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## LF Board To Seek Referendum

The Lake Forest School Board voted Monday night to go for a referendum which would add several thousands of dollars to the funds the district will have to spend on local educational programs and still reduce the current real estate tax rate from \$1.27 to \$1.16 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The proposal would switch 10c of the 35c out of that \$1.27 now allotted to the debt service to the general expense account where it could be used to beef up school budgets to purchase such things as textbooks and supplies. Despite inflation, those budgets have not been increased for a

number of years.

The 10c reduction in the debt service portion of the tax rate is possible because the district has built up a hefty surplus of \$224,299.78 in the account which is set aside to pay the principal and interest on bonds. Even with the proposed rate reduction, it is projected that surplus will build to \$305,877.08 by 1985. That surplus has grown, in part, because the assessed value of local real estate has gone up at a faster rate than originally envisioned.

Switching the 10c from the debt service to the general expense account would not change the tax

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## Dill Answers Cahall

Vice Mayor William Dill responded to remarks made recently at The Harrington Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Citizen Awards Dinner. At that meeting, Mayor Cahall uttered statements about the Council. "It is ironic when Cahall called the Council a 4 to 2 Council. He is right. There are two votes he can almost always count on to back his proposals. If you would attend the Council meetings, you would see who they were", said Dill.

The Vice Mayor struck an example concerning the rezoning of the Dudley Willis property for apartments for the elderly. "A good example is Cahall's persistence to get rezoning for housing that was supposed to be only for the elderly. Our attorney, Harry Terry, informed the Council that it could not be restricted to the elderly. A hearing was held according to the ordinance. Cahall pushed again for a second hearing on the housing development.

Councilman Brode and myself were absent from one meeting. Mayor Cahall called a recess during the meeting, and when the meeting was again called to order, Councilman Harrington made a motion for a second hearing and it was seconded by Councilman Newman. The vote was then two to two. The Mayor broke the tie in favor of a new hearing on the housing development. Cahall states discussions are taking place before the meetings and fixing the vote. ## Felton Seeks To Annex School Property

Four members of the Felton Town Council Monday night asked for and received the blessings of the Lake Forest School Board in their quest to annex the property on which Lake Forest North Elementary School stands. The proposal would extend the town's borders to include the 22 acres which make up the school grounds. The matter must now be taken to the State Board of Education and to Felton voters by referendum for approval.

Felton Mayor William Myers and Councilman Don Jacobs presented the case for annexation. They were backed up by the presence of two other Felton

Town Council members, Mary Ann Stumpf and Fred Casper, as well as the town's newest police officer, Mike Oliver.

Jacobs and Myers told the Lake Forest Board the reason for annexation was not monetary, but was a question of the town's being able to provide better service and police protection.

A key point was the question of police protection. Don Jacobs said although the town police have authority up to a mile beyond the town limits, that authority could be seriously questioned in court. The town has not so far denied

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## duPont Announces

Governor Pete DuPont, in announcing his candidacy for reelection Monday, said that Delaware can make progress in the areas of education, jobs, health care, and economic development over the next four years.

"We have used these past three years to make substantial progress in many areas; finances, judicial reform, prison reform, housing and education," Governor DuPont said. "All of us together have accomplished a great deal, but there is much, much more to be done."

"Throughout our government and throughout our lives Delaware today is much better," Governor DuPont said.

Governor DuPont added: "Together we have restored integrity to the spirit and the process of government in Delaware .... together we have restored integrity to our State's finances .... together we have restored integrity to education."

Governor DuPont was elected in 1976, defeating Sherman W. Tribbitt. He served three terms in the U.S. Congress and one in the Delaware House of Represent-

tatives. He is a graduate of Princeton and Harvard Law School. Pete and Elise DuPont have four children.

## Thoughts From Washington

### THEY DO IT ALL FOR YOU

Have you ever wondered what it would be like to have your own personal chef to cook up wonderful French cuisine for you at noon? Have you ever tired of having to scrimp and save to eat out just once a week? Is the "fast food" restaurant down the street not up to your standards?

If your answer was "yes" to any of the above, then you would love the job of Cabinet Secretary to the President. At least seven Secretaries have their own personal chefs, including the heads of the Departments of Treasury, Defense, Justice, Commerce, Labor, Transportation and Health and Human Services.

It costs the taxpayers about \$130,000 each year to pay the salaries of all these chefs and though the Secretaries, who are paid \$70,000 a year, pay a fee for these meals, prices do not cover the full costs of operating the dining facilities. For example, costs for janitorial services and upkeep for private kitchens and dining rooms of Secretaries are not reflected in salaries paid the chefs. Moreover, all departments in the federal government have large cafeterias for employees, but top cabinet officers, and their aides, rarely eat in them.

A look at a typical menu for a Cabinet Secretary will give you an idea of what you are missing by dining out at the local hamburger palace. In the Department of Justice, two chefs, who are paid \$23,000 and \$17,000, serve lunch to the Secretary and his aides in a handsome, private

Williamsburg-style dining room next to the Cabinet Secretary's office. Breakfast, for a price of \$1.50, includes coffee, juice, eggs, bacon, grits, sausage or pancakes. Lunch may consist of broiled whitefish, deviled crab, salad, dessert and beverage for only \$2.50. At these prices, you might be convinced inflation is a thing of the past!

This example of spartan facilities for high government officials is by no means isolated. The Commerce Secretary has a personal chef who is paid over \$17,000. The cook at the Department of Health and Human Services is paid \$18,000; the Transportation Secretary has one paid over \$22,000 a year. In the Defense Department, total expenditures necessary yearly to run the Secretary's private dining room average over \$235,000. Who says K-rations are cheap food?

We have reached the point where we must do everything possible to fight inflation. The federal budget must be reduced significantly to dampen the inflationary stimulus of government spending. We must reduce the budget deficit and cut back on those expenditures which are not absolutely essential. Paying personal cooks to whip up meals for Cabinet Secretaries does not seem to be a critically important expenditure of taxpayers' dollars. Even department heads must learn to "hold the pickle and the lettuce" and reduce the other unnecessary frills in their agencies.

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

All sorts of superstitions have sprung up about Whippoorwill which are ridiculous. They used to say they sucked goat's milk, foretold death, or cured aching backs with their call. They thought you could kill an enemy by having him smoke a pipeful of ground Whippoorwill bones. Isn't that gruesome? And if an unmarried maiden heard a Whippoorwill call in the spring-time and it did not call again, she would remain a spinster for another year.

Whippoorwill singing near a house was an omen of death or at least bad luck. Another funny one was that if a man had an aching back and he would do somersaults to the tune of the bird's call he could be cured. Of course they forget to think that if his back was that bad he could not do the exercises anyway.

I grew up with many of these old sayings and superstitions and had to learn to deal with them and to put them into their proper place of folklore, pure and simple.

over 37 applicants which came down to Baxter Weber of Dover Air, Brad Holstein of Smyrna, and Brian Jones, an assistant at Del State.



police service to the school. But there could be a question of whether or not it was proper to call a local officer or wait for a response from state police. This could be crucial in an emergency.

The school district might also stand to benefit by the placement of several additional street lights in areas which badly need illumination.

Lake Forest North Elementary already receives water service from Felton and will be hooking into the new sewer system which should go to construction this year. It is currently served by private septic tanks which require frequent pumping.

rate. It would simply mean a transfer of funds from one area to the other.

The 11c drop in the tax rate previously mentioned would come about because the district will no longer have to pick up the tab for special education transportation. That responsibility will be assumed by the state effective July 1, 1980. The local board proposes to let that money revert to the tax payer, thereby reducing the local rate to \$1.16.

The 11c can be dropped without a referendum, but the district needs voter approval before it can transfer the 10c from the debt service to the general expense account.

Rick Feutz, candidate for the Lake Forest School Board in the May 13 election, challenged the Board and Assistant Superintendent Melvin Luff on the wisdom of keeping such a large surplus in the debt service account. He said

it could be better spent on educational programs.

Luff replied that he would be uncomfortable with a smaller debt service cushion than \$200,000, especially in the light of a worsening economy which could render an increasing percentage of school taxes uncollectable. The debt service represents a financial obligation which the district cannot sidestep. And it must keep its credit rating healthy.

It was also pointed out that prepayment penalties on the low interest bonds would preclude the possibility of reducing the surplus by earlier retirement of the debts. Luff did concede a further reduction in the debt service portion of the tax rate would be probable as the principal diminishes.

There were further questions as to why the district would not seek to transfer the 11c no longer

needed for special education transportation to the general expense account and thereby add that much more to the funds available for educational programs. This could be done, as it has in other districts, and still keep the tax rate at the current \$1.27.

Member James Gussett pointed out that the 11c had been mandated by the state. Local districts were given no choice but to pick up the special education transportation expenses and pass the cost along to district taxpayers. No referendum was required, so the voters had no voice. He and others felt the 11c should be dropped rather than transferred, even though a referendum would be required to effect the transfer.

Also back of the decision to let the 11c go was the hope that it would increase the chances of getting approval for the transfer of the 10c from the debt service.

Board member E.B. Warrington urged the board to be thorough in educating the public about the needs of the school district and the facts of the referendum.

No date has been set for the referendum, and whenever it is scheduled, it cannot affect the tax rate for this year.

### Certification Requirements for Graduates

The Lake Forest School Board Monday night also approved a statement of assurances detailing procedures for the certification of high school graduates. The certification procedures had to be submitted to the State Department of Public Instruction by May 1. Among other things these procedures will:

(1.) Provide for the administration of the basic skills competency tests, the passing of which is required for graduation, in grade 10 rather than grade 11. Passing the tests would be a requirement for promotion to grade 11.

(2.) Standardize record keeping by providing a Record of Mastery of Basic Skills card which would be kept for each student beginning in the fifth grade. The card would indicate which of the minimum competencies mandated by the state the student has

mastered. It would also show those in which he needs remedial help.

The card would be kept in the student's permanent record file. A copy would also be included with the regular diploma or Certificate of Performance awarded upon high school graduation.

(3.) Give students with special learning problems the option of graduating with a Certificate of Performance rather than a regular diploma if they have been unable to master all the minimum competencies. (Look for further information on the certification procedures in subsequent issues of *The Harrington Journal*).

In other business the Lake Forest School Board:

Noted the State School Board will make a final resolution of the Lake Forest-Woodbridge boundary dispute at its May 15 meeting. At that time the results of a survey of the boundary are to be made public. At Board President Albert Price's request the district will notify property owners in the area in question so that they will have the opportunity to attend the state board meeting and to get on the agenda to make their feelings known. The state board has already said that the 1953 boundary between the Harrington and Greenwood Special School Districts holds. The question to be settled by the survey is, "Where is that boundary?"

-approved an athletic budget of \$50,747 for the 1980-81 school year.

-heard reports from two building principals on the results of DPI monitoring units which spent three days in the schools recently in efforts to assess local strength and weaknesses. Written results will be received later.

-granted tenure to thirteen district teachers, denied it to two others, and put four others on notice that they will be riffed because of dropping enrollment. (That is, their jobs for next year will be eliminated because the district's unit count which determined the number of teachers for which the state will pay is expected to go down).

school...the perfect school. The Milford School Board is looking for ways to cut costs. They have empty classrooms in other school buildings in the district and are of the options they are viewing is closing down two schools...Morris and West. One Board member said this move alone would save the district \$48,000. But Hollis retaliated by saying "...you can close down a wing in the Middle School and consolidate students elsewhere in the building where there are empty rooms." He also added "...we shouldn't allow buildings to rule us...we should control them. Shut off heat in rooms not being used...and if it cannot be done now then repair it so that you can cut off the heat." Harry Towers a resident of Houston and former employee of the City of Milford said "...to the Board members) that if you close the school, you will take something that the community cannot be replaced -- pride. If you want to find a way to save it, you will. The true hallmark of an organization is to take something impossible and make something of it."

Marvin Schelhaue, a Houston resident, said he had an opportunity last summer to interview a recent graduate of Milford High School for a job. He found the student could not read a brochure. Yet that evening at home in Houston, his 7 year old daughter who attends West Elementary read the brochure through. He said this reflects the quality of education at West Elementary. "Quality education in the early years is vitally important...and it

cannot be compromised for sake of economics for to do so will bind the educational process and put it in a deplorable state", he said. Mayor Connie Morgan expressed the sentiment of the taxpayers in the community by simply saying the people she represents in the community are against closing the school.

All of the speakers from Houston put forth persuasive arguments, and even the Board members seemed to agree that maybe they had not exhausted all of the options open to them so that west could remain open. Superintendent Michael Woodall pointed out that the enrollment is steadily declining in the Milford School District and that he is also faced with maintaining educational balance in the school system.

The Houston school is servicing a \$21,000 debt service. Houston residents used this argument in hopes that the Board may reject the idea of closing the school and be saddled with the debt. Board member, Charlie West, said the complaints he hears is that "...West gets preferential treatment." He did not get many to agree with him in the audience.

The Board retired from the Middle School Cafeteria and returned to the Administrative Building to conduct the remainder of their affairs, but they left the impression with the audience that they would review more options and as Ray Stoops pointed out "...interview other citizens in the District to get their opinion on the matter."

telephone, and with letters of request. They are interested in cleanliness of the Town, drainage, cleaning plugged manholes, ditching, fixing potholes in the streets, junkyards developing next to their homes, and deteriorating properties. We as Councilmen bring these problems before each meeting and it seems it takes forever to get a response from City Hall. We all know the Mayor is well aware of these problems and what does he do? He refers in his speech to the Chamber body "How long can we tarnish the image of Harrington?" I ask him the same question", said Dill. "Mayor Cahall has stated in the *Delaware State News* and *The*

*Harrington Journal* that he is against raising taxes, but yet he proposes salary increases and purchasing the Chipman House for City Hall. Where would this money come from unless taxes are raised. I am personally against raising taxes. It's difficult to follow his logic", added Dill.

"I cannot foresee how he can maintain the City in the future without raising taxes with his proposals. I have many elderly people in my Ward on fixed incomes who cannot afford an increased tax burden. Harrington has the largest tax rate and the largest capitation tax in the County. I will not vote to raise taxes", said Dill.




