

Disaster Drill To Be Held This Week

The Office of Emergency Services of the Division of Public Health will conduct a simulated disaster drill sometime prior to August 31, 1980. This year's simulation, run in cooperation with the Kent County Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council, involves participation from Kent General, Milford and Dover AFB hospitals. Other agencies involved are the Civil Air Patrol, Delaware State Police, Kent County volunteer fire departments, the Kent County Callboard, the Office of Emergency Operations and Planning, and a number of local volunteer ambulance squads.

The simulated disaster is expected to create at least 60 victims who will be separated, or triaged, according to severity of injury from the disaster site to participating

The aim of the drill is to evaluate the Emergency Medical Service system in Kent County. The hospitals are required by the Joint Commission for the Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) to hold one such drill each year as one of the prerequisites for JCAH approval.

At this time it might be a good reminder to students and parents that riding a school bus is a privilege and that a student can lose that privilege if bus rules and regulations are not obeyed. Everytime a bus student violates the rules and distracts the driver, it endangers everyone on the bus.

We do not like suspending a child's privilege of riding the bus, but we must think of the safety of all the students on the bus, as well as the motoring public.

Parents and students should also be reminded that school bus routes change from year to year. Declining enrollment has caused us to cancel two bus contracts this year. Such changes may cause students to walk to a bus route because it no longer goes down their road.

State regulations require that a student live one-half mile or more from a bus route before a bus is required to come down the road to pick him up. Also, students in grades K-6 must live beyond one mile from school before they are eligible for bus transportation; students in grades 7-12 must live two miles or more to be eligible for transportation.

All Lake Forest bus drivers have been given the names and phone numbers of new students on their buses and are to call such students. If parents or students have any questions, please call the proper school, as they all have route maps and phone numbers of the bus contractors and drivers.





public use at times when they are not required for regularly scheduled school activities. The school district is requesting that tennis shoes only be worn while playing on the courts. The school district is presently engaged in obtaining cost estimates for lighting, and there should be enough money available to make this possible.


The total cost of the tennis courts so far has been \$78,375,

shared 50/50 by the State Department of Parks and Recreation and Lake Forest. The local district's share of that cost came from funds left over from the federal EDA local public works project which financed the athletic complex, including the natatorium which houses the swimming pool at the high school.

The original cost estimate of the tennis courts was \$120,000, so there will be money left over to pay for the installation of lighting.

In a separate project, the two tennis courts behind W.T. Chipman in Harrington have recently been resurfaced.
