Felton Scout, Wes Miller of Troop 141, got a first hand look Monday night at the way town government works. Wes, who is working on his citizenship award in scouting, attended Monday night's regular meeting of the Felton Town Council as an observer who was to report back to his troop. He got treated to a brief, fairly routine business meeting but, according to Wes, he learn-

Felton Mayor William Myers encouraged the scouts to come to the town council for whatever help it might be able to give. Said Myers, who served on the Scout Committee some years ago when scouting was being newly organized in Felton, for a small town we've turned out some pretty good scouts. Present Scoutmaster of Troop 141, Joe Sherwood was a

boy in scouting when Myers was serving on the committee. In addition to the routine bill-paying business, Scout Wes Miller could have observed a number of items under discussion at the Felton Council meeting:

-Felton has a new Postmaster Gene Racz, and the town council has extended an official welcome to him. Racz, who hails from Henderson, Maryland, has been on the job since early November.

-Citizens are complaining about pot holes which make Church Street in Felton rough riding. Mayor Myers says that street is a state maintained road, and the state has been contacted about the problem.

-The reply to a citizen request about putting a mobile home in town was, "It can't be done". Town law forbids it. The only

trailers allowed are those which were in place when the 1960 law took effect.

-The town is looking for a new police officer to hire under the CETA program to help with local law enforcement responsibility.

-A portable two-way radio, purchased with SALLE funds, [Continued on page three]



Many Americans are looking for a way to express concern for their fellow citizens being held hostage in Iran that is consistent with this country's respect for law. As you know, the American Charge in Iran, Bruce Laingen, who is being held at the Foreign Ministry, has suggested that church bells be rung each noon until the hostages are released. Several members of Congress and the Attorney General also have suggested that Americans write the Iranian Mission at the United Nations to demand release of the hostages. The President endorses these

suggestions.

It is of overriding importance that Iranian authorities understand that Americans are united in their determination not to yield to blackmail and in the demand for the safe return of the hostages. Your support for these two suggestions will help prevent any miscalculation of where Americans stand in this time of crisis.

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## **Post Office has Christmas** mailing reminders

Postmaster Edward A. Biegel is reminding his customers this month to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas cards. Effective last July 15, envelopes must be at least 3-1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The new standards, first announced three years ago, are designed to speed up the flow of mail by reducing jam-ups caused by small envelopes during processing by high-speed automated equipment. Such jams can destroy mail or force costly manual handling of mail.

Last July, a seven-cent surcharge was also placed on First-Class Mail weighing one ounce or

less, and single piece Third-Class Mail of two ounces or less that measured more than 6-1/8 inches high, 11-1/2 inches long or 1/4 inch

"Most card and envelope makers are only manufacturing the allowable size today, but there may be some older stock still for sale," according to Postmaster Biegel. "We don't want any disappointed customers during the holidays.

Postmaster Biegel also reminds Wilmington residents to mail early this year. "We need your help so we can deliver every greeting card in time for the

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

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### Markley comes to West Harrington

Since November 1st, the West Harrington United Methodist Charge has had a new minister, William A. Markley. He replaced Wayne Grier.


Markley, age 47, brings diverse and well rounded pastoral experience to his new ministry. He is the son of a "circuit riding" Lutheran Minister and his early memories are of traveling with his father on his numerous rounds.

Reverend Markley took his college degree at Gettysburg College where he received an A.B. degree in the classics. He then went on to get a Divinity and Masters degree from Gettysburg Seminary.

From his graduation, Markley began a 18 year career in the Lutheran ministry where he performed a grand total of 402 confirmations, 106 marriages, 135 funerals and baptized 210 children. He was involved in Lutheran parish work during this period.

Reverend Markley decided to change his ministry in 1977. He was highly interested in hospital work and from '77 to '79 he trained at Sibley Memorial Hospital. It was there that he received his exposure to the Methodist Church which he joined. Asked by the Journal why he converted to the Methodist Church, he said, "I like the greater lay participation that Methodistism offers. Here in Harrington, I especially admire the number of people who are qualified as speakers."

From Selby Memorial, Markley responded to the need in Harring-

"I am very happy to be here," Reverend Markley said, 'Harrington and the surrounding areas are neat and clean, and there appears to be a lot of pride in the townspeople. The people we have met have received us well and seem extremely hospita-

Markley believes he has changed somewhat over the past two years. "I have developed a listening ministry over the past two years," he said. "Listening is a hard skill to master, but it's essential if I am to find what the parish's real troubles are. My ear is available to anyone.'


On Sunday, December 23, at 7:30 p.m., the young people will be performing as the Ellendale Children's Christmas program will be held in the church.

Kent County Building Inspection Department Installation of Wood Burning Stoves

During the past weeks, there has been a great deal of discussion and misunderstanding regarding the proper installation of wood burning stoves. State and County officials have taken part in conducting seminars at various firehouses and schools throughout the County to inform the residents of Kent County of approved methods of safe wood stove installations. The following criteria has been compiled for your information and

1. A permit is required for the installation of wood burning stoves, fireplaces, and chimneys. When applying for the permit, details of the location and materials to be used must be presented.

2. The installation will be inspected by a building inspector for compliance with the Building Code. 3. A safe stove base consists of a piece of twenty-four (24) gauge sheet metal on 1/4 inch asbestos millboard. This base should extend a minimum of six (6) inches on all sides and eighteen (18) inches on the side that ashes are removed.

4. A radiating wood stove must be a minimum of thirty-six (36) inches from combustibles.

5. A sheet rock wall is considered combustible; the sheet rock will not burn, but it will conduct heat to combustible framing members. The same is true for a brick vaneer wall. (Z-Brick) Brick is a poor insulator and also transmits heat to combustibles. 6. A radiating type wood stove shall be installed thrity-six (36) inches from combustibles. This distance can be reduced if the stove has a U.L. listed heat shield attached or you may build a heat shield to be mounted one (1) inch off the wall on noncombustible spaces. (Porcelain fence insulators work extremely well.) To reduce the thirty-six (36) inch clearance to eighteen (18) inch, the heat shield should be constructed of twenty-eight (28) gauge sheet metal or 1/4 inch asbestos millboard. (Note: Asbestos cement board (Transite) commonly found in lumber yards cannot be substituted for asbestos millboard.) The heat shield should be mounted off the floor to provide unrestricted circulation of air between the shield and the wall.

7. Stove pipe requires special clearances to combustibles. A clearance distance of three (3) times the diameter of the pipe; example, a six (6) inch pipe needs eighteen (18) inches of clearance.

8. A stove pipe should never run through a combustible wall or ceiling, unless it is absolutely necessary. If you have to do this, there are several approved methods. (a) Have a ventilated metal thimble made. The thimble must be three (3) times the diameter of the stovepipe. (b) Use a section of factory built chimney, then the clearance to combustibles may be reduced: Remember, leave air space or clearance as required by U.L. (c) Remove all combustible materials out of the partition to provide an airspace of a minimum of three (3) times the diameter of the pipe on all sides. (d) Surround a metal or burned fire-clay thimble by not less than eight (8) inches of brick or equivalent fireproof material.

9. A wood stove and oil burner shall not be vented into the same flue unless the wood burning unit is U.L. approved for dual operation. Each heating appliance shall be vented into a seperate flue. Multiple connections can result in flue gasses and sparks passing from one flue opening to another, reduce efficiency, and unburned gasses being ignited in the flue.

10. Factory built chimneys should be approved by Underwriter's Laboratories (U.L.). They are efficient and easy to install. Soot and creosote buildups are minimized in the insulated type of factory built chimneys because the inner wall warms rapidly. The necessary clearance from combustibles is clearly marked on each section of U.L. listed factory built chimney.

11. Single wall stovepipe is not acceptable for an outside chimney. Water and ash form lye, which will quickly eat away the single wall pipe, and also creosote would rapidly form due to the cooling of the gasses inside the pipe itself.

12. All masonry chimneys should have a tile flue liner. In homes constructed prior to 1900, many chimneys were unlined. An unlined chimney is a hazard and should not be connected to a wood stove. Efforts have been made to line an unlined chimney, but with very little success. Should you have doubt or questions concerning an old unlined chimney, I suggest you consult a reliable mason to inspect the chimney.

13. A chimney should extend at least three (3) feet above the highest point where it passes through the roof of the building. It shall be two (2) feet higher than anything within a ten (10) ft. radius. This includes the roof itself, overhanging trees and adjacent buildings.

Brochures on safe wood stove installation are available at the Building Inspection Department, Kent County Administration Building, 414 Federal Street, Dover, DE. The room number is 302. Additional information may be obtained by phone, 736-2128, 2121, 2122.

From time to time seminars are conducted at local firehouses on wood burning safety. These are posted in the news media well in advance.
