John Irwin missing, police drag Murderkill River

At 9:30 a.m., Saturday, a Frederica man notified Delaware State Police that he found a bridge rail broken through on a bridge on South Market Street over the Murderkill River in Frederica.

Delaware State Police, Frederica and Felton Fire Companies responded to find the hood of a car barely visible above the surface on the west side of the bridge. Investigation indicated that a car had been northbound on South Market Street at 2:30 a.m. when it ran through the left

railing, and was washed a short distance to the west by the flooding current before coming to rest on the bottom. A Delaware State Police diver entered the water at 10:45 to find an empty 1967 Ford. Delaware State Police checked with relatives and friends of the registered owner, but when John E. Irwin, 18, of Bowers Beach Road, Frederica, could not be located, boats from Frederica, Milford, and Magnolia Fire Companies were launched at 12:30 to begin dragging operations.

The Delaware State Police and Frederica Fire Company continued their search on Monday for the body of John E. Irwin. Six Delaware State Police scuba divers were searching the river in zero visibility for holes or snags where the boy may be trapped below the surface. Above, four boats continued to search the river. These belong to the Delaware Marine Police, Frederica Fire Company and two that are privately owned. The search continued on Tuesday until approximately 3:30 p.m.

City can't limit to seniors

Case Edwards, the firm that wants to build apartments on a portion of the Peck Avenue property now owned by Dudley Willis, might agree to limit its rentals to senior citizens. But the city of Harrington cannot make that a binding requirement that would hold once the property is rezoned. Neither can the city legally require the builder to come back to the city for approval to build additional units on the property after it is rezoned. Such requirements would not hold up in court the city was told by its

lawyer, Harry Terry in a letter received at last Wednesday's Council meeting.

Sentiment at a public hearing on the rezoning question in January showed city residents were in favor if there could be some kind of limitation, Council members expressed a desire to have the matter put before the public in a referendum and possibly limiting the portion rezoned to just enough to accommodate the number of apartment units now requested.

The Council voted to publish

Terry's letter in the *Journal* as a matter of public information.

The Council also tabled further consideration of an ordinance which would allow members to nominate appointees to the Planning and Zoning Commission if the Mayor's appointment is not accepted. Mayor Cahall told the Council he thought the proposed ordinance change was contrary to state law. Its further consideration and the appointment of another member to the Planning

Bus accident gets driver fired, committee appointed

An accident in which 7 year old Angela Short of Sandtown was injured has resulted in the firing of a Lake Forest school bus driver and the creation of a new committee by the local school board.

On Monday, March 17, Angela, brushed by the wheel axle of the school bus in which she had just been riding, was sent to the hospital with severe injuries to her buttocks and foot. She was hit while crossing the street after leaving the bus. Home by Monday, March 24, Angela was reported as improving. But her mother Norma Short, said she would be out of school for some time.

Bus driver Diane G. Hammond, charged by State Police with inattentive driving, was fired by bus contractor Lester Blades who acted in the insistence of school officials. However, their decision was made on Wednesday after the accident on Monday, and Mrs. Hammond actually continued driving for the remainder of the week.

The Lake Forest School Board, under fire from parents critical of the districts' handling of the

situation, called a special meeting Monday night to hear their complaints, to give Mrs. Hammond a hearing and to discuss formulation of a policy to deal with such situations.

The upshot of the meeting, attended by over 20 parents as well as by several bus drivers and contractors, was the appointment by Lake Forest Board president Albert Price of a 7 member committee to recommend guidelines for a policy to govern situations in which a school bus driver may be involved in an accident. The committee was asked to give a preliminary report at the board's regular meeting on May 19.

Members of the committee include Assistant Superintendent Melvin Luff, Transportation Supervisor Ray Stoops, School Board Member Donald Garey, bus contractor Lee Dean and three parents - Yvonne Armstrong (spokeswoman for the parents group), Rosamond Pierce and Cindy Carey. The last two were added after Mrs. Carey complained the committee had "more chiefs than Indians".

Parents contended they were not out to "crucify" any particular bus driver, but were concerned over the lack of policy which allowed such a delay in the suspension of a driver charged in an accident. Mrs. Armstrong told the school board parents were upset over the delay and over reports that last Monday's accident was the only complaint against the driver. She said several parents had met with Transportation Supervisor Ray Stoops and Lake Forest North Assistant Principal Grace Bradford on October 22 to review a list of complaints against Mrs. Hammond. Among the more serious was the driver's reportedly leaving the bus unattended with the motor running and with children on board, to make an emergency bathroom trip. She also pointed out an alleged "fender-bender" accident in which the damage was under \$300 and the driver was not charged. In addition, she said there had been numerous discipline problems on the bus for which all the children

Houston vote set for Saturday

Houston voters go to the polls this Saturday, March 29 to select a Mayor and one council member.

For the Council seat incumbent Dorothy Silbereisen is facing challenger Richard Rollison who seeks the two year position.

Connie Morgan, who served for two years as Mayor before a Charter change made that post an

elected office, is after the top spot. She is unopposed, and unless unexpected write-in votes decide otherwise, will soon be serving her first two year term as a Mayor chosen by the community. Before the recent charter change the Mayor was selected by the Council from among its own members.

Ms. Morgan will succeed William Dougherty, Houston's first elected Mayor, who served one term and then elected not to run.

The election will be held on Saturday, from 2 to 8 p.m. All Houston residents over the age of 18 are eligible to vote.

Police investigate pet deaths

The Harrington Police Department is currently investigating a wave of pet poisonings that have occurred in town since March 15. To date, two families have suffered losses of their pets, involving four cats and three dogs in total.

According to Patrolman Peter Bonn, the investigating officer in the case, the answer remains a mystery. "We received a call from a family who reported a strange death of their cat. They found him under the house making loud screaming noises, brought it inside where the pet began to go into convulsions. It died about 20 minutes later", Bonn said in an interview this week.

Continued Patrolman Bonn, "Then the following evening, we

got a call from another resident in the same general area reporting the same phenomenon with their pet dog. The dog died in the exact same manner. We froze the body, as we had done with the cat, so we could get an autopsy performed."

The police are now working with a variety of state agencies, including Delaware State College, to determine the cause of death in these animals. The location of the incidents are centered around the Vernon Road area and one theory is that arsenic, which was legal 10 years ago but not now, may have been exposed somewhere and the animals are getting into it.

Said Bonn, "We are looking for answers very hard in this case as children could become involved.

There is nothing conclusive at this point but we hope to have some answers soon".

Felton resident wins award

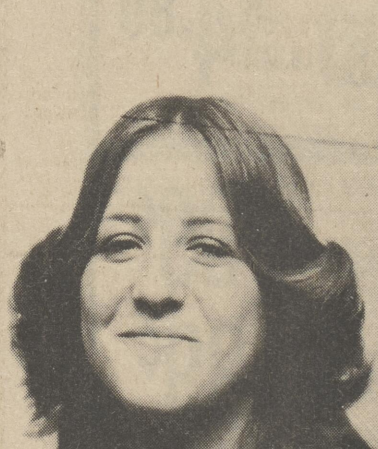

had been punished for the actions of the known trouble-makers. She cited a return to the school resulting in a 45 minute delay during which parents became frantic and an occasion on which the entire bus load of children was kept sitting on the floor of the gym from the time of their arrival at school until 10 a.m. when school officials could speak to them. Mrs. Armstrong said she received a letter showing action on the complaint was delayed for 7 days.

Parents present said they would like to see a policy which would call for an immediate suspension of a bus driver involved in an accident until an investigation of the incident and of his driving record can be made.

Bus contractor Lester Blades, who employed Mrs. Hammond, told the Board discipline problems on the bus involved more than a few children. He said "not more than two...could be considered good." He drove the bus for Mrs. Hammond when she was hospitalized during the year. Blades also asked "Are you saying, if it hit one (child), right now I've got to go?" (regardless of the fact that I

may have a good driving record spanning a number of years).

Mrs. Hammond said medical problems which caused her to be in severe pain caused her to leave the bus unattended for the emergency bathroom trip. She was later hospitalized for the problem. She said that assigned seats on the bus had helped with discipline problems for only a few days and that the 45 minute delay cited by parents happened when she returned with the bus to the school, determined to "get something done".

Saying "I have been through pure hell this week". Mrs. Hammond told the Board she thought, since there was no policy governing the situation, she should have been suspended rather than fired.

Lake Forest Superintendent William Cline thought the lack of a clear-cut policy was the major reason for the delay. He said he did not learn there had been previous complaints against Mrs. Hammond until Tuesday evening. On Wednesday, he and Assistant Superintendent Melvin Luff made the decision that she should be dismissed. A substitute was hired

who rode the bus with Mrs. Hammond to learn the route on Thursday. However, the new driver had a previous commitment and could not drive on Friday.

Ray Stoop told the Board he could not answer all the allegation concerning a particular driver in public. He said a check with nine other Delaware school districts showed none had a written policy governing bus drivers involved in an accident. Making such a policy, especially if it goes into specifics concerning the number and type of violation before a suspension or dismissal takes place, he feels may be tricky.

Yvonne Armstrong told the Journal after the meeting she felt satisfied with the Board's action in appointing the committee and thought its members were sincere in their efforts to address the problem.

Last week's accident was only the second in the district in which there has been serious injury to a child. Some years earlier a local youngster required surgery after being run over by the wheel of a school bus.

after recruiting about ten or fifteen helpers, she was able to round up \$173. This year's drive will conclude around April 1.

No stranger to community involvement, Mrs. Layton has served on Harrington's Planning and Zoning Commission and as a leader of a local Brownie Troop. The mother of two sons and one daughter, she is employed by Conventional Builders, formerly of Harrington, currently of Houston.

She and her husband, Samuel Layton are lifelong residents of this area. Both graduated from Harrington High School.

No set-aside in 1980

There will be no set-aside or voluntary diversion for 1980 feed-grains and wheat, according to Harold B. Short, Chairperson of the Sussex County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. Mr. Short encourages all producers to report their crops at their convenience. By doing so farmers will be eligible for disaster payments, if approved; price support loans, deficiency payments, if made; and proven yields.

"However, to qualify for 100% of any deficiency payment made, farmers cannot plant more in 1980 than considered planted and set-aside in 1979", he explained. Farmers who exceed 1979's planted acreage will be subject to an allocation factor which could result in a reduction of up to 20%.

Then beat the 3 egg whites with 1/4 teasp. cream of tartar and gradually add 1/2 cup sugar. Spread over pie, sealing edges and bake until meringue is brown.

Sussex 4-H News

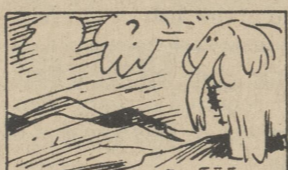

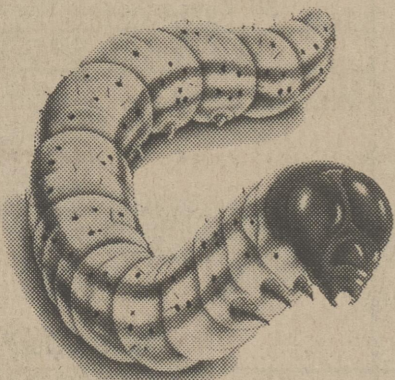
Cross-country runners work hard anywhere. At Lake Forest

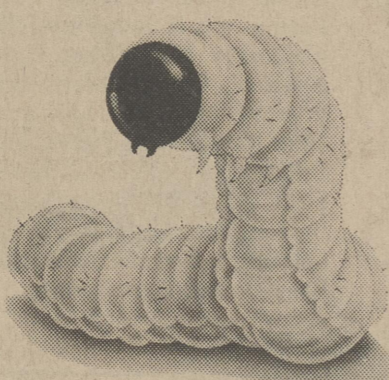
