

Library Friends Approach Levy Court

Members of the Friends of the Harrington Public Library who approached Levy Court last Tuesday in a separate quest learned it may be possible for the Court to set up a library district based on the boarders of the Lake Forest School District without getting a favorable petition signed by 51% of the property owners in the area. But they also

library has an additional three

month lease on life with the city's guarantee of money to complete the fiscal year which will be up September 30. Because the city faces a financial squeeze and because the library serves a community that extends beyond the city limits, supporters feel it is vital to have a broader basis for funding.

If Levy Court holds to its customary requirement of asking for a petition signed by 51% of the property owners in the proposed tax district, library supporters feel their job will be made extremely difficult, if not impossible. Active volunteers for the library are few in number, and the district stretches from Woodside south to Farmington and from Sandtown east to Bowers and Milford.

Precedent for county support for libraries has already been set in funds received by those in Dover, Smyrna and Milford. The Milford Library is supported, in part, by a special tax on district residents.


