# BACK TO SCHOOL

September 4th

For Lake Forest Schools

Summer for Lake Forest kids shouts its last hurrah this week as the district's schools prepare for opening day, Thursday, September 4th.

One week from tonight, bedtime schedules will be tightened up as summer night owls get ready to meet the school buses set to roll the next morning.

But Lake Forest students and parents should note that the first two days of school, Thursday and Friday September 4th and 5th, are half days. School will dismiss at 12 noon, and no lunch will be served. The first full day of classes will be

on Monday, September 8. That day will also be the first day for the district's kindergartners.

Teachers will be back on the job September 2nd and 3rd, and will attend a district luncheon hosted by the Lake Forest School Board at the Lake Forest High School Cafeteria next Wednesday.

Some familiar faces will be missing, and there will be a few new ones. However, with enrollment still declining the former will, perhaps, be outweighed by the latter. Some of the "new faces" will be new only to the building in which they will be working as since

they represent transfers from other locations within the district. Others will be temporary as they fill in for teachers on maternity or other leave.

Lake Forest High School, where there will be three new teachers in the social studies department, and the Title I reading program, which has had a sizable reduction in the number of aides, may represent the biggest changes in staff.

Federal funds, which support the Title I program, were cut last year, and there was little carry over for this year. In addition, there have been rising costs which

include a mandatory 9 1/2 percent raise for Title I personnel. For these reasons the district has had to cut eight aides from the Title I staff, thereby necessitating a number of changes in the program. First grade aides will be giving an hour of their time to learning center students, and second and third grades will share aides. In addition there will be one floating aide who may be working with fourth, fifth and sixth grade students and in the learning center in each elementary school.

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## State Will Not Hear Houston Appeal

Houston residents who have been making desperate efforts to keep their little school open received a setback last week when the State Board of Education refused to hear their appeal.

Acting in secret and on the advice of its lawyer, Deputy Attorney General Roger Aiken the State Board decided not to hear Houston parents' appeal. In the

words of State Board member Harry F. Camper, "The State Board handles appeals only if the local Board fails to follow regulations set down by the Board. But the determination of whether or not to close a school is made by the local board." He further said the State Board does not have any power to overturn the Milford Board's decision. He also commented that if they (parents) do not like

what the local Board is doing, "...they can throw the rascals out."

The State Board released figures showing their small school scored way above the national average on the CAT (California Achievement Test) given in the spring. To them, the test scores are proof that a small neighborhood school in which parents are highly involved pro-

## Harrington Jaycees Win State Championship

The Harrington Jaycees took their first state slo-pitch softball championship in a gruelling Delaware State Jaycees Tournament held at Dover Air Force Base over the weekend. It took eight games, including six played on Sunday to do the job. The highest the local Jaycees have ever placed in previous state tournaments is a third back in 1978.

Player/Coach Ray Blanchette said "wiped-out" wasn't adequate to describe his bushed team after Sunday's packed, but triumphant schedule.

The Harrington Jaycees won all but one of the eight games played. They also advanced by one forfeit,

a game for which their opponent a Georgetown "B" team was a no-show.

The Harrington team set out first to win their bracket which they did with a 4-0 record in two games played on Saturday and two scheduled for Sunday. They beat New Castle 19-4, Rehoboth 12-4, and Milton 16-12. The fourth game was the forfeit by Georgetown.

In the finals competition on Sunday, two losses were necessary to eliminate a team from competition. Harrington suffered its first and only loss in a squeaker, 10-11, to Milford. But the local Jaycees went on to defeat Georgetown "A" 12-11, Milford (in a second game) 16-4 and, in back-to-back games for

the championship, Smyrna-Clayton 5-1 and 12-11. Play on Sunday started at 8 a.m. and continued through 9:30 p.m.

The Harrington Jaycee team with its two player-coaches has 12 members, and it took the contributions of all 12 to win the state championship. Special assists came from Don Hopkins who pitched all seven innings of all eight games over the two days and from ten home runs by five team members. Mark Langford and Bill Leonard each blasted three over the fences; Neil Smith was good for two, and Bob Outten and J.D. Dennis hit one each. Other members of the team were also batting well.

## L F Courts Are Open Now

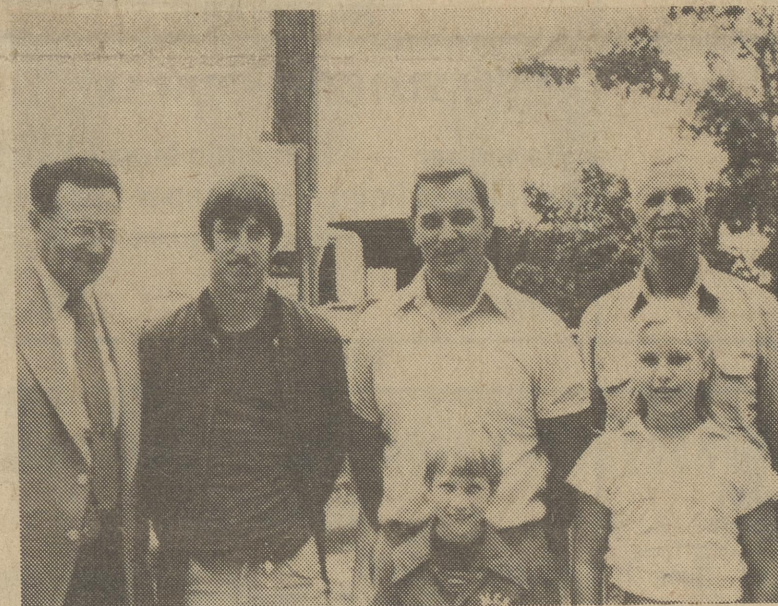
Eight brand new tennis courts, finished in red and green, have been completed at Lake Forest High School and are open for use by the school and by the public.

## Starkeys Get Record Melon Price

Roland and Louis Starkey's Jubilee melons brought a record price of \$10.85 per hundred weight on the Laurel auction block last Friday. The record price was paid by Tony Pagano and Sons, who operate out of Leesburg, Florida. The watermelons are sold at roadside stands and in Brooklyn, NY, where cool, mouth-watering slices of the Starkey melons will end up on restaurant menus.

The Paganos usually buy their melons by the field with a load to an acre the usual range in this area. In this area a good price is \$1,000 per acre. In Florida, the Paganos base of operations, \$800 per acre is considered fairly good.

The Paganos normally start hauling watermelons towards the end of April and continue up until the middle of September. This year, despite an early frost that killed off first plantings, much of the crop was early. In Immoklee, Florida, hit by the early frost, heat caused the second planting to germinate much earlier. But, the Paganos say, There is "no size" to the watermelons in most areas except for those raised by growers such as the Starkeys.

Higher prices this year are also a result of heat which killed or knocked off many of the blossoms producing a lower yield per acre. According to one estimate, there should be four loads off four acres. Growers this season may be getting only one load off four acres.

The Starkeys, a father and son team, grow about 10 acres of

watermelons and 10 acres of cantaloupes on their farm east of Harrington on the Harrington-Frederica Road. This year's crop was planted with seed purchased from Otis Twilley, formerly of Salisbury and currently of Pennsylvania, and Harris Seed Company of Pennsylvania.

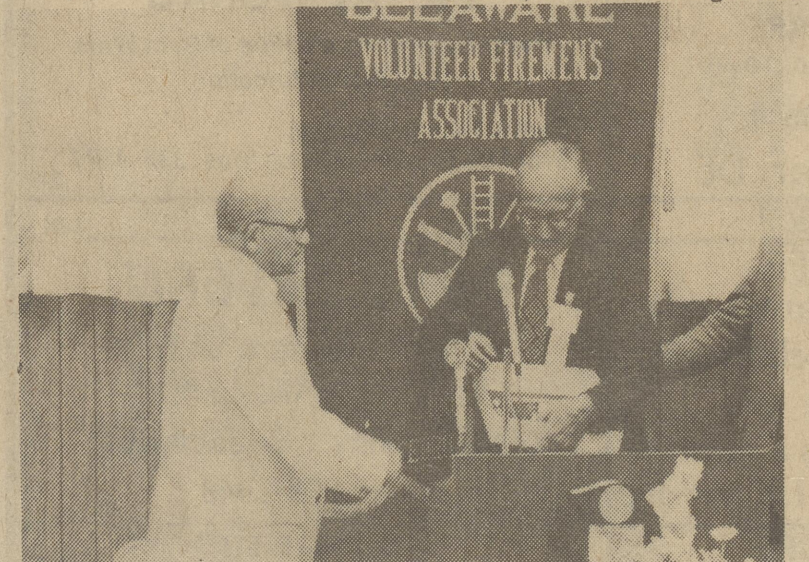
Look for a special souvenir Heritage Day Supplement in next week's Harrington Journal to give details including a map, directory and schedule of events.

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## Open Letter To Taxpayers

It is with both regret and understanding that we received the decision of the State Board of Education this past week. Due to the way in which the State Statutes are written, the fact that no specific policy exists, permits the local board to act without any official policy being formed. The state guidelines for evaluating school closings are only in the form of recommended policy and the Milford Board has steadfastly refused to use them.

It is amazing to us that any Board of Education Administration that was responsible for building an excellent educational program as evidenced in the statewide test scores in a growing, responsive and involved community such as Houston, one which has been deemed a "model school" and "the best little school in the state" and of which the superintendent has said he "felt a strong obligation and commitment to", could turn their backs on this achievement and the children's education as they have in this case.

The Board's decision did not come from any overwhelming problem, either with finances or enrollment, but among the reasons given by Board members themselves were such things as - "In order to break a deadlock", "We would be remiss in our duties if we didn't do something", "I'm sick and tired of receiving complaints about how good Houston School is and why can't my children have the

same education?" and "Houston (west) School is called the 'private' school and we can't have that." These hardly seem to be the proper responses expected from Board members who voiced their commitment to the better education of our district's children when they were candidates for office.

The Legislature of our state has not been silent on the problems that face our school districts in these times. They have voiced their position by joint resolution, that: 1. our feeder schools be continued intact. 2. that school buildings are built with tax dollars and are therefore property of the citizens and not district officials. 3. that adequately publicized public hearings should be held in each attendance area affected by closings for the express purpose of seeking public input before any decision be made. 4. that statements and opinions of the public be given sufficient consideration when making their final decision.

The Legislature has not rested there either. They have provided the finances which would enable the districts to continue their educational programs. The current school budget indicates that they have increased monies to the local schools including \$300,580.00 as an energy allocation - this is to compensate the local district for increased costs of energy. These costs used to be entirely the obligation of the local district thru property and capitation taxes. This 300,000 dollars is more than the

entire heat and utilities budgets for our district.

Last year a question was raised

Last year a question raised in a Milford Chronicle editorial was "Can the community possibly support a referendum to slightly increase school taxes, by a mere

dime per hundred dollars of assessed evaluation, to maintain quality education for the entire school population?" The answer of the entire district came in a referendum held March 25, 1980. The answer to the question was clear - we could, we would, and we did! The voters overwhelmingly

approved that extra money with 83% of the voters in favor of the tax increase. We are now informed that the money raised by that referendum is going for salary increases for Administrators, teachers and other salaries which are supported by local taxes.

There comes a time when we must think of the quotation of Mr. Harry F. Camper who is a member of the state board, "If they don't like what the board is doing, they can throw the rascals out on election day."

The local taxpayers interested in education (TIE) organization which is a part of the 200,000 member National Council of citizens in education (NCCE) is committed to seeing that our tax money is spent

with this in mind that the organization is continuing its program to attempt to actively involve all concerned individuals in our district in the decision making at the local level. Details of their September 5th meeting plans will be made available next week.

Remember, it's our children, our money, and it is definitely our business.

holding that same position at Northfield Park in Northfield, Ohio and has been associated with other tracks throughout the nation. As racing secretary, Brickel's responsibilities include putting together the line-ups for each night's racing program.

Brickel notes that stall space is at a premium this year at Harrington with trainers requesting over 600 stall spaces. More horses will undoubtedly "ship in" to race rather than stall on the grounds. "With this many horses, we've had to be very selective in choosing only those horses that will give us the best racing," Brickel went on to say that "We just didn't feel that some horses were competitive enough at this stage in their training. People come to the races to see close, fast and competitive events and that's what we're trying to accomplish."

Although it may not show to the fans watching the races, track management has also announced the addition of a new paddock area for the horsemen. This facility represents a goal set by the track a

number of years ago and which finally reached fruition earlier this summer. Racing further into the final quarter of the year both last season and this, it became imperative that the horsemen be provided an enclosed area in which to prepare their horses for each evening's races. Last year the track enclosed its grandstand for the comfort of the racing fans.

Another project recently completed includes the rebuilding of the race track surface. This project, along with the quality of the horses that have been granted stall space, is anticipated to provide new track records at the Harrington facility.

Wagering at the track will include Daily Double, Exacta, Quinella, Trifecta as well as the standard Win, Place and Show.

Although the track will open on a Monday this year, regular racing nights will be Wednesday through Sunday. Track officials have declared their Labor Day opening a Free night to race fans and anticipate a large crowd. Post time is 8:00 p.m.

## Disaster Drill To Be Held This Week

The Office of Emergency Services of the Division of Public Health will conduct a simulated disaster drill sometime prior to August 31, 1980. This year's simulation, run in cooperation with the Kent County Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council, involves participation from Kent General, Milford and Dover AFB hospitals. Other agencies involved are the Civil Air Patrol, Delaware State Police, Kent County volunteer fire departments, the Kent County Callboard, the Office of Emergency Operations and Planning, and a number of local volunteer ambulance squads.

The simulated disaster is expected to create at least 60 victims who will be separated, or triaged, according to severity of injury from the disaster site to participating hospitals.

The aim of the drill is to evaluate the Emergency Medical Service system in Kent County. The hospitals are required by the Joint Commission for the Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) to hold one such drill each year as one of the prerequisites for JCAH approval.

A detailed scenario of this year's simulated disaster will be made available to the news media approximately 48 hours prior to the drill. This information will carry an embargo on the time of release.

The start and finish points of the rally, which will begin at 1 p.m., will be at the YMCA headquarters at 1137 South State Street, Dover. According to the Bicycle Club of Delaware, clue sheets will be followed to check points during the rally. It will be judged on timing clues and observance of traffic laws.

outset of the competition.

## Lake Forest Bus Schedules

At this time it might be a good reminder to students and parents that riding a school bus is a privilege and that a student can lose that privilege if bus rules and regulations are not obeyed. Everytime a bus student violates the rules and distracts the driver, it endangers everyone on the bus.

We do not like suspending a child's privilege of riding the bus, but we must think of the safety of all the students on the bus, as well as the motoring public.

Parents and students should also be reminded that school bus routes change from year to year. Declining enrollment has caused us to cancel two bus contracts this year. Such changes may cause students to walk to a bus route because it no longer goes down their road.

State regulations require that a student live one-half mile or more from a bus route before a bus is required to come down the road to pick him up. Also, students in grades K-6 must live beyond one mile from school before they are eligible for bus transportation; students in grades 7-12 must live two miles or more to be eligible for transportation.

All Lake Forest bus drivers have been given the names and phone numbers of new students on their buses and are to call such students. If parents or students have any questions, please call the proper school, as they all have route maps and phone numbers of the bus contractors and drivers.

All routes are basically the same, except for the changes listed below:

### LAKE FOREST NORTH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

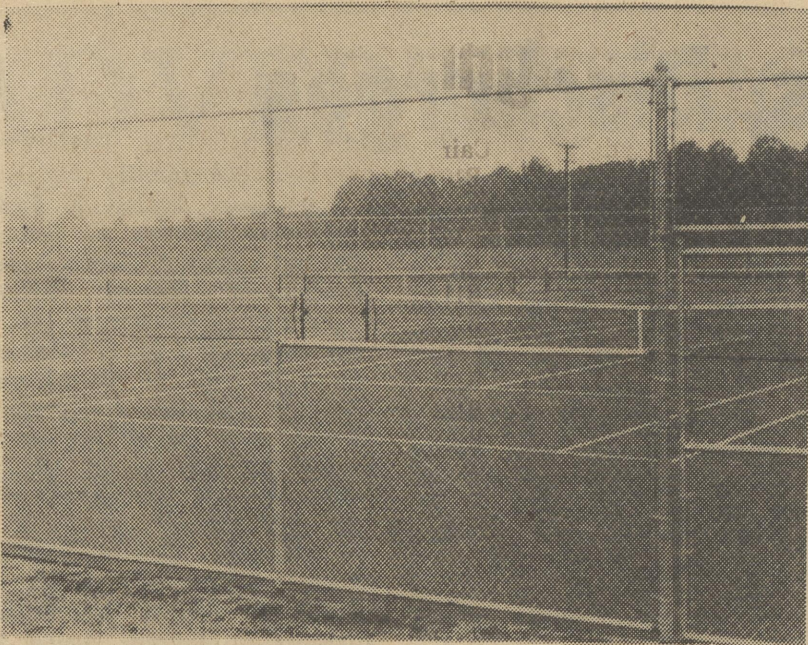

public use at times when they are not required for regularly scheduled school activities. The school district is requesting that tennis shoes only be worn while playing on the courts. School activities and other scheduled activities have priority, and Luff said playing time should be restricted to one hour when others are waiting to use the courts.

The school district is presently engaged in obtaining cost estimates for lighting, and there should be enough money available to make this possible.

The total cost of the tennis courts so far has been \$78,375,

shared 50/50 by the State Department of Parks and Recreation and Lake Forest. The local district's share of that cost came from funds left over from the federal EDA local public works project which financed the athletic complex, including the natatorium which houses the swimming pool at the high school.

The original cost estimate of the tennis courts was \$120,000, so there will be money left over to pay for the installation of lighting.

In a separate project, the two tennis courts behind W.T. Chipman in Harrington have recently been resurfaced.

## Nanticoke Dancers join tradition & dreams

"When we lead our dancers into the dance circle, the tradition of our forefathers and mothers and the hopes and dreams of our people today are joined," said Jean and Tee Norwood, who will be the lead dancers for the Nanticoke Powwow to be held on Saturday and Sunday, September 13-14.

This year's group of performers includes about 50 men, women and children, ranging in age from 2 to 85 years and spanning 4 generations. Often family groups participate together, renewing the heritage and culture for the tribe's younger members.

Preserving the culture and helping Nanticoke youth to develop a strong sense of self worth and pride in their heritage is the goal of the Heritage Committee which is responsible for the Powwow, to be held on the property of William and Joan Norwood, on Rd. 297 off Route 24 near Oak Orchard, approximately 6 miles east of Millsboro and 8 miles west of Rt. 1, Midway.

A highlight of the dancing, which is scheduled for 12:15, 4 and 8 p.m. on Saturday and at 2:15 p.m. on Sunday, will be the performance of the Toe Dance, the Nanticoke's last link to the powwows of previous generations. Leading the line of female dancers will be Mrs. Patience Harman, 85 years old, who danced at earlier powwow in Oak Orchard as a young girl. Her son, Clinton Harmon, and daughters, Eloise Johnson and Joan Norwood are members of the

musicians' group, and two other daughters, Thelma Johnson and Levalle Harmon, will join her in the dance line. Mrs. Harman also has 3 granddaughters and 4 great-grandchildren who are members of the dance troupe.

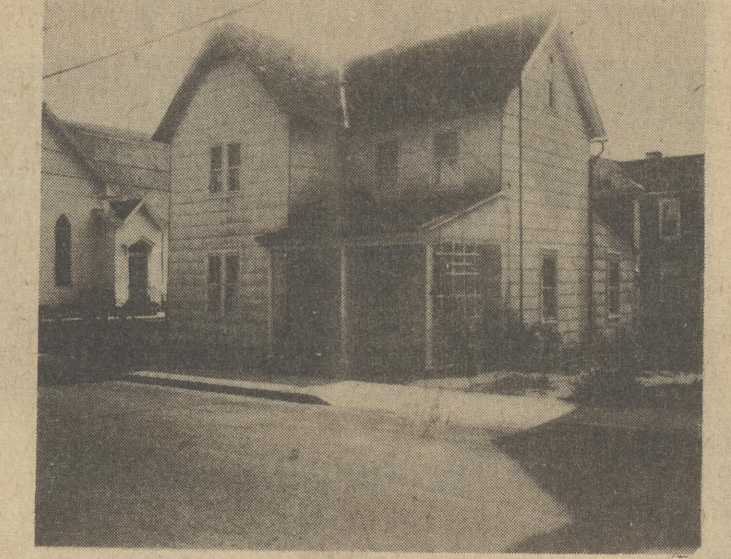
The music used to accompany the Toe Dance has been specially written to include the only two phrases remembered from music of the earlier powwows. To preserve the specialness of this fragile link to their past, the Nanticoke perform the Toe Dance only as a feature dance at their own Powwow.

Busy with the final stages of preparations, the Nanticoke dancers and musicians, are making ready their regalia (traditional native dress) - completing repairs and adding new pieces to their colorful feathers, jewelry, head-dresses, aprons, dresses, shawls and moccasins. The work is delicate and done entirely by hand, reflecting the creativity of individual performers. For the most part, natural and often hard to acquire materials such as bone, shell, silver, leather, feathers and quills are used to make the outfits authentic.

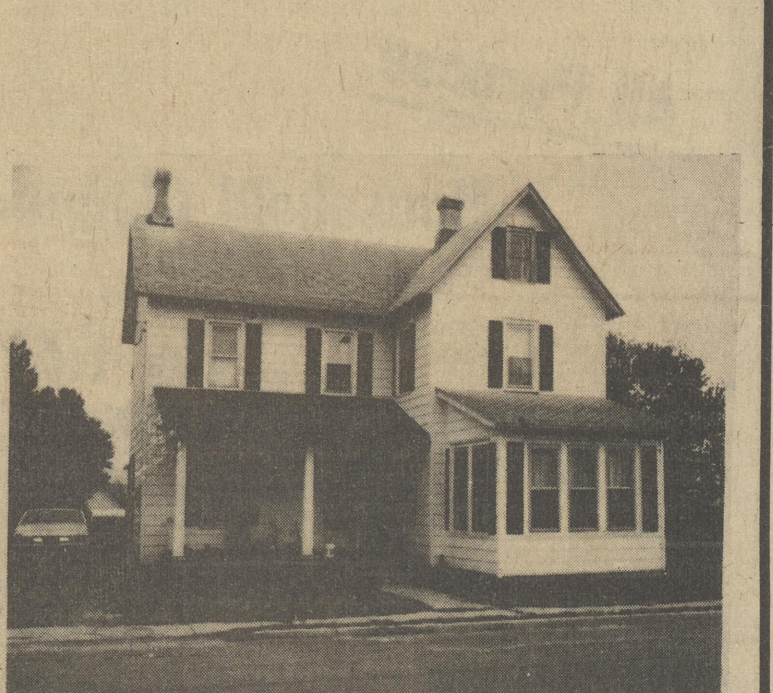
Families are encouraged to come and enjoy the Powwow together.

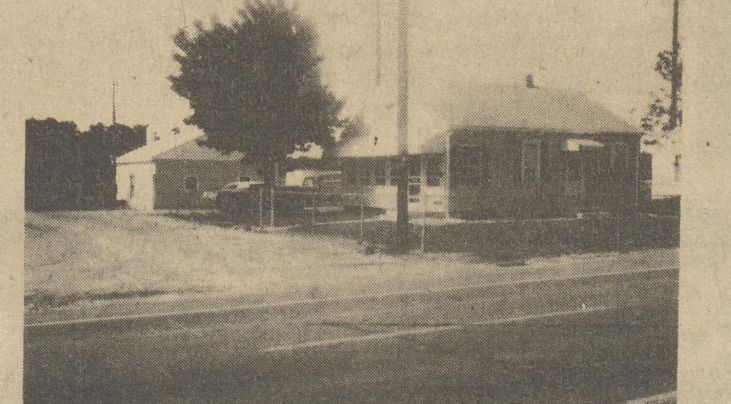
