The Felton Town Council got a irst look Monday night at preiminary sewer plans prepared by Reguardt and Associates, Engieers.
Presented to the Council by elton Mayor William Myers, the plans detail, section by section and street by street, the direction in which sewer lines will run when the town hooks into
County sewer system County sewer system.
Most of the sewage gravity fed to a pumping station west of U.S. 13. From there a orce line will take it along Delaware 12 to Frederica where he county's sewage treatment plant is located. On the preliminary plans un-
veiled Monday, the Felton areas $t$ get sewer service are dilineated, lot by lot. Mayor Myers
said the next step was to identify said the next step was to identify each lot or parcel and mark the plans. The Council will also have o contact all property owners to ind out the probable locations for sewer hook-ups on each property.
This information must be obThis information must be ob-
tained before the preliminary
plans can go back to the engineers
for final drafting. Eventually, the locations for the hook-ups will have to be marked by stakes on the properties.
Felton is pr Felton is presently served by
private septic systems. The quesprivate septic systems. The ques-
tion of whether or not to hook into the county set-up was one which raised condiderable controversy before it was put to the people in a referendum last year. Funding for the construction phase of the project is shared by
federal, state and local governments on a $75 \%-10 \%-15 \%$ basis. But each property owner must

We do no
there is only so much agricultural land. Lyle Bauer, a Kansas farmer, put it this way. "A little bit of this land is leaving us every day. It is eing chipped away silently and nobody sees it. There is plenty of food and nobody really cares that much.
New terms are now coined to label the problem Buckshot G
Surbanization. Prime Farmland; however, is a term that has had no equivalent physical and what it is: land that has the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed, fibre,
forage and oil seed crops with the least expenditure of fuel, fertilizer, pesticides and other production costs. Is the land most capable of sustaining production for future generations. Only 15\% of the well over two billion acres is the U.S. in Prime Farmland.
Delaware has a total land area of $1,266,000$ acres. Of that, the present farm acres are somewhere between 655,000 to 620,000 . We do have some time left
(but precious little) to do something about the nationwide problem within our own state borders. At the present rate of decline, we are in for a very serious agricultural land problem in 1990. Right here where you live, in Delaware. The recent monthly letter of the Royal Book of Canada states, "the need for food has always been a sharp goad to human intelligence. All his acumen in this field will be demanded by the end of this century, The first paragraph contained this cryptic sentence. "Food is so much a part of all existence that, unless they do not have enough of it, people pay little attention to what it is or where it comes from". The article went on to state that the spread of learning flourished trade had the tendency to improve culture, and this fostered intellectual enlightenment. "The story of food is the story of intermittent progress they state; and they added an old Chinese proverb as a rider--"Do not give a man a fish; teach him how to fish".
