Felton residents angered over Purdue pullout

A public meeting was held on Sunday for the citizens of Felton. At the meeting, held at the fire hall, area residents had a chance to view for the first time the plans for the proposed sewer district project. Approximately 50 citizens took advantage of the meeting.

Besides viewing the architectural plans for the sewer system, towns people discussed the problem of Purdue's supposed agreement to be a part of that sewer system.

According to council members, Purdue had wanted to participate in the new system but decided to pull out at the last minute. Purdue's action has caused much concern in the town.

The primary problem, as the townspeople see it, is the odor

originating at the Purdue plant, located just outside the town limits. The new sewage plans were to remedy this ongoing problem as well as provide better services to the residents of Felton.

A petition was made available to these present at the town meeting for the purpose of presenting to the Environment and Natural Resources for action. Anyone not present, but wanting to sign the petition, should contact the mayor or any council member.

Officials at the Purdue plant could not be reached for comment at press time but, according to a letter presented to the council on February 4th, they claim to have solved the odor problem already by spending \$106,000 last year.

First National shows huge growth for 1979

On February 19th, the 1st National Bank of Harrington held a stockholders meeting in which 136 stockholders attended. The meeting was held at the main office in Harrington, and the stockholders were catered to a meal by the Harrington Fire Company Ladies Auxiliary at the Firehouse.

At the stockholders meeting, financial reports were provided showing the Bank had a \$4 million growth over the past year with an increase of net profits of 39%. The end of the year report showed the bank had assets of

\$19,700,000. The meeting was chaired by Benjamin Hughes, who is Chairman of the Board. The reports were provided by David Jones, Executive V.P. and cashier.

A committee within the bank made a study and report on comparative sizes of "this Bank" to five other banks in the area of comparable size. The findings were that the First National provided all the services that the other banks did and further indicated that First National was "above average" in all categories.

Three seats open in Frederica

Frederica voters go to the polls on Monday to fill three seats on the Town Council. Each voter will select three from a slate of four candidates who are seeking election.

Incumbents Helen Powers and Mayor Ezekiel Dill have filed for re-election. Also looking for a spot on the Council are Virginia

Simpler, who was unsuccessful in a similar bid in November, and Asa Flemming, Veteran Councilman Reynolds Gooden has decided not to run for another term.

All Council members are elected at large, and the Mayor is selected by the Council from among its members at the reorganization meeting following

the election. This year's reorganization meeting in Frederica will be on Thursday, March 6, at 7 p.m. at the Town Hall.

Election hours are 5 to 8 p.m. on Monday, March 3 at the Frederica Volunteer Fire Hall. Eligible voters must be Frederica voters for at least six months and be at least 18.

Prayer Breakfast set

Representative Mike Harrington of the Delaware State Legislature will be the featured speaker at the annual Mayor's Prayer Breakfast sponsored by the Harrington Jaycees. The breakfast has been set for 7:30 a.m. on Sunday, March 9 in the Harrington Volunteer Fire Hall.

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Harrington Volunteer Fire Company will serve a menu expected to center around the traditional sausage, eggs and biscuit.

for next Monday, they are unopposed.

Felton is not organized into wards, and the election is to fill the three Council seats at large. There is also no direct election of a Mayor. That office is filled by the Council itself at the annual reorganization meeting which this

year will probably be on March 10.

Election hours are from 5 to 8 p.m. on Monday, March 3 at the Felton Fire Hall. All taxpaying residents of Felton who are 18 years of age and older are eligible to vote. Write-in votes are allowed.

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Adams wins U of D Ag Award....

State senator Thurman G. Adams, Jr., has been named 1980 recipient of the University of Delaware Agricultural Alumni Association's George M. Worri- low award. Presented annually, the award recognizes outstanding service to Delaware agriculture by a University alumnus.

Adams, now serving his third term as state senator, holds a B.S. in agricultural education from the University's College of Agricultural Sciences. Besides his legislative responsibilities, Adams is active in the family business, T.G. Adams & Sons, Inc., of Bridgeville—grain bro-

kers. They also produce grain and fruit.

First elected to the Delaware senate in 1972, he has served on a number of important committees. Now chairman of the senate agriculture committee, as a long-time member he has introduced numerous legislation on behalf of Delaware agribusiness. As chair- man of the public safety commit- tee he introduced a number of changes in the motor vehicle code, including the one which permits motorists to turn right on a red light. He has helped a number of state municipalities with street improvement projects

and charter changes.

As a member of the State Highway Commission from 1961- 1970 he worked toward higher appropriations for dirt road sur- facing around the state.

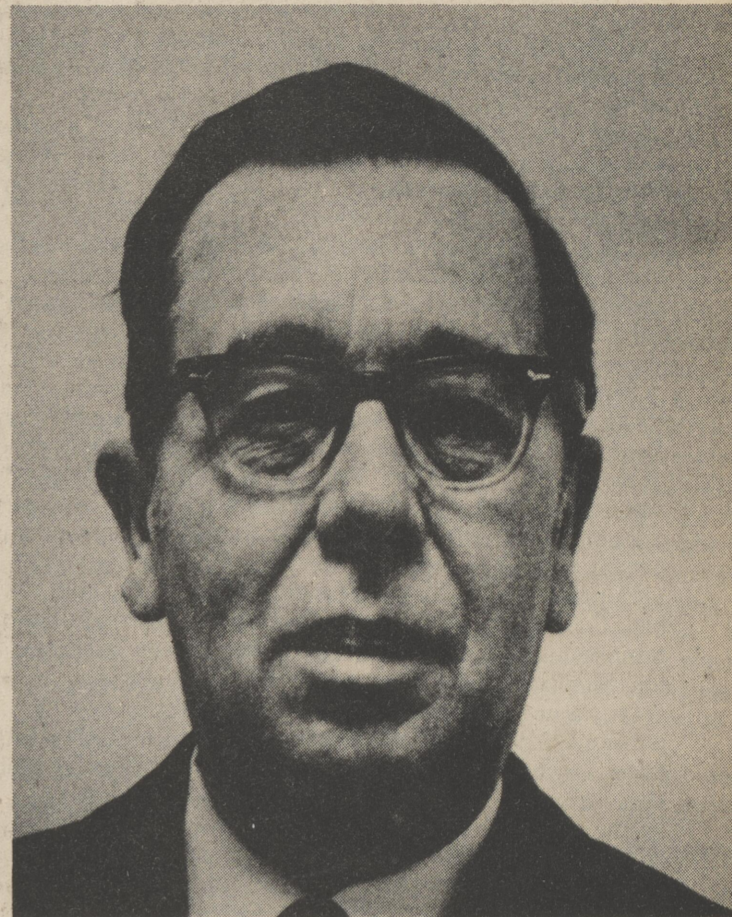
Among his various civic commitments, Adams serves as director of the Milford Memorial Hospital and director of the Delaware State Fair. He is also a director of the Baltimore Trust Company, member and past pre- sident of the Eastern Shore Grain and Feed Dealers Association, member and past director of the University of Delaware Alumni Association, and president of the

Harrington Raceway. From 1961- 1970 he served on the State Highway Commission. From 1966-1969 he was chairman of the governor's Safety Committee. He is also chairman of the board and a trustee of his church.

Announcement of the award was made during the Agricultural Alumni Association's annual ban- quet, February 16, at the Seaford Golf and Country Club.

The award is named for the late Dr. George M. Worri- low, former University vice president and former dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences. Presented every year since 1970, it honors individuals who have made out- standing contributions to the Delaware agricultural communi- ty. According to Dr. Donald F. Crossan, current dean of the College, Adams has shown a good understanding of the needs of agriculture in the state, as well as the contributions made by University programs in exten- sion, research and teaching to Delaware agribusiness.

Operation Rice Bowl is Lenten focus

In accordance with Pope John II's request that Americans share their blessings with the less fortunate of the world, Catholics in the Diocese of Wilmington will have the opportunity to participate in Operation Rice Bowl in the Lenten period commencing on February 20.

Operation Rice Bowl, a six-week family program of prayer and sacrifice, is run by Catholic Relief Services, the official overseas aid and development agency of American Catholics. Twenty-five percent of the proceeds of Operation Rice Bowl are used within Delaware and the

Eastern Shore of Maryland to alleviate poverty and suffering at the local level. Catholic Relief Services uses its 75 percent share for hunger related projects, self-help and community development work in 85 countries.

According to Diocesan Director, the Rev. Joseph R. McMahon, Catholics in the area have shown enormous generosity to the problems of the world. They recently raised nearly ninety-five thousand dollars to feed

the hungry of Cambodia over a two-month period. Last year they gave through the rice bowl, \$4,635 for local projects, and \$18,543 for world programs. "The Pope has asked us to respond to the needs of others," said Fr. McMahon. "Operation Rice Bowl provides us with an excellent family-to-family channel for that, which is especially important during this International Year of the Family."



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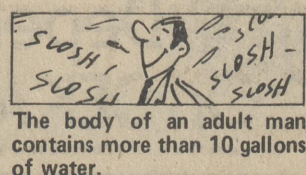
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LETTER TO THE EDITOR.....

People who are over 60 or who receive Supplemental Security Income, SSI or Social Security disability may claim food stamp deductions which may result in more food stamps. Deductions that can be claimed are:

- 1.) Medical expenses over \$35 a month.
- 2.) High shelter costs.

The additional deductions for elderly and disabled people may allow some households to be eligible for food stamps.

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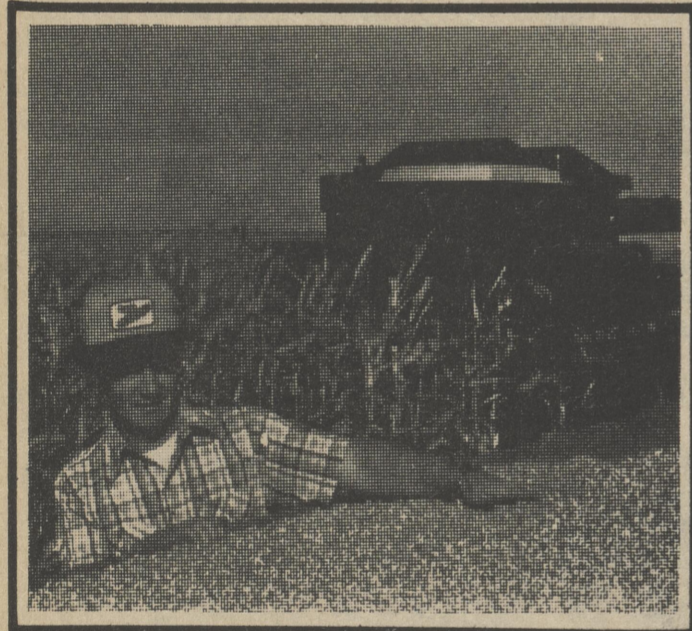

Lake Forest denied State Tourney berths

The annual Conference Championships for the high schools in lower Delaware were held on Friday and Saturday in Laurel with Milford High School emerging as the powerhouse this year. Milford took a total of 6 individual championships in an outstanding showing of team strength.

The Conference meet is designed to qualify a field for the State Tournament. The top finishers at Laurel will be sent to compete for the state titles in all weight classes.

The young Lake Forest team, under the direction of coach Tom Schaffer, failed to qualify anyone for the State Tourney but neither did they come away in defeat. Schaffer's squad represented the school in fine fashion with many quality performances in the face of awesome competition. "We did well I thought," said Schaffer, "I was especially happy with the work of our underclassmen."

Probably the best that came of the meet was the showing of the underclassmen, which should indicate the type of team Lake Forest will field in the years ahead. Schaffer thinks that the entire starting squad will be underclassmen next season and that means experience that will

count heavily in the ever toughening wrestling wars downstate.

Freshman Greg Ecenrode, at 98 pounds, surprises all but his coaches by winning his first round 9-2. In the second, he was defeated by the eventual class champion.

105 pounder Bobby Fleming showed his maturity and skill with a strong first round win. He lost the next round but wrestled what his coaches thought to be the best match of his career.

Charles Jones gave the crowd a scare when he appeared injured after an illegal slam stunned him during the closing minutes of his first round 112 pound match. He was winning easily, 10-2, at the time and finished the contest. He was taken to Nanticoke Memorial Hospital in Seaford where the doctor on duty could not perform an accurate reading on the X-rays. Jones was advised to forfeit the second round and wait until a specialist could read the evidence on Monday morning. So Jones, a favorite in the division, sat out the remaining meet and closed out his wrestling year. His back injuries were judged not to be too serious.

Jeff Grove then won his first round, 2-1, then lost 3-0 in the second.

Kenny Williams lost his first round match at 126 pounds, 14-6 to a highly ranked contender.

132 class Dave Wilson, a freshman, looked good but lost his first round also, 4-2.

Dave Brown won by pin in his first round, then won his second round too. He advanced to the semi's but lost to the eventual winner. In the consolation, Williams lost by pin.

145 pounder Mike Kosiorowski won his first match by pin in just a few seconds, advanced to the second round and lost 5-2. In Kosiorowski's class, the competition is very very close and no clear favorite was established all season.

Herschel Harmon then lost his first contest 12-8.

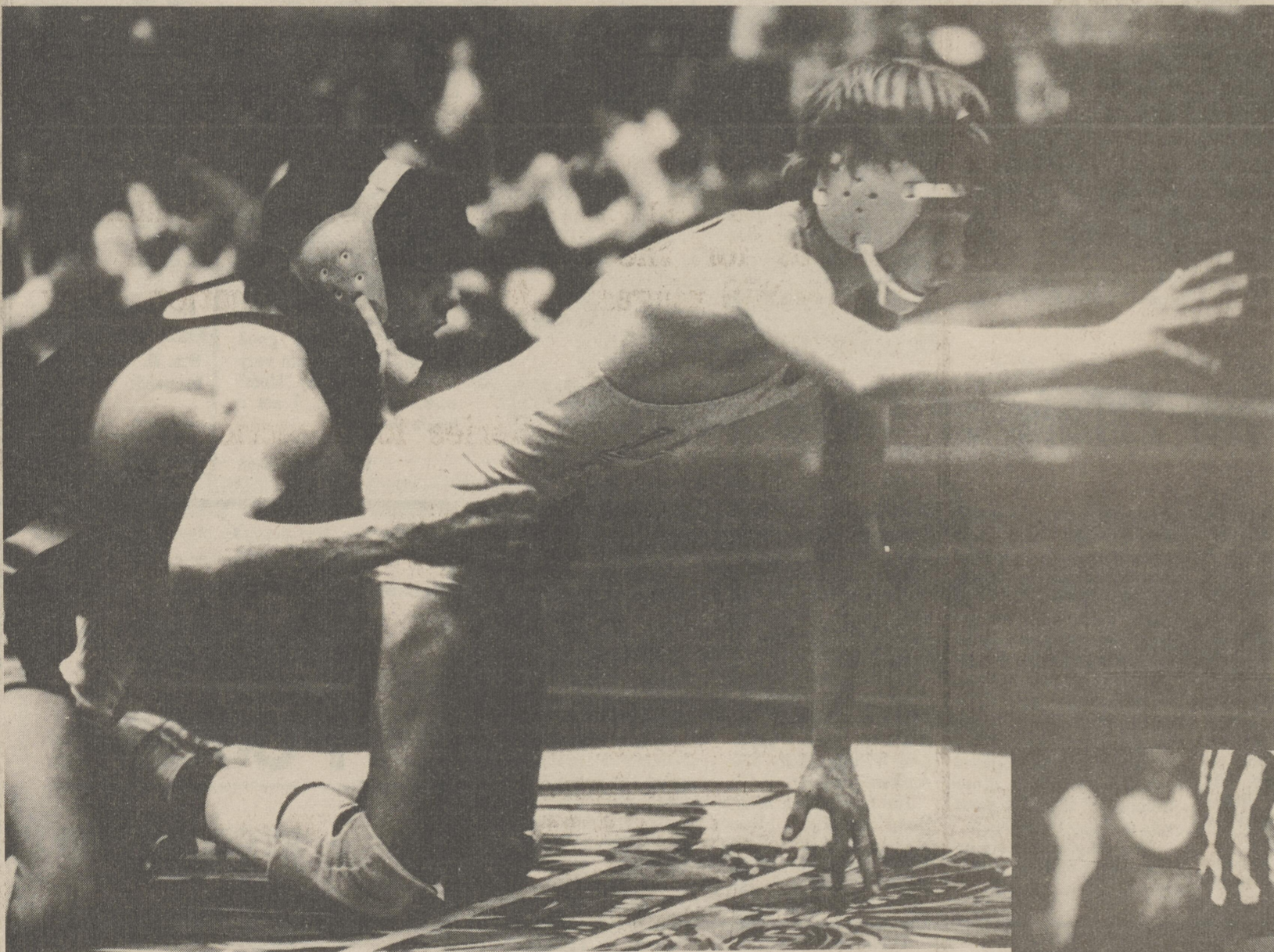

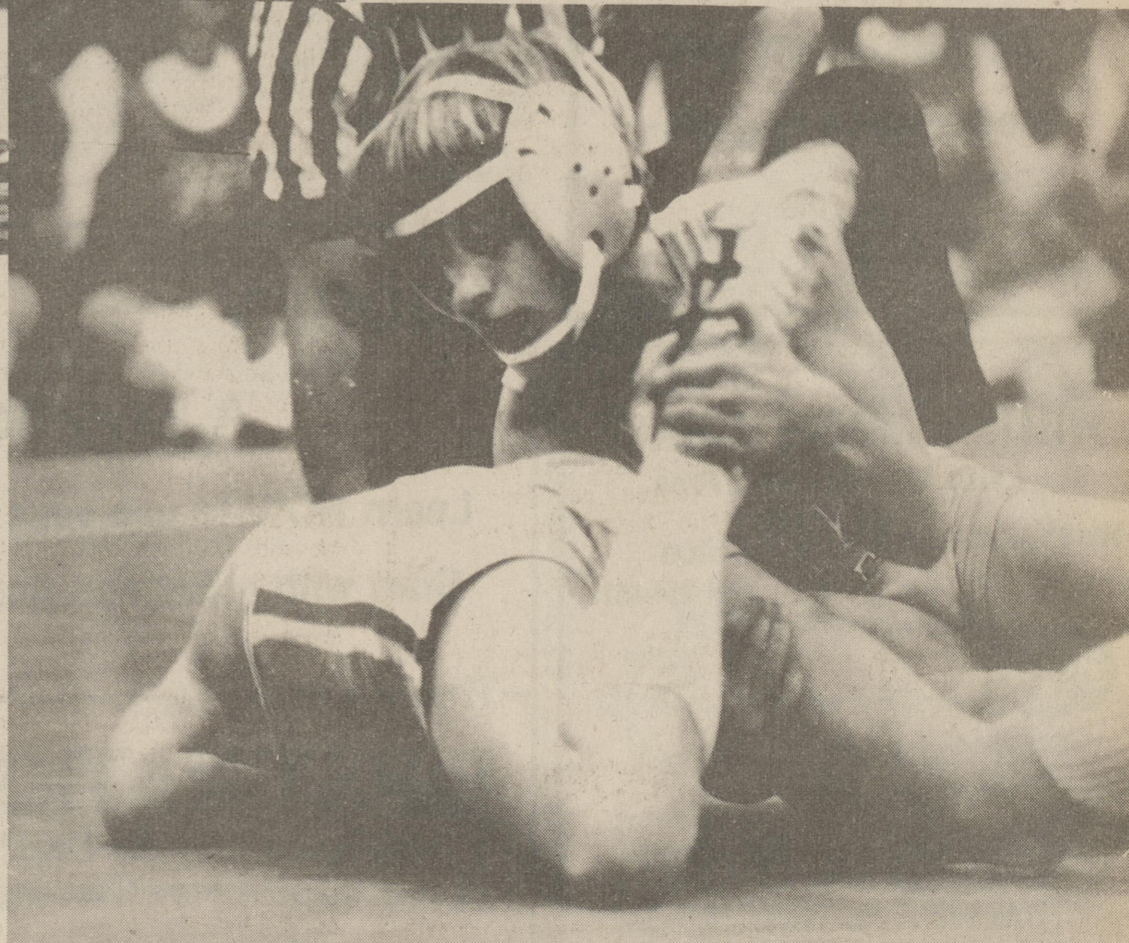

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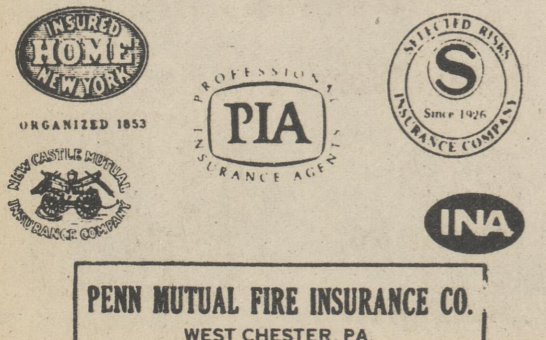
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"Hurrah" for Us!" (We're O.K.)

Some events have already been held; others are expected to be completed by the end of March. Watch the Blue B for results.

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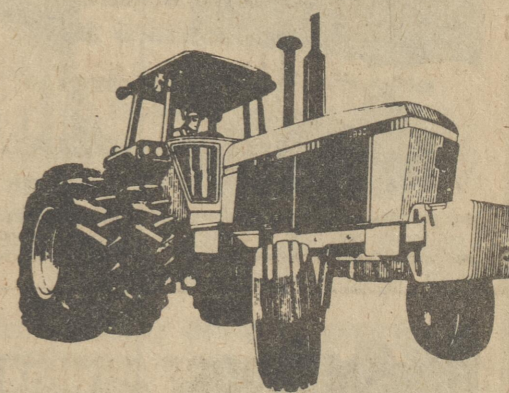

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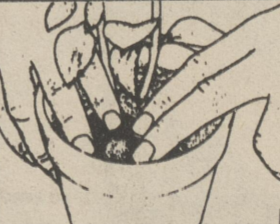

A pot-bound plant should be transplanted only when its soil is slightly moist. The Reader's Digest Illustrated Guide to Gardening, a 672-page, easy-to-read book on most aspects of gardening, suggests you invert the pot-bound plant and shake out the ball of roots and soil, ease away some of the old soil and set the root ball on fresh potting soil in the new pot. Trickle more soil around it. Hold the plant loosely by the stem.

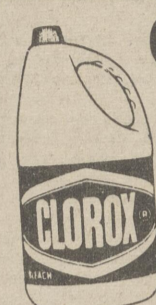

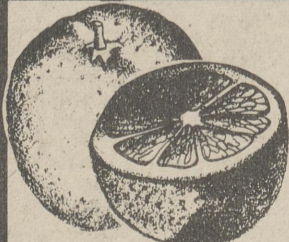
