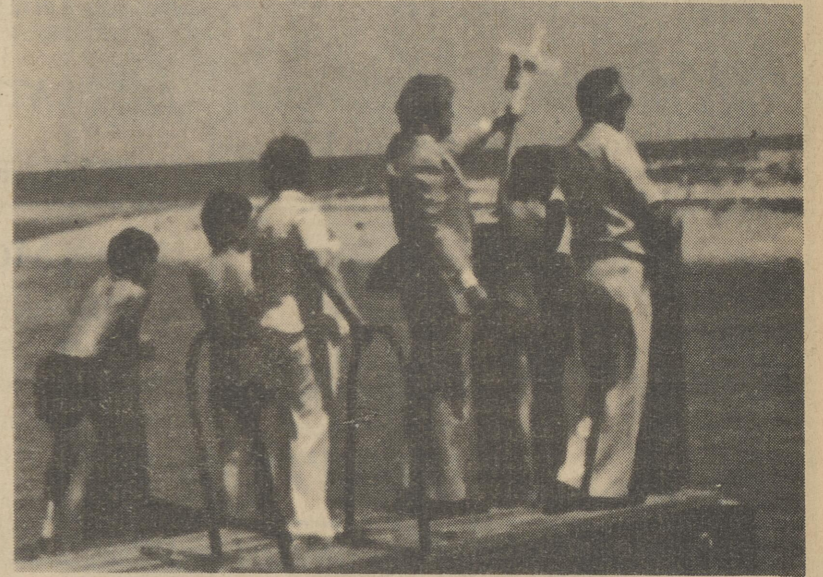
Band also took the stage to entertain during intermission.

Referendum vote is "Yes"

By a better than 3-1 margin Harrington voters who came to the polls last Tuesday indicated their approval of rezoning a parcel of ground in the vicinity of Peck Avenue to allow for the building of a rental apartment complex. The "Yes" vote was 187 to 52 on the referendum set up by the Harrington City Council to

gauge public opinion.

The referendum results are not bending upon Council which still must make the zoning decision. Presumably the matter will be on the agenda at the June 10 regular meeting. This will bring the zoning question through the full circle of a year since it was first proposed in June 1979.

National Water Policy Officials Tour Harrington Facility

On Monday, May 19, a chartered bus carrying 20 of the nation's highest ranking decision makers on water policy toured Laurel, Harrington, the Dover area, and Rising Sun, MD for the purpose of seeing innovative water treatment plants.

Harrington sewage treatment plant falls in this category, which is a plant using mechanic power only in the realm of most economical, and uses natural processes to complete the treatment. Primarily among those in attendance were Dwight Calhoun who is head

of engineering for the Farmers Home Administration, Allen Hais who is head of the Municipal Technology branch of EPA and Larry Newlin who is President Carter's White House Staff and Coordinator of water programs.

The tour was conceived and conducted by Dudley Willis, P.E., a partner in the consulting engineering firm of Edward H. Richardson Associates, Inc. of Newark and Dover. All of the projects shown were designed and engineered by Mr. Willis.

Del. EPA Notes Effect of Mt. St. Helens Fall Out

Delaware air monitoring results indicate that the Mt. St. Helens' volcanic ash cloud that passed over Delaware had a

minor effect on total suspended solids levels at ground level.

Actual values measured on May 15 prior to the appearance of the cloud was 43 microgram/cubic meter while the values measured on May 21 and 22 were 48 and 92 microgram/cubic meter. Mr. Thomas P. Eichler, Director of the Division of Environmental Control, pointed out that these values are well below the Primary Air Quality Standard of 250 microgram/cubic meter established for Total Suspended Solids in Delaware and within the normal variations noted at the monitoring site chosen for this task.

Workers Compensation

A request for a hefty increase in workers compensation rates has been vigorously disapproved, Delaware Insurance Commissioner David H. Elliott announced.

The Delaware Compensation Rating Bureau had filed for a 19.7-percent hike in workers compensation rates. Commissioner Elliott charged that the inflationary request would have cost Delaware employers an approximate \$8-Million in additional premiums.

"This significant increase request would certainly place a

tremendous burden on the business community," Elliott declared, "and especially the small businesses in Delaware at a time when they can least afford it." He said employers in this state have suffered from some significant premium increases in workers compensation that were mandated by law.

The Insurance Commissioner said the workers compensation program has to be better aligned to allow employers to receive a good return on their investment in the protection and care of their employees.

Ronnie will be a June, 1980, graduate of the University of Delaware where he was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society and the Alpha Zeta Professional Agriculture Fraternity. He completes his academic career with a 3.98 academic index with a pre-veterinary/animal science major.

While at Woodbridge High School, Ronnie served as an officer in the Future Farmers of

America, Key Club, National Honor Society, and served as President of the Student Government Association. He was also the recipient of the Valedictorian Award at his high school graduation ceremony.

Ronnie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Noah Cain of Greenwood. Mr. Cain is a retired, outstanding agriculture teacher from the Woodbridge School District. Ronnie and his parents are to be congratulated on his acceptance to Cornell University, where his selection for one of the eighty vacancies in the Class of 1984 was highly competitive.

Library Friends Approach Levy Court

Members of the Friends of the Harrington Public Library who approached Levy Court last Tuesday in a separate quest learned it may be possible for the Court to set up a library district based on the borders of the Lake Forest School District without getting a favorable petition signed by 51% of the property owners in the area. But they also got the feeling such a development is not probable.

County attorney Max Terry told the commissioner and others in attendance the county could set up the library tax district after holding a public hearing. Although it has been customary to ask for the petition, Terry said that it was not a legal requirement.

Library supporters did not get the feeling that the county commissioners were likely to waive the customary petition. But they are still prepared to ask Levy Court to set up such a tax district to help fund the Harrington based library which serves many individuals for beyond the borders of the community in which it is located.

The Harrington Public Library was set up in the summer of 1978 on the offer of a modular building and complete funding for two years from the state. The City of Harrington provided the land and set up an Advisory Council to oversee library affairs. After the state funding ends in July the library has an additional three

month lease on life with the city's guarantee of money to complete the fiscal year which will be up September 30. Because the city faces a financial squeeze and because the library serves a community that extends beyond the city limits, supporters feel it is vital to have a broader basis for funding.

If Levy Court holds to its customary requirement of asking for a petition signed by 51% of the property owners in the proposed tax district, library supporters feel their job will be made extremely difficult, if not impossible. Active volunteers for the library are few in number, and the district stretches from Woodside south to Farmington and from Sandtown east to Bowers and Milford.

Precedent for county support for libraries has already been set in funds received by those in Dover, Smyrna and Milford. The Milford Library is supported, in part, by a special tax on district residents.
