1970.

which the business of the club was discussed and plans for community projects were made and program which usually included a speaker on some subject of general interest.

During this time, several more clubs were organized but it wasn't until the decade of the 40's that Ruritan began to reach out into the other states and share its experience with other rural communities. By the time Ruritan was 25 years old, there were over 500 clubs with 17,000 members. Most of these clubs were in the southeastern part of the United

In 1964, Ruritan built an executive office in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia at Dublin. It was built by contributions from members and today serves as the organization's national headquarters.

Immediately following the move to the new headquarters, Ruritan began reaching out into the midwest. Now, fifty-one years after the first club in Holland, Virginia, in 1923, there are over 1300 clubs with over 33,000

#### In My Opinion By Bruce Levy

Two weeks ago it was a high speed chase in Dover involving a motorcycle. Result: both riders of the bike were killed. Then this week, a high speed chase involving a 12 year old girl from Salisbury to Greenwood resulting in no injuries, but pistol shots fired at the van to bring the chase to an end. Isn't there a better way to handle such situations?

It's a sticky problem with no easy solutions. Just what do the police do when a driver does not heed the order to stop?

The Delaware State Police solution seems to be this: give chase, match the law breaker speed for speed and fire shots when range permits.

Granted, the state police must give these situations much thought. They have the ultimate responsibility to bring the chase to an end before innocent drivers or pedestrians become involved and they do get the job done. But at what risk?

How about the police helicopter? What is its function here? And what about a roadblock, should one be set up ahead of the runaway vehicle? Is firing bullets into the tires in the public interest? These are hard questions that I certainly can't answer. Is it better to merely set up aerial surveilance of the vehicle and grab the people when they stop, or is it best to go right after it?

I do know this: I get very nervous when I read about a wild chase up the highway involving many officers and firing guns. I think of my family on their way to the store and what would happen if they somehow got in the middle of the action.

Anybody out there have a suggestion? Maybe if we all put our heads together we could come up with a way to bring the law breakers to justice, and at the same time protect the innocent people along the way.



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# Taxpayer's Trust Fund for the American Worker

new proposal satisfied concerns of committee members who believed hearings should be held.

The Finance Committee's action last week is a signal that your message is, at last, being heeded! I am pleased members recognize there are ways to reduce the American workers' heavy tax burden.

The committee voted to use money that would come from the regular, federal taxes oil companies would pay on the \$400 billion they are expected to earn as a result of President Carter's decision to deregulate domestic oil production. Money will be held in a Taxpayer's Trust Fund, until next year when hearings to approve the tax freeze are held.

This is the first sign of federal tax relief American taxpayers have had in almost two years.

The Taxpayer's Trust Fund paves the way for a tax break for the greatest energy resource of them all -- the American worker!

TRADE BILL SAILS THROUGH

American workers whose jobs are threatened by low-priced foreign imports will receive expanded benefits under a bill approved by the Senate Finance Committee early last week.

This bill, which I sponsored, brings the nation's trade assistance programs up to date, following passage of the 55-nation trade liberalization pact approved by the Senate in July.

Workers should not bear the brunt of our trade deficit. Yet, in many cases, they are. More and more foreign goods are coming into this country, costing skilled and trained workers their jobs, their livelihoods.

Because of trade policies -- or the lack of them -- the federal government has a legitimate role in helping displaced workers re-educate and retrain themselves, support their families and seek other employment.

My bill broadens coverage and benefits for workers and firms endangered by increased imports permitted under the international trade agreement. Trade adjustment benefits are widened to cover workers supplying goods and services to companies penalized by imports.

To illustrate the unfairness of present legislation, workers in the final automobile assembly plant may receive assistance. But, jobless workers who supplied auto bumpers may not. These people should not be left out in the cold. As it now stands, eligibility for loans and assistance is restricted to firms directly involved.

My bill provides an additional 26 weeks of benefits for workers over 60 years of age, increases job search and relocation allowances and reduces interest rates on loans to business firms suffering from foreign competition.

#### Free diabetes clinics are set for 16 locations

Free diabetes detection tests will be administered at 16 locations throughout Delaware from November 5th thru 9th.

Delaware has an estimated 30,000 diabetics-40 percent of whom are undiagnosed. Early detection and treatment minimizes subsequent complications of this disease.

Early symptoms of diabetes include thirst, excessive urination, increased appetite, weight loss, and fatigue. The simple free test can determine whether or not someone is afflicted with the disease.

Testing centers will be open from 1 to 3 p.m. every afternoon during the week of November 5th. No appointment is necessary, and patients should eat a normal lunch 1½ to 2

hours before the test.

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
