## Felton Man Sentenced In Child Beating

A Felton man, Earl Henry Hawkins, was sentenced on Friday, June 20th, to five years in prison in the near fatal beating of his four year old son. Superior Court Judge George R. Wright called it "tragic...and unique".

The child suffered a fractured skull, 13 broken ribs and a cerebral concussion and many weeks in the intensive care unit of the Delaware Division. The child was also burned over his body. He is in a foster home now and regaining his strength where he can now see and feed himself. The child, Earl Henry Hawkins, Jr., suffers brain damage.

The father was discharged from the Air Force due to an in-service accident when an airplane propeller struck the senior Hawkins in the head causing brain damage.

There were other indications that the child had been severely beaten in the past. According to Kent General Hospital and police spokesman, Mr. Hawkins had taken the child to the hospital as early as November 13 of last year for injuries to the boy. It was suspected then that child abuse was the cause. Mr. Hawkins was on prescription drugs for his in service accident. He was not employed at the time of the attack on the boy, and his wife was expecting a second child. He was depressed according to his attorney, Edward R. McNamara of Brown, Shiels & Barros of Dover. Hawkins, now in prison at Delaware Correctional Center, is responding to drug rehabilitation.

## Fire Destroys Oil Truck, Loading Platform

Quick action by local fire companies combined with a favorable wind brought a potentially explosive fire Tuesday morning quickly under control. The fire started shortly before 8:30 a.m., when diesel fuel ignited as a tank truck was being filled on the loading platform at Passwaters Petroleum, located at the intersection of U.S. 13 and Rt. 116 south of Harrington. Both the loading platform and the truck were a total loss, but the fire did not spread to five huge storage tanks nearby which were scorched, but did not ignite. The tanks contained about 140,000 gallons of gasoline, diesel fuel and kerosene.

According to Ray Passwaters, company owner, the fire started when diesel fuel spilled over onto the tanker's hot muffler as he was loading it. Passwaters turned off all valves and got out of the area immediately. Two companies, Farmington and Harrington, were on the scene within minutes, turning their first attention to hosing down the storage tanks

because fire was already encroaching upon that area.

In short order companies from Felton, Houston and Greenwood were called to beef up a firefighting force that Harrington Fire Chief Bob Taylor later in the day said amounted to as many as 50 men and 20 pieces of equipment on the scene. Taylor also said the wind out of the southwest kept flames and heat away from the storage tanks and helped avert a much more disastrous development.

As it was, there were no injuries, and the fire, according to Taylor, was brought under control within 40 minutes. Protein foam was used to extinguish the flames.

Thankful for the favorable wind, Taylor had words of praise for Ray Passwaters who he said runs a clean operation and who acted quickly and appropriately under the circumstances.

Area firefighters themselves came in for some praise from Delaware Deputy Fire Marshall

Richard R. Ward who commended their prompt action which confined the fire to the loading platform and the tanker.

Cause of the fire was still under investigation, and there was no final word on the financial extent of the damage. But Passwaters made a quick estimate of \$40,000.

Although the fire was quickly brought under control, firemen remained on the scene until noon. As late as 11 a.m., the fuel in the tanker was still boiling from the intense heat which melted the truck's tires.

While the five fire companies were involved, they were covered by others in neighboring communities. Frederica covered for Harrington, Milford for Houston, Camden-Wyoming for Felton, and Bridgeville for Greenwood. A second alarm in Harrington did occur while local fire fighters were busy with the blaze at Passwaters Petroleum. But it turned out to be an equipment malfunction at Delmar Packaging.

## Almost Anything Goes At Felton Street Fair

It's Felton Street Fair time again, and "Almost Anything Goes" in competition between the Felton United Methodist Youth groups and similar groups from Harrington, Greensboro and Camden-Wyoming. The competition, according to fair organizer Bobby Draper, is a new wrinkle added to Felton's annual event which has been going on now for 27 years.

This Saturday, June 28, is the date. Festivities are set to begin with the traditional parade at 11:30 a.m. Line-up for the parade is at 11 a.m. out on the Viola Road. From there the route proceeds down Nile Street, turning right at the intersection with Main Street. It will finish up at the bank parking lot. Fire companies and the Lake Forest High School Band will take part, and both Miss and Little Miss Felton and Miss and Little Miss Lake Forest will be featured.

Most of the other fair activities will begin at 12 noon. Booths will offer various items, edible and otherwise for sale. Children of all ages will look forward to fire truck rides. Those who want to try their aim may be successful at giving any one of a series of clowns a sudden cool dip.

Highlighting the menu for the day will be the popular funnel cake and the annual fried chicken dinner prepared by the United Methodist Women and the Willing Workers. The latter will begin at 4 p.m. and continue until 7.

The "Almost Anything Goes" competition previously mentioned

will include obstacle course races, running relays and an egg toss. This portion of the Fair begins at 2 p.m. and will last about an hour and a half. It will be held in the field between Lake Forest North elementary School and the Methodist parsonage. Spectators are welcome and will find there is no charge for joining the ranks of the sideline coaches.

The Felton Street Fair was organized under the inspiration of Mrs. Clara Henry 27 years ago. Two years ago, on its silver

anniversary, the Fair was dedicated to her memory.

Although it is a project of the Felton United Methodist Church, the Fair is made possible through the support of many community members and organizations. Proceeds go into the church's building fund which is currently being used to renovate some Sunday school classrooms.

Bobby Draper said visitors are welcome and are encouraged to spend the entire, fun-filled summer Saturday in Felton.

## Woodbridge To Try Breakfast Program

Following in the steps of a number of other school districts in the state, the Woodbridge School District will offer a federally supported breakfast program beginning in September 1980. The Woodbridge School Board at a special meeting Monday night decided to try the program for one year.

The decision came after Board members heard the breakfast program has the support of the Bridgeville PTA, the Greenwood PTA and the Title I Parents Advisory Committee. In addition, Assistant Principal Dr. Robert Sutton told the Board a survey conducted among parents, faculty, staff and administrators turned up 286 responses of which 69% were favorable.

-Xerox Decisions Bring Friction-

In action which sparked some friction between board members and Superintendent Dr. William Griffin, the Board approved the purchase of a Xerox 3100 copier, a bargain at \$2,791, from the Seaford School District, but turned down a proposal to spend over \$11,000 on a new Xerox 3109.

The 3100, used for three years by Seaford before it was discovered that the district needs a much larger copier, will be placed in the North Bridgeville Elementary School.

Dr. Griffin also proposed the purchase of a new 3109 to go in district offices, replacing the larger capacity 2400 which would then be moved to the Greenwood school where there is no working copier.

Dr. Griffin said the transfer of

state fuel allocation funds back into the Division II category, which had been drained to pay fuel bills, would make it possible to make a down payment of about \$4,500, almost half the cost of the machine. But, he said, instant action was needed because Division II funds go back to the state if they are not spent by June 30.

It was this pressure for immediate action on a major equipment purchase that caused the friction. In a briefly heated exchange, long-standing member William Tull told Dr. Griffin he did not appreciate having to make such a major decision on short notice with no time to explore alternatives.

Board member Norma Prettyman said she would have felt more comfortable with the decision if comparison figures between various models had been offered.

## Ex-Council Member Guilty

A former Town Council member for Magnolia, Janet M. Kanoy (42), has pleaded guilty to theft of town monies. Mrs. Kanoy, a mother of three maintained her innocence to the end, but finally pleaded guilty agreeing to make restitution in the amount of \$21,000 over an eight year probation period. The state prosecutors nor the judge asked for a jail sentence.

In 1978, when a new Council took over, the bookkeeping and accounting systems were found in total disarray. According to one

source "...it was unaccountable". Mrs. Kanoy moved from Magnolia into a new house at Andrews Lake, and the new Council and Town Clerk discovered the discrepancies. Investigators later discovered that Mrs. Kanoy played Bingo at fire companies at Magnolia, Frederica, Milford and Felton as much as five times a week. It is believed that she dipped into the town funds to meet her Bingo losses. At first, she may have replaced the losses but as time went on she got further in debt.

At one point in February 1978 when the new Council was formed, the new members discovered hundreds of checks missing and about \$53,000 in money unaccounted. One investigator said "she was a person the town trusted. She was permitted to handle all the funds without question." She claimed she was a victim of small town politics and small town inefficiencies. Investigators were able to show where revenue sharing checks, state and street fund monies were deposited to proper accounts but then drawn out and deposited to the general account. She was believed to have acted alone and was the sole recipient and beneficiary of the plan.

## Adams Named Executive Director

Mrs. Kenna McKnatt Adams of Commerce St., Harrington was named on June 9th as the Executive Director of the Harrington Chamber of Commerce by a committee of the Chamber. Mrs. Adams is taking the part time job designed to help build the Chamber into an active group. She has a full time job as a special education teacher in the Lake Forest School District for the

reading program in the three schools. She holds an Associate Arts Degree from Wesley College.

"I plan to feel my way along. I understand they want to revamp the dues. I will be operating out of my home", said Mrs. Adams. She is married to David Adams. They have two children, Dana (12) and Kelly (10).

## City Hires New Typist

After interviewing several candidates Monday night, the Harrington City Council hired Michelle Williams of Frederica as typist on the city office staff. Ms. Williams will fill a post left vacant since City Clerk Norma Short moved into the spot left open by Joan Wilson's resignation in the spring.

Also beefing up the office staff, but only on a temporary basis are two young ladies hired until August 15 through the CETA program. They are Theresa Smith and Mary Etta Speicher, both of Harrington.

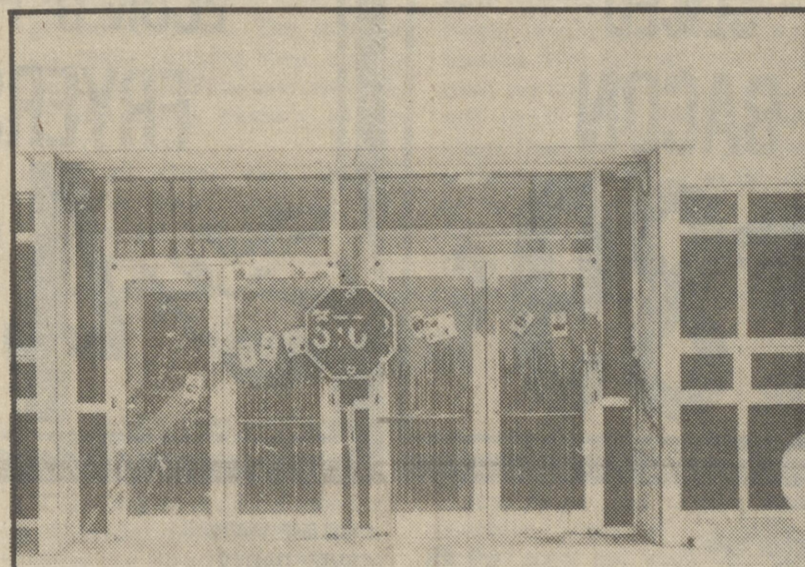

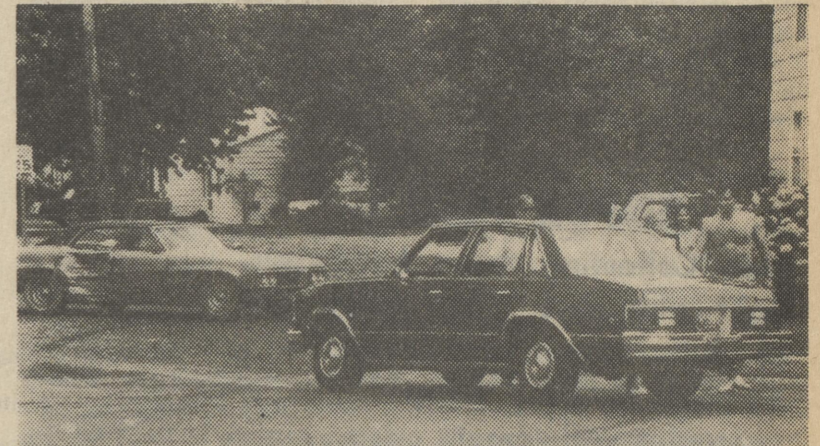
## Greenbaugh Receives Masters

John and Betty will be moving in August to Charlottesville, Virginia where John will attend the Judge Advocate General's Corps Graduate Class for ten months.

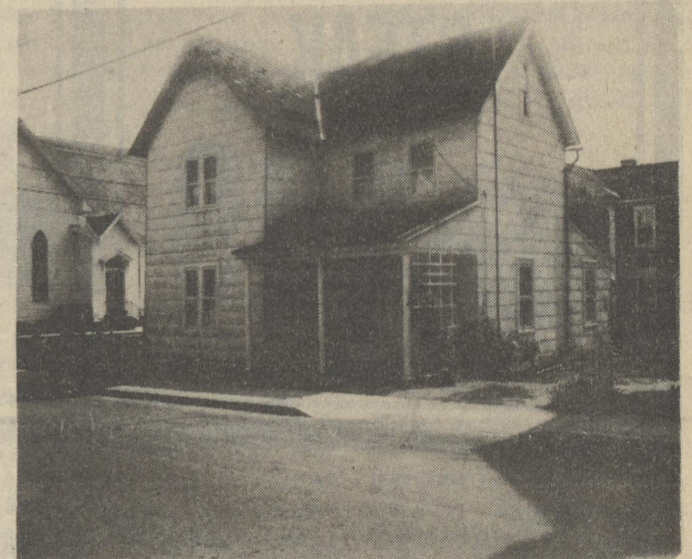

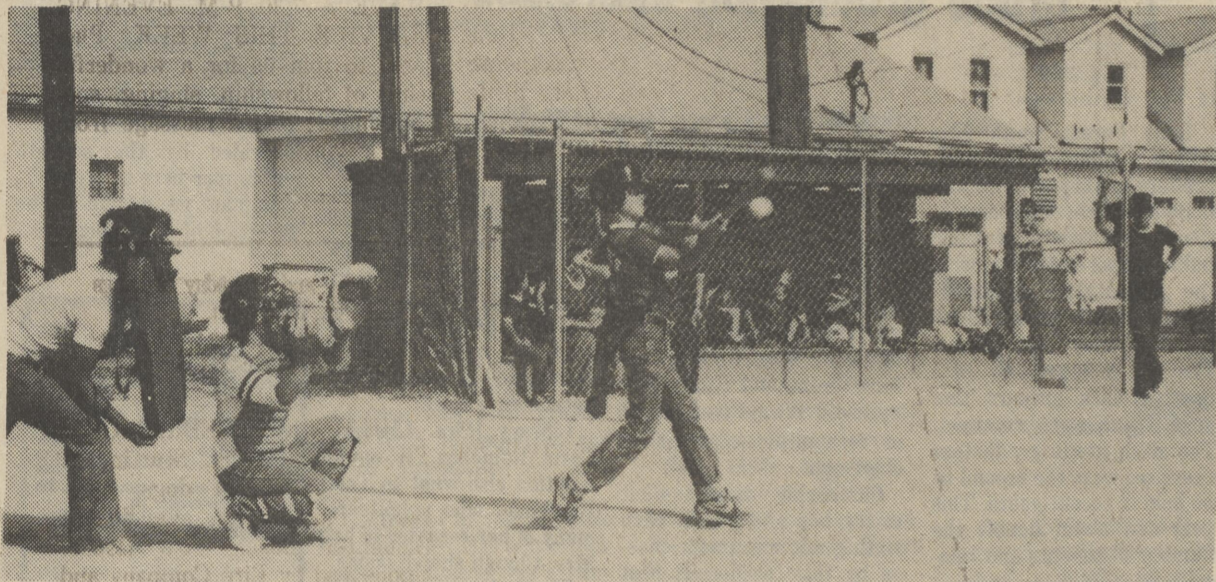

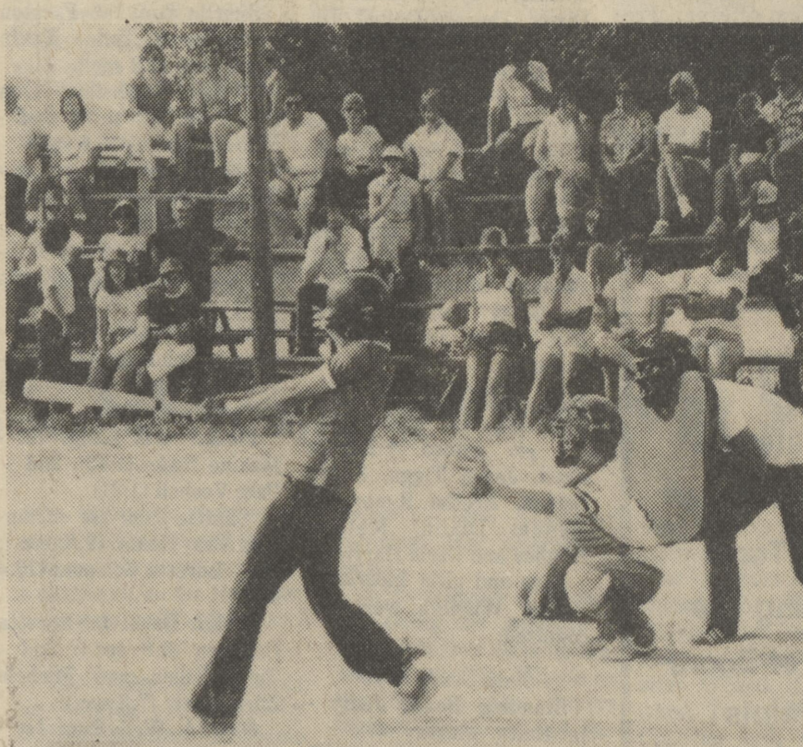

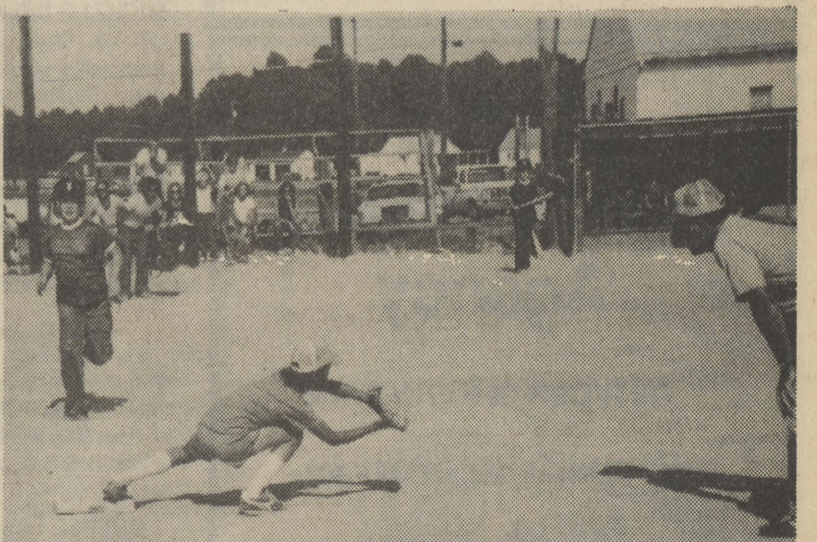

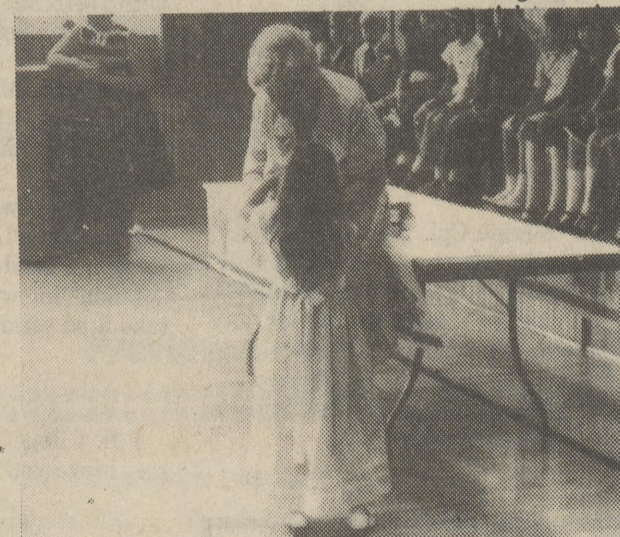

### Aviation Incident

A Milton man crashed at 2:30 p.m. today while flying his home-built motorized hang glider. Douglas L. Miller, 30, of RD #2 Box 177, Milton, had bought a one man motorized hang glider in kit form from the Eipper Company. Today, after Mr. Miller had strapped himself under the wing, an unidentified companion pulled the rope starter on the single cylinder engine. Mr. Miller taxied across an open field and became airborne within 100 feet. He continued to gain altitude as he flew into the wind. Approximately three-quarters of a mile from his point of departure, after ascending to an altitude of 80 feet, he turned downwind. In so doing he lost the lift developed by the wind passing under the wing. The hand glider suddenly fell through some trees and into a mobile home court 1000 feet south of Route 22, Longneck Road, and four miles west of Massey's Landing. The engine continued to run after the crash and had to be shut off by a resident of Julia's Place Trailer Court. Mr. Miller was taken to the Beebe Hospital, Lewes, in a Mid-Sussex Rescue Squad ambulance. He was admitted with lacerations, head contu-

sions, and a possible fractured skull. There were no other reported injuries. The Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board were notified and, although the hang glider is not considered an aircraft, will file an incident report of the crash.

### Armed Forces

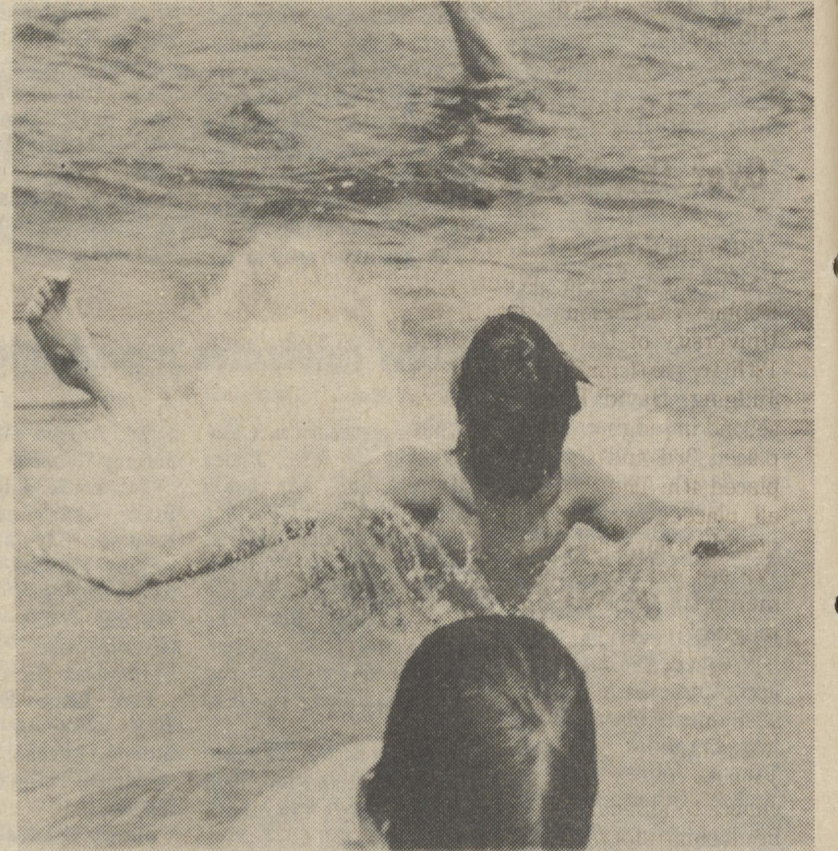

The "Winning isn't everything, it's the only thing" philosophy is fine for professional athletes who have so much at stake, but shouldn't be drilled into the heads of adolescents as the only reason to compete. Parents who lose track of this could only harm their child and perhaps drive him away from athletics. Remember, it's only a game.

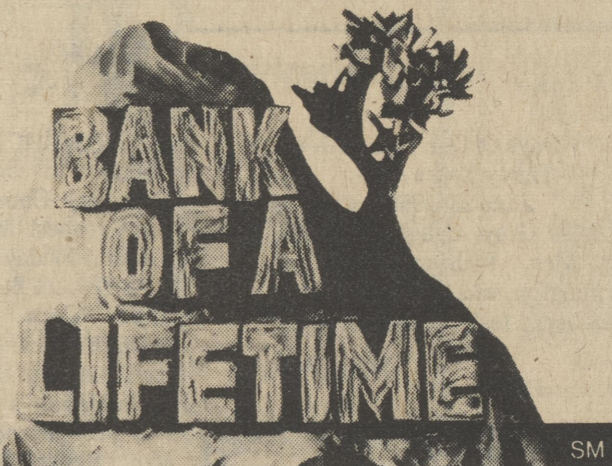

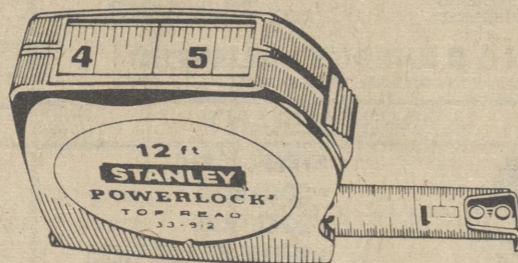

## Area Student Named To Governor's School

Governor DuPont has announced the name of an additional student from *The Harrington Journal's* area of coverage who will attend the 1980 Governor's School for Excellence, July 13-19, at the University of Delaware.

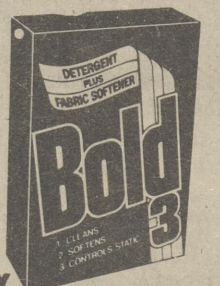
