Felton receives preliminary sewer plans

The Felton Town Council got a first look Monday night at preliminary sewer plans prepared by the Baltimore firm of Whitman, Regardt and Associates, Engineers.

Presented to the Council by Felton Mayor William Myers, the plans detail, section by section and street by street, the direction in which sewer lines will run when the town hooks into the Kent County sewer system.

Most of the sewage flow will be gravity fed to a pumping station west of U.S. 13. From there a force line will take it along Delaware 12 to Frederica where the county's sewage treatment plant is located.

On the preliminary plans unveiled Monday, the Felton areas to get sewer service are delineated, lot by lot. Mayor Myers said the next step was to identify each lot or parcel and mark the property owner's name on the plans. The Council will also have to contact all property owners to find out the probable locations for sewer hook-ups on each property. This information must be obtained before the preliminary

plans can go back to the engineers for final drafting. Eventually, the locations for the hook-ups will have to be marked by stakes on the properties.

Felton is presently served by private septic systems. The question of whether or not to hook into the county set-up was one which raised considerable controversy before it was put to the people in a referendum last year.

Funding for the construction phase of the project is shared by federal, state and local governments on a 75%-10%-15% basis. But each property owner must pay the cost of hook-up to the edge of his property. In addition, there will be an annual fee for the service.

In other business, the Felton Town Council

-awarded the bid for trash pick-up to the same firm as last year - N.L. Wilkins.

-approved the annual gift of \$25 to the Felton Little League.

-confirmed the filing dates for candidates for Town Council to be February 18-22. The election is to be on Monday, March 3, from 5 to 8 p.m. Three seats will be open.

Two from LF are nominees

Nominations for appointments to the United States military academies were announced by Senator Joe Biden's office last week.

The nominations are made upon the recommendations of a seven person Academy Selection Board appointed by Senator Biden. Ten nominees to each of the four academies were selected among the 84 students who submitted applications to the Senator. In the case of the Military, Naval and Air Force Academies, there is but

one principal nominee and nine alternate nominees.

Selected as alternate nominees, from the Lake Forest School District, are Martin Ellingsworth and Leroy Garey.

Martin Ellingsworth was nominated by Biden to the Air Force Academy, he is the son of Millard and Phyllis Ellingsworth of Frederica.

Leroy Garey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald L. Garey of Felton.

Lowber House moved

They said it couldn't be done - but in fact it was done. The historic Matthew Lowber House in Magnolia, dating back 206 years, was picked up off of its foundation on Friday afternoon and moved about 100 yards north to a vacant lot. House Movers, Inc. of Sharptown, MD handled the considerable moving chores, contracting the job from the Magnolia Volunteer Fire Company, who were the owners of the stone structure.

The fire company sold the house to the moving company for 10,000 dollars, the moving price was one dollar. Lowber House is now for sale.

In order to preserve its historical status, original bricks will be used in construction of the new foundation.

Mark Smith named Most Outstanding Athlete

Mark Smith, son of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Smith of Harrington, was honored as the year's Most Outstanding Athlete from Kent and Sussex Counties at the annual Lower Delaware Gridiron Club dinner on Monday night held at the Sheraton Inn in Dover. Mark is a senior at Lake Forest High School.

According to a spokesperson for the Gridiron Club, Smith was chosen for the honor based on his extensive athletic achievements throughout his high school career. Mark has lettered in every sport he has chosen to participate in since he began classes at Lake Forest. He specializes in football, basketball and baseball.

When he graduates this spring, Smith will have accumulated 10 varsity letters. He quarterbacks the football team, as well as handling

defensive duties, plays forward on the playoff caliber basketball squad, and performs most of the pitching chores for the baseball team.

The man who probably knows his athletic skills best is his long time coach Bill Falasco. Falasco and Smith have been together since Mark was a 7th grader.

"I think the Gridiron Club did the right thing in electing Mark," Falasco said, "very seldom do you come across someone with Mark's overall ability. Not only does he excel as an athlete, he excels as a person. Never once have I heard a negative remark about anyone or anything. But maybe most important is Mark's way of always trying to improve himself, he is never satisfied."

Continued coach Falasco, "I'll give you a typical example

of what I mean. When Mark was a freshman, he would always pull the ball to the left as a batter, he hit .420 doing it but I could see trouble ahead. I told him at the end of the season that if he kept pulling the ball like that other teams would begin to play him that way and he couldn't surprise them. So what did he do? All summer he worked at hitting to the right and up the middle, he really tried to correct it. As a sophomore, he could hit the ball anywhere he wanted, the pull was gone."

"Mark is a player, and he's a gentleman," added Falasco. "I'll miss him when he leaves."

Although many talent scouts have given him the eye, Smith has yet to commit himself to a college or university. Whenever he winds up, Mark Smith won't soon be forgotten at Lake Forest.

Airman Osmundson is apparent suicide

Senior Airman Sven Osmundson, a Felton native and 1974 graduate of Lake Forest High School, was found dead last Monday, apparently from a self inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Osmundson was a member of the Air Force law enforcement unit, stationed at Dover Air Force Base in Dover. He was 23 years old and a member of the Air Force since April 9, 1976.

According to information released by officials at the Air Base, Osmundson was found in a remote area on the base and was on duty at the time of death. No foul play was discovered.

He is survived by his parents Horace and Millie Osmundson of Felton, a brother Greig, and wife Sandra.

DAFB officials said on Tuesday that the investigation is still open and military police are examining the details surrounding the incident.

One car crash injures five

Injured in a one car crash were Ronald Hobbs of Viola, who was the driver of the vehicle, Michelle Mango of Felton, Vonkirk Rankin of Magnolia, Susan Howell of Felton and Christina Mango of Felton. Christina was seriously injured and was taken to Delaware Division in Wilmington. Early reports from the hospital indicated that she was paralyzed from the waist down.

State Police report that Hobbs was driving at a high rate of speed and ran off the right side of the road. The car flipped numerous times and crashed into a telephone pole.

Hobbs suffered a broken back while the other two passengers were treated for minor injuries. No charges were filed against Hobbs at this time.

Taxpayers who plan to use VITA assistance are urged to

bring the tax package sent them by the IRS, and all pertinent records and documents such as W-2 forms, and interest and dividend statements.

cans Abroad Program of the AFS (American Field Service). During her year in Bolivia she will be staying in Santa Cruz with

the Pagani-Martinez family and attending the Licel Monfenor Santiftevan, an all girls school.

First stop for Charupin after she left Delaware yesterday was to be Miami for a brief period of orientation. She will arrive in Santa Cruz and summer tomorrow.

Before she left "Pin" as she is known to friends in the Lake Forest District had been in touch with her Bolivian family for the year. She reported that the family has one daughter, fifteen year old Patricia, and that the father is a commercial agent. She said the family has a maid, a swimming pool and a Spanish garden, all of which she was looking forward to enjoying.

All the members of the Pagani-Martinez family speak both English and Spanish; the daughter also speaks French. Since "Pin" has studied all three, communications should get off to a good start.

"Pin" also told the *Journal* her school day will be from 8:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. She will be earning credits while attending school so that she will be a senior here by the time she returns next year.

Preparations for the trip to Bolivia may have been a little

more hectic for Charupin than for most AFS students. A citizen of Thailand, she has only been in this country since 1972 and is not eligible for U.S. citizenship until she is 18. When she found out she was to go to Bolivia, she also discovered that her Thai passport

had expired. Letters and phone calls made little or no progress in straightening the matter out. Accordingly, Charupin decided to do it in person. On Monday, January 28, she traveled to the Royal Thai Embassy in Washington, D.C. There she not only succeeded in getting her passport updated, but she was the recipient of an exciting invitation. The Queen and the Crown Prince of Thailand are in this country on an unofficial visit, and Charupin was invited back to the embassy on Sunday to meet them.

Unfortunately, preparations for her trip which was only two days away precluded her acceptance of that invitation.

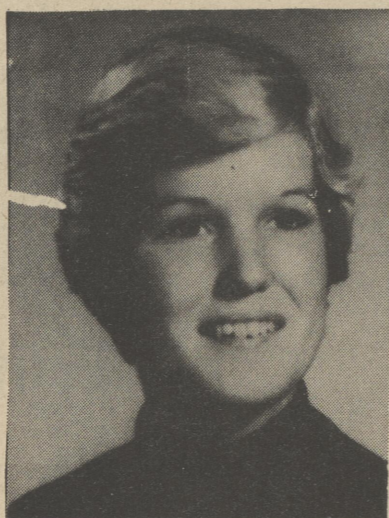
Mid-Atlantic Soybean Growers To Meet Feb. 14

Minimum Standards set for 1981

In late October, 1979, eleventh grade students at Lake Forest High School were given a competency test to determine whether they have met the state competency requirements. Effective with the class of 1981, all Delaware students must meet minimum standards of competency in the basic skills areas of reading, writing, and mathematics. Those students who did not pass all sections of the test are now

receiving remedial instruction in their areas of weakness and will be retested in April, 1980. Under the Lake Forest School District Promotion Policy, those students who have passed all sections of the test and who have met the credit requirements are eligible for promotion to senior homerooms for next year. They will graduate when they complete their required senior course credits.

IRS deletes deductions

Individuals who itemize deductions when preparing their Federal income tax return can no longer deduct state and local taxes on gasoline, diesel and other motor fuels not used in business or investment activities, the Internal Revenue Service said.

However, taxpayers may be able to claim other expenses incurred when using their automobile for business, moving, charitable and medical purposes.

Taxpayers can now deduct

1 1/2¢ for the first 15,000 miles when their automobile is used for business purposes, and, 8¢ for moving, medical and charitable use.

For more details concerning business expenses, the free IRS Publication 463, "Travel, Entertainment, and Gift Expenses," is available free from the IRS by using the handy mail-order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS number listed in the telephone directory.

Dear Sir,

As far as agricultural land is concerned, it is a question of "to be or not to be". Three million a year - that is the way they're disappearing, these acres.

We do not like to be put at variance with the urban - cold fact is, there is only so much agricultural land. Lyle Bauer, a Kansas farmer, put it this way. "A little bit of this land is leaving us every day. It is being chipped away silently and nobody sees it. There is plenty of food and nobody really cares that much."

New terms are now coined to label the problem.

Buckshot Growth, Leapfrog Development, plus a third called Suburbanization.

Prime Farmland; however, is a term that has had no equivalent term. It's just what it is: land that has the best combination of physical and chemical characteristics for producing food, feed, fibre, forage and oil seed crops with the least expenditure of fuel, fertilizer, pesticides and other production costs. Is the land most capable of sustaining production for future generations. Only 15% of the well over two billion acres is the U.S. in Prime Farmland.

Delaware has a total land area of 1,266,000 acres. Of that, the present farm acres are somewhere between 655,000 to 620,000. Roughly 49% of total land area.

We do have some time left (but precious little) to do something about the nationwide problem within our own state borders. At the present rate of decline, we are in for a very serious agricultural land problem in 1990. Right here where you live, in Delaware.

The recent monthly letter of the Royal Book of Canada states, "the need for food has always been a sharp goad to human intelligence. All his acumen in this field will be demanded by the end of this century, when the world is expected to have 2 billion more mouths to feed".

The first paragraph contained this cryptic sentence. "Food is so much a part of all existence that, unless they do not have enough of it, people pay little attention to what it is or where it comes from".

The article went on to state that the spread of learning flourished as agriculture became widespread. Surpluses of food initiated trade - trade had the tendency to improve culture, and this fostered intellectual enlightenment. "The story of food is the story of intermittent progress they state; and they added an old Chinese proverb as a rider - "Do not give a man a fish; teach him how to fish". The farmland problem is big enough and far enough past the eleventh hour to cause us all to start caring.

What would we rather do than what we have done so far about the problem? That is the worrisome matter.

The average American is like a mule - He won't kick unless he is threatened by something dramatic - and not even then unless that threat gets close enough to him. Then he proceeds to kick.

The problem is getting close enough to start kicking.

I have just seen Mr. Young's letter to you. I would echo his sentiments.

The section of your paper, "The Blue Banana", is very informative and Barbara Brown is doing a first-rate job.

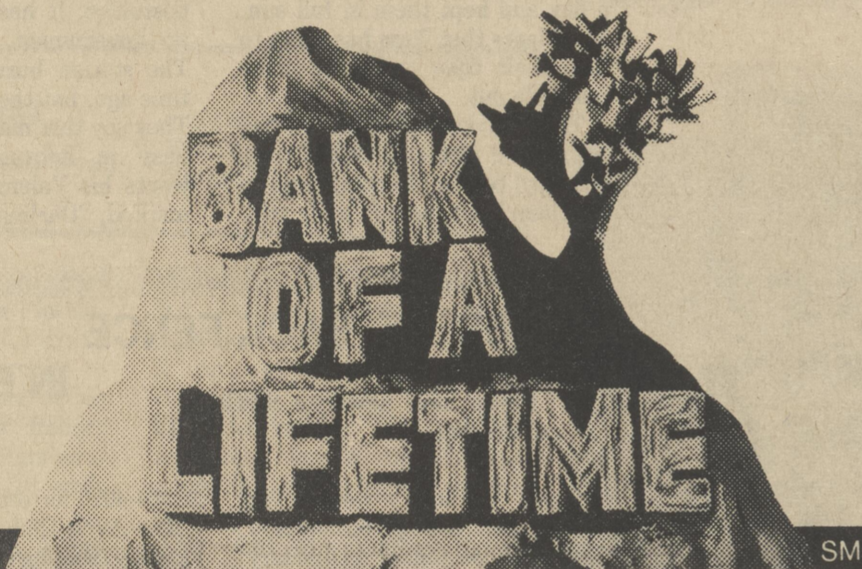

Girls rebound after Seaford loss

The continuing saga of the "first you lose, then you win" Lake Forest girls varsity basketball team rolled on unchecked last week with a miserable loss against Seaford last Tuesday, a game that coach Pat Dyal termed, "The worst I have ever seen," and a strong victory over Caesar Rodney on Friday night. The score on Tuesday was 57-22, on Friday it was 48-38.

The girls did not play well against Seaford, and making things worse, the Bluejays played brilliantly.

"Seaford played far better than I think the girls were expecting", said head coach Pat Dyal. "It was a total bomb out."

Total bomb out? If shooting 10 for 49 from the floor with 22 turnovers is a bomb out, then Lake Forest was bombed.

Nobody on the Spartan side shot for more than 4 points, star scorer Gwen Scott was 0 for 16 making her debut after an ankle injury a particularly painful one. She had missed 3 games due to the sprain.

"It was our plan," said Dyal, "to force them to turn the ball over. But in fact it was we who turned the ball over almost constantly. Also going against us on Tuesday was their defense. Seaford was in a man to man for the entire game and we just couldn't move at all. We never play too well against the man to man, we don't see it that much, but we really outdid ourselves this time."

Lake Forest was never in contention, they were down 4-11 after one quarter, 12-22 at the half, 18-46 by the time the third period ended.

"Well, one thing is clear," said coach Dyal. "If a team is going to have a good game, chances are it's us they'll have it against."

But things got a lot better on Friday for Dyal and the gang, they took a highly touted Caesar Rodney squad and whipped 'em by 10 points.

Said Dyal, "We played a very good game. What made me feel especially good was the fact that we finally scored points in the second half, which has been a trouble spot for us all season. We got 31 in the second half."

The girls were in danger of creating a losing streak for themselves, having dropped the previous two contests, and they proved they could win a pressure game if they had to. Playing at home has been a factor with the girls team all year too.

It was a close battle all the way as C.R. hung on the whole way. After the first period, C.R. led by a 9-8 margin, they continued to stay ahead in the second half, ending the period up 19-17. Lake Forest began to fight back in the third and went ahead 33-30 at the buzzer. It was 48-38 when the final buzzer sounded.

Brenda Thomas took the team scoring honors with a 14 point effort. Freshman Pam Harris played an outstanding game, shooting for 13 points and grabbing 7 rebounds. Gwen Scott got back in the flow of things and made 11 points while Lolitta Seth hit for 4 and took 8 steals. The team percentage from the floor was a much improved 41%.

After the C.R. game, the girls record stands at 8-4 in the conference and 9-5 overall.

After a Seaford win.....

Boys drop C.R. game by two at the buzzer

Tuesday's game at Seaford began on a shaky note as the Lake Forest boys' varsity fell behind by 4 points after the first period, but Bill Falasco and the Spartan team bounced back to overtake the Bluejays with a 56-44 win.

"They used a man to man on us for most of the game," said coach Falasco, "and they actually played very well. They completely shut off our back door play forcing us to use a lot of quick give and goes, they had us off balance quite a bit, it was a good win for us."

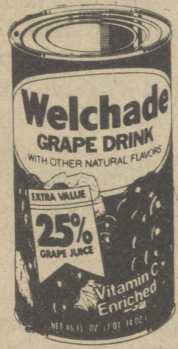

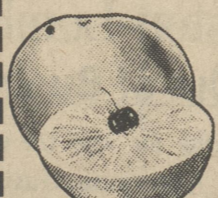
