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Referendum Is Tuesday

This coming Tuesday, May 20, Harrington voters will have the opportunity to go to the polls and voice their opinion on whether Harrington should have an apartment complex its prospective builders promise would be limited to senior citizens. The vote will be on a public opinion referendum to let Harrington City Council members know whether local citizens favor making the necessary zoning change from industrial to residential. The referendum is not legally binding on the Council as it makes the zoning decision. But it is expected to influence the final vote.

Election hours are set from noon to 7 p.m. Tuesday. Voting is to be by machine.

The proposed zoning change, which is for property now owned by Dudley Willis, has kept the city in a turmoil for nearly a year since its initiation last June. The Council originally rejected the

proposal, which had received the blessings of the Planning and Zoning Commission, without question or comment. Subsequently it was brought to a public hearing dominated by a shouting match in which a number felt the relevant facts had not been aired. At the next regular meeting following the hearing the rezoning was once again rejected in a vote that split the Council and deepened misunderstandings.

In the early fall, Willis brought a second proposal in which the boundary of the property to be rezoned was moved back 200 feet from Peck Avenue.

A second public hearing, held in January at the Fire Hall drew a number of citizens, a majority of whom indicated they would favor the zoning change if there could be guaranteed that the apartments would be limited to senior citizens.

A number of facts came out at the hearing. They included the

following:

-Although the apartment complex Case-Edwards proposes to build on the Peck Avenue property will be able to offer some rent subsidies because of an FHA loan program, the project will be an effort of private enterprise. It is not a HUD project.

-Case-Edwards will construct, manage, and maintain the project. It will provide its own entrance roads, do its own snow removal and other maintenance work, and pay for the cost of hooking into the town's sewer and water. Case-Edwards would pay sewer and water fees and taxes just as any other property owner. It would thereby bring an estimated \$10,000 in revenues to the city.

-Case-Edwards would employ a live-in building supervisor, chosen from the community, who could handle emergencies and call repairmen.

Gasahol Zoning Considered

The Harrington City Council Monday night instructed its Planning and Zoning Commission to pursue the creation of a new zoning classification which could accommodate an industry such as a gasahol plant. The move was an initial response to a group for which Wayne Eakin of Greenwood is the spokesman. The group is looking at various sites in lower Delaware that might be suitable for the construction of a gasahol plant. Harrington property located on the northbound side of U.S. 13 between the railroad

and the entrance road to C.T. Film is one of the possible locations.

Wayne Eakin had met with the Mayor and two members of the Council about two weeks prior to Monday night's meeting to explain his group's aims. Their first response was to refer the matter to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Speaking for the Commission, Harry G. Farrow told the Council a number of questions remain unresolved. Chief of these is whether the property is properly

zoned and whether it is totally within city limits.

Mayor Cahall said he understood that the entire piece of ground had been annexed by the city and that the zoning was IMP (industrial park) or M (manufacturing). Whether or not that is true, current zoning ordinances forbid the refining or production of commercial or industrial alcohol and prohibits the distillation of grain.

The City could either change its manufacturing or commercial zoning ordinance to allow for the activity now forbidden or create a new classification in which it would be allowed. The former course would open the door for production of alcohol in any portion of the city already zoned IMP or M. The latter course would require each applicant for each on industry to ask for the appropriate rezoning. This course, the Council thought would offer better control.

Once a new zoning classification is written, it would require two

City To Hire 6th Police Officer

With some reluctance, the Harrington City Council decided Monday night to hire, through CETA, a sixth police officer to help with police work and complaints local Police Chief Carl McLroy says are "skyrocketing".

The move was opposed by Councilman Harold Brode who said the City was just asking for more problems when the end of the 18 month period CETA will

pay for is reached, and there are no funds for the City to continue his employment. Brode also pointed out that the City will lose the time the new officer will have to spend at the Police Academy.

Agreeing with Brode on most of his argument Councilman Vincent Lobo said the City could justify

Farmington School To Get Repairs

Mayor Lester Hatfield of Farmington revealed this week that insurance funds from the arson fire of the schoolhouse in the amount of \$9,900 have been received by him.

The building was completed in 1929, therefore according to Hatfield it would be impossible to replace the original building materials which were destroyed by the fire. It is believed that the fire was set by an arsonist. The investigation is still being carried on. The damages to the schoolhouse were to a partial section of the roof, and internal destruction to one room.

According to Mayor Hatfield, the building, when completed, would be used for community affairs.

There will be ample parking under the direction of the Harrington Lions Club.

Frederica-- Beginnings of Discontent

The beginnings of some discontent with the protection Frederica is getting from the State Police surfaced at last Wednesday's meeting of the Town Council as several citizens came to voice their complaints. They seemed to feel that local problems other than speeding were not getting the attention they should. Part of this complaint was rooted in a hesitation to call the State Police on a small matter that might more comfortably be discussed with a local officer. Others said they had called the State Police for problems such as neighbors disturbing the peace. Their complaint was that the State Police had promised to come, but no one ever showed up.

Youngsters and others congregating on the street or in parking lots at night and becoming noisy and rowdy was a prime area of concern. This is a problem that both Council members and others present felt would become more prevalent in the summer months.

Mayor Dan Griffith suggested it might be wise to sit down with the State Police to discuss specific problem areas and perhaps to ask for an increase in the hours of

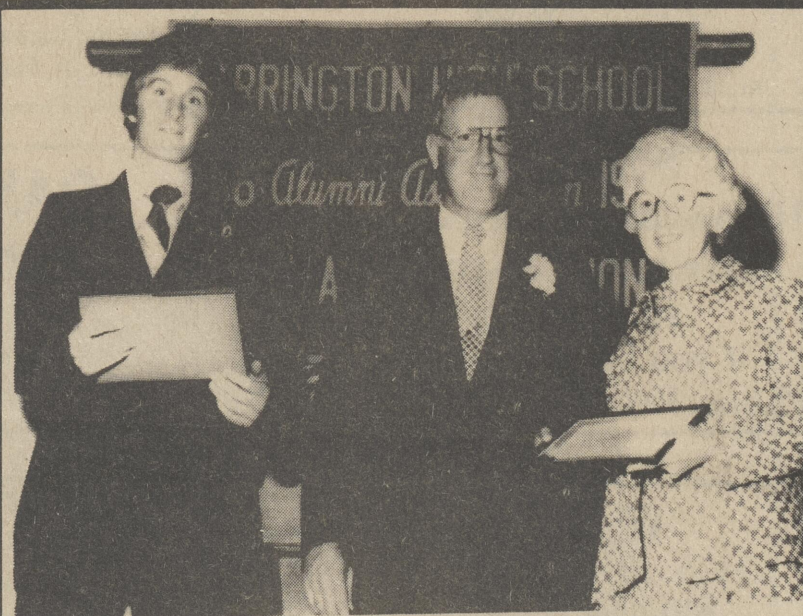
Bridgeville Hikes Sewer Rates

For well over two years now, the Town of Bridgeville has been battling with their industrial or heavy users of the sewer system. On Monday night, the Town Commissioners voted to up the rates based on a recent survey made by Cabe Associates, an engineering firm in Dover.

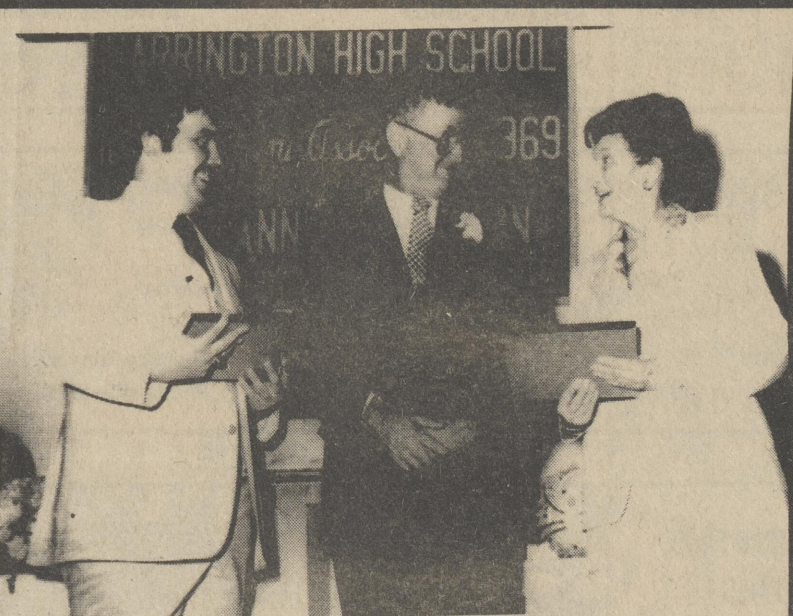
The users of the Town's system will pay a basic rate and then a surcharge for every 1000 gallons of sewage produced. Several current users such as the canning factories and scrapple concerns will definitely be effected by this.

There has been a running battle going on for nearly two years between the Town and Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

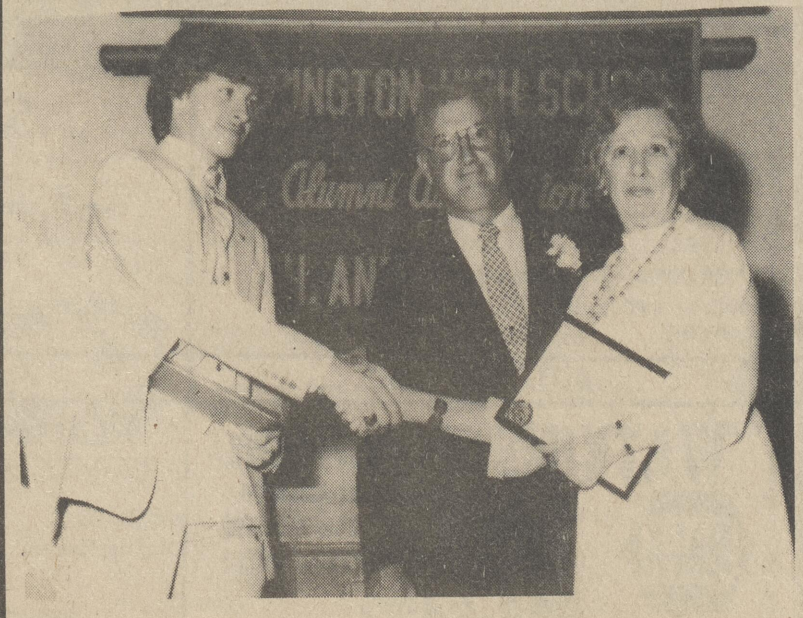
The Town began laying down the law to the companies which were suspected of "over using" the sewer system. The Town was caught between the users and the State Agency. The Town had no other choice, for the State could step in and take severe action against the Town.

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Poppy Days In Harrington

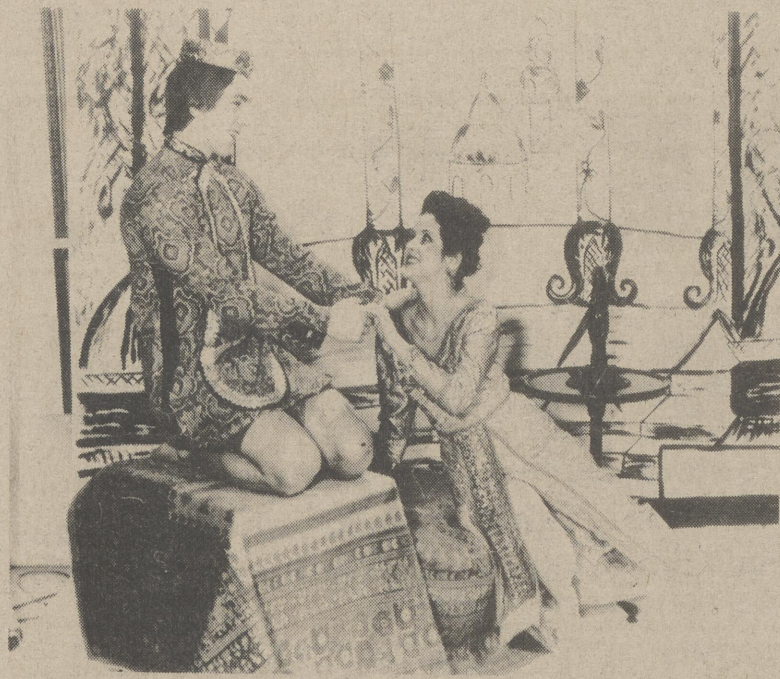
On Thursday and Friday, May 15th and 16th, members of CKRT Post #7 of the American Legion Auxiliary will be asking local citizens to buy a red memorial poppy. People in this county wear the Poppy once a year to signify a feeling of reverence in their hearts for the servicemen who died for America during two World Wars, the Korean War and Vietnam conflict.

In addition to serving as a memorial to the war dead, the poppy helps lighten the burden carried by the men who returned disabled in mind and body. Making poppies gives employment to veterans who otherwise would not be able to earn support for themselves and their families.

Poppy Days provide an annual opportunity for the American public to offer encouragement and support to these men.

The Poppy has become recognized as an appropriate way in which our war dead can be honored while the disabled are rehabilitated. The need for the relief work which poppy funds makes possible, has grown each year. Funds from Poppy Days enable the C.K.R.T. Unit #7, American Legion Auxiliary to meet this need. Dimes and dollars contributed during Poppy Days go directly into the rehabilitation and Child Welfare programs of this Unit. Families aided by Poppy Days funds live in this local

the hiring on the basis of the training and experience the person would receive while working here.

The first suggestion of hiring another officer by Chief McLroy was dropped by the Council without any motion. But after a lengthy executive session, it was reconsidered and passed the motion to hire with Lobo, Wyatt and Dill in favor, Brode opposed, and Harrington and Newman absent.

A similar situation caused budget controversy last year when Patrolman Paul Yannucci, hired with CETA funds, was picked up on the regular force.

In other business the Harrington City Council:

- voted to proceed with action against dangerous buildings on properties owned by Violet Beene and Roland Cashwell. The owners will be given ten days to repair or demolish the structures or they will face fines of up to \$100 a day.
- Another property, owned by Joseph Richardson, is already being demolished. Several others, who appeared at a public hearing to request it, were given an additional 60 days to be in compliance. Questions of building identification and ownership delayed action on two others.

- heard from George Sevast of CATV that the cable TV firm has not dropped Salisbury Channel 16, but just changed it from Channel 4 to Channel 3. Sevast also said the cost for the original 12 channel package (including Channel 16) would remain at \$6.95 but that viewers would have the option of adding six other channels (including a public service channel) for an additional \$1.40 per month.

- voted to advertise for a permanent person to fill the position left vacant at City Hall when Norma Short moved into the spot vacated by Joan Wilson. The City will also hire two part-time summer workers for the office.

procedure he is conducting. The unit can be used in the operating room for such procedures as fracture reduction, hip nailing, gall bladder operation, urology procedures and location of foreign bodies.

Instead of taking several X-rays to determine fracture alignment the surgeon will now be able to view the manipulation of the

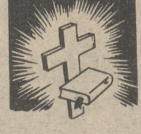

The firm would insist that the property be kept clean and could evict tenants for disruptive behavior or non-payment of rent.

Case-Edwards would be willing to promise to limit the apartments to senior citizens. (It has since been learned that the city cannot legally bind the firm to that promise).

City Manager Dave Peterson said the town's sewer and water system would be able to handle the additional load.

Those who favor the rezoning say the city needs housing of all

kinds, as well as industry. They feel there are senior citizens in this area or those who would come to this area if they could find a secure housing situation that would relieve them of the worry and expense of maintaining their own home. Proponents also point to the additional revenues on our already cramped city budget would realize. Those who have seen similar complexes built by Case-Edwards in other communities have been impressed by their appearance and the way in which they were kept.

Opponents of the rezoning have

argued that the industrial zoning should be preserved because the town needs industry. They have also worried that Case-Edwards would not be able to fill the apartments with senior citizens.

The referendum question will be "Are you in favor of a rezoning from IMP (Industrial Park Manufacturing) to R-4 (multi story apartment) of the property located on the south side and partially adjoining Peck Avenue, across from Dickerson Street consisting of 73 acres more or less, owned by Dudley Willis.

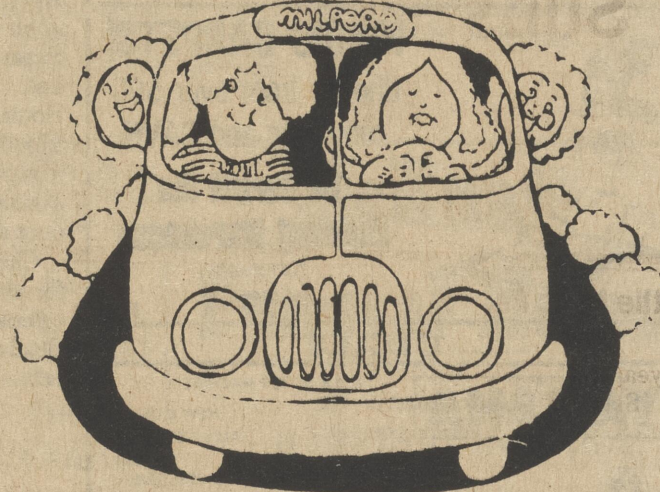

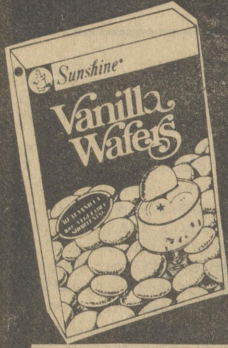

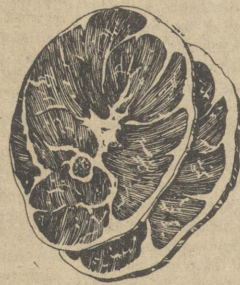
