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Rain or shine - Commencement is Sunday

Commencement exercises for the Class of 1980 at Lake Forest High School are scheduled for this Sunday, June 8, when the processional begins as approximately 230 seniors mark the closing moments and the climax of their high school career. Weather permitting, commencement will be held in the football stadium. But weather will not be permitted to change the date. Plans have been made to move graduation inside to the new auditorium should rain make an outdoor ceremony impossible. In that event only parents (or those holding the tickets allotted to each senior for his parents) could be admitted.

Four top ranking students in the graduating class have been selected to address their classmates, parents and teachers. This year's Valedictorian is Lou Ann Jackson; the Salutatorian is Jaqueline Moffett. The third and fourth honors addresses will be delivered by Lisa Bostick and Martin Ellingsworth, respectively.

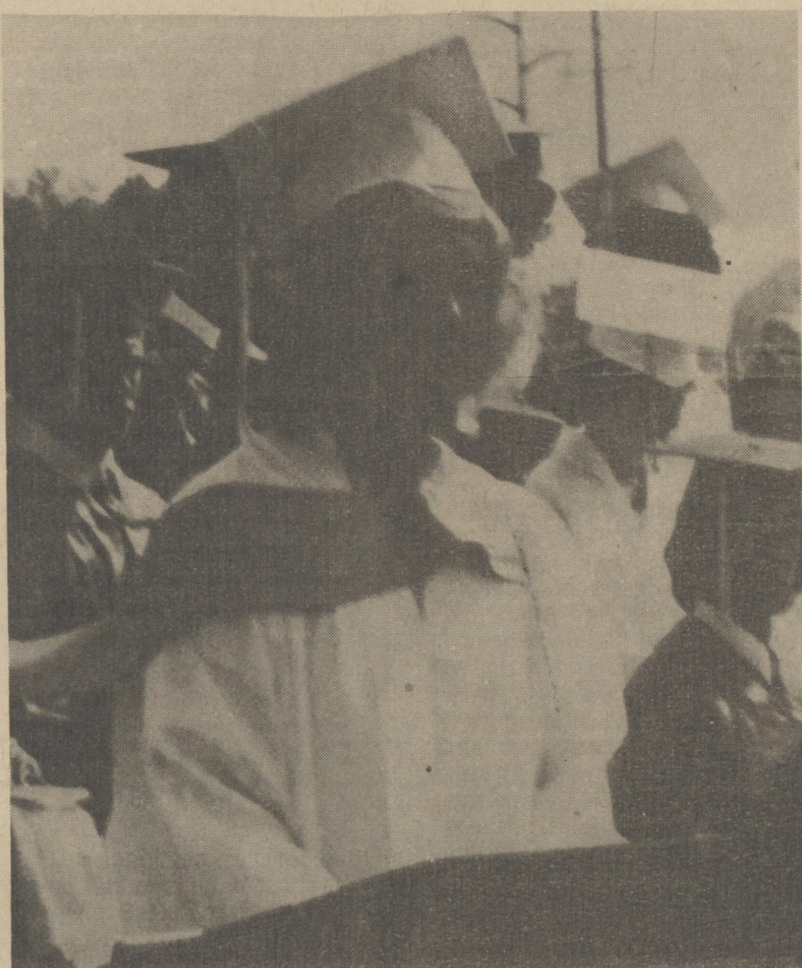
The baccalaureate address to the graduates is to be given by the Reverend Joseph E. Brame, Pastor of St. Paul's A.M.E. Church in Harrington. The Rev. Lawrence Berry of Felton will deliver the invocation; the Reverend C. Jackson Robinson of Asbury United Methodist Church in Harrington, the benediction.

Lake Forest Superintendent of Schools William E. Cline will present the 1980 graduating class to School Board President Albert Price who will award the diplomas.

In keeping with the idea of commencement (a beginning), the Senior Chorus will sing the class song "We've Only Just Begun". The Lake Forest High School Band under the direction of Dale Burkhart will provide processional and recessional music as well as accompaniment for the singing of the Alma Mater.

-Awards Assembly-
Seniors who received scholarships, awards and other honors will be recognized in the printed commencement program. A

separate awards assembly has been set for this evening, June 4th, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lake Forest High School Auditorium.

School ordered closed

Last Tuesday night the Milford School Board voted (5-2) to close the West Elementary School in Houston. The Board claims it cost \$60,000 annually to keep the school open. The two dissenting votes were cast by Jack Walls and Betty Jo Carter while Board members Raymond Stoops, who heads up the school buses in Lake Forest and Dr. William Warren, a high school teacher at Lake Forest voted to close the Houston School and the Morris School in Lincoln thereby breaking a previously deadlocked Board.

Calvin V. Hollis, III a resident of Houston and a plant supervisor at the Burreis Plant in Harrington led the assault to save the little school that everyone there loves, but in the end, his mission fell

short. Before he went down to defeat at the hands of the unsympathetic school board, he leveled certain options at the Board which had economic merit. These options were: 1. close the administrative building and move those offices to the middle school; at a savings of \$12,000; 2. close a wing of middle school at a savings of \$9,000; 3. close the Morris School in Lincoln and move to Banneker and Ross at a savings of \$34,500; 4. close West and Morris and move to Middle School at a savings of \$48,000 as a temporary measure; and 5. close West and Morris and move all 4th graders to Middle School with K through 3rd grade to Banneker and Ross. These were solid arguments

The 33rd Annual Chicken Festival opens this Friday in Milford. The festivities will kick off around 3:00 p.m. on Friday, but the official opening is around 5:00. It will be at the Milford High School.

Among the festivities and activities, the celebrated cooking contest will have among its finalists Mrs. Clarabel Walls of near Wheeler's Park in Harrington. She has been a finalist four of

the last eight years. In 1972 she placed 3rd with a recipe for preparing chicken livers.

She claims her interest in cooking really became pronounced through her three daughters who started cooking in 4-H during the middle '50's. She has a son who is a Dover attorney and a member of the Kent County Attorney General's Office assigned to the Family Court.

Felton Hires 2 Police Officers

The town of Felton will be assured a full 80 hours of police protection a week with the hiring of two new police officers - Howard Gaines and Ronald Fortin - at Monday night's Council meeting. Gaines and Fortin replace former Police Chief John Bartch and Patrolman Burt Behan, both of whom have resigned.

With his graduation from the Police Academy on May 23, Mike Olliver, hired under the CETA program, has been promoted to Police Chief. He will provide 40 of the 80 hours of police protection. The other officers will share the remaining 40.

Already on the job keeping streets clean, grass cut on city property and doing various maintenance chores is William

Tribbitt, also hired under the CETA program.

-Complaints-

Several citizen complaints surfaced at the Council meeting. Ponies stabled near his property brought one person to ask the Council for action to get them removed. He claimed the animals are not the property of a Felton resident, but are being boarded on the property. Felton has no ordinance forbidding the keeping of horses or ponies in the town limits. But the Council promised to talk to the owner of the ponies to see if an equitable arrangement can be made.

Other complaints centered on dogs running loose and motorcycles driven recklessly. The Council voted that both the dog catcher and the SPCA have been notified and some dogs have been picked up. Local police will be asked to check on the motorcycle problem.

Houston Electors May Seek Lake Forest District

Last Tuesday night the Milford School Board voted to close two schools in their district - Morris School in Lincoln and West Elementary in Houston. Harry Towers and Calvin V. Hollis, III led the attack against the School Board to save the little school

where quality education has prepared many for advanced education.

Both men put forth arguments smacking in economic saving measures as well as proof that small schools preserve quality education. In closing both schools, the Board is closing the use of properties valued at one and one half million dollars.

The members of the Houston PTO are considering many options open to them. They have pointed out that the Houston School District borders the Woodbridge and Lake Forest School Districts. They would consider as one option joining either district namely Lake Forest. This would mean a gain of tax revenue for the Lake Forest district which state authorities might favor since Harrington seeks funds to support its library which residents from Houston and near Houston use; as well as the fact that Lake Forest is the largest school district in the state. It could handle the situation. Houston is four miles east of Harrington.

A national organization known as PURE, Parents United For Rural Education, which started in Iowa then spread to 17 other states including neighboring may come to Houston's sympathetic plea. PURE's main theme is preservation of rural values and better education from smaller schools.

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A Special Man in My Life

Many years ago, in the thirty's, when I was a tiny little girl, I lived with my grandparents in a lonely old farmhouse in Maryland. Holidays were a very special time for me, especially Christmas time. I always knew that soon, someone special would be coming to visit me. Since I did not know what day it would be, I would pull a chair up to the window and watch down the road as far as I could see, looking for a car to come into sight. In that car, I knew that there would be many beautiful gifts for me. Also, a SPECIAL man, my step-father.

When the day finally came and the car was there, this SPECIAL man would get out carrying a rather large brown paper bag. He would pick me up and hug and kiss me and give me that brown bag. Inside there was so much penny candy, it would make any little girls eyes as big as saucers! Sometimes, he would tease me and leave that bag in the car. My heart would drop. Did he forget? Then he would laugh and pick me up and tell me he had forgotten something in the car. He would carry me out and get my bag of candy. No, he never forgot!

For days after he was gone, I would carry that bag around everywhere I went, until it was all twisted and wrinkled and every piece of that candy was gone. One Christmas in particular, he brought me a sled and a beautiful red snowsuit with white fur on the hood. I remember feeling so rich and pretty in that snowsuit.

It wasn't easy in those years, growing up as an illegitimate child. Whenever my grandmother would get angry with me, she would tell me that no one wanted me and if it wasn't for her that I wouldn't even be here. That my mother was going to drown me when I was born. I would go off alone and say to myself, Lester wants me, he loves me, he brings me candy. Somehow, it helped. When I started school, the kids would tease me and say I didn't have a father. I invented a story about this SPECIAL man that saved me much embarrassment; I would tell them that my father lived in a big house in Harrington and that he came for me every summer. I told that story many many times during my childhood.

A few years later, this man was discarded from my family and I was not to see him for quite some time. Although, I never forgot him! When I was older and living near Harrington, I had orders not to speak to him or talk to him. I did though, every chance I got. He always knew where I was working and would come to see me there. He would hug and kiss me and ask how I was. Tears would come in his eyes and I would feel like that same little girl again.

Last October, when I visited him, he hugged me as usual and we laughed and talked about my bag of candy. We had become very close again and wrote each other almost every week. We had planned for him to spend some time with me. He was just an ordinary person, but he played a SPECIAL part in my life. That SPECIAL man is gone now. To his friends he was always known as, Lep. His name was Lester Emory. I will always remember him with love. They say it is a sin to take ones own life. I know that he was a sinner like all the rest of us, but, in my heart, I believe that it is ONE sin that he did not commit. Please Dear God, hear my prayers and want him the way that he made me feel wanted.

which will be used again if West Elementary PTO President Ann Southard with a vote of that organization elects to appeal the decision of the Milford School Board to the State Board of Education.

Hollis also offered arguments that a recent survey showed that if the schools closed across the country only 2% of those closed actually saved money, for the money in turn was spent elsewhere in their districts. He pointed out that "...removing students long distances causes a

decrease in learning." He agreed that removing the school from Houston would have a detrimental effect on property values in the community.

The Board's decision may not be complete as Hollis pointed out, because the State owns the school property and by law the school board must keep a janitor at half time, keep the heat on at minimum and save lights burning. The replacement cost of West Elementary is estimated at \$700,000 and Lincoln School at \$850,000.

Harold Schabinger has been a Director of the Peoples Bank since 1952, and a customer of the bank since the mid '40's. At the age of 88, Mr. Schabinger still leads a very active life. He was born where he lives now on a farm just north of Felton on U.S. 13 which has 250 acres. "The original house burned in '34, and we rebuilt then", said Mr. Schabinger.

ector because it puts him in contact "...with some mighty nice people. We have a good association and the other Directors are very cooperative." He says the bank and its Directors look to take care of the local people. Many of the Directors are farmers or oriented that way "...because we are in an agricultural community, but if things change...and nobody knows for sure...but if they were to hit oil around here, it might change everything around. Land has already become too expensive to pasture stock on. You must till and keep the stock penned up. I don't believe on the other hand that land values have peaked out yet. We still feel land is a good investment." He added that farming is big business today. He has seen a lot of changes in farming since he was a boy "...particularly in the methods which produce more yields with less tilling."

He sees a lot of growth for the bank in the future "...but we have to screen our loans carefully. We bend where we can."

Mr. Schabinger was a member of the State Legislature in '36 and '37 (D - old 8th Dist.). He was Democrat Chairman and Committeeman from the 8th District. He worked at the State Bureau of Markets, spent seven years on the William Henry School Board in Dover, a Director of the Delaware State Fair for 40 years and a member of its executive committee. He has been a Director at Milford Memorial Hospital for the last 30 years. He says he drives day or night "...been smoking since I was 18, and my wife and I stay up to see Johnny Carson. I still have time to look after my farms, although someone else works them." Asked about the presidential election in November "...well it will be an interesting one." Harold Schabinger, 88, a friendly man from the "Friendly Bank"...The Peoples Bank of Harrington.

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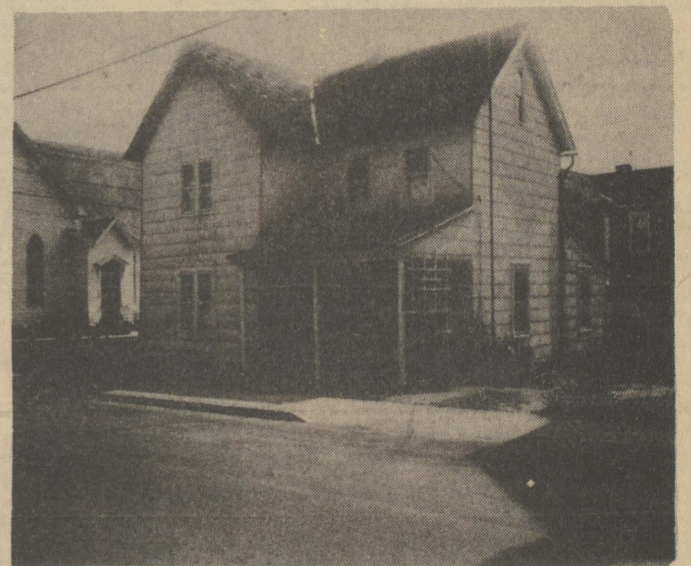

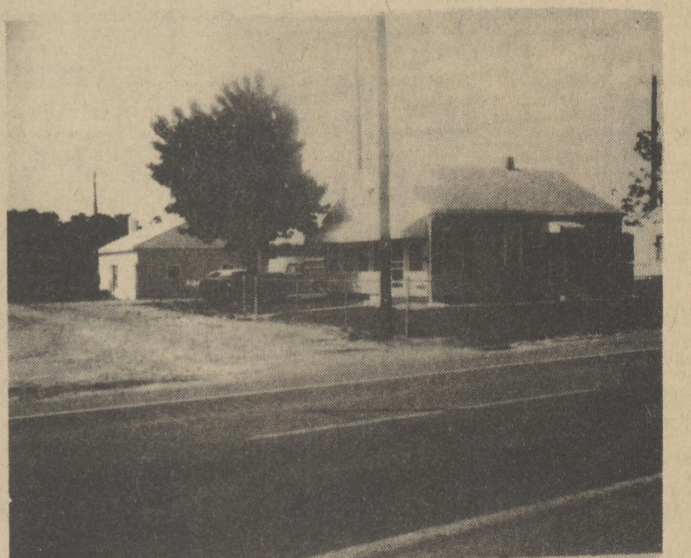
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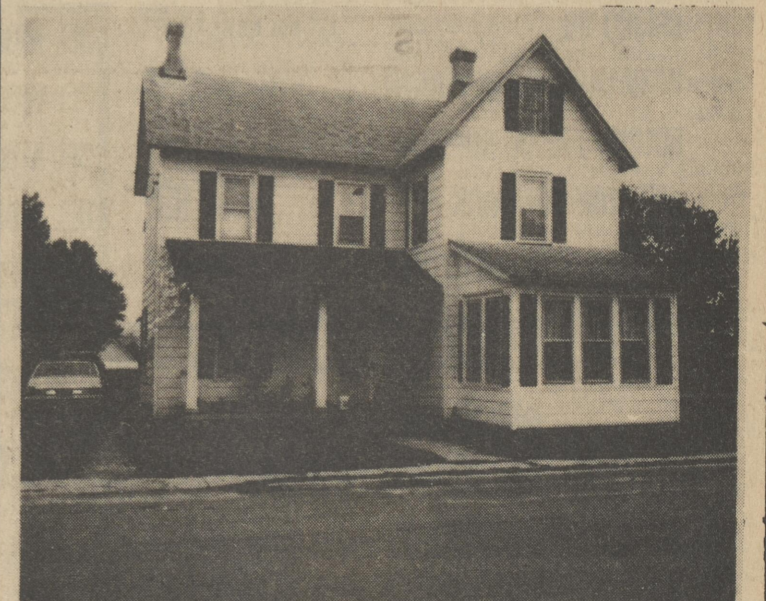

Mrs. Walls' winning recipe this year is of Chinese extraction and it will be cooked in a Wok, which is a deep oval in nature pan. "I wanted to enter this contest because it was in Milford and close to home. They also suggested an unusual recipe, which I think this is", said Mrs. Walls. She said her family has always been associated with chickens for production and profit as well as a main entry course. "It was always easy to prepare...a good economical food...as well as being high on proteins", said Mrs. Walls. "My father was one of the first farmers to raise broilers for the market. He even sold live birds at his place of business...Peck's Southern States on Hanley St." added Mrs. Walls. Her brothers Tom and Charles Peck carry on that tradition by operating as Peck Bros. Southern States in Harrington.

The following is Mrs. Walls' winning recipe:

- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon red wine vinegar
- ½ teaspoon salt

In wok, place oil and heat over medium-high heat until hot. Add chicken and stir-fry about four minutes. Add

scallions, garlic and ginger; stir-fry one minute. Stir in tomato, soy sauce, Worcestershire sauce, sugar, wine vinegar and alt; turn heat to low and partially cover the wok. Simmer, stirring often, about 12 minutes or until fork can be inserted in chicken with ease. Makes four servings.

Thoughts From Washington

America's trade deficit over the past two years has been larger than the budget deficit. At least when there's a budget deficit, we can say we've been spending too much money on Americans. But, when there's a trade deficit, we've been letting too many dollars go overseas.

That trend must be reversed. It's time the U.S. had an economic policy geared towards achieving economic growth at home. Instead of foreign cars being sold in America, I want American cars sold overseas.

A bill introduced by Senator Adlai Stevenson (D-Ill.) and I takes on this complex and comprehensive problem. The bill is unique because it represents the work of the 65-member Senate Export Caucus that Senator Stevenson and I spearheaded, and also because it's an attempt to establish export policy by the Congress, not the executive branch.

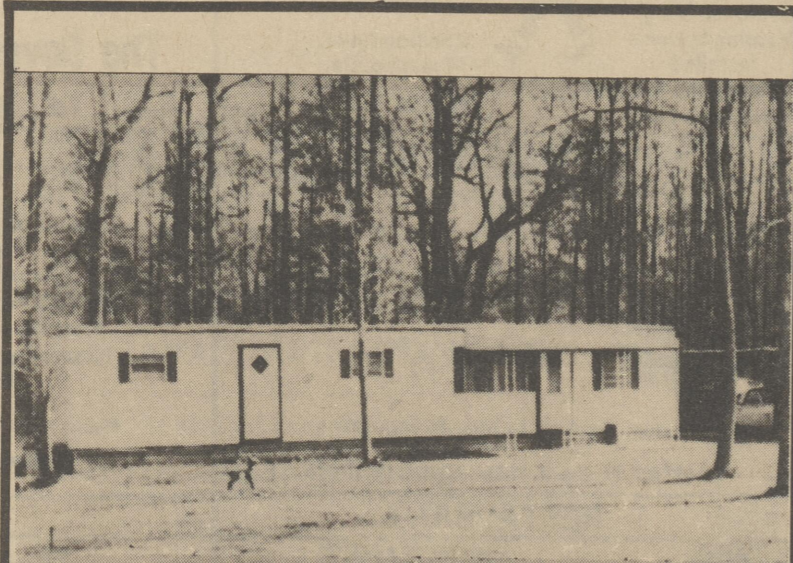
The National Export Policy Act puts exports on the front burner. It establishes a national export policy, increases export financing and creates new incentives for exports.

The Roth-Stevenson Act puts all the concerns and recommendations about exports in one place. For the first time, we can see the whole picture.

Expansion of exports belongs at the top of our goals, right along with national security. Without a strong economy at home, we cannot have a strong defense abroad. The Export Policy Act would provide the tools we so desperately need to improve our world trade position and help us compete with some of today's major trading partners—some that we helped build.

Our legislation would aid port cities such as Wilmington and it would help create greater exports of Delaware's poultry industry.

What we're trying to do is use trade as an engine to create economic health at home, to create new jobs which are so badly needed in the decade of the 80s.

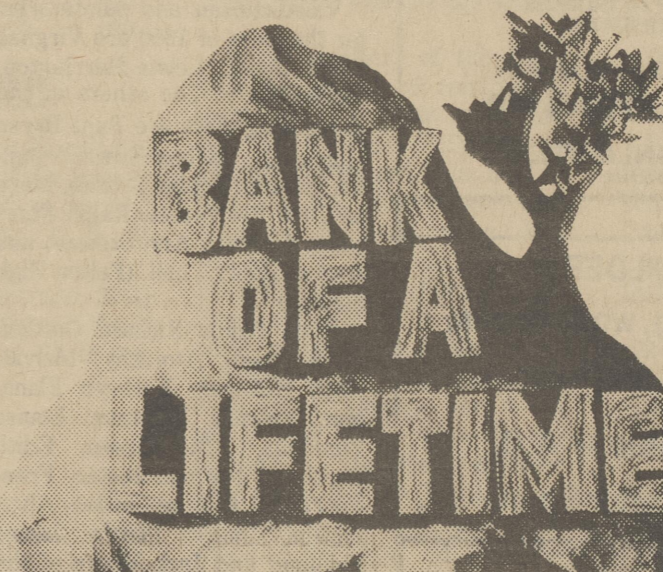
