Harrington Chamber Names Dennis & Harrington Outstanding

The committee to select the Outstanding Citizen for Harrington selected two for the prestigious award rather than one, which it had done on two previous occasions.

This year was the third year for the award. Prior winners had been Walter Messick in '78, and Mayor Arthur B. "Buck" Cahall, III in '79. This year's winners were Gary "Punky" Harrington and J.D. Dennis, Jr. They were

selected over a host of names for their bravery in saving a young boy last February who had fallen through the ice in a pond near Wyoming. Both men are employed by Delmarva Power and at the time of the incident were working on electrical lines in the area of the pond. When they spotted the boy in the water, they tried to reach him to no avail. They were lucky enough to find a boat which enabled them to reach

the stranded youth. Harrington is a member of the Harrington City Council, the Harrington Jaycees, sings in a church group called "Reach Out", Harrington Jaycees Outstanding Young Man and Vice President of the Harrington Fire Co. Dennis is also a member of the Harrington Jaycees and a member of the Harrington Fire Co. Board of Directors. It was a surprise announcement for each man.

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Fire Co Honors Ladies

The Felton Community Fire Company honored its Ladies Auxiliary Saturday night with a dinner and awards ceremony which were part of the Annual Ladies Night festivities. The occasion marked the fortieth anniversary of the Ladies Auxiliary of Felton Fire Company. The Community Fire Company itself has seen forty-one years of service.

During the evening the ladies presented the fire company a check for \$14,000, tangible evidence of their support of its activities. The money which will go into the building fund, makes a total of \$30,000 the Ladies Auxiliary has contributed over the past three years. According to the ladies, it has all been earned through hard work. Throughout the year the Auxiliary serves a number of dinners, some open to the public, others for special groups and occasions. It also prepares meals for sessions of the Delaware State Fire School just north of Dover.

The presentation of the \$14,000 was made by Joyce F. Sipple, president of the Ladies Auxiliary to Ronald Draper, president of the Fire Company.

In turn, the men's group honored the Ladies Auxiliary with the presentation of two plaques - one engraved with the names of past presidents of the Auxiliary, the other with names of its lifetime members. Similar plaques have been prepared for the Fire Company. They are designed to allow for the addition of names as the lists increase.

Individuals were also honored at Saturday night's festivities. The award for Fireman of the Year went to Jim Sluter whose rescur efforts saved the life of a four year old child last year.

Jr. Layton received the award for answering the most fire

alarms, and Gary Casper was similarly honored for the most ambulance responses.

Twenty-five year pins went to Billy Chambers and Donald Vincent. Awards for past service went to Bill Sipple (Post Chief), Ken Ryder (Past President) and Steve Childress (Past Ambulance Captain).

Guest speaker for the evening was John Smith, Senior Instructor at the Delaware State Fire School. Smith recalled the early years of volunteer fire companies in a nostalgic recounting well suited to the anniversary occasion.

The past was also recalled by Ladies Auxiliary president Joyce Sipple who gave a brief sketch of her organizations history before introducing this year's officers.

Also credit was given to Jean Wood for the beautiful cake she made. The top had a fireman's hat decorated in red with #48 on the emblem. The cake was a 2 tier, iced in white icing and trimmed in blue. Everyone was given a piece of the cake.

A special thanks to all who donated to the door prizes.

Master of ceremonies for the evening was Carl Moore, Vice President of the fire company. The invocation and benediction were delivered by the Reverend Laurence Berry, Pastor of the Felton-Viola-Manship United Methodist Church. The ambulance squad sold chances on an Indian afghan, donated by Amy Paynter, was won by Mrs. Ruth Sipple.

Prior to the awards ceremony the members and guests present sat down to a roast beef and dumpling dinner prepared and served by the VCF Ruritanettes.

The dinner and awards ceremony were followed by a dance with music by David James of WAFL.

Policy Makers Tour Local Plant

A group headed by David Beaumaster, PH.D., Executive Office of the President of the United States, Council on Environmental Quality, and including top water policy makers for much of the eastern U.S. toured the Harrington Sewage Treatment Plant on April 10, 1980.

The tour strike seminar featured innovative sewage treatment plants designed by Edward H. Richardson, Inc. and was headed by a member of that firm, Dudley L. Willis, P.E.

These plants are of special interest to the EPA and other regulating agencies because they fit the criteria of new EPA

programs which provide a bonus grant of an extra 10% over the 75% grant given to communities which construct conventional sewage plants.

Of special interest to EPA is the fact that such plants can generally provide the higher degree of treatment at a lesser cost than a conventional plant. The plants visited bear out this argument.

Subsidies to such plants are in the billions of dollars per year, and this represents an area in which huge savings can be realized by the use of innovative systems.

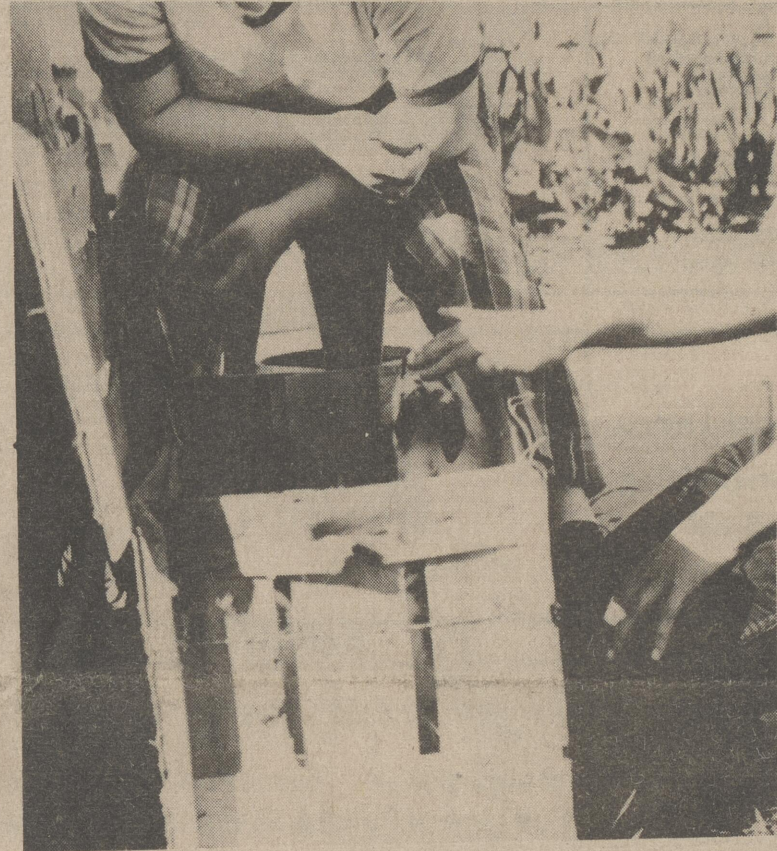
The public is invited to attend OPEN HOUSE at the Farmington Volunteer Fire Company on Saturday, April 26th from noon to 5 p.m.

Developer Addresses Chamber Dinner

Delaware's Industrial and Economic Development head William McDermott was the principal speaker at Monday night's annual Chamber dinner for selection of The Outstanding Citizen Award. McDermott in his address encouraged the Town of Harrington to do what it could to attract industry, "for industry will pay its fair share of taxes." He explained that Delaware's Economic Development Department

serves three functions: 1.) the travel bureau which serves the tourists who visit our state; 2.) the community development section which shows communities how to get federal funds; and 3.) the industrial development section which is designed to attract industry, which brings jobs.

McDermott said industries when looking to relocate look for cost of energy, availability of transportations labor force,

taxes, quality of life and predictability of the local government as well as stability in government. He encouraged the business leaders to work on a prefile of the community. "The more facts you have about your community the better sales pitch", he said. He concluded by saying that his department would welcome the opportunity to work with the Town of Harrington.

Mayor Cahall Blasts City Council

Mayor Arthur "Buck" Cahall took to the rostrum on Monday night and dove in on his City Council. He called them his 4 to 2 Council. He also said that he feels "...the optimism is fading for the Town, because I feel we are not responsive to the will of the people in this community." "How long can we tarnish the image of Harrington," he said. "Other con-

cerns will have difficulty in accepting our decisions down at City Hall, for what's wrong with Council", he added. He also elaborated on the area of pre-Council decisions in that "...discussions are taking place before Council meetings fixing the vote or decisions at the Council table... and this creates apathy." He

challenged the huge Chamber gathering which had all civic organizations present including the Lions, Rotary, and Burrsville Ruritan Clubs to help move the Town of Harrington forward. "There is an opportunity here in Harrington...a town of 2500 people, which has a city government which is close to the grass roots of democracy...which basically advocates an open form of government. We want to preserve this...if our town is to move forward", as he concluded his address. Cahall received a rousing ovation and comments from some were "...I like that young man". The Mayor's address helped make a real success out of the meeting.

WB funds will buy books, hire teacher

New health texts for students in high school classes and a gym teacher for elementary students will be just two benefits of the recent successful referendum in the Woodbridge School District.

The Woodbridge School Board voted Monday, April 14 to spend \$807.06 of the more than \$56,000 that will be realized as a result of the referendum approval to purchase new health texts to replace and update those that have seen 20 years of service on district shelves. It also approved the hiring of a physical education teacher for elementary kids in the

district who have not had the benefits of gym classes. The position is to be advertised.

Speaking to the Woodbridge School Board, Dr. William Griffin, Superintendent of Schools, once again commended the referendum steering committee on their efforts and called the 87% positive vote "phenomenal".

-Basic Skills Tested- Despite changing state regulations which make the job of keeping track of students mastery of the basic skills increasing-ly complex, Woodbridge High

Citizens complain

The Reverend and Mrs. Daniel Coleman asked the Council for help in dealing with a parking problem on West Milby Street in Harrington. The Colemans say that their neighbors, who have eight cars to one household, are parking their vehicles in such a way as to leave no room for others and often in such a way as to prevent the Colemans from backing out of their own driveway. Private attempts to settle the matter with the neighbors have so far failed. The Council opted to send a City policeman to try to work out an equitable arrangement before taking further action.

Another group of citizens in the block that is bounded on three sides by Weiner Avenue, Calvin Street and North Street came to complain to Council about the standing lake that has developed in the area. To illustrate their beef, they brought pictures of a rowboat afloat where there should be a garden.

Howell Hitchens, Jack Redden and Marvin Richardson told the Council that probes had located a terra cotta pipe which seemed capable of handling the drainage. But apparently completion of water and sewer construction on North Street had blocked the

Lake Forest School District announces Kindergarten Registration to be held the week of April 28 through May 2, 1980.

All children who will be five years old before January 1, 1981 should register for Kindergarten. Any children not currently enrolled in Kindergarten but who will be six before January 1, 1981 should register for first grade.

Parents must bring the child's birth certificate and immunization records with them when they register their child.

Registration will be from 9:00 a.m. - 2:30 p.m. in the Nurses' Office at Lake Forest East Elementary in Frederica, The Nurses' Office at Lake Forest North Elementary in Felton and The Nurses' Office at the W.T. Chipman School in Harrington. Parents are asked to register their children in the building located in their elementary attendance area.

flow. They told the Council they were prepared to put their tax money in escrow, refusing to pay the City until the longstanding problem is solved.

The Council, which earlier this year canned the North Street drainage project in efforts to balance the budget, instructed City Manager Dave Peterson to look into alternative solutions. In other business the Harrington City Council:

-set Monday, May 12 from 7 to 8 p.m. as a Public Hearing in continuing efforts to have eight properties it deems unsafe repaired or demolished. The properties are those belonging to Violet Beene on Railroad Avenue, Roland Cashwell (a trailer), Joseph Richardson on Second Avenue, Roger C. Gummo on West Street, Gilmore Farrow on Hanley Street, Marvel Flamer on Milby Street, William T. Mayfield on West Street, and Mary Dozier on Franklin Street. If the procedure were to continue to its ultimate, the Council could impose a fine of up to \$100 a day on individual property owners who ignored orders to fix up or tear down and/or have the buildings demolished and impose a lien on the properties to recover the

town's expense.

-indicated a willingness to have Ray Gagne of Stone's Hotel buy a 24 x 50' strip which would square off his property with the planned Senior Center parking lot. \$2,000 plus legal expenses was the suggested price. But Gagne will first try to have a survey done and a marker set to indicate the property line.

-heard CETA has so far come up with no qualified person to help City Clerk Norma Short who has been trying to do the work of two people since Joan Wilson left the office and the City decided to look to CETA rather than hire its own person. This was touted as a budget saving measure. But Mrs. Short is being inundated with work, and no relief is in sight.

-agreed to allow the State Highway Department's Harrington yard hook into the town's water system provided they tap in at a line near the American Legion rather than at Banks Convenience Store.

-in the wake of several assaults on police officers attempting to transport persons to court, agreed to buy a cage for the police car. In one assault, a subject arrested and placed in the car attempted to strangle the officer with handcuffs.

W.B. Board (con't)

School Principal Charles Davis told the Board the staff and administration are following the guidelines recently established.

In the past few weeks math competencies have been tested in grades 9, 10 and 11. Letters are to go out to parents as soon as results are in. Davis also said there were plans to place students who passed three or fewer of the skill areas in remedial classes next year. Those who passed six will have the option of getting extra help during study hall periods.

Language arts competencies are being checked through English classes in which every student is enrolled.

For juniors, who must meet minimum competencies in the various areas before they can become seniors, the results are of critical importance. For any who may be in trouble in any area the district will send certified letters to notify parents of the situation.

-Bus Safety Measures- A combined parking and road repair problem which make conditions hazardous for youngsters who must board at least one district bus was the topic of intense discussion at the board

meeting. Reports said trucks parked across from the IGA store in Bridgeville Manor were forcing the youngsters to go out into a pot-hole-riddled road to board the bus.

It was recommended that the district make a two-pronged effort to resolve the situation by getting the state to resurface the road and having the "No Parking" regulations enforced. The next step would be asking the State Department of Public Instruction's Unique Hazards Committee to address the problem.

In other business the Woodbridge School Board:

-heard the district has received an energy grant for technical assistance in planning ways to conserve energy in several school buildings. Chris Ward and Dr. Bartley met with district administrators this week to discuss the implementation of the grant.

-heard the districts driver education car was totaled when a student, in a panic, hit the gas instead of the brake and plowed into a truck. There were no injuries. The total cost of the car is \$5,111.00, only \$2,872.48 of which is recoverable by insurance.

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


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
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Director of the Week

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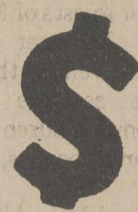
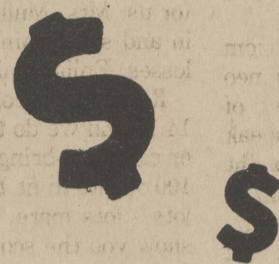

Pastoral Care Service Initiated

The Pastoral Care Service initiated in July of 1979 by Milford Memorial Hospital and a group of ministers from area churches has been gratefully received by hospital patients and their families and has fulfilled a need for a patient-centered, supportive ministry within the Hospital.
